PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

SUN ALL THE WAY FOR EASTER

Sunshine all the way made the Easter Bank Holiday more a Summer break than one in Spring. At times, over the week-end, temperatures soared into the sixties with the result that all who could, got out to soak in the welcome warmth of the sun after the long wet winter.

However while the day temperatures were unusually high, they dropped sharply at night and there was hard frost on several nights which made for a rather unusual combination of warm days and freezing cold nights.

As usual the Churches were crowded for the Holy Week and Easter Ceremonies and on Easter Sunday I heard the priest who celebrated the Mass I attended remark on the big numbers who went to confession during the previous week at their church in Dungarvan, qualifying it by saying that the biggest number were men, the majority of whom were in the young to middle age bracket—a real sign of the strength of the Catholic religion in Dungarvan and district.

The summer-like conditions on Sunday saw hundreds turn out for the Dungarvan Lions Club sponsored 20-mile cycle and it was really amazing and indeed wonderful to see that practically all the starters completed the course from the very youngest who included some as young as six and seven up to the not so young at the top of the scale.

While road traffic in some areas was pretty heavy, the overall reports were that it was not as heavy as might have been expected in view of the beautiful outdoor conditions that prevailed and the high cost of petrol now was blamed for this falling off. The drop in the number of cars on the road might also account for the fact that there were only a few serious accidents reported over the holiday period and in the West Waterford Garda district only two or three accidents resulting in material damage occurred and none of these was of a serious nature.

The one black mark that I must record concerns the abundance of litter that was as ever again evident in many places and nowhere more proliferate than in Dungarvan. On Monday some of the principal streets resembled the verges of a refuse dump and gave the town a very ugly and unkempt appearance. It certainly seems that all the appeals that have been made to keep our towns villages and indeed our countryside as a whole in a clean and tidy condition have fallen on deaf ears. What a pity and indeed what a greater pity when the sun shines from a cloudless blue sky that the scene below cannot match it.

THE DAIRY SURPLUSES IN EUROPE

One of the main concerns of the EEC at present is the size of the problem of dairy surpluses and how best to deal with it. The magnitude of the problem was explained very simply in a recent issue of "Eurofocus," a news sheet for journalists issued in Brussels by the Directorate-General for Information of the Commission of European Communities.

"Eurofocus" puts it like this: "Imagine a lake more than 6 miles long and over a mile wide. If this lake were about 15 feet deep and full of milk it would represent the annual production of fresh milk in the 9 countries of the Common Market. One farm in three in the EEC produces milk and dairy production represents about one-fifth of the Nine's total agricultural output in value terms."

There's no doubt that milk is an excellent food, full of nourishment and protein, but there is a limit to the amount

that can be consumed, even by the 260 million EEC citizens. Of course, milk is increasingly being transformed into other forms of dairy produce: butter, cheese and yogurt for example but still there is a large surplus over demand. How has this arisen and what can be done about it?

Production in other agricultural sectors sometimes also exceeds consumption but the situation is usually only temporary. A period of bad weather or drought usually balances things out over a few years and demand and supply remain broadly in balance. But in the milk sector the surplus is permanent. The public organisations financed by the EEC under the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) and transformed into products which are less perishable like milk powder and butter.

At the root of the surpluses are three principal factors: the increase in production, the stagnation of consumption and the operation of European price guarantee mechanisms. The increase in Common Market production of milk is not the result of more farmers turning irresistibly to dairy farming but rather to a constant increase in the milk yield per cow. In 1950 the "average European cow" produced 2,400 kilos of milk each year, now the figure is more like 4,000 kilos. Milk yield has almost doubled in 20 years. This huge increase has been due to several factors. Firstly, cattle are now better suited to milk production through new techniques in artificial insemination, secondly animal diseases for so long a major barrier to increased production have largely been conquered in the European countries, also, the high level of modernisation in the dairy industry with the electrical milking techniques and other methods has greatly helped efficiency and the use of "green fodder" has increased a lot through new varieties of grass and fertilisers, which means that farmers now have fewer problems with the supply of cattle feed than was previously the case.

Finally however, it has been the extensive use of concentrated animal feedstuffs, which enable milk to be produced independently of the quantity of fodder available locally. This technique is perfectly profitable for a kilo of food compound costs less, in general than a litre of milk, whilst it enables two litres to be produced.

At present the European Commission is considering several solutions to the problem but whatever is to be done to deal with the matter it must be done quickly as the growing cost of supporting the milk market may end up by compromising even the principle of the common policy.

RETIRED RECENTLY

The recent retirement of Mr. Ned Woulfe from his post as Fishery Inspector with the Lismore Board of Fishery Conservators marks the end of an era which extended over almost half a century.

Mr. Woulfe, a native of Abbeyfeale and resident in Castleownroche had served for over forty years with the Lismore Board. Half of that period was in the post of Inspector with responsibility for fishery protection on the river Blackwater and all its tributaries and during that period he became a well-known figure throughout the area under his jurisdiction which extended from Dungarvan to as far west as Kerry and even took in parts of Cork and Limerick as well.

In the course of a tribute paid to Mr. Woulfe on the occasion of his last appearance at Femyo Court before retiring, Mr. John Waters, Fishery Board Solicitor said that in the course of a long

career, Mr. Woulfe was fearless in the execution of his duty and had a wide knowledge of the fishery laws but had always tempered justice with mercy.

We wish Mr. Woulfe a happy and contented retirement.

A MISNOMER?

I note that Irish hospitals received only barely over 20 per cent of the total money collected from the sale of Sweep tickets in the December draw.

Unemployment Assistance For Smallholders

The rates of Unemployment Assistance payable to smallholders whose means are assessed on a notional basis by reference to their land valuations are not being increased, but are being maintained at their present levels. Such smallholders may opt to have their means from land factually assessed where it would be to their advantage and the rates shown above will then apply to them. Application for factual assessment of means may be made at the nearest Local Office of the Department. Smallholders who apply for factual assessment, and where the results are not found to be to their advantage, may remain on the notional assessment.

EXTRA Grants In Respect Of Multiple Births

Residence Condition for Unemployment Assistance

At present an applicant for unemployment assistance must have lived in the State for a continuous period of at least six months at any time before claiming. This condition is being abolished

Means Test Changes

Blind Pension
The amount of earnings of a recipient of a blind pension which will not be regarded as means for pens purposes is being increased from £208 a year to £312 a year in respect of the pensioner and from £156 a year to £208 a year in respect of an adult dependant, in recognition of the special problems of blind persons

Unemployment Assistance for seasonal fishermen
The amount of earnings of seasonal fishermen which will not be regarded as means for unemployment assistance purposes is also being increased
Under the unemployment assistance scheme a certain proportion of income from seasonal fishing is not regarded as means. At present one-half of the income which does not exceed £80 plus one-third of the income which exceeds £80 but does not exceed £200 is disregarded. These amounts are being increased to £120 and £300 respectively

Qualifying Age For Blind Pension

The qualifying age for blind pension is being reduced from 21 years to 18 years. Application forms for this pension are available at any Post Office and should be sent to the Department of Social Welfare, D Olier House, D Olier Street, Dublin 2

PRSI Rates of Contribution
