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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

THE END OF THE ROAD

Information to hand this week is that efforts to rescue the Bacon Factory for Cappoquin have failed and all further hope of reactivating the industry which has provided the backbone of the prosperity of the Cornerstone since it was established in 1908 has vanished.

The closure of the factory which came in the nature of a bombshell a few weeks back has resulted in the loss of more than 150 jobs and only about a dozen employees have been retained to operate the premises as a depot.

Last week in a "last gasp" effort a deputation comprising the Constituency TDs, local public representatives, union officials and other local interested organisations in Cappoquin met Agriculture Minister Ray McSharry to discuss and probe any possibilities of a rescue operation. I understand from a member of that deputation that there was an open and frank discussion lasting for some forty-five minutes but the sum total of the meeting was that there was no further hope for the factory as a going concern.

Later the deputation met and had talks with officials of the Department of Industry and Commerce and the Industrial Development Authority, the latter pledging to continue to treat West Waterford as a top priority for a possible new industry.

So harsh and bleak as the prospect is facing into a winter that is already almost upon us, the reality of the position is that the closure of the Bacon Factory is final. There is no short-term solution to the job losses that have resulted and the only prospect for the work force in the town and the surrounding areas is for the IDA to plan and go ahead at once with the building of as big an advance factory as possible in the hope that within the next couple of years a viable industry can be found to locate there.

WIT ON THE WALLS

During my travels around the West while on holidays I noted many items of interest and amusement not least of which was a visit to Bunratty Castle and Folk Park.

I noted too here and there a good deal of graffiti, terse slogans on walls and hoardings in public places. Much of this was political, a little was philosophical and one was obviously an effort by a financial wizard who merely wrote "E=0" I suppose you could say that he was not far wrong.

VANDALISM AND HOUSE-BREAKINGS

People in Dungarvan and particularly owners of shops and private houses in the vicinity of the public car park in Dungarvan are becoming terrorised at the number of break-ins and the amount of vandalism such as the breaking of shop windows which have been occurring in recent months.

Some of the premises have been broken into several times even on consecutive nights by night prowlers. The increase of such lawlessness would suggest the need for a strengthening of the Garda Force in the town and more especially for a return of men on the beat to counter-act these law-breaking incidents. I believe, and it has been said to me by many of the older residents in the town, that there was never anything more effective in the past in enforcing law and order than regular street patrols by the Garda especially after dark.

RTE AND ITS FINANCES

One of the main topics of conversation in Dungarvan last week-end was the hearing of the oral appeal by an Bord Pleanala of the objection by

An Taisce to the Planning Permission granted by Waterford County Council to the local TV Rental Company of Casey & Co Ltd for the work carried out by them on Seefin Mountain in the Comeraghs to enable them to introduce multi-channel TV reception to Dungarvan and district.

Whatever about the Taisce case there can be no doubt but that the people of the town and its environs are completely in favour of the enterprise and effort of M/s Casey & Co and all are hopeful that reason will prevail and that the outcome of the hearing will uphold the County Council decision in favour of the local Company.

In this regard I must also record the very favourable comment of everyone, without exception, who discussed the topic with me, of the backing which this paper, particularly in last week's issue, gave to the Company. We make no apologies for taking this stance as we are firmly convinced that the Taisce objection had little or nothing to sustain it.

One of the offshoots in these discussions was the finances of RTE and how much money the national television service derives from licence fees and from advertising.

I was unable to quote figures off the top of my head at the time but during the week I had a look over the Annual Report for 1979 of Radio Telefís Éireann which gives full information on this.

In regard to licence fees the report has this to say "In a broadcasting organisation which is substantially dependent upon licence revenue and where, for population reasons, the licence base is comparatively small, the maximisation of licence revenue is essential. Its significance is reflected in the regularity with which the matter has been the subject of comment in successive annual reports and in the continuing concern with which the Authority views the problem of licence evasion. In the year under review this has been more than ever true.

"The scale of the problem is increasing the amount of money involved is increasing. The best estimates are that in 1978/79 licence evasions represented a loss of income of more than £4 million. The disparity between the actual number of sets and the number of licences current and due for renewal indicates the extent of the problem (125,000). This is particularly so in relation to colour sets where the differential is 88,000."

But to get back to the actual matter of money, the financial section of the report records that the accounts for the year ended September 30, 1979 showed a loss of £505,254 compared with a profit of £1,229,593 in the previous year. The reasons given for the deficit were, mainly, the prolonged postal dispute and the coverage of the Papal visit which cost some £0.6 million.

The total income of RTE for the year was given as £32,804,502 with licence fee revenue accounting for £13,867,638 of this while advertising revenue totalled £15,347,570. RTE Relays (the wired television service) accounted for a total income of £1,452,721.

Total expenditure for the year amounted to £33,309,756 and of this £16,143,734 was accounted for by payroll costs. In recent weeks RTE have signified their intention to seek an increase in licence fees mainly because of the big number of licence evasions, so it appears that those of us who have been paying these fees in the past will have to pay even more to carry those who have not in the past or who do not intend in the future to pay their licence fees. This, of course, is an absolutely ridiculous situation.

