





EMPHATIC DEFEAT FOR WATERFORD

Galway 3-15, Waterford 2-7

Galway made no mistake in the National Hurling League quarter-final replay at Croke Park on Sunday last when, in contrast to the drawn game, they displayed all the skills when emphatically defeating Waterford by 3-15 to 2-7.

But although Waterford noticeably affected by the loss of Joe Moore and Noel Connors out through injury were comprehensively defeated in the end the stubborn resistance which they displayed made this clash an exciting one which, over the hour produced some fine performances and some well taken scores.

In the drawn game Galway were forced to come from behind but on this occasion it was the winners who forced the pace throughout.

Sean Silke who gave a truly memorable display which had the effect of inspiring his teammates throughout the field, got the Western side off to a great start when his shot from a 100 yards free went all the way to the Waterford net in the third minute.

They were subsequently never headed and even though Waterford fought gallantly to avenge their defeat Galway pulled out all the stops in a final quarter in which they eventually crushed the Dorse side.

Five minutes into the game Silke's score was negated by a brilliantly in form Jim Greene who was subsequently hampered by a lack of possession. Waterford were winning a liberal supply of the ball in the middle area where Galway were sadly missing the services of John Connolly forced to cry out with injury but who came on at full forward ten minutes into the second half.

The introduction of Pascal Ryan for the injured Michael Kilkenny, the latter immediately added fire to the Galway attack and the winners hit a real purple patch between the 10th and 15th minutes as Ryan shot the great points in the 10th and 12th minutes to restore their lead.

Gerry Curtin Noel Lane and Joe Connolly (2) added further points as Galway enforced their position. Jim Greene kept Waterford's flagging hopes alive with a superb overhead goal but Galway finished the half in complete control and points from Joe Connolly (2) Curtin and Silke boosted their lead to 1-12 to 2-2 at the interval.

Waterford although facing a seemingly insurmountable obstacle gained in stature and confidence as they brought the fight to Galway in the third quarter. Declan Fitzpatrick pointed from 55 had another from play which was followed by a further minor from Tom Casey to leave just four points in it by the 37th minute.

Waterford centre forward Tom Rockett at centre forward Tom Casey at left full and Michael Ormonde and Tom Maher forming the right flank of attack but with centre forward Silke in devastating form for Galway ably assisted by Iggy Clarke Waterford's scoring chances were limited.

John Connolly's introduction at full forward lifted Galway and Bernie Forde's goal in the 4th minute put an end to Waterford's hopes.

Galway ruled the game throughout the field and the closing quarter in which John Connolly had two fine points and Forde added his second goal just on the call of time.

Court Orders Forfeiture Of Helvick Fisherman's Nets And Trawler

A Helvick fisherman who was convicted at Dungarvan Court last week on a number of counts for illegal fishing had his nets and costs totaling £340 imposed on him by District Justice W. P. O'Connell. In addition the District Justice also made orders that the nets and trawler owned by the defendant be forfeited.

The defendant Liam Kelly Helvick, pleaded guilty to 4 charges of having in his possession at Helvick on July 24 1979, monofilament salmon nets of a depth of 45 meshes when the legal depth allowed was 30 meshes.

Mr Fergus Power Solr for the Board of Fishery Conservators who prosecuted stated that on July 24 which was in the annual close season for salmon fishing the Board's Waterkeepers went to Helvick where they saw Liam Kelly standing on the quay. They spoke to him and asked him if he owned the trawler Vega and the drift nets. He said that he did and that the nets were of 30 mesh depth. Inspector Ryan then examined the nets and found that they were 45 mesh deep and one section was monofilament.

Mr Power then said that the Inspector took possession of the net and had it conveyed to Dublin for examination by the Industrial Research and Standards and the expenses for this came to £126 with an additional £20 for the Inspector. He said that the penalties involved on each of the counts ranged from £25 to £50 with an order for the forfeiture of the nets. He also asked for £25 costs on each of the 4 counts.

Mr J. P. Gordon Solicitor for the defendant told the Court that the nets in question were displayed openly on the quay and the defendant intended them for ground fishing only. The District Justice convicted the defendant and fined him £40 on each of the four counts in addition he allowed £140 expenses and £50 costs and made an order for the forfeiture of the nets in question.

THROUGH BINOCULARS Further charges were then preferred against the defendant in respect of alleged offences at Ballinacorney Lower Old Parish on October 4 for 1) the erection of a fixed engine for the capture of salmon contrary to Section 97 of the Fisheries Consolidation Act 1959 2) fishing for salmon during the annual closed season 3) use of a drift

net prohibited under the Salmon and Trout Conservation Bye-Laws and 4) use a boat as an aid to the commission of these offences.

