Councillor Charges U.C. Chairman With Dictatorship On Bridge Issue

There were heated exchanges at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night during which the Chairman Cllr R A Walsh was charged with adopting a dictatorial attitude in regard to the controversial Causeway Bridge issue.

The matter was raised by Cllr J Byrne who produced a sketch plan showing the proposed layout of the bridge as planned by the County Engineer Mr J D Hally. Cllr Byrne, who passed the plan around for inspection by the other members said that it looked very nice and showed that the County Engineer had done his best to please everyone.

Cllr B Kyne said that the impression had been given that the Urban Council as a whole was against any changes being made in the bridge. However as far as he was concerned if the bridge could not be made safer without the changes proposed then he would be in favour of them.

The Chairman Cllr Walsh said that he was not going to allow it to be made more dangerous and any changes proposed would only make the dead body. We have had all this before, he said, and I don't want to start it all again.

Cllr Byrne said that he was entitled to have his say on this matter and he would not be dictated to by any one.

Cllr Walsh — Well I'm the Chairman here. Cllr Byrne — We put down dictators before!

Cllr T Wade having examined the sketch plan said and was very impressed by the drawing and he would be in favour of it and he felt that it was perhaps the general public saw it, it would also be in favour of it.

Council to Start Repair Scheme At Cathal Brugha Place

Recent representations made by the Tenants Association of Cathal Brugha Place Dungarvan have brought quick results as the Urban Council at their meeting on Monday night approved a comprehensive repair scheme for all the houses involved to be commenced immediately.

A delegation from the Association at a recent meeting of the Council submitted a list of repairs needed following a survey carried out by themselves. The report was presented by a report from the Town Engineer Mr P Walsh agreed that basically the complaints listed were correct. This report went on to state: "There are design and construction faults in the scheme that can at this stage be corrected and every house there could be brought up to a very acceptable standard of insulation and comfort."

The Chairman Cllr Walsh said that he was not going to allow it to be made more dangerous and any changes proposed would only make the dead body. We have had all this before, he said, and I don't want to start it all again.

Cllr B Kyne said that the impression had been given that the Urban Council as a whole was against any changes being made in the bridge. However as far as he was concerned if the bridge could not be made safer without the changes proposed then he would be in favour of them.

This made it very difficult to make up the balance between a mortgage and the price of a new home. She said that lack of savings meant that young people had to apply for high mortgages. High repayments resulted in considerable financial strain during the vital early stages of marriage. Junket Trips For Co. Councillors

Despite a request to local authorities by the Minister for the Environment to cut attendance by delegates at foreign conferences to a minimum, Waterford County Council decided by a majority vote at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last week, to send three delegates to each of four conferences to be held in the USA Paris Brighton and Jerusalem between June and November.

A list of 6 conferences was submitted by the County Secretary and the two passed over were one at Coventry on "Local Government and Environmental Planning and Control" from May 22-31 (omitted because the date was too near) and one at Loughborough on "Industry and Environment" from September 9-11 (for which there was no proposal and in which none of the members appeared to have been interested).

The appropriate cost per delegate was given in the Secretary's list as follows: Coventry £390 Cambridge Massachusetts USA (Land Policy) June 23-27 £810 Paris (International Water Supply Congress) Sept 1-4 £840 Loughborough £430 Brighton (Housing and Town Planning Annual Conference) October 28-31 £350 Jerusalem (Community Planning and Development) November 9-14 £1050.

Mr B J McNally Acting Co Manager said that the Co Manager Mr A O'Connor believed that the conferences relevant to the Council would be those to be held at Coventry Paris and Brighton.

THE ANIMAL REMEDIES ACT 1956

Animal Remedies (Registration of Manufacturers, Importers and Wholesalers) Notice to Manufacturers, Importers and Wholesalers of Animal Remedies

The Minister for Agriculture has made Regulations which require all manufacturers importers and wholesalers of animal remedies to register with the Department of Agriculture. In this context animal remedy means any substance preparation mixture or compound, other than a feeding stuff, commonly known and used as such, which is intended for administration or application whether internally or externally to an animal by any means for the purpose of preventing, diagnosing or treating any injury disease ailment or defect or improving its health or condition.

The following information must be furnished to the Department before 1st August 1980— (a) the name and address of the manufacturer importer or wholesaler (b) in the case of a company the address of the registered office (c) the address of the premises at which the business of manufacture importation or sale by wholesale is carried on (d) the names and active principles of the products being manufactured imported or sold by wholesale.

These Regulations do not apply to animal remedies prepared by a registered veterinary surgeon for an animal under his care or to preparations made on a premises by or under the supervision of a pharmacist for the purpose of retail sale exclusively on those premises. Also exempted are preparations made up in a laboratory which is engaged in recognised pharmaceutical or veterinary education research or analysis and used for such purposes in such a laboratory.

The information referred to above which is required under the Regulations should be furnished to the Secretary Department of Agriculture (Section 8) Agriculture House Dublin 2. Copies of the regulations may be purchased from the Government Publications Sales Office G.P.O. Arcade Dublin 1 (Price 15p Postage 9p extra).

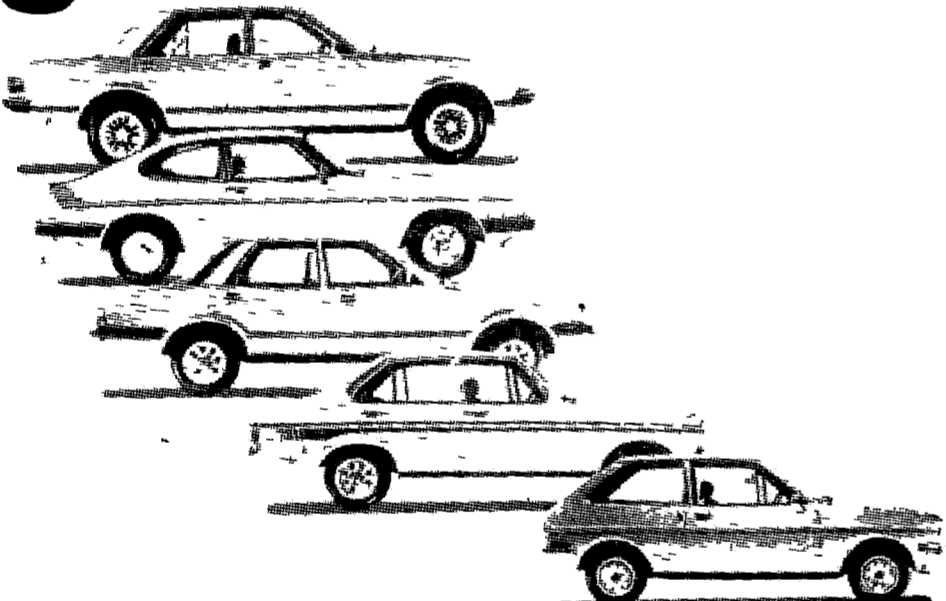
