## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**POLITICAL ACTIVITY**  
There is quite a deal of behind-the-scenes political activity going on in the county at present especially within the Fianna Fail party. From reports which have been surfacing in recent weeks there is quite a power struggle going on between two factions within the party. Recent meetings have either broken up in disorder or have fallen asunder as moves have been made by one section as against the other to retain or obtain control. The Secretary-General of the party is expected to visit the constituency shortly in an effort to sort things out.

In a more general way there is a great deal of lobbying going on within the party in a rather intense battle for the Seanad seat — the vacancy created by the unexpected election of the Fine Gael Senator in the Cork City by-election. Liam Burke, the Fianna Fail candidate, has a Dail majority and there is a hard tussle going on among many of the big guns within the party to secure the seat.

**FAITH HEALER IN DUNGARVAN**  
The Parish Church and the adjoining grounds in Dungarvan were packed with one of the biggest gatherings ever on last Sunday night as thousands, hundreds from all over the county even from as far away as Westmeath, came to attend a special ceremony held in the church by a priest who has won for himself the name of being a wondrous 'faith healer'.

From Boston in the U.S., Fr. McDonogh has visited several centres throughout the country. Last week he was in Loughrea, Co. Galway and as there several people went forward in Dungarvan during the ceremonies which continued for almost three hours until near mid-night to acknowledge cures or improvements in their health. One young girl who had been confined to a wheel-chair is reported to have walked during the prayer session while a nun suffering from multiple-sclerosis also claimed to have been cured. Many people suffering from deafness or impaired hearing also publicly declared total or partial cures.

**WATERFORD INQUISITIONS**  
Yet another interesting book recounting historic facts about West Waterford has been passed to me, this time thanks to Mrs Annie McGrath Cappoquin. It is a copy of the 'Journal of the Waterford and South East of Ireland Archaeological Society' dated January 1908. It was a journal which was obviously published at quarterly intervals in those times and contained a great deal of historic details about Waterford and the south-east region of the county.

What the extent of a plowland was I do not know but it could probably have been something in the region of an acre.

# "ACROSS THE BOARD" REDUNDANCIES THREATENED

In a shock revelation at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan members learned of impending redundancies across the board among Council staff in the coming months because of the decision by the Minister for the Environment limiting to 10% the amount by which the 1980 county rate can be increased over the '79 figure.

Top level talks are to be held between senior Council officials and Trade Union representatives in the coming weeks to consider the position but to the extent of the redundancies is unlikely to be made public until the estimates meeting of the Council on February 18th.

The news that staff are to be laid off was given in committee initially by County Manager Mr C. A. O'Connor. But it emerged very clearly in the subsequent open discussion on the Ministerial directive relating to the maximum 10% rate increase and when pressed by members Mr O'Connor confirmed that the redundancies would not be confined to the Council's outdoor staff but would apply right across the board.

spoken with a number of Council staff who had told him that an increase of 26% or 27% on the 1979 rate would be needed if the same level of services were to be maintained in the coming year and the Minister's figure of 10% could only be condemned and was entirely insufficient.

Now is the time to ask the Minister for a realistic figure to ensure that our employment levels and our services can be maintained at existing levels. Mr Deasy went on: "Cut backs in services are inevitable and I believe the County Manager should also say now what the Ministerial directive will mean in terms of job losses," he said.

Mr P. Coffey supported Deputy Deasy and said the Council would now find itself in a position of being unable to take over new roads in 1980 and the erection of houses would also be kept to the minimum. Sewerage services would not be able to be maintained at existing levels, he said, and they had now been told many Council employees faced unemployment.

**SERIOUS SITUATION**  
The Manager told the meeting that he could say that they were faced with a very serious situation. They would need an increase of 21% or 22% in 1980 to maintain last year's levels. However, though pressed strongly by several members Mr O'Connor refused to be drawn on the number of employees likely to be made redundant. I hope to be able to convey to the estimates meeting on February 18th the full implications of the 10% limit," the Manager said.