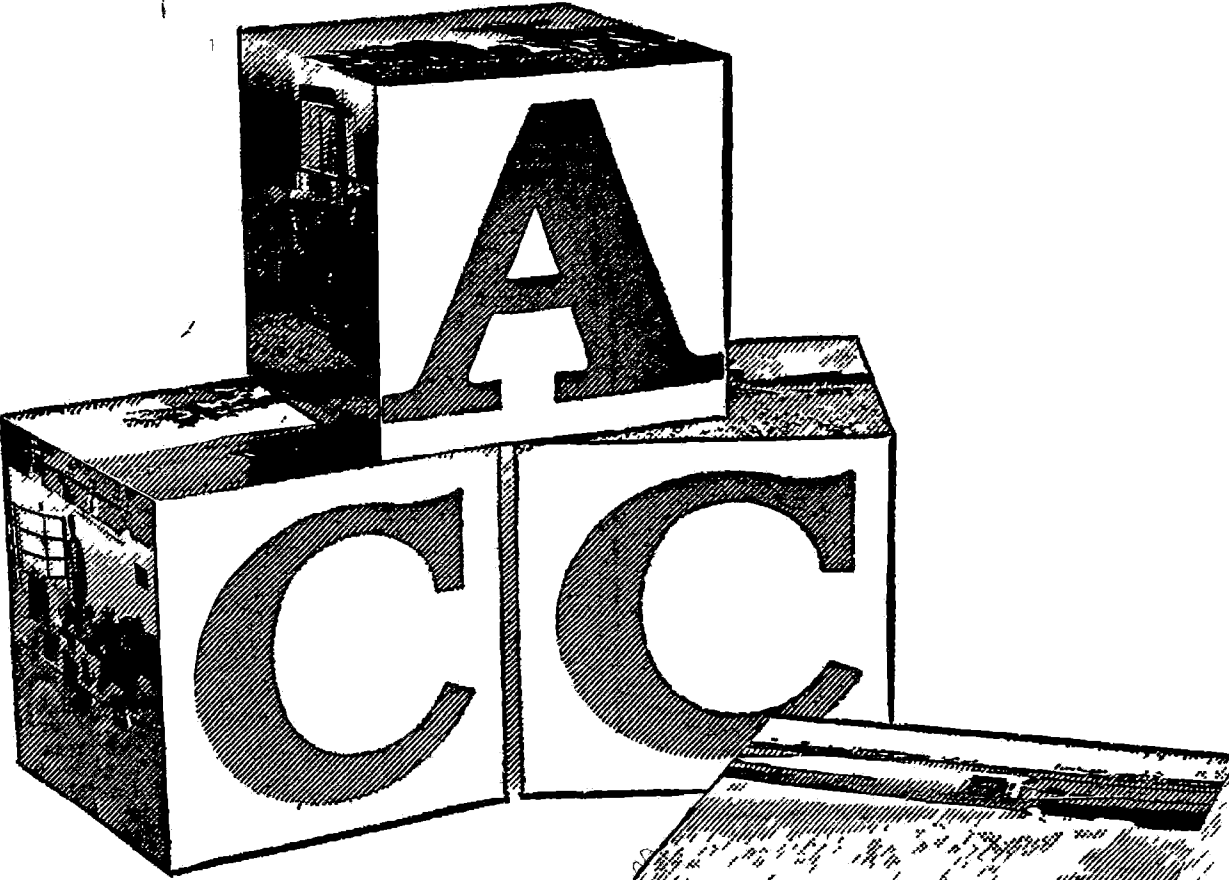

We take the following from the August issue of the Canadian Veterinary Journal — Dr J B Morrissey has been appointed director of the Animal Health Division of Agriculture Canada's Food Production and Inspection Branch. He replaces Dr Bert Lewis who retired in December 1979.

Dr Morrissey was formerly acting director of Management Services in the Food Production and Inspection Branch responsible for the branch secretariat, Statistical Advisory Services and the branch investigators. As the senior project officer he was responsible for the Education and Development Section. Born in Dungarvan, Ireland he graduated from Clongowes Wood College, County Kildare, Ireland and from University College, Dublin in 1935. He worked in dairy animal practice until coming to Canada in 1963 to take a position as a veterinarian in the Hamilton District Office of Health of Animals Branch.

Fined For His Callous Attitude Towards 4,000 Chickens

A lorry driver who transported 4,000 chickens from Co. Louth to Cappoquin last Tuesday was fined for displaying a callous attitude and indifference towards them by District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Cappoquin Court.
 Michael Cummiskey, Drumbulla Dundalk failed to appear on a charge of causing unnecessary suffering and hardship to the chickens. All members of Cappoquin on February 2 last, and in his absence was convicted and fined £25. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.
 Miss Phyllis Flanagan, Allen Street, Cappoquin, told the court that she was awakened in the early hours of the morning by cries and shrieks from the street. When she looked out she saw a large truck parked with crates of chickens piled on it and they seemed to be in great discomfort and pain. She examined the lorry and in the morning she saw a number of dead chickens. "It was most disturbing sight," she said.
 Garda J. O'Driscoll said he interviewed the defendant later that day at a local poultry factory and he made a statement in which he said he had loaded the lorry on the afternoon of February 1 with 4,000 chickens and transported them from Dundalk to Cappoquin. They had not had feed or watering. However he would expect that on Dungarvan that evening the chickens would be on the journey.
 Garda O'Driscoll said he examined the chickens and a number of them were in a very distressed condition.
