1980 Brain Of Leinster Quiz

The 1980 Brain of Leinster will receive £100 and an inscribed trophy with the runner-up receiving £50 and a trophy. There will also be a third prize of £10 and a plaque.
Mr Peter Murphy Ireland's most popular quizmaster will pose the questions to the competitors.
Entry fee for the quiz is £4 and entries should be sent to Bernadette Keogh Secretary Rochfortbridge Macra Na Feirme Rochfortbridge Co Westmeath. The closing date for entries is Wednesday 23rd January.
The continued support given to this event by Allied Irish Banks has greatly helped the continued expansion and success of the Brain of Leinster. After sponsoring the event for the first time in 1977 AIB now have their name associated with the Brain of Leinster each year.
Two teachers and a farmer between them won the four previous titles.
The first Brain of Leinster was held in January 1976 and Paddy Moore of Emo Co Laois took top honours. 1977 saw Geraldine C'haik take the title down the road to the tidy town of Tyrrellpass while in 1978 Joe Hunt from Lenamore in County Longford won the Brain of Leinster. In 1979 the Laois farmer Paddy Moore became the first man and woman to regain the title "Brain of Leinster".

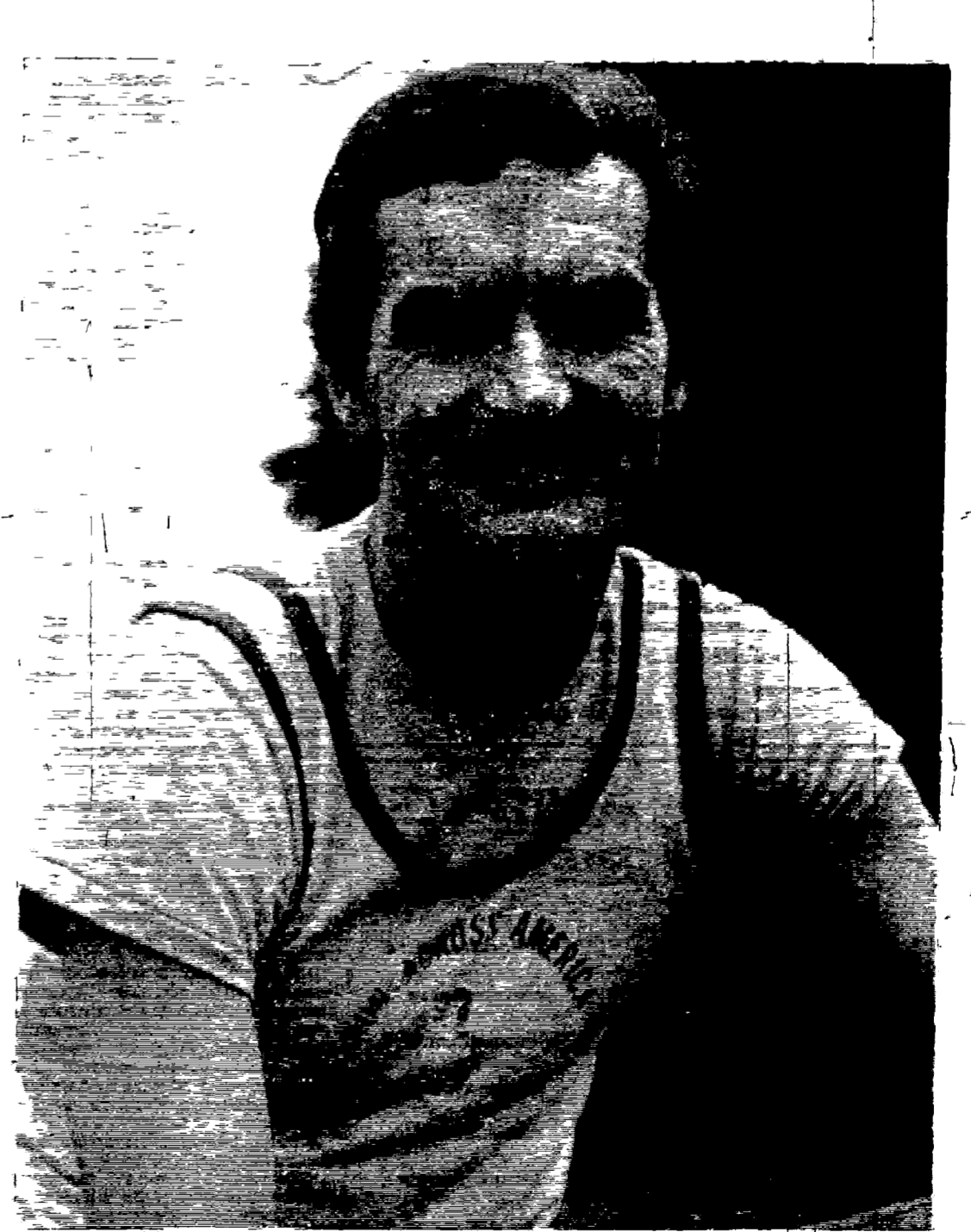
MISLEADING IMPRESSION FROM P.A.Y.E. FIGURES

