## Last Bid To Save Cappelquin Factory

The 150 jobs threatened by the apparently imminent closure of the Cappelquin Bacon Factory may yet be saved. Behind the scenes activity is going on in an effort to save the factory which has been the very industrial life line of Cappelquin and Lismore for several years.

Throughout West Waterford opposition to the closure plans has steadily gained momentum over the past fortnight. Now the four Dail Deputies for the Waterford Constituency including Minister of State Mr Jackie Fahey, have joined in the last gasp bid to save the plant.

Already the four TDs Deputy Fahey, Billy Kennelly, Eddie Collins and Austin Deasy have had in-depth talks with the manager of the Cappelquin Bacon Company Mr John Murphy.

The meeting also attended by local members of Waterford County Council agreed that the four TDs would seek a meeting with the Minister for Agriculture Mr Ray McSharry to try and mount a rescue operation that would at least keep the factory open until a suitable alternative industry could be found to absorb the 165-strong workforce.

The Chairman of Waterford County Council and Fine Gael Telecommunications Spokesman Mr Austin Deasy has stated that if the Cappelquin Bacon Company goes ahead with its plans to phase out all production at the factory over the next month the consequences for the region will be catastrophic.

A local Town Committee has also been set up in Cappelquin to fight the company's closure plans.
