## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### A SOCIAL SERVICE BUT HARDLY AT £1 MILLION A WEEK

While most people correctly assumed that the CIE transport system in this country was being run at a loss I think that everyone was surprised or indeed perhaps shocked to learn that the losses of CIE were now running at a staggering £1 million per week. It has always been accepted that the running of a railway service in any country on a profitable basis has at best been only a remote possibility. In fact public transport services are universally looked on as necessary social services but when the operating losses of such a service in a small country such as ours run to the enormous sum of £1 million every week of the year then there is need to have a long hard look at the service.

Something must be done to bring in a realistic national transport policy and to put a halt to CIE's runaway losses. While the railways are an integral part of the economy, and a pity it is that so many of the lines including our own here in County Waterford were lopped off in the past in the name of economy, a definite effort will have to be made at the highest level to get our national transport system back to some sort of financial sanity.

### NO SMOKING IN HOSPITALS

The General Hospitals Committee of the South Eastern Health Board has recommended acceptance of a recommendation from the Waterford Local Health Committee that the "no smoking" rule in Ardkeen hospital be rigorously observed.

In addition the Hospitals Committee has recommended that the rule be also applied to all the Board's general hospitals. This move would appear to be quite in line with the attitude of Health Minister, Mr Charles Haughey, who has come down strongly on the smoking habit even to the extent of restricting the advertising programmes of all the tobacco manufacturers and their sponsorship of sporting activities.

### BRICKEY MAN IN ROSTREVOR

Many television viewers who watched the Liam O'Murchu programme "From 'S Eadrom" last Monday night week must have wondered who the man who declared himself a native of the Brickey area of Dungarvan was.

The programme dealt wholly with O'neachtas na Gaeltachta which was being held that week in Dublin. This great annual festival of Irish culture draws gaels from the four corners of Ireland and the studio audience for the "From 'S Eadrom" programme on the occasion well indicated that.

There was a particularly strong northern contingent from Rostrevor, Co Down and it was one of this group who declared while taking part in a discussion on the revival of Irish and Irish culture that he was a Brickey man but beyond that his identity was not revealed.

Like many other viewers I was curious and following inquiries I found that the man in question was Patrick Ahearne a member of the well known Ahearne family of Ballynaylor and brother of the better locally known Frank and Seamus Ahearne.

Patrick a secondary teacher now lives in Rostrevor with his wife also a teacher and daughter of former GAA President Alf Murray and his family.

**UDARAS NA GAELTACHTA**  
 Mr Denis Gallagher, T.D., Minister for the Gaeltacht has made the necessary arrangements for the holding

of the first election for Udaras na Gaeltachta. Seven members to represent the various Gaeltacht areas on the Board will be elected by a poll to be held on December 12. The latest date for the receipt of nominations is November 21.

Of the seven to be elected by the people of the Gaeltacht by means of the single transferable vote two will be elected by the Donegal Gaeltacht areas and three by the Gaeltacht areas of Galway, Mayo and Meath. The remaining two will be elected by the Kerry, Cork and Waterford Gaeltacht areas.

### IS IT TO BE LEFT ON THE SQUARE?

Is the eyesore which was planted in the centre of Dungarvan Square as an office by South-East Tourism Organisation earlier this year to be left there as a permanent fixture and a more or less derelict object throughout the winter?

There has always been controversy about the attitude of SERTO in placing temporary dwellings and caravans at the Square for the few short months of the summer tourist season—usually from about June to September—and then leaving them behind when they have ceased to occupy or have use for them.

The Urban Council has given permission to the Tourism people to plank this eyesore in the centre of the Square for many years past on the grounds that it is good for the tourist business locally. Perhaps this is so but then again perhaps it is not. However the point has been repeatedly made that SERTO should be able to rent suitable conventional offices in the town instead of dumping one of these temporary dwellings on the Square every year for the duration of the summer tourist season.

But now that the summer tourist season is long gone past the bothan in the Square remains besides being an eyesore it occupies valuable parking space in the town centre. Perhaps the Urban Council would pro-SERTO to having the thing removed—even if only for the months until next June as it will not be needed again until then.