The following statement has been issued by the Minister for Finance Mr Michael O'Keefe TD
Press reports on the end-year Exchequer Statement indicate that £645 million was collected through the PAYE mechanism 88 per cent of total income tax receipts.
Although the tax collected through PAYE in 1979 is about 88 per cent of the total the misleading impression may be drawn that this represents the real tax burden on the wage and salary earner as compared with all other sectors including self-employed. In fact income tax paid on ordinary wages and salaries would be of the order of 70 per cent of total income tax payable rather than 88 per cent.
The reason is that income tax is collected through PAYE

on considerably more than wages and salaries as conventionally understood. In particular PAYE receipts include income tax paid by directors of close companies which may be defined broadly as companies under the effective control of a very small number of persons. Such directors are akin to the self-employed rather than to employees and the tax paid on their income although collected under PAYE would be more appropriately treated as tax on the self-employed in any interpretation of income tax figures. Also included in PAYE receipts is tax on other income of employees e.g. rent interest receipts etc.
The validity in principle and the factual accuracy of conventional interpretations made from income taxation statistics are among the items at present under consideration by the Government-ICTU Working Party on Taxation.

AFFECTED BY DISPUTE
Apart from the foregoing the collection of tax in 1979 was affected by the Post Office dispute which delayed revenue collection in 1979 under a number of headings. This inevitably affected the income tax yield from the self-employed much more than from PAYE because of the different collection procedures involved. While PAYE tax deductions were largely unaffected the process of obtaining accounts and making assessments on the self-employed was severely disrupted. If this disruption had not occurred the tax collected other than through PAYE would have been close to the Budget estimate of £121 million rather than the £85 million actually received. The backlog will of course be recoverable in 1980.
It might be added that the total tax revenue yield in 1979 was £2,009 million of which income tax represented 36 per cent excise duties 30 per cent and value added tax 21 per cent.

WILL RUN FOR IRELAND



One of the biggest and most novel fund-raising events ever mounted in Ireland will take place next April to raise funds for the preparation of the Irish Olympic team for the Moscow Olympics.
The event a Run for Ireland will involve over 100,000 people and is expected to raise a minimum of £200,000. It will be organised by the Olympic Council of Ireland in conjunction with the scouting movement in Ireland.
Anchor man for the "Run for Ireland" is Tony Cully-Foster who will run 129 miles around the coast of Ireland between

20th April and 25th May 1980. He will be joined at various stages in his run by individuals and groups who will be sponsored to run with him because of a variety of reasons. These will include members of sporting organisations, community and youth groups, school children, showbusiness and sporting personalities, politicians and local dignitaries.
Twenty-three local committees have been set up by the scouting movement to organise various stages of the run. For Tony Cully-Foster the Run for Ireland is the second major fund-raising event of this nature which he has under-

taken. In 1976 he ran 1,000 miles across America to raise funds for boys clubs there. He emigrated from Derry in 1969 and taught school in London for two years before moving to the United States. From 1973 until 1977 he was Director Boys Clubs of America and since then he has been personal assistant to the Chairman of the Combined Insurance Company of America. His company are arranging leave of absence to allow him to prepare and undertake the "Run for Ireland".
Travelling with him around Ireland will be his wife Melinda and two year old son Joshua.

Coast Erosion Problems Now At Crisis Point

The land of County Waterford is continuing to lose its battle against the sea and the coast erosion problems have now reached crisis point members of the County Committee of Agriculture told Monday's meeting in Dungarvan.

