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Unless Bacon Factory Saved Cappelquin Will Be A Ghost Town

On the eve of Tuesday afternoon's crucial talks in Dublin involving the Minister for Agriculture Mr Ray McSharry in a last gasp effort to have the 165 jobs row under threat at the Cappelquin Bacon Company a member of the Waterford County Council warned that unless the factory is saved Cappelquin will be a ghost town at the end of the present decade. Proposing a notice of motion calling on the Council to support the efforts of everyone in Cappelquin to save the factory Mr J A Walsh told a monthly meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan that its closure would be disastrous not alone for the town of Cappelquin but for all of the West Waterford region. Cappelquin has been associated with the bacon industry for three quarters of a century and it was suddenly as many as 165 people find themselves facing redundancy. COUNCILLORS 'LAMBAST' GOVERNMENT'S DECISION ON AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEES

All shades of political opinion on Waterford County Council at Monday's meeting lambasted the Government's decision to replace some existing members of committees of agriculture with representatives of various voluntary rural organisations. It was a bureaucracy taking over from democracy said Cllr O'Riain (FF) who warned that within the next five years the role of local councillors would be a little need for them. Cllr O'Riain said his attitude on the decision to give certain organisations representations on the committee of agriculture after Cllr W McDonnell had proposed and Cllr J O'Brien seconded that the existing ten county councillors on the committee be renominated. Also before the meeting were the names of three of the six members of the rural organisations who will be represented on the new committee. They were Mr Thomas Murphy Crummaughan, Cappelquin (Irish Co-operative Organisation) Mr Gerry Harrington, Cappagh (ICMSA) and Mr Thomas Fahy Kilnarehan, Dungarvan (Co Waterford Sheepbreeders Association). Still to nominate their representatives on the committee are the IFA, the ICA and Macra na Feirme.

### TALLOW AND ROUNDABOUT NOTES

**Tidy Towns Competition 1980** — Maximum marks in brackets. Effort — Community involvement in improving the general appearance — Continued effort on the part of the community of Tallow is gradually achieving beneficial results in the improvement of the appearance of the town. Some individual business premises have tidied up their properties and the improvement is appreciable. However much more effort is required from private residents to raise the overall standards of residential properties. Some co-ordinated action in whitewashing and cleaning the offending properties would advance the town in the competition. Comments pertaining to the improvement of amenities and the tidying up of the approach roads in the town should also be carefully noted.

**Business, Appropriate Placing Of Litter Bins, Absence Of Litter, Derelict Sites, Buildings And Indiscriminate Dumping** — Litter was under control this year throughout the town although the appearance of incidental litter in overgrown verges must be noted as mentioned in last year's report.

This gives a poor impression of the town and should be tackled. Litter bins were adequate in number and were well positioned however if the sizes of these bins could be standardised, it would make them appear more consistent. The many derelict cottages and sheds throughout the town particularly on West Street need attention. The large masonry beside P. O'Flynn's needs attention.

The Maxol station is very untidy looking, the machine parts of vehicles which are parked in its forecourt should be screened from the road. The premises of the Irish Shell Company Ltd showed a remarkable improvement since last year. The parking area of the buildings and tanks have been painted. The storing of goods and crates outside shops should be avoided as it clutters footpaths and looks very untidy.

The telephone kiosks are other large forlorn and machines in the area by the bridge and West Street detracts from the town. Bill posting on telegraph poles and name signs throughout the town should be prohibited.

**Presentation Of Street Furniture, Etc** — The seat benches outside the Bride Valley Stores were excellently maintained having recently been painted. Other benches along the Main Street particularly outside St. Patrick's Hall and the benches on the Lismore road leading down to the bridge had been repaired but they waited painting. The telephone kiosks also needed painting. The litter bins were adequate in number and were well positioned outside business premises. The public toilets on the Midleton road need considerable brightening up. The pedestrian guard-rail along by the church needs painting. Name-signs were in good condition throughout.

