## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### US MAYOR-ELECT IN DUNGARVAN

Last week in Dungarvan I had the pleasure of meeting Mr Charlie Smith Mayor-elect of Pittsfield Massachusetts USA, who told me during the brief interview which I had with him that he was absolutely flabbergasted by the hospitality kindness and generosity of the Irish people and that nowhere in the world had he experienced such a relaxed way of life as we have here.

The Mayor-elect was in Dungarvan with his wife Pat who has close family connections in the town for a brief holiday following his successful mayoral campaign and they and the other members of his party returned to the US on Sunday last.

Pittsfield, a city of some 70,000 or a population is at the western tip of Massachusetts close to the border with the State of New York and although not born there Charlie Smith grew up there and in time became involved in the construction industry. In 1973 he became Director of Maintenance with the Pittsfield Housing Authority. His interest in public office had surfaced five years previously in 1968 when he first ran for election to the City Council. He suffered a narrow defeat in 1972 but in 1974 he won a seat on the Council and was its President in 1976 and 1977.

This year he offered himself as a candidate in the mayoral election which is contested in Pittsfield on a party basis and following a good showing in the October primary he went on to win outright in the election on November 6 defeating the incumbent in the Office by a large majority the first time such a thing happened in twenty years.

At 47 years of age married with a family of six whose ages range from 25 years down to 10 years Mayor-elect Smith is an active man still in the prime of life and he will assume office as leading Mayor of Pittsfield on January 1.

He told me that his association with Dungarvan is through his wife Pat who made the first contacts with her relatives here while she was in the States and she and her mother and aunts were on a visit to Ireland in 1976. These were her uncle and aunt (Chaet and Annette Whelan (nee Street) of 54 Central Brugha Place. Last year he accompanied his wife on her second visit to Dungarvan and earlier this year Annette Whelan and other members of her family aid a return visit to Ireland.

Mayor-elect Smith, despite the name he bears told me that as far as he is aware, he has no Irish connections in his family. He was born near Denver and moved with his family to a child in Pittsfield. His father is second generation born American her mother is also born in the US being daughter of Thomas Street who was born in Dungarvan and who emigrated to the US as a young man.

Being the Mayor-elect and being the party which elected Dungarvan last week included their son Charlie (Junior) and his wife, mother in law Irene and sisters in law Mary and Gabrielle and a close family friend Eva Tidd who is nursing in Boston. All a usual had a most enjoyable time.

Incidentally my thanks to Mr Tom Dolan (Supermarket) who is responsible for my introduction to Mayor-elect Smith.

### Clubs in Dungarvan last weekend

The four involved Frank Power, Jim O'Connell and Sean O'Lionain, all employees of Dungarvan Crystal and Peter Ahearne an employee of Cappoquin Bacon Factory commenced the fast at 6 p.m. on Thursday evening of last week and remained without food until 6 p.m. on Saturday evening.

By that time the public passing by the caravan where they carried out the fast parked at the Mary Street Corner of Grattan Square, had contributed the grand total of £3,392.92 which goes to the Cambodia famine fund. In addition there was a further large amount contributed by sponsors and by the employees of Dungarvan Crystal and Cappoquin Bacon Factory.

### O'HANLON'S MOUNTAIN

Earlier in the year agitation was mounted by the people in the Ballysaggart area against moves to take away the traditional rights they had to cutting turf for their own personal requirements on O'Hanlon's Mountain.

Since then the local Dail Deputies, Jackie Fahey and Austin Deasy have raised the matter in the Dail the latter doing so within the last few weeks when he asked the Minister for Agriculture if he would ensure that the turf banks concerned would be retained as a source of fuel for the local people as they have been down through the years.

For some inexplicable reason the question was answered not by Mr Gibbons but by the Minister for Industry Commerce & Energy Mr O'Malley. It made no great difference, though as the reply indicated that the Minister was merely washing his hands of the matter when he said that the Land Commission had no function in regard to the turf banks "on the tract of mountain referred to which is understood to be in private ownership".

