## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**NEW FACTORY FOR DUNGARVAN**  
 Dungarvan's industrial expansion was given a new impetus with the announcement that an IDA reception on Monday last of a new industry which will provide 131 jobs at full production within the next few years.

The principals of the new industry are the Block Drug Company with headquarters in New Jersey USA who manufacture dental care products such as toothpaste denture cream toothbrushes and coring tabs for cleaning false teeth. A subsidiary of the company Stafford-Miller Ltd., is located at Hatfield, Herts, England and from there for the announcement of the new factory in Dungarvan came Managing Director Vincent Kelly.

The factory will be located on part of the IDA's 74 acre site at Clogherane near Lisfennel on the outskirts of the town on the Youghal Road. Plans for the building and the general lay-out of the new factory were on display at the reception and will occupy 8 acres of the site while the company has an option on a further 4 acres in the event of future expansion.

Apart from the fact that the establishment of this new factory will provide many extra jobs in Dungarvan, one of the most important aspects of the announcement was the assurance given by Mr. Kelly that the project was a "clean" one which would produce no foul smells or no smoke fumes nor would the building itself as he put it be a concrete monstrosity but would be one which would blend into the site which would eventually be fully landscaped and prove an asset rather than a liability to the location.

**TWO "MERC'S" OUTSIDE**  
 The reception at which the announcement was made was held at the Ormonde Hotel in O'Connell Street and the street was given a more than usual important appearance on Monday as two Mercedes cars stood parked outside the hotel. They were the State cars used by Minister of State Ray Burke who came to town to make the official announcement and by Minister of State Jackie Fahey who attended the function as a guest and as a local TD.

Not always are such functions given such VIP treatment as to have two Ministers of State present at the same time and in this regard it is interesting to note that it costs £33,500 a year or £644 a week to keep every State car on the road.

This information was revealed in the Daily on February 26 when Labour Deputy Barry Desmond asked the Minister for the Public Service the estimated annual cost of the Office of a Minister of State (of whom there are now 10). Mr. Gene Fitzgerald, the Minister, gave the following itemised reply: (1) The Minister's allowance (in addition to his salary of just over £10,000 as a TD) is currently £6,159 a year. (2) Superannuation benefits are provided on a non contributory basis. (3) Expenses including travel and subsistence telegrams, car hire receptions etc could approximate £1,000 per annum. (4) The cost of a State car, including petrol, replacement costs and charges in respect of two Garda drivers amounts to £33,500 a year. (5) The cost of staff with one higher executive officer two clerical officers and one clerical assistant including overheads such as rent, rates office equipment, stationery and messenger and cleaning services is around £32,000 a year.

When it is all added up it shows that each of the 10 Ministers of State appointed by the new Taoiseach will cost about £75,000 a year to the Exchequer. Certainly not chicken feed no matter what way you look at it!

## U.S. Drug Company To Start Operations In Dungarvan

The internationally known Block Drug Company, Inc. with headquarters at Jersey City, New Jersey U.S.A., is to establish a factory in Dungarvan where production is expected to begin in 1981.

Mr. Ray Burke TD Minister of State at the Department of Industry Commerce and Tourism announced the starting of the new project at a reception held by the IDA at the Ormonde Hotel Dungarvan on Monday.

In his speech Mr. Burke said it is with great pleasure that I announce today the establishment of this manufacturing concern here in Dungarvan. The company involved is Block Drug Incorporated of New Jersey USA and the project will provide 131 jobs at full production.

Products to be manufactured examples of some of which you see on display here include world famous oral hygiene products such as Sensodyne toothpaste and Corega Tabs. Some of these products are already available in Ireland through the company's UK subsidiary Stafford Miller Ltd.

Block Drug Incorporated is a major producer of oral hygiene personal care and ethical pharmaceutical products and is based in Jersey City. The company's products are sold in 150 countries throughout the world, and it employs almost 2,000 persons in eight countries in North and South America Europe and Australia.

Many of the jobs involved in this project will require special skills or technical competence and will include chemists laboratory staff fitters and process operators. A comprehensive training programme has been drawn up in conjunction with ANCO to train suitable people to fill these positions where necessary. Recruitment is expected to begin late in 1980 and production will commence in 1981.

The products will be exported to the company's long established markets in Europe.

This project is yet another indication of the suitability of Ireland as a location for investment in suitable people to fill these positions where necessary. Recruitment is expected to begin late in 1980 and production will commence in 1981.

