THE CALM AFTER THE STORM

It all took only a few minutes at the meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday. There was no discussion and no raised voices as the newly co-opted member, Mr Tom Cunningham Stradbally, took his seat as a Councillor having been declared unanimously a member of the Council by the Chairman, Deputy Austin Deasy.

It was truly the calm after the storms of the previous weeks in which the Fianna Fail organisation in the county was almost split asunder by dissent in reaching a decision as to who should fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Minister of State Jackie Fahey who had been a member of the Council for the past 30 years.

As the vacancy occurred in the Fianna Fail membership of the Council it was in accordance with the political agreement publicly announced at the first meeting of the newly-elected Council following last year's Local Elections, left to the Fianna Fail Party to nominate their candidate to fill it and as the vacancy occurred in the Kilmacthomas Electoral Area which embraces the area from Clonmel to Portlaur and back to the outskirts of Dungarvan in the Ballinroad and Ballinacourty districts it was to be a person from within that area.

From the outset once it became apparent that a vacancy would arise following the appointment of Deputy Fahey to a junior Ministry, it was assumed that, in accordance with the traditional custom, the next following defeated Party candidate for the area in the previous election would be selected and the man in that position was the Stradbally footballer Tom Cunningham who was narrowly edged out of the last seat by his own party colleague and standing Councillor, Portlaur man Michael Henebery in the 79 elections.

However the position changed as the weeks passed and shortly before the selection convention was held in Kilmacthomas on June 30, a new face in the person of the Minister's 25-year-old son Sean entered the fray backed by an extensive canvass. He won the voting contest at the Convention but the announcement of the result created bedlam and the meeting ended in a walk-out. The meeting of the Comhairle Dail Ceannair held in Dungarvan the following Thursday night to ratify the nomination of Mr Fahey (Junr) again broke up in disorder and a further meeting of the CDC which incidentally was that body's annual meeting and at which Mr Sean Whelan, Kilcooney Ballinacourty was re-elected Chairman once again failed to reach a ratification decision although the members sat behind closed doors until well after midnight.

throughout a breeze but it was evident that despite the surface calm there still exists a deep turbulence within the Fianna Fail party which will take a considerable time before it finally subsides and is forgotten.

WHAT AN OLYMPIC TEAM!

The 1980 Olympic Games commence in Moscow next Saturday but due to the boycott mounted by the US and many other countries because of the Russian invasion of Afghanistan, the absence of many of the world's leading athletes will detract from much of the appeal which previous Olympics had. The athletes of many of the other countries which called for a widening of the boycott have notwithstanding gone to Moscow to compete but some of these in deference to the wishes of their home governments will curtail their participation in the traditional opening ceremonies which have been such a colourful part of all previous gatherings. Ireland is one of the latter countries whose athletes have gone to the Russian capital without the whole-hearted blessing of the government.

But while the 1980 Olympics may not be the best ever, they will attract a great deal of attention and Irish interest will mainly be centred in the fortunes of Eamon Coghlan and our own John Treacy. Despite our own backing for the boycott, we wish them well and hope both will prove winners.

RTE will provide exhaustive coverage of the Games on both channels and last Saturday a 24-man team from the RTE Sports Department left Dublin for Moscow on a project which will cost an estimated £200,000. While there is bound to be a great deal of interest in certain aspects of the Olympics, I have doubts that there is any need for the comprehensive coverage that RTE has planned nor indeed for the expenditure of such a huge sum of money to travel and maintain such a big squad for the period of the games in the Russian capital. We must have a bigger team of commentators than competitors at the Games so it is hardly any wonder that RTE in all probability will soon be making noises to have the licence fees jacked up again to pay the expenses of these travelling commentators.

It seems to be a general failing in this country for far away places to look more inviting as, just like the members of Local Authorities and those foreign conferences, we always seem to go overboard where these trips abroad are concerned.

Certainly the Olympic Games are a great spectacle and are well worth watching in part but surely they could have been adequately covered by a lesser number than the big squad dispatched "for the duration" by RTE.