**Marks (15) 11**  
**Present On And Appearance Of Residential Areas, Including Their Open Spaces** — The terraced cottages on the Lismore road are very appealing. They could be considerably improved if painted continuously as the maintenance of the cottages is at present quite sporadic. Terrace houses on West Street were spilt somewhat by derelict buildings and vacant overgrown plots along the street. Older houses in the town itself are being abandoned and falling into disrepair a trend which should be altered in future. The old almshouse on the Youghal Road looked very well apart from overgrown grounds. The two storey terraced houses leading down to the church were very attractive and as shown here the effort in the use of colour should be extended to all the housing in the town. The new housing estate past the church could be better maintained. The houses looked a little dreary and the common area as already mentioned needed vast improvement. Some very fine houses and gardens were seen on the outskirts of the town and are to be commended. Marks (15) 13.

**Appearance Of Approach Roads And Verges, Streets Back Lanes And Footpaths** — The main Lismore road is well maintained despite the overgrown verges which should be tidied. The bridge is nicely painted and looks effective. The secondary approach road from Rathbarney was spilt very much by overgrown verges. Derelict roads along this and other approach roads is quite serious and should be given immediate attention as was previously mentioned. The fine stone walls along this approach road should be cleared of weeds and repaired where they have fallen down, as they are essential to the character of the town. The Youghal road was well maintained although the verge outside the new factory on this road should be planted in the next year. Marks (20) 15.

**Presentation Of A Natural Amenity — Open Spaces, Parks, Green, River Banks, Fosses, Parks, Trees, Flower Beds, etc.** — The trees along the main street will when matured considerably enhance the character of the town. The little shrubs on the Youghal junction looked very effective and was well presented. The residual space by the Bride Valley Stores Ltd. is excellent and shows what can be done with these residual spaces with a little thought and care. The presentation and stream on West Street should be developed more. Stream banks should be tidied and some means of access to the stream from the road should be made. The stream particularly needs cleaning and the bridge itself could be painted.

The common area in front of the housing estate on the church road was sadly lacking in imagination. It could if properly maintained be very attractive. The grass should be cut for a start and perimeter trees planted around the green would turn it into an attractive amenity for the residents. Benches placed here would also be beneficial. Marks (25) 16.

**Presentation Of Buildings — Shop Premises and Business Premises, Factories, Historical and Public Buildings, etc.** — The business premises in the town there were some exceptionally fine examples including McCarthy's Ahernes and P. O'Flynn's premises. Kenry's Bar and Queens General are the standard of presentation of business premises is quite low and a lot of properties in the town needed painting among which were the butcher shop and the unnamed premises beside it. Walshes, Fitzgeralds Garage, The Corner House, J. Ryans Lunches and Con Murphy's.

Plastic signs are as yet not too prevalent in the town, but ever in improving properties commercial owners should attempt to integrate them with traditional shop front facades in the street. The use of artificial stone facades detract from other authentic masonry buildings in the town and the use of large plastic signs as on the Spar Foodstore is a disgrace.

**General Summing Up** — The premises of Brendan Taylor Motors Ltd will be improved when present concreting of the forecourt is completed. The development of the front wall of this area should also be considered. The area should be considered for planting along the perimeter wall would considerably enhance the street.

The entrance to Tallow Community Hall urgently needs repainting and attention as it is very untidy looking. The Parish Hall would be brightened up considerably if it were painted and the arched window on the front needs replacement. The Derelict Almshouse in the street (The Derelict Almshouse) presented and is an example of fine building preservation. The Rectory on West Street and Garda Barracks need attention. The Carnegie Library and its grounds were in good condition. The entrance has been painted and looks quite well. The grounds of the Church of Ireland were overgrown and they need considerable attention. The Catholic Church and the graveyard were well presented although the spiral of the church looked shabby with peeling paint and a monument opposite it looks extremely well.