**NO SMELLS, NO SMOKE**  
 Mr. Vincent Kelly Managing Director of Stafford Miller (UK) Ltd. who represented the company said that it was a family business now in the third generation. He said that one of the reasons they had decided to come to Dungarvan was because the IDA site at Clogherane (near Lisfennel) was a beautiful and most convenient one as

they could export their products through the port of Waterford while they had an adjacent airport in Cork. He realised he said that there had been some considerable concern about the effect the new factory would have on the local environment and he wished to allay these fears by stating that they were not going to build any concrete monstrosity and as it was a clean industry there would be no smells and no smoke. He assured the people of the locality and the town that the new factory building would be nicely landscaped and once they had settled in he thought that it would add to the location.

**HIGH PRIORITY**  
 Mr. Frank Burke Regional Manager IDA Waterford said that West Waterford is an area of high priority with the IDA and locations like Tallow Lisnane and Cahir had been given a lot of attention recently and this was evidenced with such recent approvals and announcements as Arkie Ltd. Flexible Hose Ltd. Hydrex Int. Cypolas Tobin Engineering Fine Wood Laboratories as well as expansion of existing industries such as Moloney's of Cappagh M D O'Connor & Son etc.

We have said "focused" on Dungarvan in more recent times where we are glad to say that overall stability exists with the local manufacturing industry and the proof of this is an increase in existing manufacturing employment last year of 156 in manufacturing employment in Dungarvan went from 1,493 in January 1979 to 1,649 in January 1980.

# "YES, LET ME LIKE A SOLDIER FALL"

Mollis son, Peter Donnell sat beside me at the music lesson. The teacher said Peter you have no ear! Now, there had been no mutilation in a fight or otherwise. The teacher spoke in a musical sense. Actually, he himself had "no ear" what Peter lacked was intellect.

Years later in a little Tipperary town, I ascended the stairs to the organ to investigate the sound of the beautiful Wallace tune 'The harp in the Air'. I didn't reveal my presence till the tones had melted and died upon my ear. There sat Peter on the stool. After an exchange of ecstatic relations we walked amongst the tombstones, a suitable background to the conversation which was the long string of complaints about the work of an organist and the poor wages etc.

The power of music seems out of all proportion to its cost. I exclaimed "The training of a choir, like virtue seems to be its own reward. The same may be said of the organ. There's no money in it." "You should do it for the love of the thing," he said. "I'm going to take pupils I have sent around a prospectus I want to keep a high standard. The prospectus is about short skirts (legs play a comic melody on the organ pedals) lip stick powder puffs etc. What do you think? Didn't some push powder puff through the letter-box?"

"What did you do with it?" He didn't answer. Had we been outside the holy ground his answer would have been far from edifying. Donnell went on "I often heard of voluntary" in connection with the sublime organ. But not until I became organist did I know what it meant. "Do you ever visit Dungarvan?" "I'm due there next Thursday."

On his arrival I took him straight to the home of a lady friend in a corner of the park. She stood a pianola, marked "Weber London". A small bookcase had thirty pianola rolls of perforated papers sealed in plastic. I skimmed through the titles - Vivald, Hayden, Beethoven, Mozart, Wagner. Peter looked out one marked "Vincent Wallace 1885 - Fantasia Brillante The Orchestra London and The Aeolian Co. New York."

A pianola is a kind of mechanical piano which plays back roll-music when one works the pedals. For a while we listened to the overture. 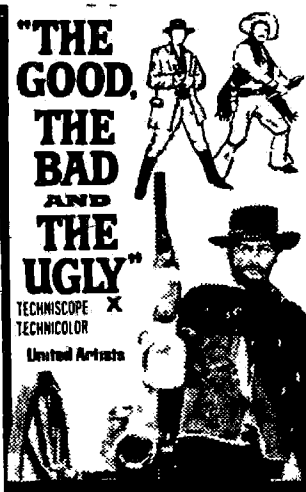

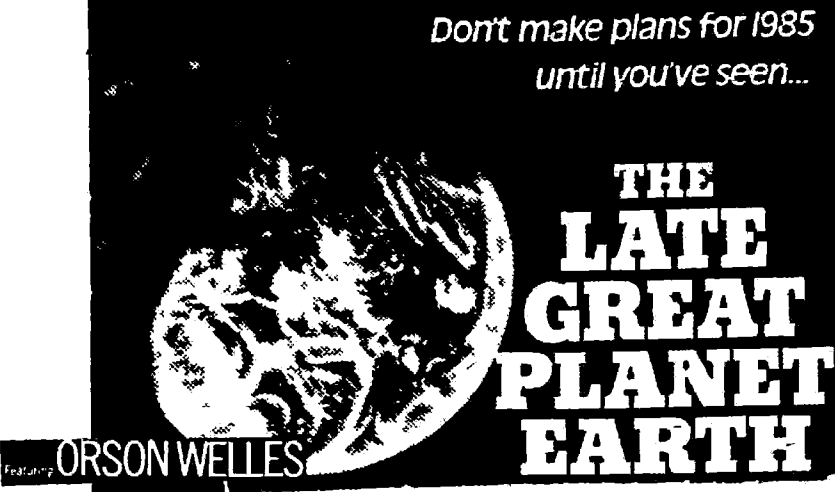

£7,000 Cut In Local Improvements Grant

Members of Waterford County Council were informed at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday by the Department of the Environment that a grant of £19,000 had been allocated to the Council for Local Improvements Scheme works in 1980. Mr J. D. Hally County Engineer said that the figure allocated was down from £26,000 last year and he added that to carry out the same amount of work as was done with the £26,000 last year it would require about £32,000 or £33,000 this year.