Clr P. Cahill however expressed doubts about the unemployment figures. "Back in 1974 we also had a similar threat hanging over the Council but no one

was laid off," Clr Cahill said, adding that the officials seemed to be making things out to be worse than they actually are.

Clr C. Curran said his policy had always been to contain the rates. Were they now asking to increase the county rate by 20% in 1980 because if they were it would not receive his support. He went on to point out that at the present time rates were being paid in the main by farmers and business people and they certainly wouldn't welcome a 20% increase on the county rate.

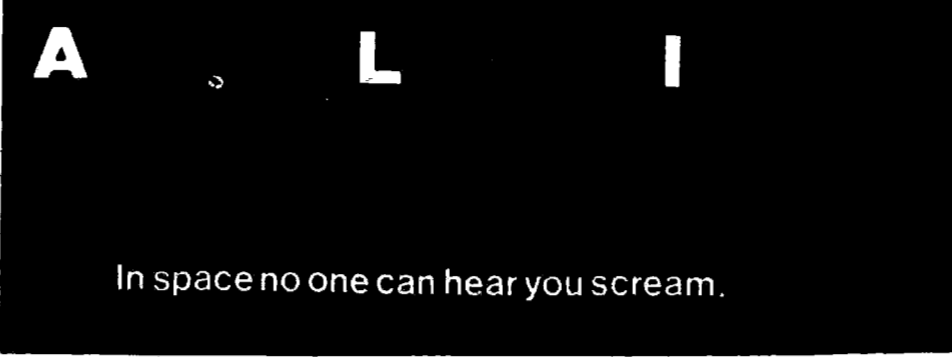

I.D.A. Asked To Acquire Land

Having moved positively and successfully to acquire land for industrial development in West Waterford the Industrial Development Authority is to be asked by Waterford County Council to take the necessary steps to acquire land in the Kilmacthomas and Tramore areas of the county.

A notice of motion to this effect was moved by Mr A. Deasy TD, at this week's Council meeting in Dunganvar and received the unanimous support of the members.

Deputy Deasy said the IDA had achieved excellent results in their drive to promote the western end of the county industrially. Kilmacthomas and Tramore were two of the most rapidly expanding centres in the county and both were in need of new industry. As a first step in that direction they should urge the IDA to acquire land suitable for industrial development.

Mr M. Henery seconded the proposal adding that neither Kilmacthomas nor Tramore had secured labour intensive industry for many years.

DAIRYING SYMPOSIUM AT LISMORE

At a well attended Dairying Symposium in Lismore entitled 'Increased Efficiency for 1980' Mr Dan Ryan, Agricultural Adviser stated that increased costs for 1980 would amount to £30-£35 per cow. So if farmers incomes are not to fall back about 70 gallons more per cow must be obtained this year. A good stocking rate was important for a good income.

Mr Pat Gleeson Moorepark emphasised the importance of minimising meal feeding and securing the maximum from grass-bearing in mind that the dry matter in concentrates costs £14 per ton as against £14 per ton for grass. Fertilizer nitrogen was better value now than at any time since 1968. 90% of the spring calvers feed should come from grass and silage.

Discussing mastitis Mr Billy Meaney Moorepark outlined an enormous annual loss in milk yield and emphasised the most critical time as the period around calving. He advised teat disinfection, prompt detection and the following of directions - also dry period treatment.

D.A. Asked To Acquire Land

Having moved positively and successfully to acquire land for industrial development in West Lismore, the Industrial Development Authority is to be invited by Waterford County Council to take the necessary steps to acquire land in the Lismore and Tramore areas of the county.

A notice of motion to this effect was moved by Mr A. Deasy, T.D., at this week's special meeting in Dungarvan and received the unanimous support of the members.

Deputy Deasy said the IDA had achieved excellent results in their drive to promote the development of the county. Industrially Kilmacthomas and Tramore were two of the most rapidly expanding centres in the county and both were in the new industry as a first step in that direction they would urge the IDA to acquire suitable for industrial development.

