PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

LIVING BEYOND OUR MEANS — BUT HOW?

Happenings in the political scene last week with the resignation of the Taoiseach, Jack Lynch, and the election of his successor, Charles J. Haughey kept the spotlight very much away from another very important happening — the publishing of the Devlin Report — which deals with the findings and recommendations of the Review Body on Higher Remuneration in the Public Sector.

The Report published last Thursday recommends further big salary increases ranging from about £3,000 a year for the Taoiseach and Chief Justice down to about 'a mere' £600 a year for Senators.

All members of the government will share in the benefits as will judges, civil servants, senior executives of semi-state companies together with all members of the Oireachtas TD's and Senators.

For most of the people at the top it will be the second pay increase this year and it will bring their overall rise to between 30 and 35 per cent compared with the 15-16 per cent in the National Understanding.

The recommendations in the Report will mean that all members of the Government will be paid well over £20,000 a year. The salary of allowance (whatever you want to call it) for a Dail Deputy will jump by about £2,000 from its present level of £8,173 to around £10,000 while a Senator will have an additional £600 tacked on to the present annual allowance of £4,811.

All very good for the people at the top who are running the country but simultaneously with the publication of the Report came a message from Senator T. K. Whitaker former Governor of the Central Bank contained in an address which he gave in Dublin to the Association of Certified Accountants.

Whitaker stated that the country was at present living well beyond its means and that it just could not continue. The plain fact is that this year we will spend some £1,000 million more than we will produce and the country is funding that extra spending by running up our foreign debts dipping into our overseas savings — our foreign reserves, and using EEC grants.

Dr Whitaker prescribed as the cure higher taxes, cut backs in Government spending and a more moderate rate of income increases. Where then does the Devil stand vis-a-vis D. Whitaker? Can we or can we not afford all these huge cash increases for those at the top? Whether we can or cannot they will be given anyway. But having approved such increases for themselves and the members of the Oireachtas how can the Government preach a policy of restraint where the ordinary workers are concerned? What's sauce for the goose must surely be sauce for the gander.

SLOW IT DOWN

The carnage on Irish roads last week-end as crashes claimed 12 victims — five people died in Munster, four of them in County Cork — shows that there has been an alarming drop in safety precautions by road users. The pictures in some of the morning papers on Monday spoke for themselves showing wrecked cars and debris scattered after the collisions with, for instance a child's shoe lying on a footpath on one side of a road and a coat and a Wellington boot on the other at one of the fatal scenes.

One onlooker described one of these scenes as 'a terrible sight and indeed so must all the others have been as well. It is heartrending to see so many lives being needlessly lost, lives which might pos-

sibly be spared if a little more care and attention was practised.

This brings me on to a point which I feel we must make in regard to the care and attention which, in this regard, appears to be totally lacking in drivers using the Springmount-Cloneeey road in Dungarvan and which on at least a couple of times each day puts pedestrians crossing the road at the top of Wolfe Tone Road (Fair Lane) at high risk.

I have had several complaints about the reckless speed at which car drivers and motor-cyclists take this corner when turning from Cloneeey into Fair Lane. Drivers have been described to me as actually throwing their cars around the bend in top-gear sometimes on two wheels, in a mad dash that will eventually surely result in a fatal accident.

The corner is a particularly bad one in that many pupils from the nearby Presentation Convent have to pass through it and for them the lunch period is particularly hazardous as it coincides with one of the 'racing periods' for the car drivers concerned.

The road authorities in charge of traffic control in the urban area will have to take some definite action to see that the traffic at this danger point is slowed down and slowed down before someone is either maimed or killed. This is no exaggeration as I have seen the situation myself.

SAILING DOWN THE RIVER

We continue this week with the account of a sail down the River Blackwater from Cappoquin to Youghal as recorded in "Egan's Waterford Guide" published in 1894. Last week we had got as far as Villiers-town and now we sail on from there.

"New Strancally Castle — immediately below the mouth of the river is the beautiful residence of George White-lock-Loyd, Esq. This Gothic structure was built by Mr John Kelly from a design by T R Payne of Cork, and is in keeping with all the charms of the Blackwater. Here are a series of ornate demenses, displaying the richness and natural decoration for which the lower valley of the Blackwater is remarkable.

