behind the SPOTLIGHT

WHO WOULD BELIEVE IT? While the Department of Posts and Telegraphs earlier in the week refused to say when the postal services would return to normal they did claim that an improvement was taking place. But who would or could believe them?

Two letters posted in Dublin on September 27 were delivered to me on Monday last, October 8 after a period of 12 days in transit. The letters were important in that they referred to arrangements for the Papal visit which could have been of great benefit to me had I been aware of them in time. I mention them merely to show that there are long delays and I am aware that everyone else is in the same boat.

Over the past few weeks a storm of complaints from industry and tourism about the time taken to deliver letters has blown up while much concern has also been voiced by the general public who are subjected to much hardship in many ways by the delay in the postal services.

We have been offered all kinds of excuses by the Department. A Posts and Telegraphs spokesman stated during the week that the delays were being caused by staff shortages. Staff was being recruited but it would take some time to train them. He also pointed out that post office staff had received their full holidays this year despite the 19-week strike and as a result this had caused additional problems as leave had to be taken into a smaller period of time than normal.

The question that many people are now asking is whether the postal services will ever again revert to what, before the strike, we accepted as normal. Has the 19-week strike off such the old machine still off during the strike period placed it in the position that it will never again, in its present form, function with any degree of efficiency?

In an editorial in the Irish Times on the subject on Tuesday the affects of the 19-week strike which took place in the British postal service in 1971 are recalled. In spite of the best efforts of both management and unions it never really recovered. The editorial stated and added: "The concept of second-class mail emerged and then became a permanent feature. Next-day delivery is unknown as a result of the United Kingdom strike."

If this is to be the consequence of the strike here then some alternative arrangements will have to be made. Communication must be speeded up to start with. If the Department fails to get the service moving in a satisfactory manner something will have to be done. Perhaps if they spent less time in thinking up excuses and more in providing service we would be present and get on with the job the position might be done.

BOULETS AND BOOES

Viewing the visit of Pope John Paul II to Ireland in retrospect there are a couple of bouquets I would like to hand out but also a few booes I would like to give.

Whatever may be said about the visit in so many other ways there is a unanimous agreement that the coverage of the ceremonies at all centres was a superb one and a big bouquet to them for that. Then there were the hardships of the private buses which ferried thousands of pilgrims in a most non-stop to Galway, Knock and Limerick with little or no sleep and very little to eat over the three days. And of course to the delay in the wonderful way each of the ceremonies was organised and run.

One of the biggest booes I want to give is at ourselves. The general public for the manner in which we turned every one of the venues concerned from clean well-laid out areas into enormous refuse dumps. In practically every instance, and I saw it personally in Limerick, people just got up at the close of the ceremonies and walked away, literally leaving everything behind. It was an absolute disgrace and a great shame on all of us.

Then also a big boo for CIE for the way that they ill-treated the pilgrims at several of the centres but especially at Knock where they charged each individual £1 for a return shuttle service from Clarendon to Knock which turned out to be a fiasco and was described to me by one pilgrim as an absolute rip-off and a boo also to some of the stewards who sent many pilgrims who had suffered great hardship in many ways on fools errands in their attempts to gain admission to some of the venues.

BREAKING THE £5 BARRIER!

Since the new regulations relating to bar extensions at supper dances came into force on September 1, there has been some difficulty in deciding what constitutes a substantial meal and how much of the admission price charged should be absorbed in providing it.

At first the District Justice in charge of the Court areas of West Waterford and South Tipperary decided that the minimum admission charge to such functions should be £3.50 on the basis that £2 of the charge should go towards the provision of the meal. Solicitors in Tipperary making applications for extensions raised objections to this decision and a test case by way of appeal to the Circuit Court has been entered.

Pending the outcome of this appeal the District Justice intimated that he was prepared to compromise by knocking 50p off the charge fixed but further issue was taken against this.

At a recent sitting of the District Court in Dungarvan local solicitor Mr J P Gordon submitted a number of applications on behalf of a client submitted that the minimum charge then standing at £3 should be reduced by a further 50p to £2.50 without interfering with the substantial content of the meal to be provided. In the case he cited he told the Court that it would consist of a portion of chicken together with hot potatoes and vegetables. Mr Gordon created chuckles in court when he pointed out that in insisting on the £3 limit the District Justice would place an intending customer who wished to take a partner to a dance in the position of having to break the £5 barrier to gain admission.

