PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

OFF TO BRIGHTON On August 7, the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Sylvester Barrett, issued a circular to each local authority in the country on the subject of a Housing and Planning Conference to be held at Brighton next month with an expense account of £400 each. In the present bad economic position, and there can be no doubt but that this is so, such a decision begs the question as to how sincere our public representatives really are about the concern they express for the ratepayers who have to foot the bill.

A BIT THICK The unofficial strike by petrol tanker drivers has not so far been felt in these areas and hopefully reason will prevail before this might happen. However those of us who made the trip to Dublin last weekend were made keenly aware of the position and of the devastating affect which the strike is having not only in Dublin but all over Leinster.

From the moment we crossed the provincial boundary into Leinster it became evident at once, as roadside filling stations displayed the old signs so familiar during the great shortage "closed" or "sorry, no petrol". In the city and suburbs the filling stations just had their forecourts closed off and were very evidently out of business. As I have said, for those of us up from the south, the situation had no ill-effects as most travellers ensured they had full tanks before starting out on Friday or Saturday but the awful plight of Dublin people and latterly of people in areas now affected by the strike has been seen on our television screens as they have had to queue for hours at the few stations still open in the hope of getting a few gallons of the precious fluid.

It is no wonder that there should be angry public reaction to the strike which is just another of the many which we have experienced in the past where a small group with a lot of muscle use their power to hold the country up to ransom in their own selfish sectional interest. And in this regard the thousands of queue-weary motorists could hardly believe the news which surfaced during the past week that the striking petrol tanker drivers who were responsible for such chaos have been able to fill the tanks of their own cars with petrol at a price of 10 per cent below the ruling rate through a concession operated with the petrol companies.

Certainly this situation does very little to win any sympathy whatever for the striking tanker drivers and the fact that they continue to ignore all appeals to return to work and pursue their claims through normal channels shows how apparently powerless the trade union movement is in the matter of control over their members. The manner in which the strike weapon has come to be abused by certain groups of workers in key positions is further shown by their most recent demands for "compensation" from their employers for the period during which they remain out on strike. The position has now really become ridiculous and makes an absolute mockery of the agreed procedures for dealing with industrial disputes.

Sooner or later, the Government and the trade union leaders will have to take a long hard look at this problem of unofficial strikes if we are to eradicate these blackmail attempts by small muscle groups in the future.

BACON FACTORY CLOSURE WAS SOCIAL TRAGEDY FOR CAPPOQUIN

In the course of a statement issued on Tuesday last, Mr. John Dwan Branch Secretary IT & GWU Waterford said "The closure of the Cappoquin Bacon Factory involves the loss of 150 jobs may register with most people as just another in a continuous pattern of closures redundancies and short-time working. However if we look beyond the statistics the closure represents nothing less than a social and economic tragedy for the Cappoquin/Lismore area. Whatever chance the unemployed man or woman in the urban and industrialised centres may have of finding a new job those redundant from Cappoquin face the prospect of looking for jobs where none exist. Before the closure the area was already considered as depressed and underdeveloped. The tragedy of the closure has the added dimension which particularly angers the workers and the people of the area namely that it could and should have been avoided. Over the years the company made healthy profits but little was re-invested in the company beyond what was required to meet minimum veterinary standards."
