### WATERFORD CO-OP SOCIETY REPORTS RECORD YEAR

In the progress report from the Chairman, Tom Walsh and Chief Executive Stephen O'Connor of Waterford Co-op Society to a special general meeting of the Society held at the Town Hall, Dungarvan on Thursday June 12, it is stated that in terms of turnover milk intake, grain intake and feed compounds, 1979 was a record year on all counts for the Society.

Total turnover reached £104.9 million, an increase of 14%. However the trading surplus at £2.2 million shows a substantial reduction over the previous year's £4.1 million. The basic reason given for this down-turn was that the revenues in the Dairy Division remained static due to the lack of price increases, stemming in the main from EEC policies and market conditions.

The report adds that although the economic climate for increased milk production has not improved in recent months production to the end of April 1980 showed a useful increase of 6.5%. Despite a plethora of levies and proposed levies, milk continues to be, by far, the best prospect especially for those who have already invested substantially in a dairy herd and the related buildings and equipment.

Forecasting a bright future for the Society the report states "Waterford Co-op itself can face the future in the confident knowledge that the good years of farming have been well utilised in strengthening the Society's capital base. A massive capital programme has been carried out, including more expenditure in 1979/80 than in the entire 80 year history of the co-operative movement within the area. This means that immediate further development need not place an undue strain on the Society's reserves as cash flow situation.

This in itself is an enormous tribute to those thousands of farmers who have with commitment invested in and traded with the Co-op. We extend to them our sincere gratitude for their confidence."

### ROAD HAULIER'S VIEW

Where on earth did the County Engineer get such an accurate figure? Road Transport Engineers with the world tyre companies in USA, Europe and the UK agree that the juggernaut does very little damage to the roads and is the most suitable form of road transport—a 20 ton load spread out evenly

Dungarvan 4-1, Tallow 3-2
Even the soggy undertone conditions and driving rain which fell throughout failed to subside Tallow and Dungarvan under 16 hurriers who served up a splendid hour's hurling in the final of the Meladon Cup, played at the CBS Grounds Dungarvan on Friday evening of last week.

Assisted by a strong breeze blowing towards the school end in the first half Dungarvan did most of the attacking and though Tallow took a shock lead when Aidan Ryan's goal it was the Blues who led at the break by 4-1 to 1-1.

The second half was a cracker as Tallow set about overhauling the holders Piking on the pressure they attacked non-stop subduing Dungarvan and imposing strain. Jim O'Donoghue's well-flighted 65 went skidding to the net and when Billy Henley finished off another assault with a goal Tallow's hopes of a lifting the siege Dungarvan threatened at the other end but by now Sean Lyons Billy Clyne Michael Tobin and Jim O'Donoghue were inspired by the mighty efforts of their colleagues up front and kept a clean sheet during this half.

Aidan Ryan's second point of the same left just two points between the sides as time ticked inexorably away and we felt that the winner must come.

Excitement was intense in these closing minutes as the Dungarvan backs somehow defied all that Tallow could hit them with. We became oblivious of time and Tallow were still swarming in attack as the final whistle sounded.

All marks to Dungarvan for holding out so bravely. They never wilted in the face of constant pressure and must be given the major part of the credit for their team's victory.

From Tallow's viewpoint the concession of a couple of the first half goals and failure to turn second half possession into stores led to the loss of the match. On the credit side we had the satisfaction of shaking off first half lethargy to show the real Tallow over the second thirty minutes and in the process prevent Dungarvan from recording even one score during this period.

The game was a very tight affair with Jim O'Donoghue and Sean Lyons rubbed off on their fellow defenders and with Kieran O'Brien playing well at midfield the forwards got a lot of ball as the game wore on.

Aidan Ryan was the big man in the forward line and scorer-in-chief but even he found the going tough.

In wet conditions control is terribly difficult and a forward in possession finds it hard to turn hold his feet control the ball and strike accurately. Forwards in no way lacked heart or indeed ideas but we badly need to quicken and sharpen our skills.

The field was in excellent trim and in no small way helped to make this a good game. So did Pat Moore the referee who was eminently fair.
