PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

A BIG DAY FOR LISMORE
 The provision of approximately 50 jobs in Lismore and district before the year's end will undoubtedly prove a big welcome boost to the local economy. News of the new industrial development for the town came in an announcement made by Minister of State at the Department of the Environment Jackie Fahey, TD, in Lismore last Friday and will consist of two projects which will be set up on the 47 acre site owned by the IDA in Lismore which is about to be serviced by the County Council.

Project number one will be the factory to be established by Arkle Ltd, manufacturers of luxury kitchen units and bedroom furniture. Proprietor and Managing Director of this company is Mr Paddy Mulcahy who is no stranger to Lismore where he has made many friends through his association with the local Golf Club of which he is a most popular member. Mr Mulcahy speaking at the reception at which the establishment of his new factory was announced stated that construction work on the premises would start within 6 or 8 weeks and he hoped that by September they would be ready to commence production.

Project number two will be set up by Flexible Hose Ltd. This has nothing to do with ladies tights as one woman thought before the activities of the new company were explained but will be concerned with the manufacture of metallic and PTFE (polytetrafluoroethylene) — if you can pronounce that — flexible hoses for specialised industries. An associate company of P. Arnold (Flexible Hose) Ltd, Northampton England they are also associated with Dublin Engineering Services as a result of which their market in Ireland is already established.

Mr Peter Mitchell who is Manager of the new unit of the Company to be established in Lismore said that their products are used extensively in the pharmaceutical, petrochemical steel and general engineering industries. The building of the factory in this case will commence next week and it is expected that manufacturing will start at the end of May.

The establishment of these two projects in Lismore has been principally due to the IDA through whose help and assistance this new industrial development in the town would never have come about. IDA Regional Manager Frank Burke described the development as a major break-through in the efforts they have been pushing for the past couple of years and indeed all credit must go to them for the results they are achieving. Frank has had a most able assistant Regional Manager in the person of Tom Hyland whose interest in the welfare of Lismore and West Waterford as a whole is more than evident.

Tom has been a great asset to the industrial growth of the West of the county in recent years. A native of Lismore where his parents, Mr and Mrs Maurice Hyland, live at Chapel Street he has worked quietly and efficiently behind the scenes to encourage and secure the establishment of these industries. Never a man to seek the limelight he was still shy and even embarrassed in his native Lismore last Friday as the principals of the new projects to be established there together with the officials and members of the County Development Team and the Local Development Association spoke out in praise of the help and the effort he had put into the entire undertaking.

He is now leaving the region on well deserved promotion to take over as IDA Regional Manager, West Region and while we wholeheartedly congratulate him on his new appointment we can only say that what will be a gain for the West will be a genuine loss for us. He takes up duty in Galway on March 1.

However as far as Lismore is concerned the town has now gained two new industries with well-established backgrounds. As we have already stated thanks for this must go to the Companies concerned to the IDA and all the other bodies who helped in securing them. Once they have commenced operations their success will depend on the availability of a good workforce and on the co-operation of the local community. The development is something for which Lismore has waited a long time. We wish all concerned every success.

Dungarvan Urban Rate Struck At £12.29

Dungarvan Urban Council unanimously struck a rate of £12.29 in the £ for 1980 at their estimates meeting last Monday night. This is an increase of £1.11 on last year's figure and is the maximum increase (10%) allowed by the Minister for the environment.

The estimate submitted by the Mayor Mr C A Connor provides for a total expenditure of £855,759 of which £260,793 falls on the rates. In his report to the Council the Manager stated that briefly the rate increase derived from the need to provide for additional outlay in housing, environmental protection and the increased county demand.

Among the principal points dealt with in the Manager's report the following were included —

- The 13 house scheme at Childers Estate is now nearing completion and is expected to be ready for occupation within the next five or six weeks.
- A financial allocation for the erection of 26 houses at Kilrush has been sought from the Dept. Formalities should be completed shortly and it is expected that work could commence sometime in the month of May.
- Provision is included for extra public lights including one at Strandside South Abbeyside and Fitzgerald's Terrace. £500 is again included to continue Junior School Warden Scheme at Presentation Convent and £1,100 for the employment of a school warden for the Childers Estate. Youghal Road area (£4,000) is also included for the employment of a Traffic Warden/Litter Warden.

• Metered water charges are to go up from 22p to 30p per 1,000 gallons. Application is being made for the sanction of the proposed augmentation scheme to increase the output at Dalmanuck.

• £2,000 has been included to cover the cost of the report on the Streetscape at present being carried out by the Council's Town Planning Consultants.

• £1,500 has been included for cleaning beaches and maintaining playgrounds. A similar amount is provided for the continuation of the repair of the swimming pool.

LIKE A FAIRY TALE

Following the reading of the Manager's report by the Town Clerk Mr B White Mr A Deasy TD remarked that compared with the County Council the Urban estimate report read like a fairy tale as there was to be no curtailment of services for which they should all be very satisfied.

The County Manager said the present satisfactory situation was due in great part to previous Councils who had pioneered many of the developments which enabled the present Council to go ahead with the present schemes. I have been associated with the Council for the past 13 years" said the Manager and I think that tremendous credit is due to the previous Councils for this.

Mr D Gode then proposed and Mr T Wade seconded that the rate of £12.29 as submitted be adopted and this was unanimously approved.

Two Million Gallons Of Water Daily Not Enough For Dungarvan

At present there are two million gallons of water per day supplied in Dungarvan but it was not enough. Mr P Walsh Town Engineer told members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night.

He made the point when Mr Austin Deasy TD suggested that the Council should make a dole supply available to 27 houses located from Killosera to Killofford which at present had no water.

Mr Walsh said that it would not be possible to do this without the augmentation scheme proposed for the Ballinamuck supply which when carried out would double the daily output to four million gallons. The water is there" he said "but it is a matter of getting it into the town."

Mr B White Town Clerk said that the contract documents for the scheme had been sent to the Department and they were awaiting approval for them.

When Deputy Deasy said that this could take some time and that he would press to have the houses he referred to supplied.

Mr O Connor stated that in the next month or two they expected the announcement that two new industries which would give considerable employment would be started in the town and they would have to get priority where water supplies were concerned.

He pointed out that the houses referred to by Mr Deasy were outside the Urban area.

Mr Walsh said that the two million gallons a day they had at present was not enough and industries would suffer if there was any further draught.

When the Co Manager said that he would take the matter up with the Dept. Mr Deasy agreed to defer the matter to a later meeting.
