I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

Over the last number of weeks there has been quite a lot of controversy over the prices of feed barley. It is the function of the Grain Committee to ensure that the grain growers receive the market price for their crop and we will continue to vigorously pursue this objective.

When negotiations broke down between IGAMA and I.F.A. they published a basic price of £90 per tonne at 20% moisture. This has resulted in compound prices offering artificially low prices for dry grain.

The present difference on price was not due to the unwillingness of the Grain Committee to sit down to negotiate but due to the refusal of IGAMA to be reasonable and realistic in fact.

What will happen if feed barley is bought at prices between £83-£86 per tonne? Prices at this level will allow merchants to export freely to Northern Ireland.

Let us examine the 'on account price' offered by two major Co-operatives where they offer £83 per tonne and use a differential of £21 for the cost of drying and weight loss.

The Grain Committee are still confident that a price of £90 is still justified and will continue their campaign in order to achieve this price.

CABLE TV IN DUNGARVAN

Dear Sir
I refer to recent widespread publicity in the Dungarvan and Clonmel areas concerning the appeal by An Taisce and mountaineering groups against the granting of retrospective permission by Waterford County Council to Casey TV Rentals to retain an unauthorised television reception structure on the summit of Seefin Mountain in the Comeragh/Monavullagh range together with an access road to the site.

An Taisce notes in particular the recent vote by Dungarvan Urban District Council supporting the development of communications of public representatives and newspaper columnists e.g. these people (i.e. An Taisce and friends) should be told to stay out of the affairs of the town (Dungarvan) and appellants in this case are An Taisce and I can tell the people who are involved with that particular body that they'll bring the wrath of the people of Dungarvan down on their heads by their action they hold up the Casey TV Ltd plans.

Naturally we in An Taisce are extremely sorry that you people are displeased with our stand on this matter and even sornier that they do not understand it. We would very much like to see the people of Dungarvan getting improved television reception—but not at any price and in our view the price to be paid in this instance namely the insensitive gouging of a track across the exposed side and up to the summit of a 2,400 ft high mountain and the erection on the skyline of an ugly blockhouse is out of all proportion to the benefit.

We can only surmise that in this instance Waterford County Council faced with what they regarded as a fait accompli opted for a quiet life in legitimising this appalling development. Their apparent failure to notice that anything was happening on Seefin Mountain added to their subsequent suggestions that the development was barely perceptible must constitute the most striking example of bureaucratic blindness in the history of physical planning in Ireland.

There are obviously not many votes to be gained in the mountains otherwise some elected representatives might possibly have spoken out against this intrusion into one of Ireland's prime landscapes of outstanding natural beauty (see the last column in the Dungarvan Leader). In the understandable absence of support from that quarter An Taisce and the Federation of Mountaineering Clubs of Ireland must run the risk of being branded as 'snatchers' by being prepared to speak on behalf of this threatened national resource (and we are sure that the people of Dungarvan will not dispute that the Comeragh/Monavullagh are a national amenity as well as a local one).

We must stress that the present situation is not of our creation. We are merely responding as any conservationists worth their salt would to an unauthorised action carried out without any evidence of concern for an environment of the highest quality. We would point out that if correct planning procedures had been followed in the first instance all concerned parties would have had an opportunity to comment in a rational and unprejudiced manner on the proposed development and the outcome might conceivably have been an agreed position whereby a television signal of satisfactory quality could have been provided without causing major environmental damage. Such an opportunity was never presented to us. We therefore make no apology for amplifying the democratic process of an Bord Pleanála hearing to express our legitimate dismay at such behaviour and its results.

In conclusion we invite concerned residents of Dungarvan and Clonmel to see this devel-

opment for themselves and to make up their own minds as to whether good reception might have been obtained at a lesser cost.