Mr M. Henery seconded the proposal adding that neither Kilmacthomas nor Tramore had secured a labour intensive industry for many years.

DAIRYING SYMPOSIUM AT LISMORE

A well attended Dairying Symposium in Lismore entitled 'Increased Efficiency for 1980' was held at the Lismore Agricultural Centre on Friday night. Mr Dan Ryan, Agricultural Adviser stated that increased yields of 300 would amount to £35 per cow so if farmers' expenses are not to fall back on 70 gallons more per cow it is obtained this year. A good stocking rate was important for a good income.

Mr Pat Gleeson, Moorepark, stressed the importance of balancing meal feeding and using the maximum from silage. He advised that the following directions should be followed: concentrate 1.5 to 2.0 per ton as against 1.0 per ton for grass fertilizer. Rough was better value now than at any time since 1958. Discussing mastitis Mr. B. Murphy, Moorepark, outlined enormous annual losses in the field and emphasised the need for a critical time as the period of calving. 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COURT SEQUEL TO ASSAULT ON FISHERY INSPECTOR

On an afternoon in June last year when tensions ran high in Youghal and other parts of West Waterford and East Cork, as controversy raged over the vessel issue of salmon fishing by-laws, Lismore Board of Fishery Conservators Inspector Justice W. F. O'Connell was told at Youghal Court on Thursday before the court, Michael Murphy Quinlan, Youghal, who pleaded guilty to assaulting Fishery Inspector Edward Woulfe at Youghal Harbour on June 2, by attempting to strike him with an oar, obstructing Inspector Woulfe and conduct calculated to lead to a breach of the peace.

Inspector Edward Woulfe told the court that on that date he was in the Board's fishing launch with other officers and gardai after they had set two drift nets in Youghal. They were about to leave in the launch for Ballycotton when the defendant approached his own boat. He was shouting and then picked up a bottle and hurled it straight at two gardai who had to duck to avoid it.

LAUNCH INCIDENT

Continuing the inspector said Murphy then jumped on to the launch armed with an oar in his hand and he said to witness "I will murder this Woulfe". Murphy then came straight for witness with the oar and he (witness) gave Murphy a leg on the forehead with his walking stick. The defendant was ordered off the launch but he refused to leave and said he was going to see Woulfe.

Murphy who conducted his own defence, put it to Inspector Woulfe that the (defendant) never threatened to kill him. Inspector - You did on at least four occasions. Defendant - I was held down and beaten several times by you. Inspector - I never struck you other than the tad I gave you when you stuck when you came at me with the oar.

Defendant - I was held down and you struck me eight or nine times. You are telling lies in the witness box.

ADMISSION. Garda Dan McSweeney said he had assisted in the seizure of the fishing nets that day and was on the launch when Murphy came on board with the oar. Witness subsequently said to take a brush from the defendant who was in a very excited state.

Garda Brendan Casey said he was also on the launch when the defendant boarded it. "I didn't see the alleged assault but Murphy was incensed with rage."

The defendant in evidence admitted going on board the Fishery Board launch for the express purpose of trying to remove the two fishing nets that he threw the bottle to try and distract those on board and used the oar only to pull his boat alongside the launch. He had no intention of striking anyone with the oar nor did he make any attempt to do so.

Inspector Woulfe came on scene when I got into the launch and before I knew where I was I was caught, held down and struck several times by Woulfe.

Defendant denied passing any remark to the effect that he would murder the inspector. Repeating to Supt M. P. Byrne, Murphy agreed that there was a lot of trouble in Youghal and elsewhere in East Cork at the time over the salmon fishing by-laws. He was determined to seize back the nets from the launch that day.

The Justice said they all knew of the protests by the fishermen at that time but the Fishery Board inspector and his assistants have a difficult and unpleasant job and were entitled to do their job without running the risk of being assaulted and interfered with.