### A LINK WITH THE PAST

The regretted death in Dungarvan last week of Mr Paddy Kearney recalls a family link which he had with a famous Dublin family. Born himself in Dublin Paddy Kearney came to Dungarvan at the age of 18 years and started work at the gents hairdressing shop of Phelans in Main Street nearly three score of years ago.

He was cousin of Peadar Kearney who will always be remembered as the composer of the Irish National Anthem "The Soldiers Song" and also a cousin of the famous literary family of the Behans which included the late Brendan Behan and Dominic Behan.

Our sympathy is extended to his bereaved wife, son, daughter and other relatives.

### Death Of Former Augustinian Prior

Rev. Fr. Patrick Cummins O.S.A. who died in Waterford on Sunday after a long illness was a former Prior of the Augustinian Order in Dungarvan for several years during which time he was very active in GAA and other sports and cultural activities. He was largely responsible for the fund-raising efforts which led to the building of St Augustine's Church in Cork City. Fr. Cummins was extremely popular and well known for his work with young people.

Two big building fund matches of the time were the famous Glen v Barrs clashes known ever since as the "suit-lengths" and "bicycles" tournament games—reckoned by many to be the best ever in Cork. Fr. Cummins was born in Stradbally, Co. Waterford in 1909 and joined the Augustinian Order in 1922. He was ordained in 1929 and worked in many parts of the country.

He died at Maypark Nursing Home in Waterford and is survived by his brothers, sisters, nephews and nieces. His remains were removed to the Friary Church, Dungarvan last Monday evening and his interment took place in the adjoining churchyard after a celebrated Requiem Mass on Tuesday.

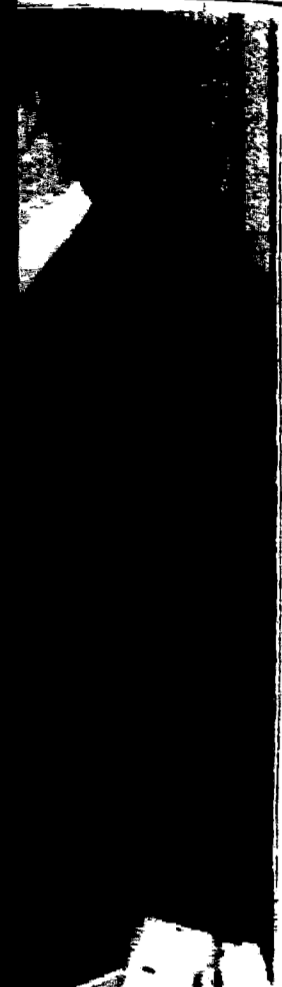

DISASTROUS DAY FOR WATERFORD HURLING

LAOIS 1-12, WATERFORD 0-10

The credibility of Waterford hurling could not stand long following their five points defeat at the hands of the newly rated Laois side in their opening game in Div 1B of the National Hurling League at Dungarvan, on Sunday last.

It was Waterford's worst display ever — and the fact that they did not suffer an even more humiliating beating could be attributed to the shortcomings of the Laois attack rather than to any outstanding defensive play by Waterford.

In fact Laois were so much on top for long periods that they should have been much further ahead at the finish and would not have been flattered had they been so.

Despite a spirited opening five minutes, which saw their score without reply, Waterford's challenge subsequently deteriorated and they were struggling to contain a determined if not brilliant Laois side for the remainder of the game.

Even the urgings of the home crowd failed to lift Waterford as Laois against the wind forced them back on the defensive.

The winners led by 0-2 by the 17th minute and the goal which had looked so imminent for some time came two minutes later when Johnny Mahon, who had taken the lead for the first time, maintained this point lead at the interval (1-4 to 0-5) and Waterford's position at this stage looked hopeless as they faced the strong breeze in the second half.

As expected the winners piled on the pressure from the restart and added two more in the next six minutes. Waterford made a brief bid to salvage battered pride and had drawn level (4-6 to 0-9) by the 42nd minute but they failed to maintain their challenge and it was Laois who made the running for the remainder of the game.