Macra Chief On Move Away From Full-time Farming

Mr Seamus Hayes National President of Macra Na Feirme in his address at the presentation of prizes to the winners of the Co. Waterford Macra Na Feirme Efficiency finals at Lawlors Hotel Dungarvan on Thursday July 31 said that the average size farm in the county today is 55 acres. It is therefore extremely worrying to see the distinct move away from full time farming on holdings of 50 acres and under. Only one third of all holdings under 50 acres (fifty) are farmed by full time farmers. Only one in every ten farms between 30 (thirty) and 50 (fifty) acres has an heir who will be a full-time farmer. Unless we immediately take positive action the structure of the farm industry as we know it will break up and the style of rural living will change dramatically. These changes are neither good nor inevitable. We must maintain the structure of family farming and must create conditions on holdings of 50 acres that will make farming a realistic and attractive proposition to the many young people who are now turning away from it. These people are seeking alternative employment in the industrial sector with the intention of leaving farms that could give a viable and rewarding profession, to be managed on a part-time basis. For many years Macra Na Feirme has sought direct aid for young farmers entering agriculture. There is now some recognition of the problems facing these young men and women. The principle of preferential interest rates on borrowed money for young farmers has been introduced but it is also necessary that other equally important steps be taken. The farm retirement scheme needs to be completely overhauled. A realistic pension that offers 50% (fifty per cent) more than the old age pension should be offered to retiring farmers. The pension should also be linked to inflation and social welfare benefits that are given to the people on the Old Age Pension. Farm partnership will have to be encouraged and the pilot farm Partnership Advisory Service set up by Macra will have to be expanded. The inhibiting legislation affecting partnerships will have to be changed to encourage rather than discourage partnerships. Investment in agriculture by large businesses will have to be encouraged. Large insurance companies and banks should invest some of their profits in developing agriculture in the same way that they invest in property blocks inside and outside the county. An ideal way to do this would be to invest in a system of leasing of livestock. For example French young farmers can lease all their cows from a leasing company and borrow money for capital developments at four per cent per year. Schemes like this would ensure that young farmers could and would return to farming as a full time occupation.

REVITALISED ADVISORY SERVICE
The arrival of ACOT will mean a revitalised Agricultural Advice and Education programme and if we can match this effort with the implementation of other schemes that I have mentioned, the response from the 2,400 young people entering agriculture each year will be very positive and the benefits will be felt in every area.

All members past and present men and women are welcome to attend. Auditions will take place next week for specific parts in the show. Practice parts have been selected for anyone who wants to audition. More about that next Monday night. After the success of our last show we are hoping for a big turnout of members this year.

Then Hackett had a brain wave. He said sharply 'twist him round and he'll back out himself'. Paddy's wife was waiting outside. They proceeded to go home bye-linked. Although abusing him, to the onlooker they would appear to be walking very affectionately. At the head of the northern side would ladder him home the rest of the way.

A hiker entered owing to the rain, looking as forlorn as a March graveyard. What have you in the knapsack I asked to make conversation. A little fellow took Moll's bag! After a bit he sat down to the piano, and after some slow phrases 'erupted into Tom Moore's 'On Breac na Noie Naimhe'. It was the death of Robert Emmet Moore's family, on the father's side sprang from Kerry. His mother came from Westford. He wrote thus about Emmet: 'He was a noble fellow. He used frequently sit by me at the piano, while I played over the airs from Bunting's Irish collection. I remember one day when we were thus employed him standing up from a reverie, while I was playing the spirited air 'Let Erin Remember The Days Of Old', and exclaiming passionately 'Oh, that were at the head of 20,000 men marching to that air, and I tell you, the tyrants would shake!' Had Moore remained in Dublin he would have gone as far as Emmet in devotion to his country and he would probably have shared the fate that befell most of the United Irishmen. T. D. Sullivan paid him an apt tribute: 'His thoughts were, perhaps not as deep as a well. Nor rose they as high as a steepie. But his songs will abide where he wished them to dwell. In the homes and the hearts of the people.' There was a silence which Mickie Diver broke. It makes me think Waterford has a monument to dog, but meaning in memory of our great hero Thomas Francis Meagher. It's a livin' shame!