Defendant pleaded not guilty to these charges. Waterkeeper John Doyle in evidence said he was an Inspector under the Waterford Fishery Board and on October 4 with three other waterkeepers they were near Minehead and saw the trawler Vega owned by Liam Kelly coming in towards Minehead. They went towards the Lighthouse and two of the keepers remained there while witness and another of the keepers went across the fields to Ballinacorney Lower where they saw the Vega heading. The time was 3.55 p.m.

Through binoculars he saw 3 men hauling a net into the Vega and after hauling it they headed towards the shore. About 100 yards out there was a marker buoy and the Vega stopped. Liam Kelly took the marker buoy on board and attached the rope of a net to it and lowered it into the water. The net appeared to be 45 meshes deep and about 800 yards long. It was a salmon drift net with white plastic floats after paying out the net the trawler headed back to Helvick and they then left and returned to Carrick-on-Suir.

Cross-examined by Mr Gordon Solr witness said that they carried out their observations through one set of binoculars which he shared with the other waterkeeper and the distance involved was about 200 yards. He said that they did not go back to Helvick to access Kelly when he arrived there as they saw no point in doing so.

Waterkeeper J. Geraghty gave corroborative evidence. At this stage Mr Gordon asked for a direction on all counts on the grounds that the prosecution had failed to establish a prima facie case as they had submitted no evidence that they had carried out a proper investigation. It could not be possible for the waterkeepers to say from a distance of 200 yards that a net was 45 or 50 or even 30 meshes deep. They could have gone back to Helvick and accosted Kelly there if they wished but they had not done so.

The District Justice granted a direction on counts 1 and 2 but said that the defence had a case to meet on counts 3 and 4.

WATER DEPTHS At this point the prosecution called a further witness John O'Keefe an Engineer with the Dept. of Fisheries who produced charts of the locality where the alleged offences were stated to have occurred. He stated in evidence that according to these charts the depth of the water where the marker buoy was stated to be was from 45 to 51 feet.

Liam Kelly the defendant then gave evidence and said that he was the owner of the Vega. On October 4 he was fishing with three others and the nets he was using were salmon nets but he was using them for bottom fishing. He denied that he was fishing for salmon on the occasion and said that because of the time of year they would be no good even if he did catch any. He was fishing for pollock ling and cod and was using concrete brick to sink the net to the bottom.

Witness repeated that he caught no salmon on the occasion and said that he had never heard of any salmon ever being caught in the Minehead of Helvick areas in October. He further added that the water depth where he was fishing was between 2' and 3 fathoms (15 to 18 ft).

Following further submissions by Mr Gordon the District Justice said that he had no doubt but that the defendant was in breach of the statute which counts 3 and 4 were concerned and he convicted him on these charges. On count 3 he imposed a fine of £25 with £50 expenses and £25 costs and on count 4 a fine of £10 together with an order for the forfeiture of the boat.

He fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal by either side.

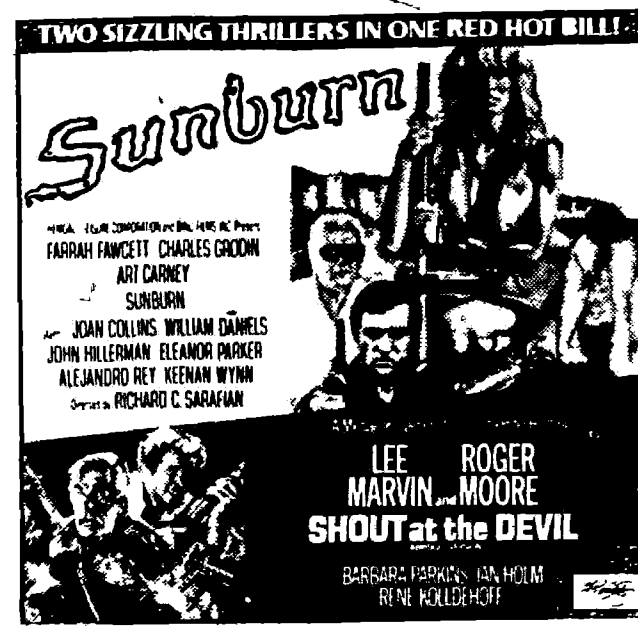

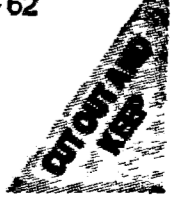
