ANOTHER JUMP IN T.V. LICENCE FEES

Public reaction to the announcement by RTE last week that T.V. licence fees are to be increased as from December 1 has been sharp. Colour licences are to rise in price by £7 to £45 while black and white licences will go up by £4 to £27. These latest increases are estimated to bring in an extra £3 million in a full year to RTE.

Announcing the increases RTE's Director-General, Mr. G. Waters claimed that they were necessary "to enable RTE to maintain the standards in its radio and television services which the public has come to expect".

With a workforce now estimated to run to 2,500 RTE must certainly be overloaded, but the DG was quick to assure his "army" that there would be no redundancies and that the required "economies" would be achieved at the expense of the viewing public, especially in the captive areas of Channel 1 and Channel 2.

The DG might start by cutting back on their new 9 o'clock News. Since this circus was introduced it has, on some occasions, counted up to a dozen persons (male and female) involved in reading the news and the additional cost involved makes it no more appealing for the viewers than it was when a single person read the bulletins.

Mr. Waters might also take a sharp look at the "Quick-silver" programme which is certainly living up to its name where expenditure is concerned. Thousands of pounds have been handed out as prizes in this so-called "brain-guzz" programme but the IQ required is so low that the programme would get by, as far as both contestants and those who wish to view it are concerned, just as well with prizes of a more modest scale.

There are several other areas where RTE could make economies without affecting the standards of the services they provide especially in the field of travelling. The expenses of sending teams abroad must run to enormous sums to cover sporting and political activities in various parts of the world when a far better service could be purchased for less from an agency.

It is time for RTE to pull in its horns and to realise that it has not a bottomless financial well from which to draw to cover these costly trips and that unlike the UK and Europe where viewers are numbered by hundreds of millions, there are only about two millions of us here to foot these bills.

SEEKING FAMILY HISTORY The Town Clerk in Dungarvan Mr. Bertie White has passed us a letter which he received earlier this month from a U.S. resident who is seeking information about her forbears who originally came from Abbeyside. The letter came from 78 years old Miss Anne Weldon of Stuyvesant Oval, New York and it states that her father, Thomas Weldon was born in Abbeyside on February 1853 but left there at an early age. Her grandfather was John Weldon who married a Mary McGrath. Miss Weldon goes on to say in her letter that her father told them that he was born in the house where Crotty's licensed premises now stands and also told them that at that time the junction was known as Weldon's Cross. Other points which she makes in the letter about the family are that her grandfather John Weldon had a brother Stephen, that he owned a ship and was lost at sea. She and her sister who is 76 are interested in obtaining a copy of a map of Abbeyside and any information about the Weldon family who lived in the village more than a century ago. It might be possible that among some of the older generation in Abbeyside there might be some recall of the points made in her letter by Miss Weldon and I am sure it would please her very much to obtain any information no matter how meagre, about the Weldon family background before they left the Village.

FOLLOWING IN FATHER'S FOOTSTEPS IN CHICAGO

The last result of the November 4 elections in the U.S. to be turned in in Chicago was that of Mr. Richard Daley Junior's victory over the Republican incumbent, Mr. Bernard Carey, for the office of Cook County State's Attorney. The young Daley defeated the Republican Party in a Republican year, but he was also victorious over Mayor Jane Byrne and what remains of the once powerful Democratic machine. The mayor had dropped her support for Mr. Daley at a crucial stage in the campaign.

Sen. of the famous Richard Daley, long-time Mayor of Chicago whose ancestors came from Old Parish and who made history when he was given a Civic Reception when he visited Dungarvan some years ago, young Daley displayed much of the grit and toughness which kept his father at the top as one of the big political bosses of the Democratic Party throughout his lifetime in Chicago, always one of the toughest and roughest political arenas in the U.S. during the November elections.

Opposed by 48 of the city's 50 ward committee men, Chicagoans were treated to a display of a Daley claiming that the Democratic machine was planning to steal votes from him through methods made famous during his father's years as Mayor. He won the Democratic primary against the power of the machine's mayor, who, herself, won office against the machine after being the favourite of his father.

The young Daley has, during his tenure in the State Senate, built somewhat of a reputation of being a progressive and his campaign was by far the most interesting during the recent election in Illinois. After his victory Mr. Daley promised to pursue his duties with genuine professionalism and efforts to curb some of the more pressing issues, which include narcotics, gangs, violent crimes, arson, organised crime and official corruption.

It remains to be seen whether the new State Attorney in Chicago will be as strong and ruthless in pursuing these ends as his late father was when he was the King of the Windy City.

Car Came "Out Of The Blue" At 2 a.m. In Ballyduff

Sean Lee, Main Street, Kiltworth, who it was stated drove at speed through the village of Ballyduff in the early hours of the morning and almost swept two guards on the road appeared before District Justice W F O'Connell at Lismore Court charged with dangerous driving on June 30. PRESIDENT REITERATES I.F.A. DEMANDS. Special meetings of co-op management committees are to be required by shareholders to instruct the societies not to pay the terms of the National Understanding to workers on the grounds that it would erode farm incomes even further. The extent of the current income crisis in farming is not yet fully appreciated by the Government or the sectors outside agriculture. When the co-ops show convincingly that they are not in a position to pay the National Understanding without reducing farm incomes further the magnitude of the crisis may finally be brought home. IFA President Donal Cashman said last week.