'They have been erected against the wishes of the vast majority of the people and if this Council is to avoid further trouble and controversy then the remaining bollards should be removed forthwith' Cllr Carey said. He added that for 200 years people had a right of way to the strand but they could no longer use their cars to go there because of the bollards.

Cllr K. Bulbulia however explained that the Council had erected the bollards because of the way cars were speeding along the strand although they had been erected provided the rights of access to the beach were not interfered with.

Cllr Cahill claimed that before the bollards had been erected many motor cyclists had turned the beach into a speed track.

The Chairman Mr. A. Deasy T.D. warned that it was an issue on which feelings were now running very high and he believed the bollards should be removed.

Cllr Carey then proposed their removal. Cllr P. Cahill seconded and the members unanimously agreed.

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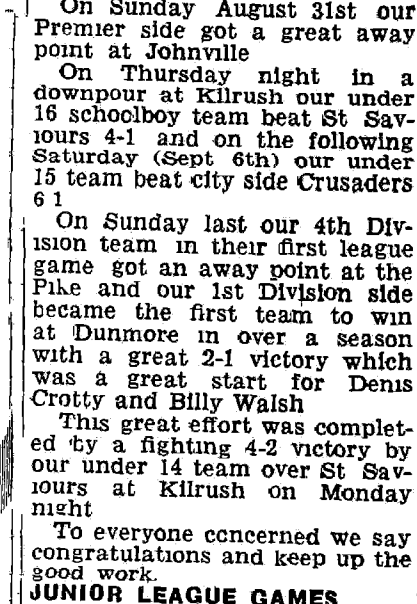

LIVESTOCK PROBLEMS DISCUSSED WITH MINISTER An assurance that the Government would do its best within the limits of Exchequer resources and the rules of the CAP to help livestock farmers who are experiencing a serious erosion of their incomes was given by the Minister for Agriculture Mr. Ray McSharry. The assurance was given by Mr. McSharry when he was an IFA delegation led by the President Mr. Donal Cashman and the Chairman of the National Livestock Committee Mr. Seymour Crawford.

Following the meeting IFA in a statement said The Minister was exhorted to reintroduce intervention buying for beef heifers at a price of 65p/lb carcass weight and the export beef factories should be allowed the options of selling carcasses half carcasses and whole carcasses in quarters of beef into intervention.

He was also asked to ensure that the same variable premium would be paid on exported Irish cattle and beef from North and South of the border with the southern exporters getting the same cost of transport allowance as their northern colleagues and that the Irish beef factories would not receive a lower variable premium on exported processed beef.

PROGRESSIVE FARMERS PLACED IN JEOPARDY

It is frightening that long-term credit commitments of some of our most progressive farmers over the past couple of years have now placed their viability in jeopardy. This was stated by Mr. Michael Slattery Chairman of South Tipperary Executive of the IFA last week. He said 'Most of the development plans for those farmers were carried out with the best advice available. Many small and medium-sized farmers embarking on developing their farms which involved borrowing £10,000 to £20,000 and often more.

Now that interest rates are in many cases 6 per cent higher than when the loans were taken at the rate of 4 per cent, interest has now to be found in order to service these loans. The Government has to finance to be made available to restructure existing loans for those farmers. The Government and the lending institutions must come to the rescue. Otherwise the production base of agriculture for expansion will be at risk.

Mr. Slattery went on to state that when the fodder scheme introduced by the Government was a sign of their awareness of the fodder crisis. While the fodder situation was critical and all possible action should be taken while growing conditions remain during September it was important for all to remember that farming is a financial crisis which cannot be blamed on the weather.