As members reiterated their calls for financial aid from Central Funds to tackle what has now been assessed as a £5m problem, some striking statistics emerged from the discussion in all more than 200 acres of valuable agricultural land have been lost to the sea.

Some 1700 acres need to be reclaimed outside Dungarvan and since the committee's last meeting on December 3rd another five acres of land have been lost in the Ardmore area alone.

HEALTH CONTRIBUTIONS ACT 1979. Liability for payment of Health Contributions. Under the provisions of the Health Contributions Act, 1979 persons over 16 years of age who have an income are obliged to pay health contributions. A person who holds a current medical card, or who is in receipt of a social welfare widow's pension, a deserted wife's allowance or benefit, or a social assistance allowance as an unmarried mother, is exempt. A widow with a social security widow's pension from another E.E.C. country is also exempt. The rate of contribution for the year ending 5 April, 1980 is 1% of ALL income up to a ceiling of £5,500. In the case of a married couple a separate contribution is payable by each spouse in respect of his/her own income.

In order to assist the public to know who generally has entitlement to a card the Board publishes from time to time the income guidelines issues for assessing eligibility. The income counted is the current gross weekly income of the husband and wife only. Special allowances are made for high rent and rates or house loan repayments and for reasonable cost of travelling to work. After making these allowances any person can be entitled to a medical card with an income within these figures: Single people £32.50 per week (living alone) £28.00 per week (living with family) Families: Husband and Wife £47.00 per week, Children (under 16) £5.00 per week, Children (over 16) £6.50 per week. Example: Husband and wife and dependent children aged 4, 6, 12 and 16 will qualify if their gross income (after allowance) is £68.50 or less. ANGLING CLUB NOTES

THE RNLI

The Irish Lifeboats had a very busy year in 1978. Nearly 100 lives were saved and £1 million worth of marine property was recovered without salvage claim.

During 1979 Irish Lifeboats North and South launched 159 times on service and saved 94 lives. They also landed 34 persons who had not been in extreme danger. More than half of the services were to vessels whose occupants had put to sea for pleasure (or so they thought) approximately half were carried out in darkness and 24 involved co-operation with aircraft of the Air Corps, RN and RAF. Crewmen spent 3,250 man/hours at sea and although they saved craft worth some £1 million they made no salvage claims.

All the above statistics are up on those of 1978 largely because of the performance of the Durr more East Falkovton Court, mactherry and Baltimore Lifeboats which spent 75 hours at sea during the Fastnet Race and saved the lives of 45 yachtsmen.

The only figure which decreases was for false alarms, sometimes hoaxes (22) and it is hoped that this is an indication of an increasing public awareness of the dangers of yachting, as well as the parents of our youth would improve on these young people that is not only disgraceful but criminal to interfere with lifesaving equipment like life bouys either by their removal or destruction or the removal of the ropes supplied. It was sad to read only recently that a lifeboat was useless in trying to save a life as the rope had been interfered with. It is not only school going "oun" people that are interfering but often by the school-leavers—the citizens that take pleasure in destruction.

The lifeboat voluntary workers were awarded two gold medals, ten silver medals and one pair of brooches as awards for their outstanding voluntary services in the many areas throughout the country.

BASS. Mature fish range from 1 lb up to 20 lbs. Most fully developed bass range in weight from 2 lbs to 9 lbs. In 1978 a bass of 12 lbs 6 ozs was landed off the Edd stone Reef.

Bass are seldom found further north than the Ulster coast line as bass prefer the warmer waters down south. When summer arrives bass shoal in the estuaries and move well up the rivers as it is nothing unusual to catch some good bass along the Docks in Waterford. The writer used to fish between the moored ships and the dockside and in the running water or current it was rewarding. The bait used was pieces of mackerel or rag worms. The German sprat was a very good artificial bait for bass.

Large bass scavenge off the Kent and Devon coasts. They drop back on the ebb tide to feed on immature fish like flats and sand eels and crabs on the sandbanks near the river mouths.

On the West coast of Ireland there was some very good bass fishing. The Atlantic breakers threw up good supplies of lug worms and sand eels. It still awaits investigation to decide the whereabouts of the spawning grounds of bass. It either spawns inshore or in deep water during May and June. The fertilised eggs drift to the warmer upper waters.

DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN DETECTIVE

Late Mr. John F. O'Brien

The people of the area were stunned and saddened at news of the unexpected death of Detective John F O'Brien which occurred in Baggot Street Hospital, Dublin on Sunday last.

Supt O'Brien who resided at Ennafort Road Raheny was a native of Kilmish Dungarvan where his family are well-known and highly respected members of the community.

He had been ill for just a short time and his unexpected passing at the age of 54 comes as a grievous blow to his wife his four children and all the members of his family to whom deep and sincere sympathy is extended in their great loss.

Supt O'Brien was regarded as one of the country's most competent policemen and recognised as an expert on "case-blowers" from Scotland and England.

His most celebrated case was the arrest of the Littlejohn brothers Kenneth and Keith who were exposed some years ago as British intelligence agents.

They had been operating as British agents when they made a big haul in a raid on a Grafton Street Bank in Dublin. Following intensive investigation led by the then Det Inspector O'Brien, they were cornered and are currently serving sentences in Mountjoy Prison.

Supt O'Brien joined the Garda in 1948 and was posted to Pearse Street Station in Dublin where he worked throughout most of his successful career. He was extremely popular in the force and also commanded respect among the criminal classes in the Dublin area.

Supt O'Brien who spent most of his holidays fishing on the River Colligan is survived locally by his mother Mrs O'Brien, Kilmish brother Ned and sister Mrs Patricia McCarthy. Another brother Michael resided in Canada.

SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD SIGHT TESTING SCHEME

A new sight testing scheme has been introduced by the South Eastern Health Board in Counties Carlow, Kilkenny, Waterford, Wexford and South Tipperary for eligible adults.

What is provided. Under the scheme eligible adults will be entitled to obtain a sight test and prescription for spectacles, if required from qualified persons in private practice who have agreements with the Board to provide this service.

The existing Community Ophthalmic service, which provides eye examination and treatment services, will continue to operate at the Board's clinics and will cater for all eligible children up to 16 years of age and eligible adults who opt for this service.

Who are eligible. The scheme applies to persons aged 16 years and upwards who are currently eligible for ophthalmic treatment and appliances under Section 67(1) of the Health Act 1970, in effect medical card holders and their adult dependants.

How to apply. Eligible persons wishing to avail of the scheme should apply to the local office of the community care area in which they are resident. The addresses of the local offices are as follows—

Withdrawal Of Financial Aid Would Be "Disastrous" The County Waterford Committee of Agriculture is to make budgetary submissions to the Government urging that there be no cutbacks in the amount of finance to be made available to the agricultural sector in next month's budget. The Government has announced that there will be cutbacks in the amount of finance to be made available to the agricultural sector in next month's budget. Mr E Collins TD told Monday's meeting of the Committee in Dungarvan that it appeared that there would be widespread cuts in this area and such a move could only have disastrous consequences for the development of the farming industry. There must be no cutbacks of any kind. Deputy Collins said, adding that the Government should in fact do much more than it had been doing to help and encourage farm development. Supporting Deputy Collins Mr W Walsh said the withdrawal of financial aid from agriculture at this point in time would be disastrous. The farming industry has taken a real bashing over the last six years he said. The Chairman Mr M Quailly said financial aid to agriculture had been for 12 months. He had to think what the situation will be like in another 18 months if present trends continue he added. RIDICULOUS The Chairman went on to say that it was costing the IDA £20,000 to create one new job and that surely was a ridiculous situation. If agriculture was granted added in that fashion the industry would create many many more jobs. Mr Hartly accused the Government of using agriculture as a political football with which to placate the trade unions. Mr C Curran however strongly disagreed and said it should be recognised and appreciated that the PAYE sector had a terrible grievance with many of them paying one-third of their wages in income tax. However it was not true to say that farmers did not pay tax and some farmers he knew were paying brutal taxes. Finally the meeting was unanimous in calling on the Government not to reduce the amount of financial aid to the farming industry in the coming budget.

BETTER TIMES AHEAD FOR DAIRY INDUSTRY

There is little chance that Mr Gundelach's proposed 3% surcharge on milk production will be approved, Mr Brian Joyce, Managing Director of An Bord Baine said at the annual dinner of the Kerry County Executive of the I.C.M.S.A. in Tralee recently.
In putting forward his package of proposals the E.E.C. Farm Commissioner has ignored many crucial factors, Mr Joyce said. Mr Joyce also predicted that the spring farm price review will bring an increase in support prices and that there will be some easing in the level of interest rates. He said that Bord Baine was in a particularly strong marketing position this year and that the vexed question of New Zealand's access to the Community market was also likely to be resolved.