The Minister Mr Faulkner in his reply admitted to the Deputy that RTE were considering the question of how to provide reception of RTE Radio 1 on VHF throughout the day without depriving listeners of reception from RTE Radio 2 but at this stage it was not possible to say when a solution to the problem would be found.

### RACE COMPANY CLAIMS £12,000

You will recall our comments on the filthy conditions in which the people who arranged Limerick Race Course on the final day of the Papal visit on October 1 left the place on leaving it. Well as a consequence the Bishop of Limerick has now received a bill from the Limerick Race Company for £12,000 to cover the losses sustained when they were unable to hold a scheduled race meeting a month later because it had not been possible to get the track back to proper condition in time and the Stewards would not allow the meeting to be held.

Further comment would be superfluous!

### QUICKLY REMOVED

I meant to refer last week to the speed with which the South East Tourism Organisation reacted to our criticism of the manner in which they had left their temporary tourist office "abandoned" at the Square in Dungarvan.

Within a matter of a few days it was "jacked up" and taken away. Better late than never, I suppose.

### RTE RADIO 1 RECEPTION

I have had several complaints in recent weeks from people not only in Dungarvan but elsewhere about poor reception of RTE Radio 1 on the medium wavelength. One listener told me that he always was able to get reception on VHF until some time back when Radio na Gaeltachta blacked out the signal. I was interested then to read while going through the Official Dail Reports that the Skibbereen TD Jim O'Keefe (who incidentally has family ties through marriage with Dungarvan) raised the matter in the Dail on October 25 when he asked the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs when

**Four deputations at Council meeting**

Four deputations were received at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night and although it was unanimously agreed at the outset to allocate five minutes to each deputation to state their case and that discussions be reserved until the deputations withdrew the entire matter dragged on for a full hour.  
**HANDBALL CLUB**  
The first deputation heard was of 4 members of the Handball Club who sought money to build a new alley. Members of the deputation told the Council that they had a couple of hundred members in the club. They had a site for the alley at the Gaelic Field and about £3,000 in their own funds. An alley similar to one in Clonmel would they said cost about £35,000.  
Although the Co Manager said that the Council had no funds at its disposal at present for this purpose the Chairman Mr R A Wish assured in a deputation that they would get every support from the Council.  
**ROWING CLUB**  
The second deputation was from the Rowing Club and consisted of Ms S Brannigan (Capt) Mr B Keohan and Mr J R Walsh the latter being spokesman. They were there because they wanted the use of the estuary in the last few months they had 2 boats damaged which cost a lot to repair. The main problem here was the bridge which would be built over the estuary and fall of the tide and ships going around which throw up banks of rocks and stones. They never knew from one tide to the next where these banks would be.  
Mr Walsh went on to say that last year he submitted proposals to the Council to put a low weir at the red bridge to hold about 7' of water which would cost £1,500 or £2,000. This is a job that must be done if the club is to survive, he said.  
Asked for his comment when the deputation had withdrawn the Town Engineer Mr P Walsh said that several years ago the advice of the Cork Harbour Commissioners' Engineer was sought on this and other matters and the Commissioners' Engineer was completely against any such proposal. He recalled that if there was any interference with the flow of water in the Western Bay or Colligan estuary they might find the shipping channel silted up to the extent that no shipping could be brought in.  
When the Co Manager Mr O'Connor said that this would be a matter for the Department of Industry and Commerce it was agreed to ask them to carry out a survey and give an assessment of the proposal.