FARMERS FORCED TO PAY EXTRA TAXES, LEVIES, AS WELL AS CREDIT RATES FOR FARM RESECTION PERIOD

Mr. James Massey Chairman of the Co Mayo IFA Rates and Taxation Committee following a week of meetings in Co Mayo with regard to his Committee's campaign for the retention and restoration of the agricultural grant on rates said that all farmers in the county regardless of size of holding, were united in highlighting the county's exorbitant rates demanded for almost £18 in the pound PLV as compared with the national average of £12. He went on to say that farmers comprise the only section of the Community which has been forced to pay extra taxes and levies as well as rates from £20 PLV upwards at a time when their income compared to non-farm incomes is in the second worst position since 1953.

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REMINISCENCES

I had picked up a home made candle formed of tow dyed in tallow. We were on the pier looking at the headland known as Ballinacourty Point or Wyse's Point. This pier was finished in 1933 at a cost of £1,180 paid by the government and Sir Thomas Wyse Ballinacourty at that time had a limited number of fishing boats. Other boats used carry limestone along the coast. Ballinacourty stood out on a silver light reflected from the sea. It fishermen were said to see it quote 'the most persevering and industrious on the Waterford coast. They built a pier of loose stones knocked down by storm waves and rebuilt in a process of alternation which singularly showed their courage. Then Villiers Stuart proprietor of the pier assigned a large sum of money in building the present pier which despite all the money and labour proved to be an unsafe one.

We had cycled to The Stone Bridge, Muckie Diver, an ancient lagoon at the landside known as The Crompaun. I shouted at Timmy Pat who was crushing whins for cattle feeding on a whin-stone. He replied 'Muckie Diver why are you doing your yard when it is at home you should be working the farm?'

I have sub-let my land it would, indeed, be a poor farm that could not keep one man idle. A shrill whistle announced the entrance to the tunnel which may yet prove invaluable in a nuclear attack. # What it's all about - That Taisce Appeal

