Ballyduff's Title Hopes "Killed" In Second Half

Ballyduff's hopes of a senior hurling championship title were killed off with clinical precision by an avalanche of second half Portlaoise goals in a poor first round game at Dungarvan's Fraher Field on Sunday night last.

Martin Hickey, with the precision of a neuro surgeon split the harassed Ballyduff defence on three occasions and further goals from Eddie Rockett, Mossie Walsh and Jackie Whelan added the hammer blows which turned Ballyduff into a literally demoralised side as they wilted and then died with little or no resistance.

So much was expected of Ballyduff this year that the manner of their championship demise must be a bitter disappointment to their followers. Certainly there was no indication in the first half of the eventual second half rout. Both sides looked evenly matched in the opening 30 minutes and possession was evenly distributed.

The sides were level on two occasions and there was never more than a three minute difference with Portlaoise holding a two point lead (0-7 to 0-5) at the interval. Perhaps Ballyduff's greatest cause for alarm in the first half was the failure of the inside forwards to make any impression whatsoever on the Portlaoise defence.

The half forward line too were finding the going tough against the Portlaoise half line of Noel Sullivan and Michael Kearney which was the level for the third time in the game.

But then came the first of the Portlaoise goals as Eddie Rockett now operating at centre forward ward ran into the 60 metre line to slam home a great shot to the Ballyduff net.

Galvin (65) and Billy Keely added Portlaoise points before Martin Hickey burst through on the right wing and his blistering shot was deflected to the Ballyduff net to give Portlaoise a 2-9 to 0-7 lead.

These scores heralded the beginning of the end for Ballyduff who lost Mossie Walsh a few minutes later.

The sides swapped points but an air of dejection crept into the Ballyduff play following Portlaoise's third goal in the 48th minute. This came direct from a 60 metre free from Mossie Whelan and it really knocked the Ballyduff men off their feet.

Within three minutes Jackie Whelan added another Portlaoise goal and even at this stage the crowd were beginning to make for the exits as the Portlaoise men led 4-10 to 0-8.

The sides again swapped points before Martin Hickey burst on the scene again to crash home a great goal and he finished Portlaoise's tally with a kicked goal after Billy Keely pointed to complete the rout.

Noel Sullivan kept his goal intact for the winners, while John Galvin Paul Kelly Tom Hanlon and Peter Whelan were all outstanding in defence.

Mossie Whelan and Jim Hennebery were well nigh unbeatable in the centre of the field in the second half while all of the forwards were impressive when they got possession, again in the second half.

Last season His Majesty suggested that anglers could save expenses travelling if they arranged to use one car for say every four anglers and divide up the costs, and this would be a great saving during the summer. Just think it over and make the necessary contacts and it could be arranged.

C.C.E. Summer Entertainment Programme

The 1980 summer entertainment programme of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann was officially launched by the Minister for the Gaeltacht, Mrs. Maire Geoghegan-Quinn, TD at Culturlann na hÉireann Dublin on Tuesday June 24th. A special booklet "Ireland in Musical Mood" has been published to mark the occasion.

Sesiun which got under way nine years ago started off with six venues. Sesiun gives the participants an opportunity of displaying their talents in their own native environment. Sesiun also enables young and old to participate in the show and helps their learn stage craft. A very important aspect of our music and culture is to promote local traditions of the various areas. It also gives a great awareness to the local people.

OVER 50 FLEADHANNA
Each year there are over 50 Fleadhanna organised by Comhaltas which also includes Fleadh Nua and Fleadh Amhran agus Rinne. This year will include a new Fleadh, namely Fleadh na nGael in which particular emphasis will be placed on the Irish language. With over 400 branches and a membership of 25,000 Comhaltas is strongly rooted amongst the public. Not alone has Comhaltas introduced a revolution in traditional Irish music it is a community movement which encourages and creates healthy activity in the family unit.

One of the most outstanding results for Comhaltas is the fact of having 60 branches in Ulster. This encourages the people to come together irrespective of political or religious situations.

Vocational Education Facilities Sought For Lismore
The Department of Education has been accused of going back on an assurance given to the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee following the closure of the only two vocational schools in West Waterford at Tallow and Cappoquin.

Mr James Aidan Walsh told the June meeting of the VEC in Dungarvan that following the closure of the only two vocational schools in West Waterford region had been left without vocational education of any kind. He said that the Department of Education is concerned that it has completely forgotten about the closure of the Cappoquin and Tallow schools.

Mr Walsh went on to say that Lismore is a town that is ready and willing to provide the educational subjects if the Department sanction was forthcoming and they as a committee should press as hard as they could to have them sanctioned. At present students from the region wanting to avail of vocational education subjects had to travel to schools in Fermoy, Youghal Mitchelstown and Dungarvan.

Other members also accused the Department of going back on a promise given to West Waterford. It was unanimously decided to seek an immediate meeting with the Minister for Education to stress the urgency of the situation. The committee will also press for the support of the constituency Dail Deputies to try and secure that early meetings with the Minister.

Mr Walsh said the issue was very likely to become a very hot point in the Dail as he is certain the Minister would not refuse to receive a deputation.

E.E.C. Aid For
Gaeltacht

Mr Tom O'Donnell TD, MEP,
former Minister for the Gaeltacht
has taken up the cudgel in the
Commission of the European
Communities in the name of the
Gaeltacht
Mr O'Donnell has in Stras-
bourg tabled an important Parliam-
entary Question to the
Commission of the European
Communities The question is
expected to come up at next
month's session of the Parliam-
ent

THE QUESTION
is the Commission aware of
the special cultural significance
of the Gaeltacht regions of Ire-
land and of the serious econo-
mic and social disadvantages
these regions suffer and if so
whether the Commission would
be willing to co-operate with
and assist the newly established
Gaeltacht Development Board
in formulating and implement-
ing a comprehensive develop-
ment programme for the Gaeltacht
In a special statement issued
in Strasbourg Tom O'Donnell
said —
The Gaeltacht is the source
and fountain of the language
and culture of Ireland and the
people living in the Gaeltacht
are amongst the disadvantaged
communities in the EEC
The Gaeltacht has suffered
enormous emigration and
depopulation The future viabil-
ities of Gaeltacht communities
can be assured only through the
formulation and implementation
of a comprehensive integrated
and properly coordinated devel-
opment programme extending
over a period of years possibly
two periods of five years each
Now presents itself to initiate a
new dynamic development pro-
gramme for the Gaeltacht This
opportunity arises because of
two significant reasons
The first is the establishment
of Udaras and the second is the
recent decision of the EEC to
endorse the concept of regional
development programmes In fact a number
of such programmes have already
been approved by the EEC for
a number of regions in Ireland
to exemplify the Western Isles of
Scotland

The Gaeltacht forms an ideal
region for the application of the
principle of integrated regional
development programmes now
finding favour with the EEC
Udaras should now formulate
a five year plan covering the
economic social and cultural
development of the Gaeltacht
This plan must be
comprehensive and should em-
brace all aspects of development
such as agriculture industry
craftwork tourism fisheries
natural resources infrastructure
transport, communications
education and training culture
and language The plan should
also include the cultural and
Irish Government and the
EEC on a £1 per £1 question
I am hopeful that my basis-
ing a favourable cultural and

the Irish Government and U-
daras will lose no time in imple-
menting the plan suggested

The Gaeltacht is Ireland's
most precious heritage A herit-