**THE LINNEY**

A 3-man deputation from the Brass and Reed Band asked the Council to alter their decision to repair the Linney which adjoined their bandroom at the Quay.  
The deputation pointed out that the Linney was at present in a scandalous state and was now used only by wineos and tinkers as a doss-house and toilet. They said that pallets stored there enabled some of these people to climb on to the Linney roof and then on to the bandroom roof which has been damaged very badly and cost a lot to repair. They said that it would be better to have the Linney cleared away altogether as it was of no value any longer.  
When the deputation withdrew it was pointed out that some months ago following a deputation from the dockers who wanted the Linney cleaned up and repaired so that they could use it as a shelter on days when boats were being discharged the Council agreed to do so at an estimated cost of £475.  
It was agreed that the matter be again discussed with the dockers' Union.  
The members of the Band deputation were J Connors F Kencaly and L O'Mahony.

**Disqualifications And Heavy Fines In Drunk Driving Cases**

Disqualifications for the statutory period of 12 months together with fines, some up to £100, with endorsements were imposed on a number of defendants who were convicted by District Justice W F O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week on charges of driving with excess alcohol in their blood. **Hard Luck Case** - What was described as a hard luck case was that of Brian O'Brien, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, who was charged with driving with excess alcohol in his blood. He was fined £100 on November 5, 1979. Supt M English said that when the defendant was stopped by the Garda at Leamybrien they came to the conclusion that he had too much to drink. A blood sample taken by Dr Higgins was certified by the Medical Bureau to contain 133 milligrammes of alcohol per 100 millilitres of blood. "It was" said the Supt, "a hard luck case". Mr E P King Solr who appeared for the defendant said that the sample showed only a trace of alcohol in the blood and there was no doubt but that the defendant was capable of driving on the occasion. He had been stopped at a check-point. A fine of £20 with £1076 medical expenses was imposed together with a disqualification from driving for 12 months the conviction was endorsed on defendant's licence. **Purely Technical** - When Michael Barry, Ballintaylor was charged with driving with excess alcohol at Mitchell Street, Dungarvan on December 30, 1978 it was stated that the sample taken certified the blood alcohol content to be 112 milligrammes per 100 millilitres of blood. It was stated that this was purely a technical case but showed the severe consequences that occur. The defendant was a man who very seldom took a drink. He stated that he lives 6 miles outside the town. The disqualification order be not enforced until January 1 to enable him to make alternative arrangements. John F. **SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD NOTICE TO FARMERS ON HEALTH CONTRIBUTIONS**

- Under the Health Contributions Act 1979 farmers are required to pay health contributions. These are payable to their local health board.
- All farmers over 16 years of age who have an income are liable. A register of liable farmers has been compiled based on the rated occupation of land as shown in the rate books of the local rating authorities. Persons other than rated occupiers who occupy land on a letting, renting or leasing agreement are also liable in respect of that land for the duration of their agreement.
- Farmers who have medical cards or who are in receipt of certain social welfare benefits are exempted from liability. Land which is used for market gardening or for a trade other than farming is exempt. Any person wishing to claim exemption should apply to the local office of the health board for an exemption form.
- Farmers who also have a trade or profession will not be liable to the health board but will be liable to the Revenue Commissioners for the appropriate health contributions.
- Demands for contributions are being sent to persons who are currently on the register. These demands will be equal to 1% of reckonable income, subject at present to a maximum contribution of £55 00 p a. A farmer's reckonable income is calculated by multiplying his land valuation by 92. The valuation of buildings is not included.
- Any sums due by or to existing contributors under the Health Contributions Act 1971 will be brought into account in the Demand.
- Demands for contributions will be accompanied by a detailed explanatory memorandum. Persons who have further queries relating to the above should write to the Health Contribution Section at their local health board office.

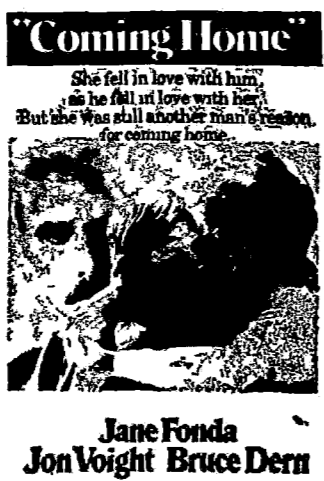