County Council Vacancy Filled Without Contest

The filling of the vacancy on the County Council and the County Committee of Agriculture created by the recent resignation of Minister of State Mr Jackie Fahey due to pressure of his Ministerial duties passed off without a hitch at the monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

The stormy build-up to the co-option resulting from a bitter internal battle within the Fianna Fail party for the nomination in which the 34-year old Stradbally footballer Tom Cunningham and the Minister's 25-year old son Sean Fahey were the central figures fizzled out following the eleventh hour withdrawal from the contest by Mr Fahey.

Mr Fahey won the nomination by 24-25 majority at a meeting of the Kilmacthomas Fianna Fail Comhairle Ceannair which broke up in disorder following a walk-out by a number of delegates. Two subsequent meetings of the Party's Comhairle Dail Ceannair held in Dungarvan the second one on last Friday night at which the nomination was to be ratified also broke up without reaching a decision.

The matter was then referred to the Officer Board of the Party's National Executive in Dublin which in turn referred the matter back to the ten sitting Fianna Fail members of the County Council to decide the issue but just before they were due to meet the statement from Mr Fahey came last Saturday afternoon stating that he had decided to withdraw his name from the contest.

CALL FOR FULL INVESTIGATION
Mr Fahey stated that he had come to this decision "in the interests of Fianna Fail and party unity. Stressing the fact that the decision to seek the chairmanship of the County Council alone Mr Fahey's statement went on:

I was properly selected at the Convention by a decisive vote and I am sure that the decision has only highlighted the serious divisions within the party in the constituency and so in the interest of Fianna Fail and party unity I am now withdrawing my name from the contest.

Mr Fahey's statement went on to call for a full investigation into the whole party organisation in the Waterford constituency down to Cumann level.

He has only his Ministerial post but politics in general. However following his sons withdrawal and after being prevailed on by close friends he decided to continue as Minister of State.

Mr Fahey also stated that the Taoiseach Mr Haughey would visit the Constituency towards the end of August to appraise the entire workings of the Fianna Fail organisation and to try to resolve the many serious problems which have manifested themselves repeatedly in recent years.

NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR BITTERNESS
In a statement issued to the Press after Monday's County Council meeting the newly elected member Cllr Tom Cunningham said that he was glad that the entire needless episode was all over.

Mr Cunningham honestly believe he went on to say that no one had a greater entitlement to this County Council seat than I having faced the electoral last year and so I don't feel in any way responsible for the bitter exchanges of the past fortnight which have so badly tarnished the Fianna Fail image in the constituency. I deliberately refrained from making any comments throughout it all and I took this particular stand in the best interests of Fianna Fail.

Cllr Cunningham then said "had Sean Fahey taken the decision at the Kilmacthomas Convention which he took at the eleventh hour last Saturday the Party would have avoided all the bitterness of the last two weeks and the consequent bad publicity. It is his statement that I deplore."

Mr Cunningham who was present at the meeting then took his seat as a Councillor and was welcomed on behalf of the Fine Gael Party by Cllr Coffey who said that Fine Gael were happy to stand by the agreement made at the first meeting of the present Council last year.

When Mr Cunningham thanked the Council for co-opting him unanimously and the Fianna Fail Party for nominating him to fill the vacancy Deputy Ede Collins quipped "which one?"

MINISTER'S DINNER

After the meeting the Minister of State Mr Fahey was most to a number of members of the Press at a dinner given by him at the Ormonde Hotel Dungarvan in appreciation of the Press coverage afforded him during his thirty year period as a member of the Council.

The Minister availed of the occasion to state that during the height of the bitterness he had at one stage taken a decision to quit not only his Ministerial post but politics in general. However following his sons withdrawal and after being prevailed on by close friends he decided to continue as Minister of State.

Mr Fahey also stated that the Taoiseach Mr Haughey would visit the Constituency towards the end of August to appraise the entire workings of the Fianna Fail organisation and to try to resolve the many serious problems which have manifested themselves repeatedly in recent years.

WITCH HUNT

Conference the Minister requests that there should be no representation on behalf of local authorities at the conference this year. He considers that any local authority who may already have made nominations for attendance at the conference should now rescind their decision in the public interest."

