Traffic Protest By Dungarvan Housewives

Placard-carrying housewives brought traffic to a halt for more than a quarter of an hour last Friday at Youghal Road Dungarvan when they formed a human barricade across the road in support of their demands for the appointment of a school traffic warden

More than 70 housewives from the nearby Childers Estate took part in the protest which began at 12.55 pm and was called off 15 minutes later Many of them carried placards—some of which asked "What Price A Life" and "Why No Warden?"

During the protest the traffic flow was seriously disrupted and at one stage stationary cars extended for almost a mile on the Cork side of the town Again on yesterday afternoon the housewives protested in similar fashion and while this 'demo' was of shorter duration traffic was nonetheless still very badly disrupted

The traffic warden issue has become a very vexed one with the Childers Estate residents in recent months They say that the main Cork-Waterford road becomes a veritable death trap during the lunchtime rush and have been continually calling for the appointment of a traffic warden to ensure that children coming from the rear entrance of the Presentation Convent School can safely cross the main road to their homes at Childers Estate

Already Dungarvan Urban Council has passed a notice of motion in the name of Cllr Maran Walsh calling for the appointment of a warden To date however the appointment has not been made primarily it is believed because the Council had not the necessary finances to do so in the 1979 financial year

ONE WEEK Cllr Walsh himself a Childers Estate resident took part in yesterday's protest and said afterwards that the parents had been driven to taking this line of action And he was adamant that this form of protest would continue on at least a once a week basis until the appointment had been made

However the Estate parents may not have to wait too much longer to get their warden The estimates meeting of the Urban Council is due to be held next Monday night and it is believed they include financial provision for such an appointment

In the meantime the protesting parents have no intention of letting up

Co Council has no money to save jobs

Nineteen employees—at least—of Waterford County Council will be made redundant because of the serious financial position the Council now finds itself in. And the job losses will be substantially greater if the Department of the Environment does not come up with a satisfactory level of Road Grants for 1980. Confirmation of the job losses was given to last Thursday's annual estimates meeting of the Council by the Co. Manager Mr C. A. O'Connor. He told the members that there was no way of avoiding the lay-offs but he was working in close co-operation with the Trade Unions involved to try and minimise them.

In an unexpected move permission was sought and granted to the Co. Waterford IFA Executive to address the meeting and their spokesmen urged that the 1979 rate of £11.75 in the £6 be again adopted for the coming year and not the £12.95 figure being asked for by the Manager in his estimates.

The IFA Co. Chairman Mr P. Caspary said that his executive realised that to maintain the current rate at last year's figure would cause problems would limit services and might well cause unemployment. But there were no easy options open to him and he warned that unless the rate was raised, the IFA would be unable to meet its obligations.

Mr O'Connor said that while the IFA didn't want to see any reduction in grants within the County Council, he had to say that if it came to a choice between job losses in the local authority and increases in the productive sector, he must say that they should be within the local authority.

Other IFA speakers included Mr D. J. Coleman and Mr E. O'Brien. Mr Coleman, who is Chairman of the Co. Waterford IFA, said that the IFA was not over-optimistic about the amount of grants it would receive in 1980. The Co. Manager in his estimates indicated that expenditure would come to almost £7m with income realising less than £6m. The estimates he said, conformed with the Ministerial guideline permitting a maximum 10% increase on last year.

He said on the question of staff reductions the Minister said that while he could not speak for other local authorities, he would be surprised if they were not faced with the same problem. He went on to say that he had had very constructive talks with the unions and he was hoping for some voluntary reductions. They were also looking at two special offers in relation to the layoffs—those in the 60-65 age bracket and those who had worked in the Council staff during the 12 months.
