## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### STILL A FOUR SEATER

Despite some forecasts that the Waterford Constituency, due to a population increase, might become a 5-seater for future Dail elections, the Boundary Commission has recommended that it remain a 4-seater with certain alterations.

The Commission set up by the Government on October 9, 1979, "to advise and report on the formation of constituencies for the election of members to Dail Eireann," was headed by Mr Justice Brian Walsh, Judge of the Supreme Court with Mr Gerard A. Meagher, Secretary of the Department of the Environment and Mr Michael J. Healy, Clerk of the Dail. Mr T. Sexton, a principal officer in the Department of the Environment, was appointed as Secretary to the Commission.

The Commission has now submitted its report to the Government and the main result is that the strength of the Dail will now be increased to a total of 166 members. Waterford as I have stated, despite predictions to the contrary will remain a 4-seat constituency although the Commission has recommended a big increase in the number of 5-seaters throughout the county.

Dealing with the situation as they saw it in the Waterford Constituency the Commission states as follows in their report:

"The combined population of the county and county borough of Waterford is 87,278. If the area were allocated 4 seats the population/member ratio would be 7.54% above the national average, if it were allocated 5 seats the ratio would be 13.97% below the national average. The area which includes the city of Waterford would be a suitable base for a 5-seat constituency but a transfer of at least 10,000 would be required to bring the population up to the level for 5 seats."

The transfer could be made from Co. Kilkenny (including the Waterford City suburbs situated in that county) without reducing the representation of the proposed Carlow-Kilkenny constituency. The Commission did not favour this arrangement because it would involve breaching a provincial and a county boundary and because the population involved would be far greater than that of the Waterford suburbs situated in Co. Kilkenny.

"A transfer from South Tipperary, which would reduce the representation of that county to three, was not considered appropriate because the transfer required would be far greater than the transfer necessary to bring South Tipperary up to the 4-seat level."

"In regard to an adjustment between Waterford and Tipperary, it was stated in a submission to the commission that the inclusion of part of Co. Waterford in the South Tipperary constituency in 1961 and 1969 caused resentment among the people of the area. It was also stated that the counties of Waterford and Tipperary are separated not only by a county boundary but also by the river Suir and the Knockmounth ranges and that an adjustment between the counties would therefore be inappropriate."

"While recognising the force of these arguments the Commission felt that, in the circumstances existing in the area, the most reasonable arrangement would be the allocation of 4 seats each to Waterford and South Tipperary and the transfer of the rural district of Clonmel No. 2 from Waterford to South Tipperary in order to improve the population ratio in both of the proposed constituencies."

"The area proposed for

transfer is much smaller than that previously joined to South Tipperary and, in the commission's view, the area could be said to be oriented towards Clonmel and to have a degree of affinity with the neighbouring area of South Tipperary."

The commission recommends the formation of a 4-seat constituency consisting of the county borough of Waterford and the administrative county of Waterford less the former rural district of Clonmel No. 2."

### WHAT THE PROPOSALS MEAN

In simple terms the Commission's recommendation in our case will remove approximately 1,550 voters from the Waterford register and the area affected stretches from the Old Bridge Clonmel to the Half-Way House and will include the following polling stations: Curraghkilly, Derri-naur, Kilmaccoma, Castlequarter, Bennetschurch (which include parts of Ballymacarby village), Nire and Poulavogue.

Hardest hit of the sitting deputies in the constituency by the proposed changes will be the recently appointed Minister of State in the Department of the Environment, Mr Jackie Fahey, TD, Lyreanearla, Clonmel. He will stand to lose about 700 supporters in the areas to be transferred to South Tipperary and will now also find himself a resident in the new South Tipperary constituency.

Also hit, but to a lesser degree, will be Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy who has been building up support in the areas now to be lost over the last couple of years and it is estimated that he will lose from three to four hundred votes in the proposed transfers.

The city based deputies, Mr Billy Kenneally, Fianna Fail and Mr Eddie Collins, Fine Gael, will not at all be as much affected by the changes as their colleagues in the Western end of the Constituency but nonetheless will be bound to lose some votes.

The Commission's recommendations are concerned only with Dail elections and as far as I can ascertain will not affect local elections so that while the voters in the areas now to be transferred to South Tipperary for the purpose of Dail elections will vote for the Dail candidates in that constituency, they will continue to vote in the local elections for the candidates for Waterford County Council in that electoral area — unless of course there are any other further changes or recommendations in the meantime.

### NO TROUBLE ON THIS OCCASION

The annual general meeting of the Fianna Fail Dungarvan Comhairle Ceannair, unlike the two previous meetings which had to be abandoned in disorder passed off without incident on last Saturday night Mr Sean Whelan outgoing Chairman presided at the outset and the man appointed by the Comhairle Dail Ceannair to take over during the election of office s Deputy Billy Kenneally, appeared to the delegates to show restraint and to see that the business of the meeting was conducted and concluded in a calm and orderly manner. This appeal and the handling of the few controversial situations that did arise by the Chairman ensured that this was done.