He won his point when the District Justice agreed to a further compromise with a £2.50 minimum charge but this will only apply until the test case to be submitted to the Circuit Court next month's circuit.

WINTER IS NIGH

Winter is already upon us and the passage of the year after a most indifferent summer is marked by the early darkness which now falls.

While the changes in nature leave us in no doubt that summer has gone and that the time to don the winter woollies and the rain gear has come the civil changes that mark the change-over from summer to winter time hampered that point home as well.

Last Monday night we had the first of these changes over when the closing times in licensed premises were cut by half-an-hour to 11.10 p.m. The second and more noticeable of these changes will follow in a fortnight's time when on the night of October 27-28 we put our clocks back an hour. From then on it will be a case of batten down the hatches and prepare for the worst.

Let us hope that it will not be as harsh or as long as the winter we had last year.

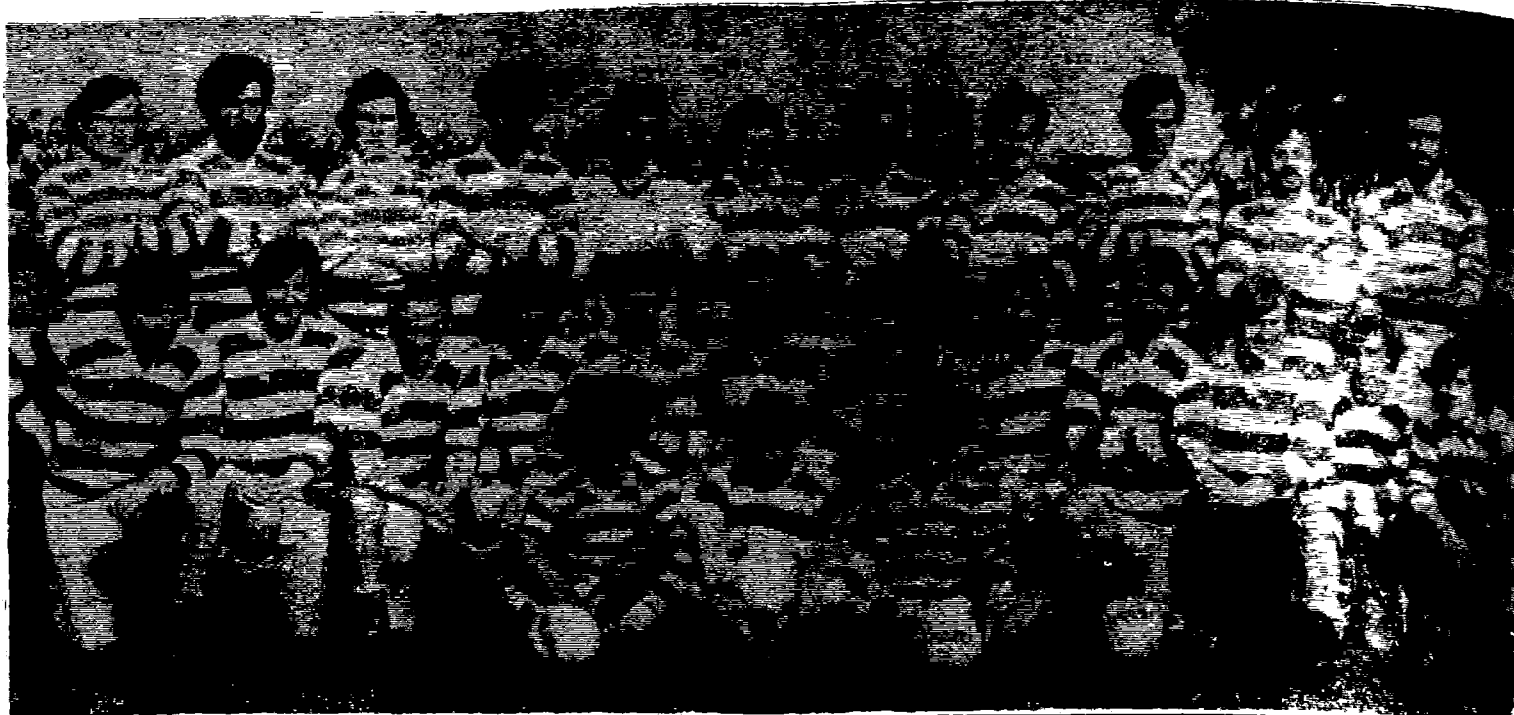

CENTRAL BANK ASKED TO RAISE EXTRA £25m.