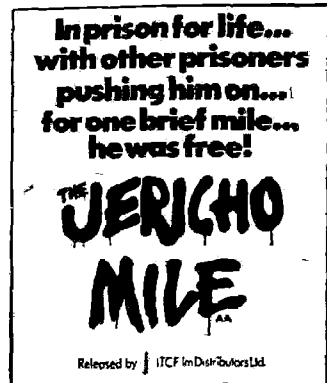

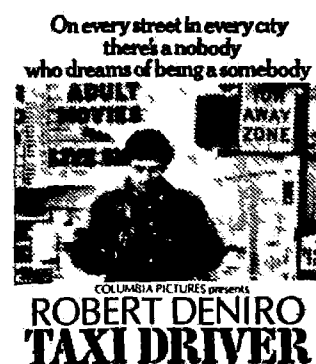

IN-LAWS DISPUTE

Ardmore Cottage Sale

A County Council cottage and acre of land now valued at £14,000 was the subject matter of a circuit court action before Judge D P Sheridan in Dungarvan when a furniture-maker sought specific performance by his sister-in-law of a verbal agreement in which he claimed the cottage and land had been sold to him for an agreed sum of £1,500.

Plaintiff in the action was Michael Dunne College Road, Ardmore and he brought the action for specific performance of the alleged agreement against Mrs Catherine Grant 65 Merrick Avenue Luton Bedfordshire.

Mr Dunne in evidence said the cottage and land now in dispute were sited at Ardo Ardmore and he agreed to purchase it and the acre from her for a sum of £1,500 and in addition he was to pay off the mortgages on it (about £500) to Waterford County Council.

As a result of the verbal agreement witness said he purchased building materials to carry out renovation works to the cottage and also made a number of other items himself.

However in August 1979 he received a letter from the defendant's solicitor directing him to remove all the materials as the cottage was now up for sale.

Mr John Gordon B.L. (instructed by J P Gordon and Co Solrs) for the defendant put it to the witness that the whole thing blew up last year when Mrs Grant returned from England, had the property valued by an auctioneer and a value of £14,000 was placed on the cottage and land.

The plaintiff's wife Mrs M Dunne also gave evidence in support of her husband's claim that a verbal agreement for the sale of the property for £1,500 had been entered into with the defendant.

Witness said it was only in August 1979 that she found out that Mrs Grant had offered the house for sale to another person and witness accused the defendant of going back on her word.

That same evening Mrs Grant offered the house and land to me for £14,000 she said.

Witness in cross examination agreed that in January 1979 she had written to the defendant telling her that the cottage was in bad structural state and that unless something was done to it soon it would fall down.

INCREDIBLE

At this stage Judge Sheridan said he must hold against the plaintiff. If a contract for the purchase of the house by Mr Dunne had been made in 1977 and the plaintiff believed he now was the owner he found it inconceivable that plaintiff would stand aside and let the cottage go to rack and ruin.

Judge Sheridan said he found that the plaintiff's actions were consistent with nothing more than a vague type of understanding between himself and the defendant and he was not entitled to succeed in his action. He refused the defence application for the costs of the case.

Prosecutor Edward Ryan B.L. (instructed by P J Lavan & Co Solrs) was for the plaintiff.

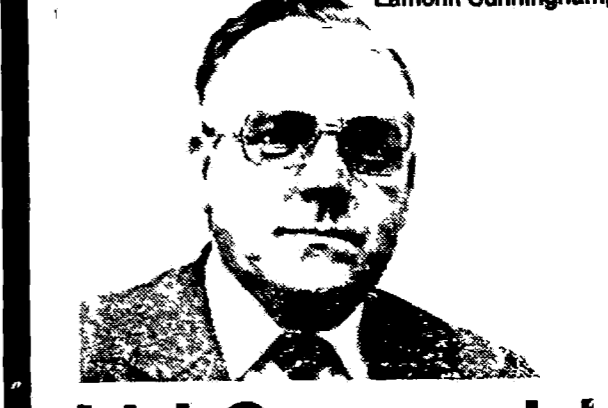