"The castle commands a view of the confluence of the two rivers the sylvan banks of which display a proportionate extent of colouring with the broad and freshened flood beneath. Here is a small bay in which sea-bound vessels could make anchorage, and thus lend the aid of ocean vistas to enhance the exquisite panorama. The present owner is Henry Loyd, Esq, J.P. Strancally Castle, Tallow.

"Old Strancally Castle — Three miles south of the demense of new Strancally stands the old fortress. Here the peaceful musings of the tourist are broken in upon by the relation of bloody deeds and the historic barbarities of the 'murdering hole'. The Desmonds again reigned here. The castle being posed upon a rocky pinnacle gave ample opportunity to penetrate the rock and thus communicate with the river beneath. Invitations to the hospitable hearth brought many an expectant guest to their untimely doom in this place of murder.

"Any enemy or person who stood in the way of aggrandisement was honoured by an invitation to the castle, where a dismal and watery grave of this hellish design awaited him by being hurled into the murder trap. Finally a discovery was made, owing to the fortunate escape of one who told the tale and the castle and cave were demolished almost entirely by gunpowder. Thus ended the barbarities of Strancally or 'Straith-na-Caillighe' the Hag's Holm.

"Molana Abbey — After passing old Strancally, a small river unites on the left bank which passes by the ancient village of Clashmore, and forms here the 'broad' of Clashmore. And at this point we have the strong tributary of the Licky on the left forming a broad expanse of water while a little farther on to the right is the site of Molana Abbey and the mansion of Ballinatrav, in which demense the Abbey is situated.

"The site of the Abbey was formerly an island called Dar-Inis or the Island of Oaks. Here St Molanide founded an abbey for Canons regular in the 6th century. At the dissolution of all the monasteries it was assigned to Sir Walter Raleigh, who gave it to the Earl of Cork. It is said Richmond le Gros is buried there.

"The glen of the Glendyne stream which rushes through this ancient territory affords a drive by its banks of rare attractions, one of which is the basin formed by the dripping waters from the rocks, in which, tradition states, prophetic pictures of the future may be read by the skilled in the art of magic, perhaps because of the place being named after St Molan, the prophet. The present occupier of Ballinatrav is Colonel Holroyd Smyth, Ballinatrav, Youghal."

We shall continue our journey down the Blackwater as it appeared to the tourist who passed that way almost 100 years ago in next week's issue.

Charles J. Haughey Is New Taoiseach

After six hours of the most venomous abuse in which character assassination was not omitted, Charles J. Haughey TD who had been elected leader of the Fianna Fail party by 44 votes to 38 following the resignation of Mr Jack Lynch assumed the leadership of the country as Taoiseach in the Dail last Tuesday evening.

Having been proposed as Taoiseach by Mr Lynch and seconded by Dr Michael Woods Mr Haughey had to sit for hour after bitter hour as invective and vituperation poured across the floor of the house from the opposition benches of Fine Gael and Labour.

The personal attack on Mr Haughey led by Fine Gael Leader Garrett Fitzgerald and Labour Leader Frank Cluskey was unprecedented in the history of the Dail and indeed did nothing to increase the stature of the Dail the dignity of the office of Taoiseach nor for that matter the good of the country at international level.

The petulance displayed by the Opposition leaders did nothing for the Fine Gael or Labour parties in the circumstances either.

UNRUFFLED

Mr Haughey listened to the stream of abuse and criticism apparently unruffled and when the storm had blown itself out and the vote taken he was declared elected by 42 votes to 32. He then went to Arus An Uachtaran where he received his Seal of Office from President Hillery and on his return to the Dail he announced his new cabinet as follows —