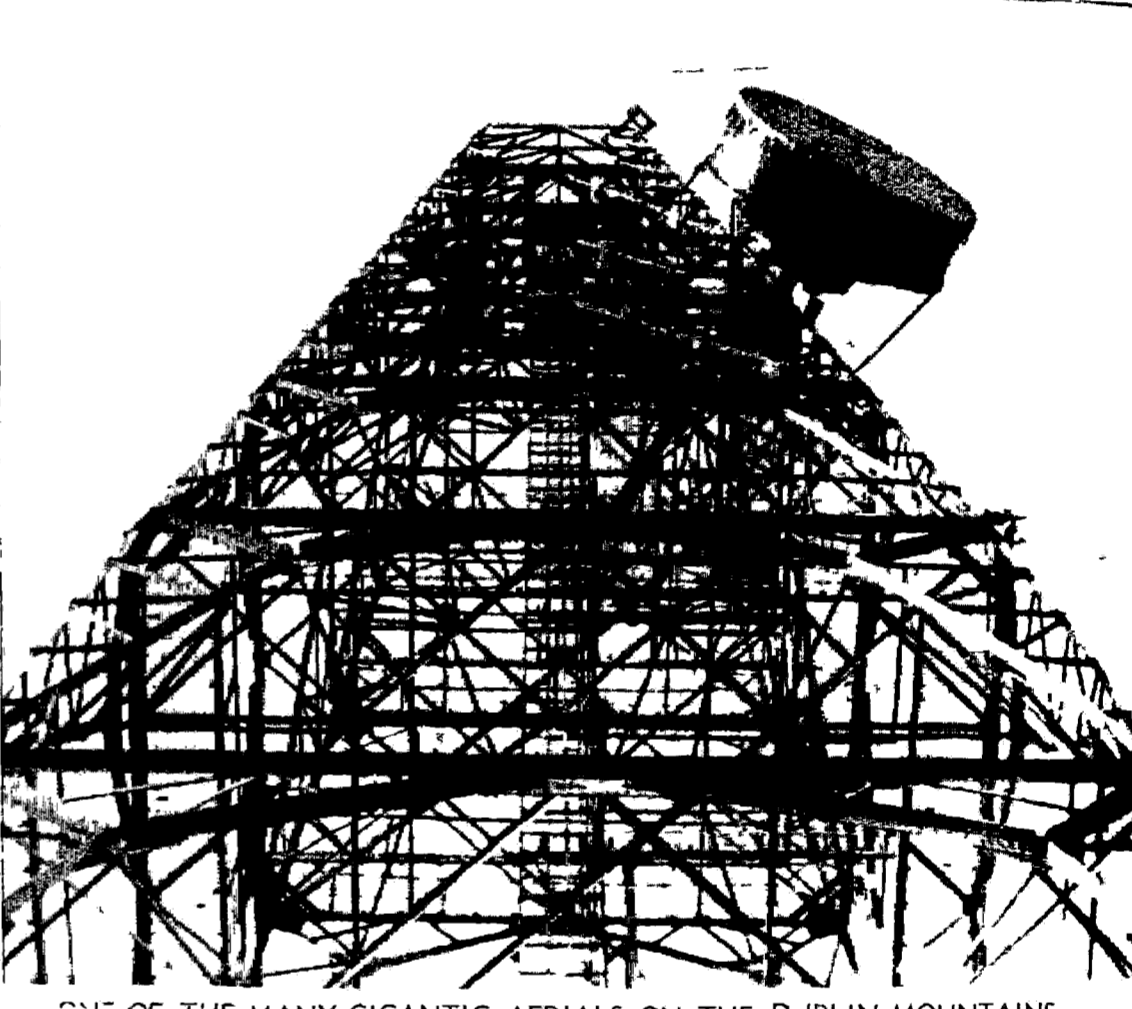


Casey T.V. Company's building on Seefin Mountain which houses the receiver and which requires no outside aerials with a 100 ft. tower.

