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WHAT IS THE TRUTH?

Much has been written and many arguments made for and against the participation of the athletes of the world in this year's Olympic Games which are due to commence in Moscow next month. The call for a boycott of the Games, first mounted by the United States as a protest against the Russian invasion of Afghanistan has received the support of many countries but the number which has accepted the invitation to Moscow still remains in the majority.

While all admit, at least tacitly, that Russian combat troops are conducting a reign of terror in Afghanistan, the main argument adopted by those who have decided to participate in the Games notwithstanding is that sporting activities should have no part in politics and vice versa. While I find myself in thorough agreement with such a sentiment I have to go further and ask myself what is the truth of the matter where this is concerned.

It is an unfortunate fact that politics have been allowed into sport and this has been a fact for years. Sporting success has long ago been used as a vehicle for political propaganda so it is naive for anyone to say or to attempt to make people believe that this is not so.

In the situation which has arisen from the invasion of Afghanistan by the Russians and the manner in which they have pursued a relentless campaign of destruction and death in that country the Olympic Games in Moscow have now become a contest between two of the great world powers, America and Russia and no matter what is said to the contrary this is the fact of the matter.

In the circumstances no matter how much of our sporting bodies proclaim that politics do not enter the issue in excusing their decisions to go to Moscow, they must realise that their presence will be chalked up as a score for Russia and the Russian propaganda machine will make sure that it is seen to be so.

I know the work and self-sacrifice that goes into the training and preparation of an athlete for events at local level and I have an idea what it must take from a man at the top to train for what has always been accepted as the peak of success—an Olympic gold medal. That is a medal won in competition with the best in the world.

With so many absentees from the Moscow assembly, there can, however, be no great honour attached to an 1980 Olympic medal—even if it is gold itself—as it will always bear the tarnish of the background against which it won.

If our athletes and boxers cannot see their presence in Moscow as a boost for the Russian political propaganda machine and insist on going in the hope of winning a medal—that is, of course, their democratic choice—but as I see it the situation is one in which you cannot remain neutral—if you go, you give approval to what Russia is doing or you stay at home and show your disapproval.

OBJECTION WITHDRAWN

The people of Dungarvan were stunned last week when they learned that an appeal had been lodged by the CEO of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee, Mr. Daniel Kelleher against the decision of the Dungarvan Urban Council to the granting of permission for the construction of a new £3 million factory to be erected by the Block Drug Company on the IDA industrial site at Clogherane on the outskirts of Dungarvan.

Mr. Kelleher's bungalow is located near the industrial site on which the factory is to be built.

As a member of the County Development Team which has the job of securing suitable industrial projects to provide much needed employment in the county, Mr. Kelleher must have been well aware from the beginning of the Block Drug Company proposal for Dungarvan and he, was, in fact, present at the reception held by the IDA in Dungarvan some weeks back at which the official announcement of the project which in time will provide 150 jobs for the area, was made. His decision to appeal against the permission granted to the Company, therefore, came all the more as a surprise and a bombshell.

Letters from the Fr. Two-mey's Residents' Association and from other local residents in the Clogherane area dissociating themselves with the objector and stating that they had no objection whatever to the setting up of the factory were published in this paper last week and since then there has been a change of heart by Mr. Kelleher.

On Monday last we learned that Mr. Kelleher had decided to withdraw his appeal to An Bord Pleanála and that Cllr. Tom Kyne was to issue a statement to the Press on the matter. This news will we are sure, be well received, and commenting on the latest development on Monday evening, Mr. Frank Burke Regional Manager IDA expressed delight that the appeal had been withdrawn as this would ensure that the factory would now go ahead as planned and it would also ensure the long term industrial prospects for Dungarvan.

I understand that the site development work for the new factory has now started and construction work is expected to commence within 3 months and the factory will be in production by June 1981.

FINE GAEL TAKE OVER

Fine Gael took over the Chair and Vice-chair of Waterford County Council at the Annual Meeting of the Council last Monday. The position turned out just as I forecast in here some weeks ago at though things might not have turned out quite so blue (no pun intended) for Fianna Fail had they had their full representation present at the meeting. Minister of State Jackie Fahey still a member of the Council was absent. As a result the Vice-Chair was filled by the casting vote of the newly-elected Fine Gael Chairman, Deputy Austin Deasy.

After the meeting of the Fianna Fail Party Whip on the Council, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally, was in angry mood when he met members of the Press and stated that Deputy Fahey had been notified in writing the previous week to attend the meeting and his absence had been unexplained and as a result the Party had lost the Vice-Chairmanship of the Council. He said that Mr. Fahey would be called on to explain why he had absented himself from the meeting and that the matter was one which would come up for discussion at the next meeting of the Fianna Fail Comhairle Dail Ceannairde the body which deals with the Party affairs in the constituency.