Three points followed before Waterford had their next and final score a point from a free by Tom Maher in the 47th minute. But the final ten minutes belonged exclusively to Laois as they sent over three further points which deserved a place in the game, which, from a Waterford viewpoint was nothing short of a disaster.

Laois had very good players in Keogh, John Carroll, Christy Jones, Mick Mahon and John Delaney, John Delahunty and Michael Walsh at centrefield and Martin and Michael Cuddy, Johnny Mahon, and John Kirwan in attack.

BLACK DAY It was unquestionably a black day for Waterford hurling, a day when Daise hurling stock slumped to an all time low. The position at the end looks irretrievable, the prospects bleak and the hopes of a major breakthrough to the big time seem to be fading beyond recall.

Some players came through the game with reputations intact. Keeper George O'Grady, Seamus Hannon, Moe and Richie Walsh, Nicky Cashin and Noel Connors did their best against all the odds. But it is obvious that something is badly amiss and particularly in a forward line which failed to score from play over the sixty minutes. Some of the players who have to be looked at closely if Waterford are to stop the rot which threatens to wipe out hurling in the county at inter-county level.

PRO Objections To Colligan Estuary Reclamation Following representations which he made to the Minister for Tourism and Transport Deputy Austin Deasy has received the following reply from the Ministers Private Secretary.

I refer to your recent representations on behalf of the residents of Strandside North Abbeyside, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford and confirm that Dungarvan Urban District Council have applied to this Department for permission to reclaim portions of the Colligan River Estuary.

A number of objections to the proposal were received in this Department following publication of a statutory notice in two local newspapers. These objections are at present under consideration and I will be in touch with you again at a later date in regard to the outcome of the Council's application.

The Minister in his reply said that as regards (a) surveys of congestion were made by the Land Commission only as necessary in connection with the division of particular estates. Dail Questions On Waterford Coast Erosion

In reply to questions raised by Mr Austin Deasy T.D. in the Dail the Minister for Finance Mr George Colley stated that the government was seeking EEC fund assistance for coast protection projects because there was a sufficient availability of such projects to utilise the country's fund quota.

Mr Colley also informed Mr Deasy that the Commissioners of Public Works had received proposals under the Coast Protection Act, 1963 from Waterford County Council for coast protection works at the following locations:

- (1) Ardmore/Curragh (2) Ballyvogue (3) Cunnigar (4) Glencorran/Ballyquin (5) Tra more (6) Whiting Bay

He went on to say that the Commissioners were awaiting completion of certain statutory requirements in relation to the applications submitted in respect of Ardmore/Curragh Cunnigar Glencorran/Ballyquin and Whiting Bay. The application for Tra more was listed for a statutory preliminary examination but because of prior commitments it was not possible at this stage to say when this would be carried out.

The question of the relative proportion of Exchequer and Community funds to be spent on the Ballyvogue proposal had delayed progress here but a decision on this aspect would be made shortly and the Ballyvogue project proceeded with as quickly as possible having regard to other commitments the protracted statutory processes under the 1963 Act and the availability of engine cranes and other staff to carry out the work.

Objections To Colligan Estuary Reclamation

Following representations which he made to the Minister for Tourism and Transport Deputy Austin Deasy has received the following reply from the Ministers Private Secretary.