Present at the meeting also was Senator Willie Ryan, Tipperary South and his presence and the words he addressed to the delegates also had the desired affect of ensuring a calm and orderly procedure of the agenda.

A storm did threaten to blow up at one stage when

objections were raised to the manner in which the recent AGM of the Dungarvan Cumann was conducted when it was alleged that non-members of the Cumann were allowed to take part in the voting for the election of officers but these objections were withdrawn when Mr Whelan asked that this be done in the interests of the party and for the sake of restoring harmony. However I feel that this is a matter which may not yet be finished and that it will be raised at higher levels.

The crunch for the meeting came with the election of officers and particularly the position of Chairman as this was the subject which created the trouble at the two previous meetings but when this had been disposed of with the outgoing Chairman, Mr Sean Whelan, Kilkenny Ballinamulty retaining his position by 34 votes to 26 in a straight contest with Mr Paddy Kenneally, M.C.C., Agha, stress and strain disappeared and the meeting proceeded to a proper and peaceful conclusion.

As the Chairman so rightly pointed out at the outset there was nothing to be gained from the continued wrangle that had gone on as this only created unwelcome and unwanted publicity for the party within the constituency and it is well that on this occasion common sense and calm prevailed. I would congratulate Mr Whelan on being rendered as Chairman of the Comhairle Ceannair an honour he well deserves for the staunch services he has rendered to the Party down through the years.

## County Engineer Recommends No Change In Council's Decision On Causeway Bridge

The Causeway Bridge at Dungarvan was yet again the subject of a further report by the County Engineer, Mr J. D. Hally at a meeting of the Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

The matter was raised by Cllr D. Goode who told the Council that he had received instructions from the "Save The Bridge" Committee to hand in a notice of motion calling on the Council to rescind its previous decision to alter the bridge and remove the existing parapet. He was doing this, he said, to conform to the legal advice given by the Council's Law Adviser at the previous meeting. The motion proposed by Cllr Goode was supported by Cllr P. Kenneally, J. O'Brien, J. Hart, A. Deasy, T. D. and K. Buihulla.

### CO ENGINEER'S REPORT

Mr J. D. Hally Co Engineer then submitted the following report:

1. I refer to the case made and the suggestion put forward by the deputation at the County Council meeting on April 14 in connection with the proposal to remove the parapets from the Causeway Bridge cantilever footpaths out to either side of the bridge and erect a railing on the outside.

2. There are four specific problems associated with the Causeway Bridge as it is —  
1. There is a decided hump on the bridge.  
2. The bridge is oriented rather too much to the north and would be better swung towards the town.  
3. There is inadequate — at most no — provision for pedestrians on the bridge.  
4. The solid parapets render the bridge 'blind' particularly in traffic conditions.

"Short of building an entirely new bridge neither of the first two aspects can be changed. Both numbers 3 and 4 however can be resolved either by a proposal to provide the cantilevered footpaths with an open type railing. The deputation proposed as an alternative to narrow the carriageway by providing a footpath on one side of the bridge to a width of 4 ft with a protective railing between the footpath and the roadway.

3. The only practical solution to the problems posed by the bridge as it stands at the moment they have made some suggestions about the construction and architectural features of the

bridge which I will certainly take into account in the design. Two members of the staff of An Foras Forbartha have inspected the bridge and I have discussed the position with them. One is a Traffic Engineer and the other a Landscape Architect. They are of the opinion that from the safety, traffic engineering, economic, and legal aspects the proposals for the cantilevered footpaths is the optimum solution but they would greatly regret the disappearance of the parapets from the aesthetic point of view. Since in fact the question of safety for the users of the bridge both drivers, cyclists and pedestrians is the prime reason for the proposals I consider that the conservationists view must give way to the traffic safety aspect of the matter.

I am satisfied that there is no practical alternative to the removal of the parapet walls and the cantilevering of the footpaths as set forth in my report of last October. Finally in my view the final result of the work I propose to undertake will be aesthetically as pleasing to the eye as — indeed in my view more so — than the present structure. I recommend that the County Council confirm their previous decision on the matter.

**NO ADEQUATE STEPS**  
Deputy Deasy submitted that the Council had taken no adequate steps to control traffic on the approaches to the bridge and there never had been even a slow sign erected on the Causeway to warn motorists that they were approaching a dangerous junction and a narrowing of the roadway namely the bridge itself. He asked the Council to respect the wishes of Dungarvan Urban Council who wanted to have the parapets of the bridge retained and cantilevered footpaths placed on the northern side.

Cllr J. Hart said that he had attended the public meeting held about the bridge and the feeling of the people of Dungarvan in general was that the bridge should be retained as it is and that they were still awaiting a reply from the Solicitor for the two people concerned who were objecting Mr Horsman and Mr Landers.

