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MUST NOW BE APPOINTED BY MINISTER

The fact that three of the six nominating voluntary organisations in the County failed to name their representatives for the newly-constituted Committee of Agriculture in time for approval by the County Council at their first meeting in September has now brought about a change in the procedure to be followed.

The original position was that of the 16 members which constitute the Committee of Agriculture 10 were to be appointed by the County Council from amongst its own membership and the remainder to one each were to be nominated by the following six voluntary organisations: Sheepbreeders' Association, ICMSA, Co-operative Movement, ICA, IFA and Macra na Feirme. By order of the Minister for Agriculture the nominations were to be submitted in time for approval at the first meeting held by the County Council in September. Only three of the bodies named, complied with this. Sheepbreeders, ICMSA and Co-op and the nominees were duly approved.

The position then was that when the "new" Committee of Agriculture now under the jurisdiction of ACOT, met for the first time in Dungarvan on September 17 there were only 13 legal members in attendance and this prompted Cllr C. Curran to question the original constitution of the Committee and the legality of any decisions (including the election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman) taken at the meeting. It was agreed however, to proceed with the business of the meeting in the usual way.

In the interim period the matter was submitted to the Department of Agriculture for clarification and this was forthcoming in a letter from the Education Division of the Department dated October 8 which was read at last Monday's meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan.

The relevant part of that letter states: "The position is that under the terms of the Agriculture (Amendment) Act, 1970 each County Council is required to appoint a new committee of agriculture at its first meeting after 1st September 1970. Since the designated rural organisations in County Waterford had not made their nominations before this meeting took place their nominees cannot now be appointed by the County Council."

However, section 26 (D) of the Agriculture Act 1979 provides that a committee of agriculture shall be deemed not to be invalidly constituted by reason of the failure of the designated organisations to nominate the number of persons determined by the Minister. The section further provides that the event of such failure the Minister for Agriculture may nominate for appointment as members or appoint to be members of the committee such persons as he may determine so that the number of members of the committee shall be the number required."

This then shows that while the Committee was not initially constituted in the first instance the matter of filling the still vacant three places is no longer a matter for the County Council but for the Minister himself. In the circumstances I think that Cllr Curran was well justified in expressing the reservations he voiced at the initial meeting of the committee and it was just as well to have the entire position clarified.

If the three "absent" designated organisations are still interested in taking up their seats on the committee they will now have to make representations to the Minister regarding the appointment by him of their nominees.

A £10,000 JUNKET

I have always opposed the junket trips abroad by public representatives at local level and lest I might be accused of being inconsistent, I now want to make it clear that I am equally opposed to such trips if they appear to be excessive, whether or unnecessary. Oireachtas members of the Government are concerned.

We have heard a great deal of moaning by public representatives at both levels in recent weeks about the inability of the ratepayers to meet their rates bills but while this has been going on so also have plans been proceeding to fly several members of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council out to a "conference" in Brighton.

While there can be no doubt about the fact that the farmers have taken a dreadful "beating" this year and that the inability of many of them to meet their rate demands is very real, it has not put an end to these junkets which must be paid for out of the money collected through rates.

But it appears to be a case of "anything you can do I can do better" or "don't do what I do but do as I tell you" as far as big brothers in both Houses of the Oireachtas are concerned. Despite the Ministerial strictures on foreign travel handed down to the local authorities (mainly unheeded anyway) six members of the Oireachtas (four TDs and two Senators) paid a 5-day visit to the USA with all expenses paid, the week before last. They were all members of the Oireachtas Committee investigating semi-state bodies. At the moment they are investigating Aer Lingus and to show how thorough this "investigation" is they flew to the US first-class (at a cost of £1,086 per person) to look into the airline's ancillary activities there. They stayed at two exclusive Dunfry hotels in New York and Boston of which Aer Lingus are shareholders. The total cost to the taxpayers of the trip was almost £10,000!

The 6-strong delegation headed by Senator Paddy Conroy (FG), Vice-Chairman of the Committee and former Minister for Justice, also included Senator Justin Keating (Labour), and Deputies Barry Desmond (Labour), Michael Herbert (FF), Billy Kenneally (FF) and Austin Deasy (FG) (FF) and Austin Deasy (FG). That meant two from each party which incidentally included two of our own deputies. In the light of present economic difficulties is such duplication justified? The sky still appears to be the limit!