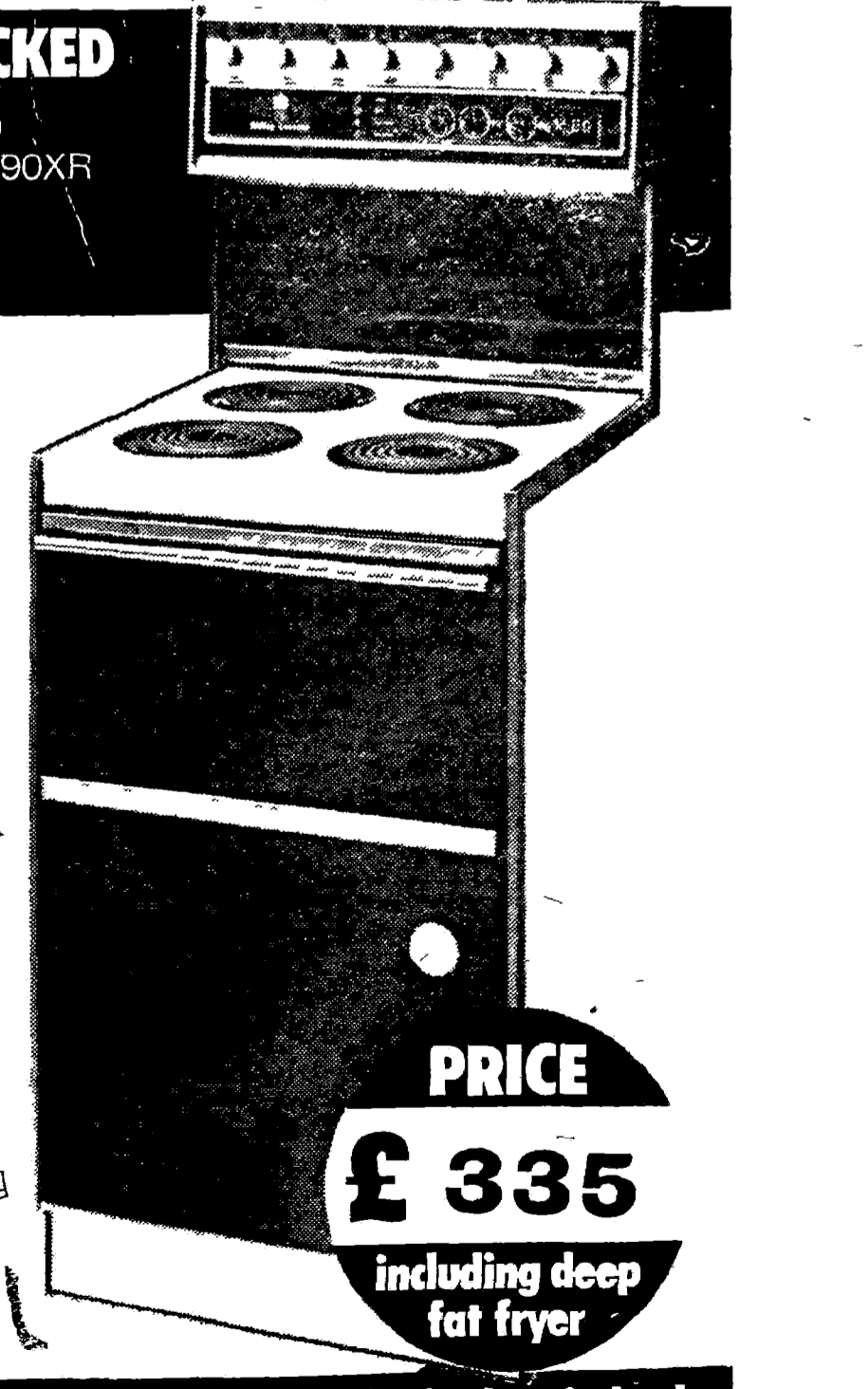

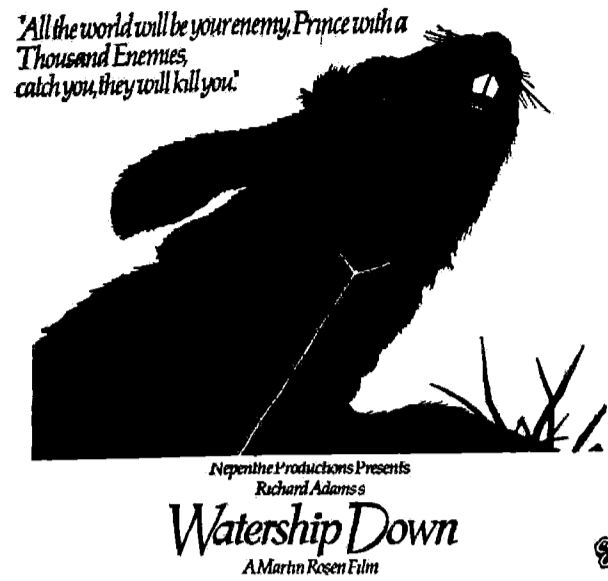

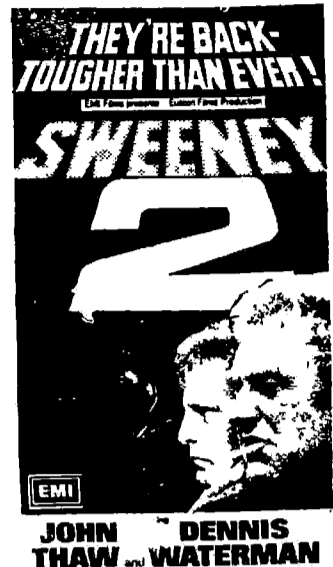

### ATHLETICS STAR OF THE FUTURE



FRANK O'BRIEN — the country's most exciting weight-throwing prospect (Rory Wyley)

He stands a towering six feet one inch in his stocking feet tips the scales at 15 stone and at 14 years of age bids fair to become one of Ireland's most successful ever field athletes.

That's a sketchy statistical breakdown of Frank O'Brien of M.p.stown Dungarvan an Intermediate Certificate student at the local CBS who has just rounded off a fabulously successful year by being awarded the Bishops Trophy for the most promising athlete in Waterford '79.

The shot discus and hammer are his specialist field events and since he took up athletics for the first time in 1976 has regularly and spectacularly smashed national record after record in all three events.

His achievements have not been confined to this country alone and this year was one of nine Irish athletes selected to represent the Irish schools at the F.I.S.C. Games at Burgos in Spain. There he captured a gold medal in the discus and a silver in the shot emerging as one of the brightest stars of the games.

Frank's modest in the extreme about his achievements to date rates that Spanish performance as the one that most pleases him in winning the discus he achieved a throw of 54.88 metres which is way ahead of anything ever achieved by an athlete of his age in this country and indeed is one of the best ever recorded by a 14 year old anywhere in Europe.

He trains for ninety minutes a day — every day — and it is this kind of commitment to the sport that all but assures him of a glittering athletics future.

He is generous in his praise of his coach Jack Fraser of Tallow who really launched him on his athletics career. Mr. Michael Lavelle of Rockwell College Bro. Lotius of Dungarvan CBS, former Olympic hammer thrower Phil Conway and Mary McKiernan a P.T. instructor at the local Presentation convent.