Farm income has fallen in real terms in 1978 because of the high rates of inflation and Mr Gundelach's punitive measures are totally unnecessary in the circumstances Mr Joyce said. It is necessary each year for the Farm Commissioner to make a lot of noise about the extra cost of the CAP. This is sweet music in the ears of opponents of CAP especially British politicians in their efforts to obtain cheap food from other Community members as well as the old colonies.

The essential fact to remember about Britain's deep rooted objections to the CAP is that the support prices paid within the Community are just as essential to Britain's farmers as any other farming nation in the E.E.C. What Britain wishes to do is to lower support prices in the EEC as a whole and then provide its own farmers with deficiency payments. This view is not shared elsewhere in the Community and will not prevail. The CAP is a vital integral part of the European Community and will continue to be so in the 1980's. The inordinate amount of adverse publicity which the CAP receives in these islands is out of all proportion to the prevailing view in the Community about the agricultural policy.

We sincerely hope that this statement of opinion will make a strong case for a price review which will bring an increase in support prices at least equal to any increase in the co-responsibility levy. Support prices this year should at least be maintained in monetary terms if not in real terms.

INDUSTRIAL RECESSION
Mr. Joyce said that higher energy prices will unfortunately give rise to industrial recession in the developed economies but this will in turn give rise to a general easing of world interest rates in 1980. Hopefully as the year goes on this will provide some relief to that very important category of farmer who has been investing heavily in the

last few years in additional stock numbers and facilities. Mr Joyce said that the outlook for the marketing of dairy products this year was good. Bord Baine is in a much stronger position now than it was this time last year. The stocks we are carrying into 1980 are only those essential to service markets until a sufficient level of new production becomes available in the spring. This year should also see a resolution of the vexed question of New Zealand's access to the Community market. There is an upward trend in world market prices and this is likely to enable the question of the future access of New Zealand to be renegotiated in a more favourable climate from an E.E.C. point of view. We expect that 1980 will see an agreement reached between New Zealand and the E.E.C. that is equitable and fair to both parties.

Mr Joyce also pointed out that because of the major transfer of purchasing power away from export markets to oil producing countries by virtue of higher oil price increases these nations were now emerging as major consumers of dairy fat and protein. He forecast continuing and developing demand for milk products from these countries even at higher world prices than are currently prevailing.

We therefore look to the market place with considerable optimism for the future and anticipate an extremely strong demand for our products in 1980." Continuing Mr Joyce said, Bord Baine have already decided at its December meeting that it intends (barring unforeseen circumstances) to maintain prices paid to supplying creameries for export markets in 1980. The Board has already increased the price paid to co-operatives for butter by £20 per tonne since January 1st. This increase represents a restoration of a price made on July 1st 1979 because of difficult market conditions being experienced at that time. New £20 Note To Be Issued Shortly

Brief details of the new £20 note to be issued for circulation on and from Monday 4th February 1980 were announced by the Central Bank of Ireland on Wednesday last.

The predominant colour of the new note is blue and it is considerably smaller in size than the current £20 note. It is the fourth denomination in the new series of legal tender notes being introduced on a phased basis by the Central Bank of Ireland and has been designed by Sir Gordon Bennett, a team of Irish artists and designers who also designed the £1, £5 and £10 denominations in the new series.

RENAISSANCE OF LITERATURE

In keeping with the overall design theme based on particular eras of Irish history the design elements of the new note reflect the renaissance of literature in Ireland in both Irish and English in the early part of this century.

The design on the front of the note features a motif based on the Abbey Theatre symbol side by side with a portrait of W. B. Yeats both of which are set against the background of an excerpt from Yeats' Deirdre manuscript.

The design on the back of the note sets The Blasket Islands against an excerpt from an early edition of Tomas O'Crain's classic An tOileánach.

Council Of Europe Higher Education Awards Scheme

These scholarships which are tenable in the academic year 1980/81 are intended for post-graduate students. The value of the scholarships is 2,400 N.C. per month over a nine-month period.