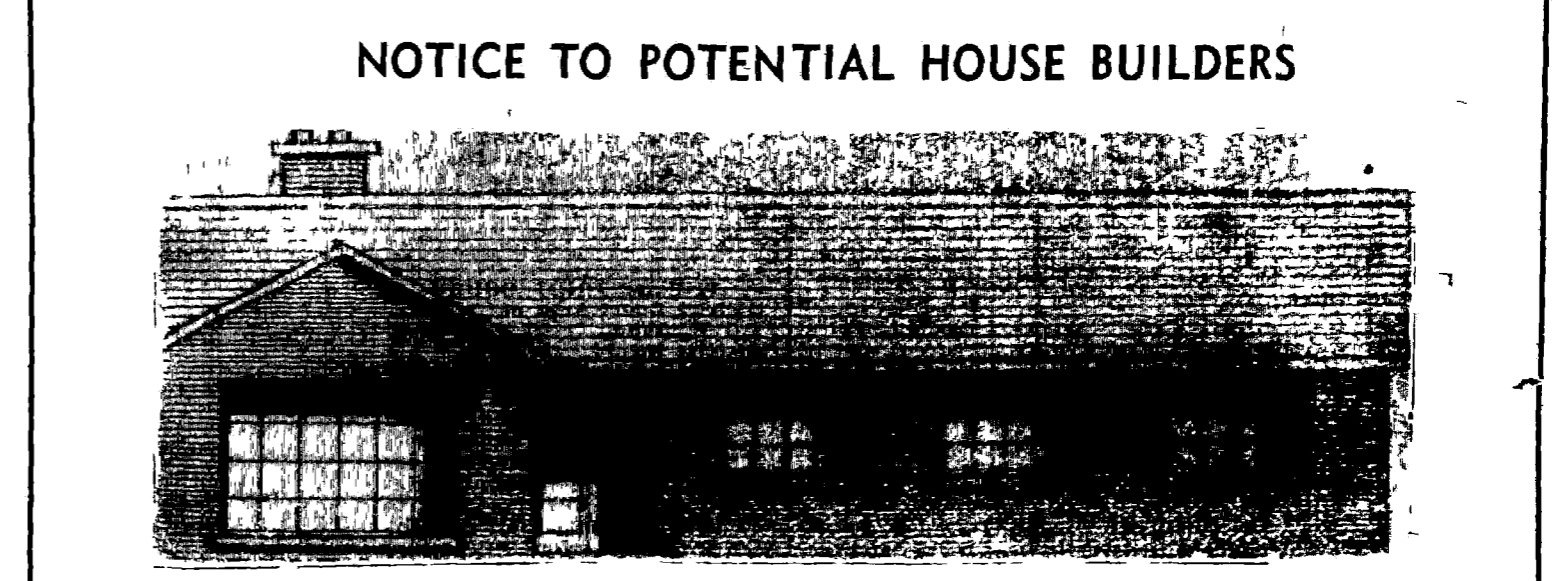

County Council Housing Programme Under Fire

Clir C Curran who opened the discussion referred to the anger and frustration being felt by many prospective tenants and he described to the people of the County the programme which provided for the building of a mere 38 houses in the coming year
He also said that proposals to build four new houses at Pith Kinsalebeg would be resisted by any means possible by the tenants of the existing 12 Council houses there which are at present retained The retention of any more houses on that site would create serious over-crowding for the people of the County and he is imploring the Minister and the officials not to go ahead with the proposed four houses
Clir Curran then went on to point out that only four new houses had been built in Ardmore although there were 16 applicants on the waiting list while there were no houses planned for Clashmore in 1980
'What horrifies me in 1980 more than anything else is that young people from these areas who get married have no place to go to be housed except into Youghal'
Clir J. Harty curran said that what very poor progress had been made in the provision of more authority houses through out the County The provision of 38 new houses in 1980 would go nowhere towards meeting existing demands and the Council were not taking a substantially step up on their planned programme
Clir P Kennedy said that the housing situation in Ardmore and Clashmore was very serious and in particular Ardmore areas was being neglected by the Council He agreed that the tenants of existing houses at Rath would strongly resist any plan to build four extra houses on the site there
EFFORTS FAILED
Mr C A O'Connor Co Manager said that all efforts made by the Council to acquire sites for building by agreement in Ardmore had failed They had land at Rath where he understood people wanting houses in the area mentioned would go to live
The Co Manager, Mr J D Hally told the Council that they were at present proceeding with a purchase Order to acquire land in Ardmore but he added that this would not be completed in 1980
County Secretary Mr B J McNally said that since the matter was previously discussed by the Council they had sent the Council's proposal to seek approval for 100 houses in 1980 to the Department but no reply had as yet been received
The Co Manager said that they had not so far received notification of the Department's housing allocation for 1980
When this was made known he said that they could reassess the housing programme for the coming year in light of the amount of money which would be made available