Deputy Fahey has not attended a meeting of the Council since December 12 last and following his appointment as Minister of State it was expected that he would tender his resignation as a member of the Council. He has not, however, done so even though the Kilmacshomas Comhairle Ceannairde of Fianna Fail have nominated Stradballyman Tom Cunningham to fill the vacancy in the event of Deputy Fahey's withdrawal.

On Tuesday Mr. Fahey's Private Secretary at the Department of the Environment phoned me to say that the reason why the Minister was

not at last Monday's Council meeting was that he was still confined to his house following his recent illness. Perhaps this will iron out the difficulty as Cllr. Kenneally saw it on Monday evening but the matter of Mr. Fahey's standing in the Council still remains to be resolved.

Co. Council Opt For Safety In Causeway Bridge Issue

Opting for the safety factor in the proposals of the County Engineer for alterations in the Dungarvan Causeway Bridge as against the aesthetic value of retaining the parapets, Waterford County Council rejected a motion should then put specifically formed Save Our Bridge Committee by 12 votes to 10 at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

The alteration in the name of Cllr. D. Coode and five assenters adjourned from the May meeting of the Council called on the County Engineer to discuss the motion passed at their meeting of January 13 regarding the removal of the parapets of the Bridge and that the County Engineer be asked to have another look at the alternatives (put forward by the Bridge Committee) with particular reference to the possibility of widening the present narrow footpath on the bridge.

A large number of members of the Bridge Committee were present at the meeting to listen to the discussion and to hear what the outcome would be.

MODUS OPERANDI

At the outset the County Manager, Mr. A. O'Connor said that the Council should take note of the modus operandi to be followed in dealing with the motion if they wanted to rescind the previous decision he said they were entitled to do so but if this was the outcome he said that rather than leave matters at a standstill the Council should put forward some positive proposal which could be submitted to the Department to ensure that the money earmarked for the proposed alterations to the bridge would not be lost.

Cllr. D. Coode then formally moved the motion recalling the moves that had led to the decision on the bridge. This was seconded by Cllr. P. Kenneally and supported by Cllr. J. Harty, Bulbulla.

In referring to remarks made by Cllr. Goode, the County Manager said that he wished to make it clear that whatever resolution was passed the County Engineer would comply with it. Cllr. Cahill said that there was £50,000 available immediately for the work on the bridge as proposed by the County Engineer and now it would be as if certain people did not want to spend this money although it would create much needed employment. He also said that the bridge as it is at present is dangerous and coming up

the quay to cross it is a death-trap.

Cllr. P. Kenneally said that while he was supporting the motion he asked if it were passed would it be possible that they would then be no money to spend on the bridge this year.

The Co. Manager said that he did not know that but he again assured the Council that whatever scheme was decided by them there would be no money Department for approval.

Cllr. J. A. Walsh felt that Mr. Harty's proposals for the bridge were excellent but in view of the objections to it by the local community he suggested in any way in which they might reach a compromise decision.

Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer said that he was concerned with the safety of pedestrians cyclists and especially people pushing prams using the bridge. If the footpath was widened as suggested in the motion it would put the considerable number of cyclists using the bridge most of them school children out into the stream of traffic. The Council would now have to decide whether they wanted to put the aesthetic value in maintaining the parapets on the bridge as a safety factor. He could not recommend that the footpath be widened as this would create a more serious situation and he assured the Council that if his proposals were carried out the result would be that the bridge would eventually look as good if not better than it looked at present.

Mr. Hally then said that if the Council decided to rescind their previous decision it would then be a matter for them to say precisely what they wanted and this would then be submitted to the Department for approval. He added that the work on the bridge would be financed from central funds and would cost nothing on the rates.

Cllr. T. Kyne said that when proposals to alter the bridge were first made about 10 years ago he was the only one who then objected to them but he said that the traffic using the bridge then was not as intense as it is now. From the point of view of the safety of these now using the bridge he was afraid that he would have to accede that the suggestion contained in the County Engineer's proposal was now the only feasible one.

Cllr. M. Queney said that he also would support the County Engineer's proposals as the bridge and its approaches as it

was at present was most dangerous. Added to this he said that the County Engineer was the qualified person to advise them and he did not think there was any member of the Council competent enough to come up with a more suitable alternative.

Cllr. E. Collins T.D. said that while he would like to go along with the motion he felt that he would have to give more consideration to the safety of cyclists and pedestrians as referred to by Mr. Hally.

OVER-RIDING FACTOR

Cllr. G. Armstrong thought the Council would have to come down on the side of safety. If one life was lost on that bridge he said it would be too dear a cost for the retention of its aesthetic qualities and we would feel very guilty then. I think the safety factor must be the over-riding factor in our decision.

Cllr. W. McDonnell pointing out that the volume of traffic would be increasing said that he would go along with the County Engineer's view as he had the expert knowledge of the position.