Incidentally, had a visit to Foxhills Country Club outside London on a similar "errand" not so very long ago!

WHO CALLS THE TUNE?

As I write this column on Tuesday morning it looks as if petrol harmony is in sight and that following a nationwide vote by oil tanker drivers the 5-weeks old dispute will come to an end. A £500 sweetener seems to have been one of the big factors in getting the up-to-date intransigent shop stewards committee to come to terms which they were prepared to recommend to the drivers at large. The proposals which broke the deadlock in the dispute emerged after an intensive day-long talks conducted by Rights Commissioner Con Murphy at the Labour Court on Sunday.

But while the petrol tankers might again begin to move normally it does not mean a final end to the dispute as the back-to-work package provides for the Congress of Trade Unions and the oil companies to carry out an assessment of the drivers' productivity and produce a report by November 14.

The "settlement" of course will bring signs of relief to will bring signs of relief to harassed motorists and businessmen who needed fuel and while it may be said that now is not the time to argue that matters should never have

been allowed to reach the state they did in the first instance, it must be realised that in recent years these disruptive, unofficial strikes by small powerful groups have occurred far too often and it will not just be good enough now that the latest one has ended to merely forget it ever happened.

Some action will have to be taken whether it is by the Government or by Congress to ensure that these unofficial strikes are at least curbed in the future. The Government cannot disown their responsibility to the entire country by merely ignoring the situation until another crisis of a similar nature occurs and if the trade union movement is to fulfil its true role then it cannot allow "committees" of shop stewards or of other unofficial strikers to take over its functions.

And before leaving this topic I would like on behalf of all readers of this column to extend sincerest thanks to the Army Command and to the Army personnel who manned the petrol tankers so efficiently, for the wonderful job they performed in making supplies available and so saving the country from utter chaos during the strike.

WORK TO PROCEED ON DUNGARVAN CAUSEWAY BRIDGE

The original proposal by the Co. Manager that work on the Dungarvan Causeway Bridge as outlined in the report of the Co. Engineer was binding on the Council and the subsequent resolution from the National Council's Advisory Committee was not relevant.

That was the sum total of the explanation of the County Council's decision given to members of Waterford County Council by the Council's Law Adviser Mr M. M. Halley Solicitor at the Council's monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday.

He told the Council that the original proposal of the County Council to proceed with the work on the bridge still stood and no further action could now be taken to alter that fact.

Council Told To Stop 6-Day Rate Notices

There was no doubt but this had been a disastrous year for farmers said Cllr K. O'Ryan during a discussion at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

The discussion was initiated when Cllr J. Quirk proposed and Cllr O'Ryan seconded a resolution empowering the Council to grant a waiver from the condition that the making of allowances under the Rates on Agricultural Land Relief Acts in respect of rates for the current year shall be subject to such rates being paid not later than the appropriate dates as defined in the Act.

Cllr James A. Walsh made a comment accepted by the Co. Manager Mr C. A. O'Connor as a very valid one that farmers were unable to pay their rates this year even though the rate increase had been restricted to 10 per cent over last year. "Next year" said Cllr Walsh "the Council could well be looking for an increase of 20% in order to pay their way so it would be just as well for the Government and Co. Councils to look to other sources to fund the public services then."

Cllr M. Qualey said that despite the commitment of the Taoiseach in his recent discussions with the Farmer Organisations that Local Authorities would take no further action on rates for the present 6 day notices were still being sent out by the Council. He suggested that these should be stopped pending clarification of the point made by the Taoiseach.

The County Manager said that the responsibility for looking after the Council's finances rested on him and he was now only implementing the budget which the Council had passed in adopting their estimates last April.

The County Secretary Mr B. McNally said that up to the end of September only 54% of the county rates had been collected in a normal year up to 70% would be collected by that time.

Dungarvan Man Returned For Trial

TALLOW G.A.A. NOTES

IT'S CAPPOQUIN IN A THRILLER
Cappoquin 4-5, Tallow 2-9

In the year's finest hurling match a game that throbbled with all that is best in our ancient game Cappoquin wrenched the divisional title from Tallow under 21 hurlers and thus made amends for some heart-breaking defeats at the hands of those self same opponents. The beautiful autumnal sunshine drew a very big crowd to Lismore and whatever about an understandable disappointment by Tallow supporters at the loss of a title which could so easily have been retained no person present could deny that this was an outstanding game. The pitch was as good as the best pitch is just now, following the continual rainfall of the last month conditions were sticky, there was no run on the ball and lifting was a difficult business.