By the end of the year farm incomes will have declined by around 50 per cent in real terms relative to their 1978 level and farmers just cannot tolerate a demand to Brussels for real-estate increases in the price of milk and beef. The rehels announced will do little to relieve farmers caught up with increasing costs and static prices. Action must be taken now to get relief from taxation not related to incomes a subsidy on interest rates and a demand to Brussels for real-estate increases in the price of milk and beef.

Our demands are still for a 17 per cent increase over and above next year's EEC Price Agreement, the abolition of rates, Resource Tax and all levies in operation without reducing farm incomes further. In addition we will also be pressing the government to get the banks to introduce long-term lending for farmers. I believe that a loan for capital development especially farm buildings and reclamation should be converted into 30 year loans at reasonable interest rates as prevails in other EEC countries. This would be a very positive way by which the banks could help farmers," he said. Meanwhile a demonstration through the city is planned for Saturday December 6. IFA Munster Vice-President Paddy Fitzgerald said that the demonstration would be peaceful and his main purpose is to bring home to the community the extent of the income crisis in farming. 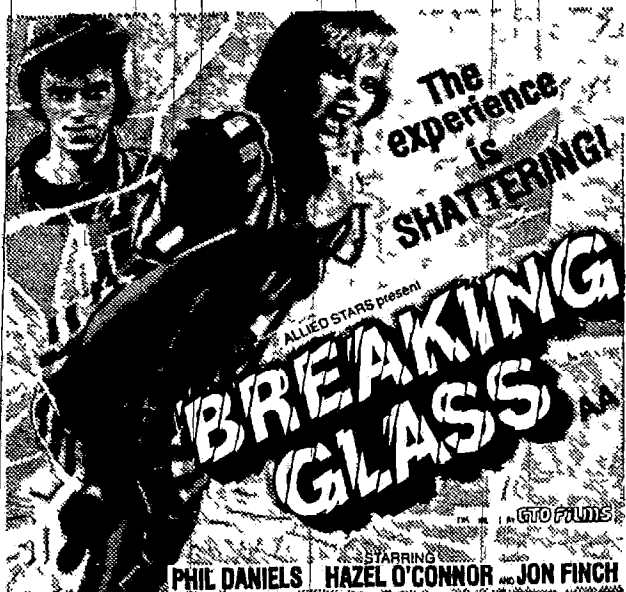

Press Release From Dungarvan "Save The Bridge" Committee

The following 'Press Release' has been handed to us for publication by Mr John R. Walsh Secretary of the Dungarvan "Save The Bridge" Committee. "As a result of the four and a half thousand signatures received by the Save The Bridge Committee are representing five out of every six adults in the urban area of Dungarvan (the people of Dungarvan are very angry at the vicious unjustified and unfounded attack made on the Minister for State at the Department of the Environment, Mr Jackie Fahey T.D., at the meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday. This was clearly a clumsy effort by certain councillors to turn the bridge issue into a political football for their own reasons. "The preservation of the bridge has not been a political issue as people of all political persuasions, and none have come together to prevent the vandalism of our bridge. We find the County Engineer wanting in not stopping this misled attack on the Minister because he knew that long before the Minister sent his official memo to Waterford County Council that the engineering section of the Department had arranged a conference between the Department officials, the Waterford County Council officials and the officials representing the Save The Bridge Committee on Monday 28th July last. This conference did not take place because the County Engineer refused to take part in it. "Regarding the 'democratic' decision as taken by the County Council as already stated four-and-a-half thousand signatures representing five out of every six adults in this town were obtained to preserve the bridge. Democracy means abiding by the wishes of the majority of the residents of the urban area of Dungarvan. It is also significant that six out of seven County Councillors answerable to the voters of Dungarvan in the Dungarvan electoral area voted to preserve the bridge. We would like to point out to County Councillors especially Deputy Collins that the destruction of the bridge is not held up by the Minister as a Minister of State but by the determination of the vast majority of the towns people who will not allow the bridge to be turned into a death trap at the behest of Councilors who are far removed from the scene and whose motives have nothing whatsoever to do with the question of the bridge. Any far-sighted person must agree that it is sheer lunacy in these times of financial stress to squander £50,000 on a job that would not only destroy Dungarvan's most famous landmark but would make it a deadly danger by removing the very structures that have kept it accident free. This would in effect make it into a speedway and it would mean God help the pedestrians on the unsheltered windswept promontory that would be left, not to mention the dangers to little children from the river on the largely unprotected structure remaining. "We also find the County Manager wanting in not reassuring certain Councillors that the balance of the £50,000 allocated to the bridge, after the work done on channelling the traffic onto the bridge would be lost. "It is high time now for our County Councillors to wake up and realise what is going on on all approaches to the bridge which we have sought continuously and for which the County Engineer has stated he has plans should be put into effect immediately thus making the bridge safer for all users. And this is what the Councillors should be pressing for. — Save The Bridge Committee November 16 1980.