Deputy Deasy Chairman who was also one of the assenters to the motion said that while he recognised that there was a hazard on the bridge he felt that it might be possible to reach a compromise by placing a cantilever footpath on the north side of the bridge.

The Co. Engineer said that if this was done it would take considerably from the appearance of the bridge and would divert most of the traffic to the south side.

When it appeared that stalemate on the issue was being reached the Co. Manager said that the proposers could withdraw their motion and an amendment along the lines suggested by the Chairman substituted.

GETTING BOGGED DOWN

Cllr. C. Curran said that they were just getting bogged down as it appeared they were not prepared to take a decision on the matter.

It was then decided to put the motion as it stood to the meeting and following a vote it was lost by 12 votes to 10 as follows:

Against—Cllrs. Kyne O'Conor Harty O'Ryan Armstrong McDonnell Quirk Walsh Cahill Carey Collins Queney — 12

For — Cllrs. Curran Deasy Guide Harty P. Kenneally O'Brien P. Coffey Bulbulla Healy W. Kenneally — 10

The Chairman Deputy Deasy then declared that he would move an amendment at the next meeting to place a cantilever footpath on the north side of the bridge as a compromise and that the parapets be retained.

Cllr. Kyne pointed out that this would not be in order as the Council's present decision could not now be changed for six months.

Mr. Hally, County Engineer—If such an amendment is to be put forward the Council would again have to rescind its existing decision.

Cllr. Curran—We're just fooling around with the matter now!

The matter petered out when the Chairman said that they could ask the Council's Law Advisors view on the position.

FINE GAEL CAPTURE COUNTY COUNCIL CHAIR AND VICE-CHAIR

Mr. Austin Deasy T.D. Fine Gael Party spokesman on Transport and Communications is the new Chairman of Waterford County Council. He was elected unopposed at the annual meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday when the outgoing Chairman Cllr. Tom Kyne the sole Labour representative on the Council intimated that he was not seeking re-election.

Deputy Deasy's election was proposed by Cllr. J. A. Walsh and seconded by Cllr. M. Queney and when no further proposal was made Cllr. Kyne declared him elected.

At this point Cllr. Kyne continued to occupy the Chair and seconded for nominations for the Vice-Chairmanship.

Cllr. O. Coffey then proposed Cllr. Queney and this proposal was seconded by Cllr. J. Harty. Stating that he felt that this position should rotate among the parties Cllr. Healy (F.F.P.) proposed Cllr. C. Curran and this proposal was seconded by Cllr. M. Henebery.

Cllr. Kyne then stated that he had been approached in regard to the Chair but had expressed the view that he would prefer to see it rotate by agreement such as existed among the parties on Waterford Corporation. He appealed to the Fine Gael Party to seriously consider his suggestion that the Chair should be given to Fianna Fail on this occasion.

When there was no response to this a vote was then taken and resulted as follows:

When the vote of 11 to 11 was announced the Co. Manager Mr. C. A. O'Connor inter-

vened to state that there was a legal problem as Deputy Deasy had already been elected Chairman although Cllr. Kyne still occupied the seat. The Co. Manager would have a casting vote in the issue.

Deputy Deasy then took the Chair (and the chain of office) and gave the casting vote in favour of Cllr. Queney whom he then declared elected Vice Chairman.

SOUR TASTE STILL EXISTS

Deputy Deasy then thanked the Council for their vote of confidence by electing him as Chairman and unanimously he has been flattered by the insistence of his party colleagues that he should become Chairman although he never had any aspirations for high office. He was dubious he said that he would be able to emulate the admirable manner in which Cllr. Kyne had filled the position in the past. He said that as Cllr. Curran had done for so many years before it or as the late Norman Walsh had done when he had been the Council's Chairman he would however do his best.

Referring to Cllr. Kyne's suggestion about the rotation of the position he said that while he had nothing against the spirit of such a suggestion there was something of a sour taste left after recent years when the party in power had operated a winner take all practice. We will I am sure then said the Chairman be willing to discuss the matter within our own party and perhaps after the year has passed we may come to a decision about it.

Pointing out that the coming year would be a time of change for the Council as their County Manager would be retiring and that it would also be a difficult year in which to meet their financial commitments, Deputy Deasy asked for the co-operation of all in meeting the problems ahead of them.

Dail Question About Dungarvan Housing Scheme

Mr A Deasy asked the Minister for the Environment at Question Time in the Dail the reason for the delay in making a financial allocation available for the provision of a new housing scheme at Kilrush, Dungarvan as requested by Dungarvan UDC. Mr Connolly — Dungarvan Urban District Council's request for a capital allocation to finance their 26 house scheme at Kilrush must be considered in the context of the amount of capital available for the local authority housing construction program me. The Minister said that he would like to see schemes in progress at the present time and the relative priority rating of the scheme I cannot say when I will be in a position to convey a decision on the application to the county council.