Nor does Frank omit the local Augustinian Fathers who have always made their top class training facilities readily available to him.

His main target in the coming few years is to compete and capture gold at the European Junior Championships (under 19). He is already well on the way to achieving the prestigious distinction for these prestigious championships and there are more than a few connected with athletics in the country who believe he could well become the youngest ever winner of a gold medal at these championships.

Apart from competing in Spain this year he was also a member of the Irish schools in a national team which conquered at Grangemouth in Scotland while on the home front he won the Waterford and Munster shot discus and hammer titles setting up new records in all three events in the process.

He also won the Waterford, East Munster and Munster Colleges for the shot discus and hammer again with record throws in each and went on to win the All-Ireland junior colleges shot and discus titles.

The '79 successes didn't end there as he also won the Waterford and National Community Games discus final. He was a member of the Munster team in the Tailteann Games for Under 17's (he's only 14) and won silver and bronze medals.

Frank's first medal was won in 1976 when he captured a silver in the All-Ireland shot put championship at Santry and that same year won the county shot championship. In Waterford Munster and All-Ireland championships and as runner-up in the shot put at the Community Games finals in Mosney.

Last year's successes came thick and fast as Frank's emergence as a real international prospect became evident. Again county provincial and national titles were won proving the youngster's worth even more in important triumphs this season.

In a county that has seen John and Ray Treacy and Gerry Deegan blaze glory paths on the athletic tracks of the world there is every confidence that 14 year old Frank O'Brien will in time achieve similar glory in the field events at which he is now displaying such immense promise and potential.