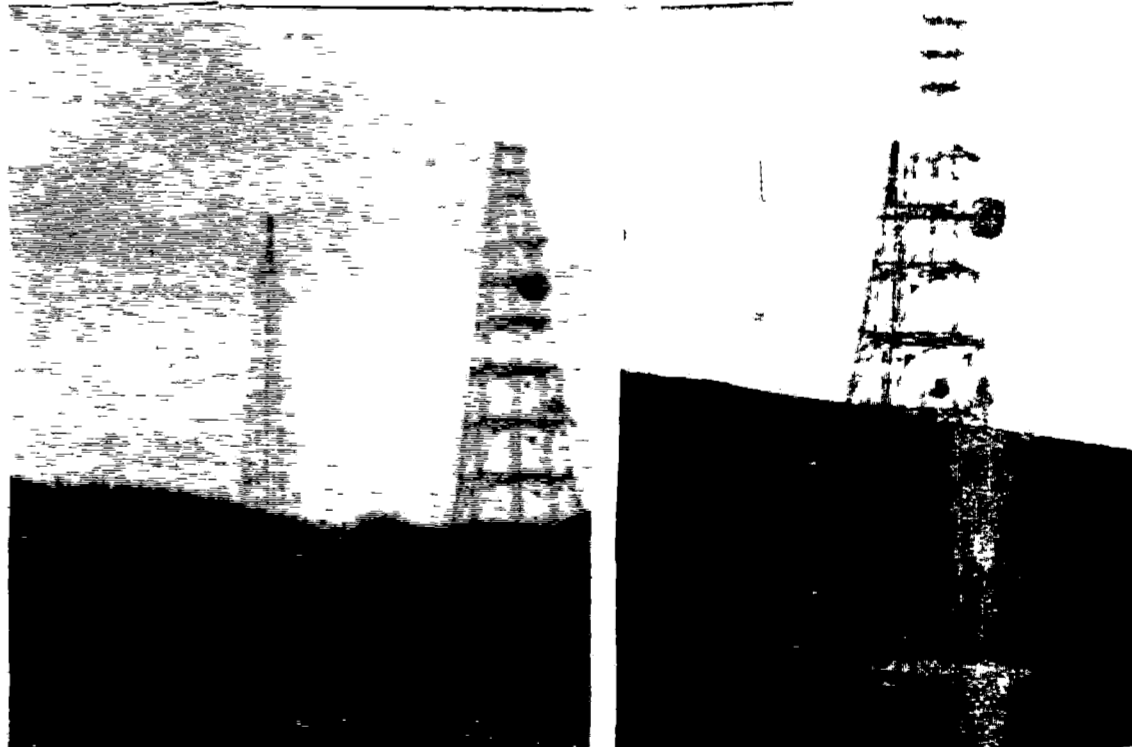

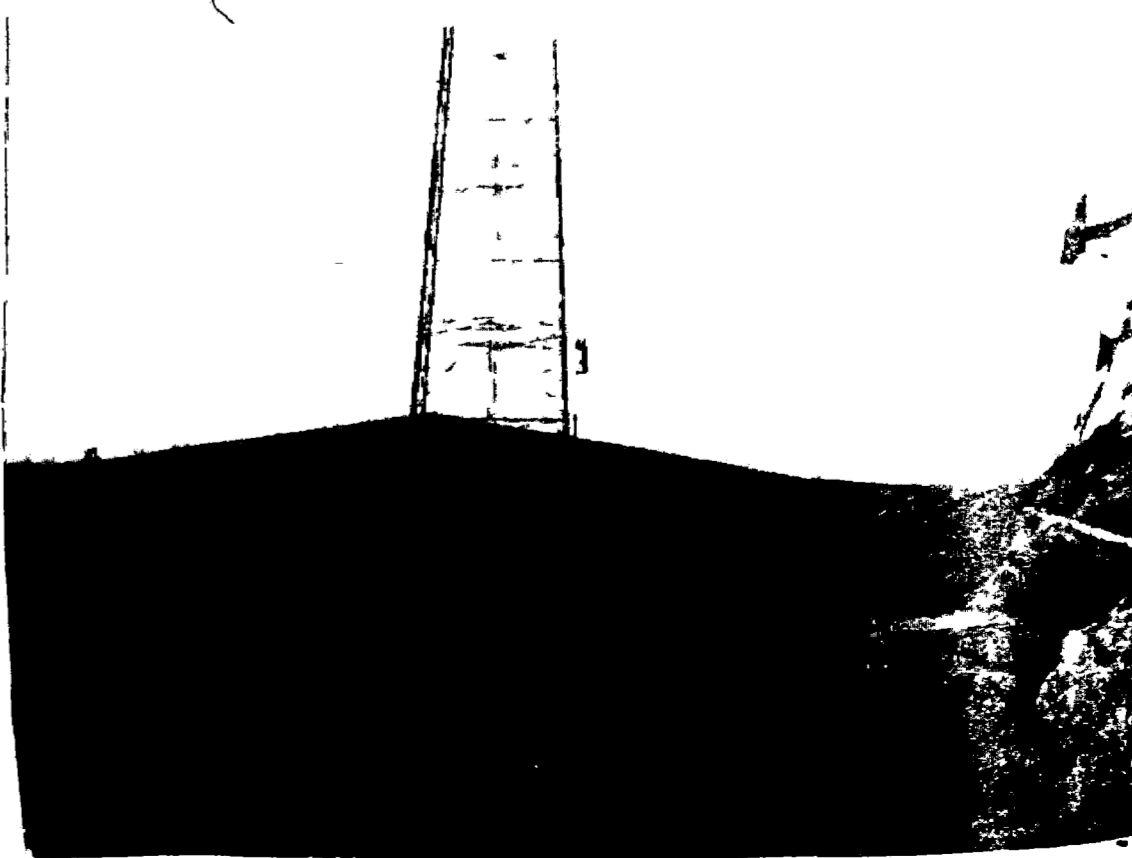
The hearing of the planning appeal, which is open to the public, takes place in the Courthouse, Dungarvan at 2.15 p.m. today Thursday September 11.