Mr Deasy — I would like to inform the Minister that it is not the county council who are involved but Dungarvan Urban District Council. Can the Minister give me a guarantee that there will be a financial allocation for those houses in 1980? Mr Connolly — I am not giving any guarantees but I can assure the Deputy that it will be looked into very favourably. Mr Deasy — is the Minister aware that tenders for this housing scheme were received six months ago that several hundred people in Dungarvan town are waiting for housing and that there are only twenty six houses in this scheme? The money being sought is quite minimal in regard to the number of applicants. Mr Connolly — It is being looked into and will get favourable consideration. Mr Deasy — When does the Minister expect to be able to let us know the financial allocations? Mr Connolly — In due course.

Official Statement On Withdrawal Of Planning Appeal To Dungarvan Factory

Following a series of discussions between Mr Donal Kelleher, Clogherane, Dungarvan and the I.D.A. Waterford and myself I have been informed by Mr Kelleher following further discussions this week that he is today Tuesday the 10th instant giving instructions to his Solicitor to withdraw his objections to the building of the proposed factory at Clogherane, Dungarvan. He is doing so in the interest of better community relations in the town and so that the much needed employment resulting both from the actual building of the factory and the employment there when it is completed can go ahead at once. This statement by me is being made with the knowledge of and approval of Mr Kelleher.

Lethal Pollution Kills Fish Life In Blackwater

Acid-like pollution which entered the river Gradogue near Mitchelstown on Tuesday evening last later spread to the Funcheon and subsequently to the Blackwater itself of which the Funcheon is a tributary. All fish life and even waterfowl and river birds were killed off at once in the immediate vicinity of the outbreak. Gardal on the downstream side of the killer effluent as far as Ballyduff and Lismore were busy warning farmers to remove stock from river side fields and people were told to keep away from the river for the time being. An investigation into the matter is being carried out by the Gardal Cork Co Council and the Lismore Fishery Board.

Declare State Of Emergency In Farm Incomes —Waterford Farmers

At a recent meeting of the Waterford County Executive of the IFA a call was made to the President, Mr Donal Cashman, to declare a state of emergency in farm incomes. The past two years has seen a steady decline in incomes in the farming sector due to a number of factors. Bank Interest Charges (12.25 per cent in 1973 is 20 per cent in 1980) have created a very serious threat to the livelihood of many farmers who borrowed in good faith and confidence during the so-called boom years. Coupled with static farm output prices inflated input costs, increases in rates withdrawal of rates-relief for farmers in the £40-£60 PLV bracket and the prospects of a severe recession tax conditions for the farmer are very serious. Confidence in agriculture is at an all time low. While the resource tax is particularly objectionable in principle in reality the abolition of rates-relief is much more punitive being much more severe on a per acre basis. 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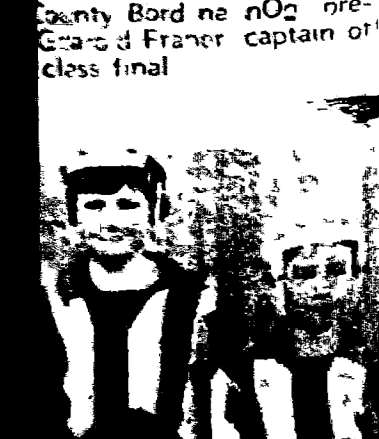

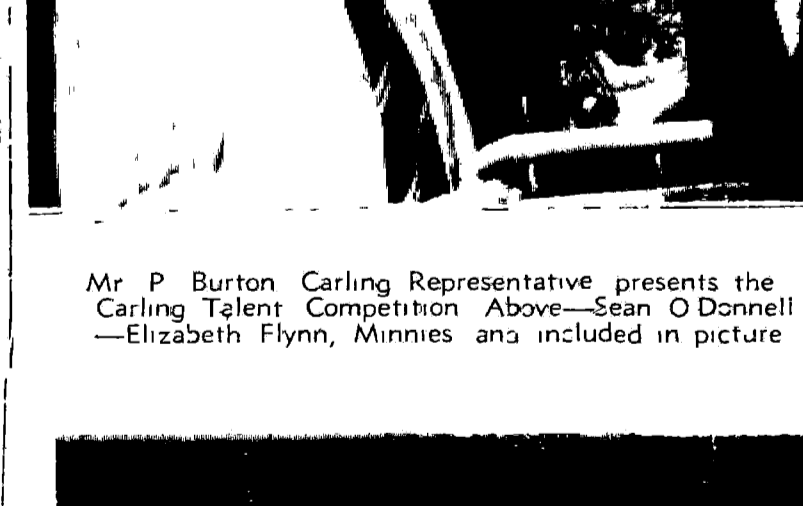