6—If you are carrying cash make your most expensive purchase first and having made it make sure you don't lose it to a thief If your purchase is bulky ask the shop to deliver it
7—Do not leave your purse or handbag on shop counter or on floor of fitting room — you are vulnerable when fitting new garment or examining next purchase
8—Never advertise that you are carrying a large sum of money by careless exposure of same when making purchase—remember you are being watched
9—Hold your handbag close to your body preferably under your arm with the flap innermost Be aware that the lady or gent jostling or pushing in crowded areas may be there to distract your attention while an accomplice steals your purse
10—Do not overload your handbag it may not close properly
11—If you are using public transport be extra careful when boarding bus or train—you are then most vulnerable
12—You are urged to shop early in the month and early in the day

Circuit Judge Rules On Sale Of Cottage

The purported sale of a cottage and all the adjoining half acre of ground by an elderly County Waterford man to a young married couple who had returned from England in search of a home was the subject matter of a two-hour hearing before Judge T N Desmond at Dungarvan Circuit Court recently.

Plaintiff in the action was Michael F Dea Ballycoo Dunbarvan and he sought the specific performance of a contract entered into by the defendant Thomas Conroy, Tynallyra, Ballycoo Dunbarvan, to sell a cottage and a half acre plot at Tynallyra to the plaintiff for an agreed sum of £5,400.

The defence was denied that there was an agreement for the sale of half an acre with the cottage and that the plot agreed to was considerably smaller.

Robert Keane auctioneer and owner of Connell Street, Dungarvan told the court that he had received instructions from the defendant around January last to sell the cottage and half acre plot and he advertised it in a number of newspapers.

Mr Keane said Dea's first offer was £5,200 which Conroy accepted but intimated that a smaller plot would go with the cottage. The plaintiff insisted that the cottage if there was the half acre going with it and finally a price of £5,500 and £100,000 was agreed upon.

Cross-examined by Mr Declan Budd B.L. (instructed by E.A. Ryan and Co Solicitors) for the defendant witness agreed that he had advertised the cottage without putting Conroy's name to it and also the advertisement wrongly claimed the cottage was situated at Steady Hill. He was merely complying however with the defendant's instructions in that regard. He denied that he had placed the cottage in the newspapers without instructions from the defendant.

Mrs M Dea wife of the plaintiff gave evidence of an agreement being reached for a selling price of £5,400 for the cottage and the half acre. She subsequently signed the contract in the offices of the defendant's solicitor and the contract specifically stated the cottage and two rods.

The plaintiff Michael F Dea said he would not have purchased the cottage unless there was the half acre going with it. Mr J P Gordon Solicitor for the plaintiff corroborated Mrs Dea's evidence about the contract being signed specifically providing for the sale of half an acre. The defendant was not present at the signing of the contract but he subsequently signed it.

DIDN'T KNOW WHAT HE SIGNED
Conroy however told the court that he really didn't know what he was signing when he put his signature to the contract. He thought it had something to do with arranging a County Council loan. He showed the exact plot that was going with the cottage to in or around one rod.

Witness said that if he was to sell half an acre with the cottage it would mean he could not get machinery in or out of his own property nearby. He denied ever giving Mr Keane instructions to advertise the sale of the cottage and plot. Instead he had told him (Mr Keane) he was selling it himself but that if the (Mr Keane) had a client he could send him out.

Mr M J Lavan Solicitor for the defendant said Mr Keane had telephoned him to tell him that the plaintiff had bought the cottage and a plot of land for £5,400. Witness asked Mr Keane the acreage of the plot and he replied 'I'm not quite sure about that but it is approximately two rods.'

Witness said he drew up the contract containing the words 'two rods but approximately' after the fact. He did inform his client that the contract provided for approximately two rods of land when he (the defendant) was signing it.

Judge Desmond said it was a case that presented some difficulty. However he was satisfied that the defendant agreed to sell and actually sold the cottage and half an acre. Accordingly he must order that the defendant now complete the specific performance of the contract and he also awarded the costs of the action to the plaintiff.

Mr John Gordon B.L. (instructed by J P Gordon Solicitor) was for the plaintiff.