HOUSING GRANT The same Department also informed the Council that an initial capital allocation of £600,000 had been made to cover the Council's ongoing commitments at January 1 for expenditure during the coming year on the Council's housing schemes.

Mr B. J. McNally Acting Co-Manager told Deputy Deasy that the allocation would just about cover the plans laid out by the Council for the year.

Regional Structure For AncOT

The Board of AncOT the new agricultural education, training and advisory body, has adopted an organisational structure based on three levels: county (including district) already in existence; regional and national.

The regional structure of the organisation will consist of the regions as follows: South-west (Cork Kerry, Limerick, South-east (Waterford, Wexford, Tipperary, Kilkenny, Carlow and Wicklow) West (Clare, Galway, Mayo and Roscommon) North-west (Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Monaghan, Carrick and Longford) Midlands (east) (Laois, Offaly, Westmeath, Meath, Dublin, Louth and Kildare).

There will be a Director in charge of each region, responsible for all the advisory, training and associated development activities of the organisation within the region. While being necessarily geographically located in the region, the Director will be based on the basis of the resources main enterprises and problems to be tackled. These considerations will also determine staffing, especially in terms of specialist staff as well as the facilities needed to underpin a programme for the progressive development of agriculture in each region.

Among the specialists staff at these levels will be those dealing with advice education and training. The directors will be required to develop and maintain active liaison with agricultural organisations and other appropriate organisations in their areas. The deliberate policy of the Board is that all possible functions will be developed to the regional level.

The Director of AncOT Dr Tom Walsh will work from a national office temporarily located at 39 Northumberland Road Dublin 4 with three principal aides - the Director of Operations, Development and Administration.

RESPONSIBLE FOR WHOLE COUNTRY The Director of Operations will be responsible for the implementation of the programme of AncOT in the country as a whole. For this purpose the five Regional Directors will report to him and he will consequently supervise the overall operation of the finance personnel, general administration, specialist advisory and engineering services for the regions.

The Director of Development will be responsible for the organisation's overall programme development liaison and dissemination and for monitoring evaluation and innovation activities.

The Director of Administration will be responsible for the organisation's overall finance and personnel functions the internal audit and the administrative and general management and related services.

Work is now in progress to integrate the staff from the organisations concerned into the new body at an early date. The first step will be the appointment of the national and regional directorate staff.

Mr. Brosnan said that it was specifically required by the Act as a defendant in such a case and as the Garda in his evidence did not state that he had done so while the defendant had stated that it had not been given to him he applied for the charge against his client to be dismissed.

Supt. M. English who prosecuted the case submitted that the Garda was not obliged to state in evidence that he had considered such a written statement and he further pointed out that Mr. Brosnan had not referred to it in cross-examination.

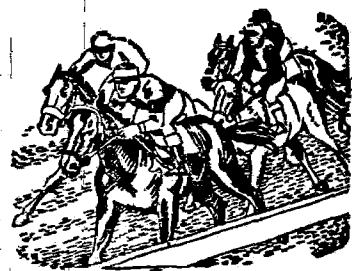

That she took part competently in her first car rally since then she has chalked up an impressive list of successes. Winning the 'best lady' award in the 1979 Circuit of Kerry and capturing firsts in the ladies section in the Thomond Rally the Tipperary and Fenway Forest Rallies in the recent West Cork Rally she was third in the ladies section a similar honour going her way in the '79 Circuit of Munster Rally

This week-end's Circuit of Ireland is of course her greatest challenge to-date and Marie will be happy just to compete in the event. Her father Michael, who will be a member of her service crew during the few days believes she can and will finish the rally — barring accidents

Marie will start out with the storied international Belfast Friday morning from Belfast that will take in 12 stages in the North before returning to Belfast that same evening. The drivers next take to the road at 4 o'clock on Saturday morning ending in Killarney — with 11 more stages behind them — that evening

Marie and her few competitors will be starting out at 4.30 on Sunday morning on nine more stages and over an area that will include the Ring of Kerry before returning again to Killarney

While her interests in motor sport account for the bulk of her leisure time Marie is also a member of the Dungarvan Fishing Club where she does some time modelling with the Fiddima Supple Model Agency in Cork
