A feature of the competition was the excellent manner in which County Council property was presented. The manner in which shops and private houses were presented was a credit to the owners.

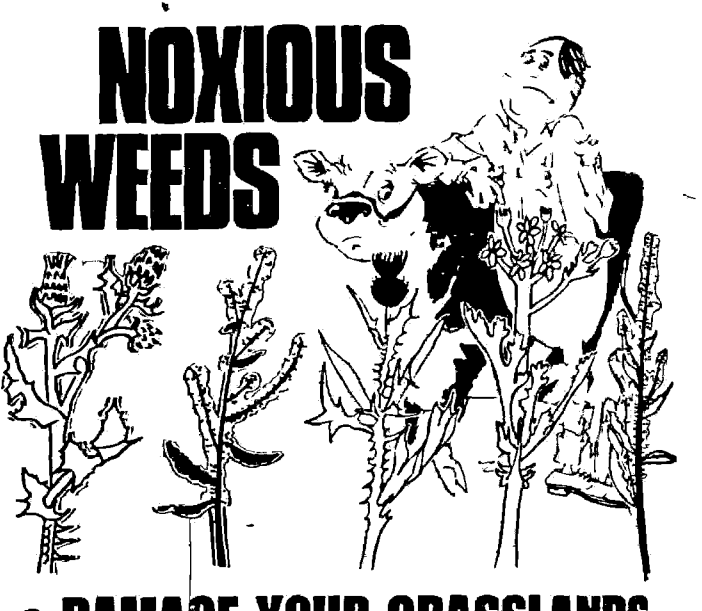
In Clashmore Village the central feature is the river.

RECOGNISE RESPONSIBILITY TO AGRICULTURAL SECTOR

"The Government must recognise its responsibility to the agricultural sector by taking immediate action to halt the decline in farm incomes"

This was stated by Mr Donal Cashman IFA President, last week He was commenting on the publication of the Central Statistics Office figures on agricultural output and incomes for 1979, which showed a drop in farm incomes in money terms in 1979 of 11.7%

Mr Cashman stated that the true income position of farmers in 1979 was even worse than the C.S.O.'s figures have indicated because the C.S.O. did not take account of interest on farm borrowing in their calculation of farm incomes

If the higher interest payments by farmers in 1979 had been taken into account the reduction in farm incomes in money terms would have been about 23% which means that farmers real living standards fell by almost one-third (32%) in that year

Mr Cashman continued "The factors responsible for the drop in farm income last year are still in operation in 1980. Current trends indicate that farm incomes in 1980 will be close to their 1979 level which would mean a further drop in real incomes by about 20% this year

While all farmers are suffering because of the decline in farm incomes in the past two years Government action must be directed towards those farmers who are hardest hit at the present time I wish to bring the Government's attention to three groups of farmers who are most severely affected by the present recession in agriculture

These are firstly those farmers on smallholdings particularly in the Western part of the country who had already inadequate incomes even in the relatively good year of 1978 as was shown by the Farm Management Survey

secondly those farmers who invested in land improvement and farm buildings and additional livestock since the beginning of 1977 largely using borrowed capital and who are now in serious financial difficulties

and thirdly those farmers who had their rates bill more than doubled this year because of the removal of the agricultural grant from farmers between £40 and £60 P.L.V.

I am now proposing that the Government should implement the following measures to alleviate the problems on these farms - The Government should pay the maximum level of headage payments (compensatory allowances) provided for in the Disadvantaged Areas

EXCESSIVE DELAYS IN PAYMENT OF GRANTS

The excessive long delays in the payment of grants by the Government on the foot of development work done by farmers is causing unnecessary hardship

Development Planning Of New £15m. Ardkeen Hospital In Balance

Uncertainty continues to surround the fourth stage in the development planning for the new £15 million hospital at Ardkeen Waterford with the news that the Minister for Health has deferred a decision on the matter for another two months.

A decision has already been deferred for six months until July 1 and it seems unlikely now that planning will be given the go-ahead before the end of the year. Mr P. Ward, M.P. Hospital Care told this month's meeting of the Health Board that at a meeting with the Minister last month CBOs were told that no additional supplementary funds would be made available other than those necessary to meet cost rises.

The South Eastern Health Board has decided to invite the Minister to visit the region and meet a deputation to discuss the implications of the planning delays.

Dr Hugh O'Brien Moran warned that the Board would suffer through this postponement in the planning of the regions most important building. He felt that the Board had been badly treated by the Department of Health and that the Board should press for a change of heart on the ministerial level.

Dr Donal Ormonde is the only doctor in the deputation to meet the Minister if he visits the region.

Labour for the farm is usually provided by the family and a valuable capital must be allocated between farm and household needs'. The journal includes a wide variety of articles on various aspects of such subjects as Consumer Affairs Home Management Energy Farm Family Farm Dwelling and Farm women. In addition Maura Fennelly writes about The Munster Institute and Kathleen Delap on the topic of Home Management. The Editor, Mr Tom Walsh Director ACOT describes the Farm Home Yearbook as a Key Service and Dr Harry Spam for Deputy Secretary of the Department of Agriculture recalls The Early Years. Speaking at the reception Dr Walsh highlighted the complex role of the housewife in modern farming. Nowadays indeed she has in many instances to become something of an accountant if the various farm records taxation demands are to be kept in order. Charges such as the involvement of farm women in cooperative development and health and welfare care. The achievement of these changes requires appropriate education and services. He was first elected a Fine Gael member of the Council in 1980 when he followed the tradition of public service in the Heskin family which had been carried on by his late brother Denis who was also a member of the Co Council and who represented the Waterford Constituency in the Dail for a number of years. He remained a member of the Council until 1974 when he did not go forward for re-election.

For many years also the late George Heskin was a leading member of the Beetgrowers' Association in which his organisational abilities were well-known. His wit and jollity in all the circumstances he moved, made him a unique and popular figure and his passing is now much regretted by all. He died as he had lived, having returned home from a funeral on Monday night but was taken suddenly ill and despite medical attention and spiritual aid he died on Tuesday morning.

There was an immense cortege at the funeral of his remains to St. Macdara's Church, Ballyduff on Wednesday evening representative of all sections of the community and including members and senior officials of Waterford County Gaelic Athletic Centre. Requiem Mass was offered on Thursday morning following which the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery.

The chief mourners included Mrs. Jeannette Heskin (wife), Teresa Anthony (sister), Sister of Charity, Dublin, Mrs. T. R. Strutt, Ballyduff Mrs. C. R. Strutt, England (sisters), daughters and grandchildren nephews, nieces, relatives, etc., etc.