The game got off to a breathtaking start at a pace that was maintained throughout this exciting first half Michael Condon's point after a minute and a half was negated a half a minute later Mick Beecher put us ahead only for the equaliser to come within 30 seconds. Philly Curley's point one minute later gave Tallow a lead which they enjoyed until within five minutes of the half time whistle. In between we witnessed some marvellous physical while-heated commentaries from both sides that allowed no spectator respite you aren't take your eyes off the play in case you missed a stroke of this hurling spectacular. Michael Condon's goal in the eighth minute (1-3 to 0-2) Cappoquin's first goal after fourteen minutes (1-3 to 1-2), Condon's second goal (2-3 to 1-2) all kept Tallow's hopes alive. Brave Cappoquin lifted their game for the remaining twelve minutes of this half and denied Tallow a score during this period while scoring two points themselves. In the second half for the first time when Pintan Murray shot to the net in the twenty-fifth minute five hectic minutes later they were still that point ahead (2-4 to 2-3) when half time allowed every one time to draw a breath.

The manner in which Tallow set about their work in the second half showed how determined they were to hold on to their title. Yet so staunch was the Cappoquin defence that it took Tallow eight minutes to equalise when Mick Curley raised the white flag. Philly Curley's pointed free two minutes later restored Tallow's lead — 2-5 to 2-4. Dermot Murray's point in the fifteenth minute levelled once again (2-5 to 2-5) but more Philly Curley points (the first after a good Dermot Cantillon pass) saw Tallow 2-7 to 2-5 ahead with nine minutes remaining. Forward weakness prevented Tallow from wrapping it up in this stage with some good scoring chances being allowed slip away. When Johnnie Mason finished to the net for Cappoquin in the twenty-third minute leaving their noses in front 3-5 to 2-7 we wondered what Tallow's reaction was going to be.

This question was answered a minute later by Mick Beecher's soaring point level again. Then came the crucial score and sadly it stemmed from a defensive mix-up. Full credit to the Red and Blacks they took this golden chance and sent that great what should do now it was 4-5 to 2-8 and when Mick Beecher sent a 65 smoothly between the uprights Tallow were within two points of the leaders and had five minutes to save the game.

This was a struggle for supremacy which has never been matched in this grade as Cappoquin defied everything that Tallow could throw at them. There was no opportunity for any player to adorn his efforts the tackling was razor-sharp and you got no second chance if you failed to strike first time in a peculiar way. Tallow's desperate attempts to salvage the game reminded one of Duhill's efforts during the last five minutes of the senior county final. This time however, Tallow were not going to let off and we were that tantalising two points in arrears when Richie Ormonde signalled the end of the game. Cappoquin's jubilation was understandable as they joyously hailed this breakthrough and Tallow lads waited for the presentation of the trophy to respected rivals.

Even though defeat is never welcome Tallow can be very proud indeed of last Sunday's display. It was a magnificent effort which but for the ill luck surrounding Cappoquin's goal would have proved successful once again. In standard no game in any grade in our county during this year could measure up to this superb clash of many hurlers. There were some-shattering tackles but no most ferocious calibre but all rancour of any kind. It took two great teams to produce this game of the year and the mutual appreciation of the adversary's worth was evident in the warm exchange of congratulations after the final whistle. It would be unfair to omit a tribute to our own team all of

them. Some failed to produce the form of which they are capable but all tried mightily. Pat Murphy kept a great goal. He has all the requirements for the position and has matured quickly since playing in this grade last year. Con Ryan, Aidan his brother, Michael and John Geary, Timmy Sheehan and Frank Ryan in the second half were great defenders. After all Cappoquin could only score nine times in the hour.

Midfield was one area which we lost in the first half until Mick Beecher arrived and it was his lack of penetration in our forward division which eventually proved our undoing. Philly Curley got some nice scores. Mickie made a few good ones and Michael Condon took his scores very well indeed. For all of the possession so bravely won there was quite a lot of scoring chances squandered. The quick tackling of the Cappoquin backs made scoring harder still.