Mr Byrne said that he had visited the place in recent months pretty often and on the last occasion he found it to be most disagreeable. He thought that the Council should walk no longer but should go ahead as decided and put the gate there. Then he added "let the objectors take an action against the Council if they want to".

A whispered consultation between the Town Clerk and Co. Manager Mr C. A. O'Connor followed and when Cllr Byrne asked what the Manager had said the Town Clerk replied "The Council agreed to this."

Utians would need to be a minimum of 4' 6" to allow for two ramps to pass coupled with the proposal to erect the guard rail between the carriageway and the footpath this means that the overall width of path would have to be a minimum of 5 ft.

At present the footpath on the downstream side of the bridge is approx. 6' in width and it would thus be necessary to reduce the width of the carriageway by 3' 6" to give practical effect to the proposal of the deputation. This would reduce the carriageway width to 21' 6" while the deputation's suggestion if implemented would provide proper pedestrian crossing on one side of the bridge. There is another and potentially very serious aspect of the matter and that is the question of nonfeasance and malfeasance. As things stand at the moment should there be an accident the County Council has done nothing to worsen the situation and on the basis of nonfeasance would probably escape its duty. On the other hand should the Council narrow the roadway and an accident ensue it might reasonably be argued that the County Council was guilty of malfeasance and would therefore have to accept full liability. Granted that there is no guarantee that an accident will not happen even with the proposals I have put forward the Council's actions would be clearly seen to have been designed to improve the situation for both the pedestrian and motorist and could therefore be regarded in the light of malfeasance and nonfeasance.

I have consulted An Taisce (Waterford Branch) and An Foras Forbartha on the matter and they were warmly complimentary about the solution proposed by the Council.

The matter was then further discussed at the next meeting when the Council will consider Cllr Goode's motion.

### Councillor Agrees With "Pensman" On Bridge Issue

At the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night Cllr J. Byrne expressed his agreement with the meeting held about the Causeway Bridge. He said that one of the speakers at the meeting had stated that the bridge should be saved because it was an architectural gem but said Mr Byrne "I would like to congratulate Pensman in the Dungarvan Leader" whoever the gentleman is for writing that retired people who are more important than saving a bridge.

Cllr Byrne said that he agreed with this and was speaking for people who had to cross the bridge daily.

He also criticised the remarks of another speaker at the public meeting who had referred to the building being erected by the Council as monstrosities but he said that these were buildings which housed workers in good conditions with good pay, many of whom were members of his union. "I think" said Cllr Byrne that it was very unfair to pass such remarks about the laboratory being built by the Co-op as they were un-called for and unwarranted."

### Dungarvan Men Went On Cheque Book Rampage

A Detective Garda whose prompt and accurate detection of the criminal rampage mounted by two Dungarvan men after he had come into possession of the cheque book was warmly complimented by District Justice W. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court.

Detective Garda A. J. McNulty Young had given evidence of arresting the two young men, Richard Whelan (21) and John Cummins (19) both of Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan who were convicted on a series of charges of uttering forged cheques and unlawfully obtaining goods and cash through uttering them.

Witness said the defendants somehow came across the cheque book in the name of a local married couple. They then proceeded to go to shops and supermarkets buying small amounts of goods with cheques made out for £50 or £70. There had been no proper signature on any of the cheques, simply block letter capitals imitating the printed names on the bottom of the cheques. In all cheques the value of £370 had been cancelled by the defendants.

The Justice sentenced the defendants to six months imprisonment concurrent on each charge suspended on condition they be of good behaviour for 12 months and that each pay £1.45 compensation within two months.

terrie O'Neill, Abbeyside, said: "On the 12th of last January an Ursuline convent in Long Island, New York, was suddenly burnt to the ground and five Irish nuns, two from Dungarvan, the Dominicans, Sister Theresa (nee Wall), sister of Willie Wall, licenced greengrocer in Street, The Fermard nuns, Monica and Evangelist, were sisters of Jack O'Brien. Mary, a nun who was lost two other nuns at sea. Sister Monica is at present Mother Superior of the Ursuline Order throughout the world.

The fire was described in the following letter to the Sister Superior to an old friend in Dungarvan

Dear Pax (Whelan)

Up to now I have been unable to write because of the shock of the burning convent last February. I was awakened at 2 a.m. by the sizzling of the entire alarm. I grabbed a kimono, coat, house shoes and made for the fire. With the other Sisters I had hoped that the boiler would be controlled. The Superior calmly said the fire was out. She stood in her robes and it was snowing. She had heard the noise. She had tried to ring the bell. The police had tried to get in. She asked a passing car to give her the key. She did not turn on. She saw a glass panel and she saw the police came in. She found him badly cut.

The fire appliances worked from 2 a.m. to 7.30 but in vain. The man had started the fire. The premises were burnt to the ground. The Protestant nuns with reverence bowed and took away the Tablet to a Jewish house where they were cared for. People in the hot coffee and to offer us their shelter. All our concerns were alerted. Charity can't come from a poor man. The people were wonderful.
