Western G.A.A. Convention

1979 Most Disastrous Year Ever For Waterford

Outgoing Chairman, John A. Murphy in a very comprehensive address to last Sunday's Western G.A.A. Convention in the Friary Hall Dungarvan told the delegates that 1979 must rate as one of the most disastrous years ever on the playing fields for Waterford. The year when Waterford failed to register a solitary championship victory in Munster.

Mr Murphy who was retiring as Chairman having served his three year term said that this surely represented the scarping of the barrel and must seriously concern all involved to an extent in Cumann Lutha Chleasa Gael in the county.

Continuing he said 'It must be a priority of everyone then to ensure that 1980 does not bring about a repeat. For far too long now our county has been the chopping block for most of the other Munster counties and if we have any pride at all we will surely redouble our efforts to make some kind of a breakthrough in the coming year.

Mr Murphy said that 1979 cannot be so devoid of playing talent as our results of last year would suggest. To what extent did lack of commitment and lack of adequate preparation contribute to those series of disastrous results? Let us all try to find the answers to those questions in the hope that this coming year will see a reawakening of the Waterford spirit and a reawakening of the pride and character that took us to so many hours of glory in the past.

On the domestic scene the Chairman said that some concern was to be justifiably felt about their general standards. They had some great games in 1979 but they had far too many games that did not even fall into the category of mediocrity.

Unless he said and until players gave to the games and to training the kind of commitment the players of other counties gave they would continue to suffer disappointing standards.

He was critical of players who he said would not walk a few hundred yards to training or to important games. The club and its officers must provide transport and lay on all the other necessities that players of the past years never knew anything about.

This he continued is the fact of the situation today not just in our division or in our county but all over the country. It is a situation that must change and players should not expect to continue to be spoon fed as is so often the case at the present time.

In a brief reference to the centenary year in 1984 the Chairman said he hoped the incoming Board would immediately 'knuckle down' to the task of seeing how it could best celebrate the occasion. He hoped he said that the Western Board would set standards in the county that would make the envy of everyone else.

This could not be achieved however he said if the whole task was entrusted to a few. Every club and every club officer must stand up and be counted and if the desired re-

Glowing tributes were paid to Seamus O'Brien who retired at last Sunday's Western Convention as Secretary of the Western G.A.A. Board after a unbroken 20 year term in the office.

From the floor of the hall, Abbeyside man Ned Keane said that they were proud of their club man and thanked Seamus for his wonderful 20 year term in office.

The Vice-Chairman is Affane Cappoquin's Denis McGrath who was unopposed Secretary Vincent Mulligan (Abbeyside/Ballinacourty) unopposed Asst. The following were the results of the voting: Total votes 162. Quota 41. O'Brien M (39), Walsh P (14), Walsh J (3), Murphy J A (41—elected), Quirke J (27).

Walsh P Eliminated. Second count: O'Brien 39, Walsh P 14, 45 (elected), Murphy 41, Quirke 37. Distribution Walsh's surplus: 4 Third count—O'Brien 44, elected Walsh 41, Murphy 41, Quirke 37.

The following were elected to the Disciplinary Committee—M White S Tobin E Cunningham N Fleming and T Mansfield. None of the 11 motions tabled were voted on as all go forward to next Sunday's County Convention in Dungarvan.

Other speakers at Convention were Peter Hayes who welcomed the delegates to Convention on behalf of the Dungarvan Club Joe Conway who spoke about the plans for football in the county and Donald O'Farrell Trustee who spoke about the Ceann Arus fund.

Chairman John A. Murphy extended a cordial welcome to Convention to Tallow's Jim Cunningham and Dec O'Sullivan. Both were described by the Chairman as being part and parcel of Convention both having attended every Convention held to-date by the Western Board.

Best wishes for a speedy recovery were extended to Padraig O'Faimin former County Chairman and Association President who is at present in hospital in Dublin. The Draws and Fixtures Meeting will be held in Dungarvan on Monday February 11 and the venue for next Western Convention is Cappoquin.

In the final analysis one felt that the spoils deservedly went to the victors but the final winning margin did scant justice to the efforts of a Waterford side whose cause was not helped by the concession of an easy goal in each half the blame for which must rest with keeper George O'Grady.

Waterford had the better of the opening exchanges and had a sensational start when Tom Casey found the Kilkenny net after only sixty seconds.

Showings confidence in every sector they raced seven points clear in as many minutes but suffered a severe setback when centre-forward John Galvin making a comeback after being out through injury for six months failed to last the pace and had to be replaced.

Two goals from Christy Heffernan one of them could be considered something of a gift and one from a penalty by Billy Fitzpatrick in the 26th minute left Kilkenny 3-3 to 1-6 ahead at the break.

The second half produced very exciting fare but Kilkenny clinched their victory in the 31st minute when Mick CroTTY was on hand to hit home their fourth goal after keeper O'Grady batted down the ball instead of catching it.

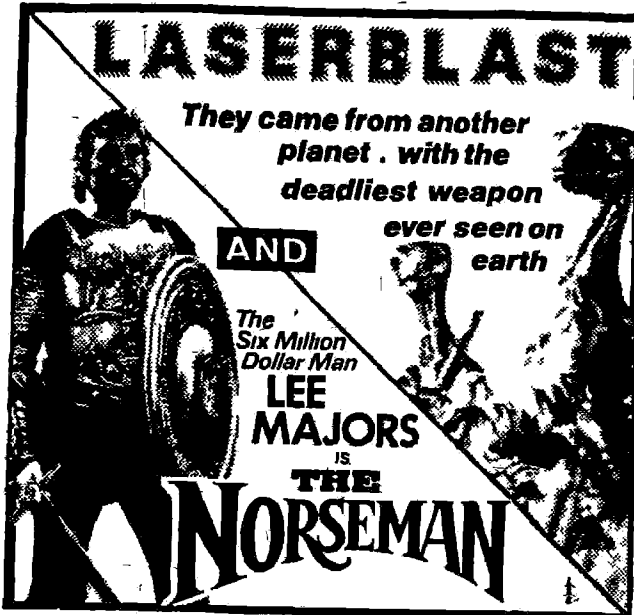

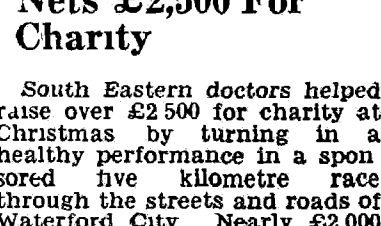
