PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

MORE CRITICISM OF COURT ACTIVITIES URGED

A call for more frequent comment by the media (press, radio and television) on the activities of the Courts was made by a Dublin solicitor at a seminar on "Freedom and the Media" which was held on Saturday last by the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland at the headquarters of the Society at Blackhall Place, Dublin 1 which was privileged to be among the attendance of 150 journalists, lawyers and information officers present at the seminar which was formally opened by Mr Justice Donal Barrington and chaired by Mr Walter Beatty, President of the Law Society. The proceedings which commenced at 9.30 a.m. continued until late into the evening and maintained the keen interest of all present throughout the entire day.

Speaking on "The Legal Perspective," Mr John Buckley, Solicitor, said that he believed that if reasoned and reasonable comment by the media on the activities of the Courts was a more common occurrence, the likelihood of contempt proceedings being instituted might be reduced. While the true legal position was that a reasonable criticism of Courts or a system of law they operated or penalties they imposed was not contempt of Court, justice was not a censored virtue and must be allowed to suffer the scrutiny and respectful even though outspoken comment of ordinary men.

Mr Buckley went on to say that while he had a high regard for the media in Ireland, comment had been irregular. "In a small community such as the legal profession is in Ireland," he said, "it is not always easy for members of the legal profession to be outspoken in their criticism of the way in which the Courts operate or particular members of the judiciary carry out their functions. The media would do the public a service if they could offer critical or reasonable comment on such matters."

He then stated that the Court of Criminal Appeal had recently found it necessary to criticise the way in which a criminal trial was conducted by a High Court Judge who had interrupted the trial so frequently as to cause the trial to be unsatisfactory. If such conduct was typical of the judge in question, said Mr Buckley, it is surely something on which the media ought to comment and on which the public are entitled to be informed. A Court system which is subject to regular comment is less likely to be "scandalised" than one which appears to be immune from day to day comment but is occasionally subject to what the Court may take to be intemperate criticism.

Thalidomide case in the European Court of Human Rights where this ruling was overturned. "It would," he concluded, "be a pity if that Court having given clearance to media comment during the course of litigation, advantage was not taken of this freedom."

In his references to this aspect of the role of the media, Mr Justice Barrington in his opening address said that the judiciary should be above criticism during the hearing of a trial or court proceedings, but once the decision had been made it should be open to public scrutiny. A citizen had the right to have his case heard by an independent and impartial tribunal. There was, therefore, a tension between that right and the public's desire for news, but it was important that the value of the independent trial be preserved.

From the views thus expressed, albeit by legal experts, readers will readily realise what a tricky course a journalist has to tread in doing his job conscientiously and the difficulties which editors and newspapers have to grapple with in maintaining the required balance in the news which may be reported and the comments which may be made.

SLOWER THAN IN THE 18th CENTURY

For months past now we have been having regular complaints about the ever lengthening delays in our postal deliveries. Ever since the disastrous postal strike of twelve months ago things have gone from bad to worse. Our internal postal service has lost general confidence where times of delivery are concerned. Recent complaints which we have had from readers in England and even as far away as Australia who subscribe to our postal subscription service show that the malaise has spread to those areas as well.

However if it is any consolation to those of us who have to suffer these delays, the following extract from a recent copy of "Eurofocus," a news sheet for journalists issued by the EEC in Brussels may be of interest.

"Europe's Post slower than in the 18th century?—Have you ever thought that the post in Europe is getting worse and worse? According to British Euro MP Derek Prag, the service is taking longer than in the 18th century! Apparently letters coming from Italy take two weeks, on average, to get to Britain and those from Germany take 10 days. What can the EEC do to improve this situation? Prag asked in a written question. Very little as far as the internal postal services of any individual country are concerned, replied the Commission but for the European postal system it had high hopes that the introduction of new technology would make things a lot better."