"I accept that feelings were running high in places like Youghal at that time but I do not believe the defendant's allegation that he was severely assaulted and beaten by Inspector Woulfe in the climate that prevailed at the time the assault by the defendant on the inspector was a serious one."

However when told that Murphy had no previous convictions and was presently unemployed the Justice imposed what he described as nominal fines of £10 on the assault charge and £5 for obstruction. When Murphy save himself by not interfering with Inspector Woulfe or other Board officers in the future the Justice struck out a State application to bind him to the peace.

Worrying Of Livestock By Dogs. Each year there are numerous reports of attacks on sheep and other livestock by marauding dogs.

Dog owners who live in or near rural areas or people who take their dogs into the countryside should keep them under control at all times as required by law. All dogs should be kept on a lead particularly when farm animals are in the vicinity.

Dogs that run free are a serious menace to sheep particularly at lambing time and each year a large number of sheep and lambs are severely injured and many die from attacks by such dogs. Those responsible are not always strays frequently the culprits are local unsuspected household pets not kept under proper control.

Dog owners should note that (1) - The owner of the dog is liable in damages for any injury done to livestock by his dog (2) - During the hours between sunset and sunrise dogs should be prevented from straying by being effectively confined and controlled.

(3) - Dogs found straying may be seized and detained by the Gardai and destroyed if unclaimed within seven days. (4) - The Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1960 provides that "it shall be good defence to an action for damages for shooting a dog if it is proved that the dog when shot was worrying livestock lawfully on the land that the shooting was done by the owner of the land or of the livestock by a member of his family or by an employee and that the Gardai were notified of the shooting within 48 hours."

If owners exercise proper control on their dogs the loss to farmers and the suffering and injury caused to sheep and other livestock can be avoided or at least considerably reduced.

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COURT SEQUEL TO ASSAULT ON FISHERY INSPECTOR

On an afternoon in June last year when tensions ran high in the courts and other parts of Waterford and East Cork a controversy raged over the issue of salmon fishing laws, a Lismore Board of Fishery Conservators Inspector was assaulted after the seizure of two fishing nets. District Justice W. F. O'Connell was led at Youghal Court last Thursday before the court was Michael Murphy, Captain's son, who pleaded guilty to assaulting Fishery Inspector Edward Woulfe at Youghal harbour, on June 25, by attempting to strike him with an oar obstructing the view of Woulfe, and conduct calculated to lead to a breach of the peace.

WOUND INCIDENT

Continuing, the Inspector said Murphy then jumped on to the beach armed with an oar in hand and he said he was "wounded" by Murphy then came straight for witness with the oar and he (witness) gave Murphy a tap on the forehead as he was walking back. The defendant was ordered off the beach but he refused to leave and said he was going to sea with them. Murphy who conducted his defence, put it to Inspector Woulfe that he (defendant) never threatened to kill him. Inspector—You did on at least four occasions. Defendant—I was held down and beaten several times by Inspector—You did on at least four occasions. Defendant—I never struck you but the tao I gave you came with the oar. Defendant—I was held down and you struck me eight or nine times. You are telling lies in the witness box.

COMMISSION

Garda Dan Mcweeney said he had assisted in the seizure of the fishing nets that day and as on the launch when Murphy came on board with the nets. Witness subsequently had to take a brush from the defendant who was in a very excited state. Garda Brendan Casey said he was also on the launch when the defendant boarded it. "I didn't see the alleged assault at Murphy was incensed with me."

DEFENDANT DENIED PASSING ANY MARK TO THE EFFECT THAT HE HAD MURDERED THE INSPECTOR

Replying to Supt. M. P. Byrne Murphy agreed that there was no trouble in Youghal and nowhere in East Cork at the time he over the salmon fishing laws. He was determined to get back the nets from the beach that day. The Justice said they all agreed that at that time but the Fishery Board Inspector and his assistants have a difficult and pleasant job. Justice indicated to go about doing it without running the risk of being assaulted and interfered with.