The Irish Farmers Association and the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers Association have asked the Central Bank to borrow an extra £25 million for productive purposes in agriculture.

While the actual lending rates in most European countries would be 7% 8% or 9% farmers would pay the full Irish rate of 17% to 19%. The extra money about 9% would go into stabilisation fund which would be used to insure the loans against fluctuating currencies in the different countries.

The fund would be administered by a committee comprised of representatives of the banks and their agricultural experts alone the lines of the committee which supervised the World Bank loan for agriculture some years ago.

The money would be used for land reclamation increasing cattle breeding stock increasing capacity for wintering livestock, disease eradication, problems, young farmers starting out in farming.

The IFA and ICMSA to approach the Government to ask them to examine the solution. They will also be approaching the commercial banks whom they are suggesting should disburse the £25 million loan to individual farmers.

"We're All The Same To-Day" (By "Once Dubh")

It is hard for an amateur to draft a description of the happiness in Ireland around the time week-end of September 20th in view however of the occasion involved anyone who ever wrote a line about anything would be cowardly not to try again. There is an appeal for help to lift a mass of litter from the centre of Phoenix Park. It is a sordid sight of rubble stretching for miles but it is a powerful reminder of possibly our next hour.

Together with Galway, Knock and Dublin Airport, the fifteen acres of the Phoenix Park will be long remembered as the venue for the first visit to Ireland or the leader of millions of Catholics and a gesture to calm the waters of a troubled sea. It is no need to dive into any details about this Papal welcome - the crowds have already spoken - but in between there was joy and disappointment and a number of minor incidents that contributed to a historic day.

Many writers including Pensions of the Dungarvan Leader mentioned that a lot of the Papal visit was centred around the West and while I agree, I think the man in question would gladly have it such a thing was possible that the hands of us all. True there would have been some scene had his helicopter touched down on Tramore Racecourse or at Cork Airport. Perhaps the schedule of his visit remains a bit of a mystery but who can deny that in the short time at his disposal he did us proud. Galway had a special significance some had already spent long hours in the Phoenix Park and did not gain passage back until the early hours of Monday morning. Their singing of pop hymns was a treat to remember. I am no pop enthusiast but somehow the Rivers of Babylon will never be the same again.

Knock the focal point of the Pope's visit will be remembered because of the magic of the man himself and the courage and faith of the Irish who travelled long journeys to meet him. There was disappointment too as people who waited long hours to catch a close glimpse of the Pontiff and walked back in darkness to Claremorris without having achieved their goal. Truly it was a day of joy and disappointment. On Saturday September 23rd as night fell on the Papal cavalcade, flag waving thousands waited in Sean McDermott Street in Dublin near the tomb of Matt Talbot but the cavalcade moved on.

Congratulations have been offered to many on the success of the visit and organisers the Garda the ambulance brigade the Civil Defence. No doubt they deserve it but to speak of Phoenix Park alone the solid and serene behaviour of the million three hundred thousand people must never be forgotten.

As her two small children grappled with lemonade and sandwiches she cast an eye across the teeming thousands and on towards the red robed figure one quarter of a mile away from us "black-sticker" patrons of coral 22. Let it be said that we all the same today. Some statements ladies and gentlemen some statements.

An extract from the Pope's address in Dromeda must have drawn the greatest cheer of the visit. I do not remember the exact words but the text was: "I am from the Vatican. There are some who may not believe me but let history record that in an hour of trial the 'Bishop of Rome came to visit Ireland'." Let it be said that we all the same today. Some statements ladies and gentlemen some statements.

"Never" (I would say) "in the field of human conflict has so much been done for so many by so few." Yes his visit could be a kind of transport to a brighter day - a ship to a new horizon.
