


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Church Leaders Issue Call For Week Of Prayer

The leaders of four Churches have issued a call for a week of prayer for Ireland from December 28 to January 4.

The following is a copy of their message which is being sent to the Clergy of all four churches throughout Ireland, to other churches and to many Community Groups:

"We invite the members of our churches and indeed the whole community in our island, North and South to make this week that ends an old year and begins a new one a special time for Remembrance and Spiritual Renewal.

The closing year is shadowed still by continuing violence especially in Northern Ireland, and by the fears, suspicions, sorrows and divisions which this feeds, even far beyond its borders. New shadows, too have been falling across our land, as in the wider world, with rising uncertainty. A new year should mean new resolve and hope yet, unless we can find new ways of life together and new inspiration in seeking and avowing in God's will, we can count on nothing but a sad repetition of the past.

"We need a truly repentant spirit and a sorrowful penitence for our failures. We must realise the injuries we have inflicted on ourselves and others, and become aware of the many ways in which we have come short of the Christianity we profess. In this way only will our hearts and minds be turned from the sins and errors which are destroying us. We need too, a truly practical faith, not in ourselves and in what we are able to do, but in the saving love of God that is found in Jesus Christ. This brings to us forgiveness and teaches us also to forgive, that we may find new life and strength in partnership with Christ. Our Lord it is thus that gives us hope and it is for this that we must pray fervently to God.

"While we join wholeheartedly in this call to prayer, we appreciate that the response will be made differently in different situations. Some will respond privately and individually some in their parishes and congregations as they meet normally for worship and some in special services, perhaps arranged together. Some may gather their prayers together on one special day, while others will take up the call daily throughout the week perhaps focusing day by day on the different aspects involved. Let each play their part and make their contribution as best they can, having in mind the concerns and thoughts we offer, to seek spiritual renewal and re-dedication of ourselves throughout our land for the incoming year.

CENSUS OF POPULATION 1981

VACANCIES FOR 3,000 PART-TIME ENUMERATORS

The work will involve the distribution, collection, checking and summarisation of the Census household schedules.

Qualifications

It is essential that applicants for these posts:

- be not less than 18 years of age on 1 January, 1981
- have a good general education
- be able to devote not less than 25 hours a week to Census work (including training) for a total of about 9 weeks during the period from late February to the end of May, 1981. A considerable amount of evening work will be required.

Remuneration

This will be on a fee basis plus a terminal bonus payable on satisfactory completion of the work. While payments to individual Enumerators will vary according to the number of households etc. in their Enumeration Areas, the average total payment is likely to be in the region of £440. In addition, each Enumerator will be entitled to a fixed allowance in respect of travelling expenses.

To qualify for appointment to a Rural Enumeration Area applicants must hold a current full driving licence and have the use of a motor vehicle.

I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

NATIONAL COUNCIL RECEIVES REPORT ON ARRANGEMENTS FOR I.F.A. PUBLIC DEMONSTRATION

The IFA National Council at its meeting in Dublin last week received a report from the Minister Vice-President Mr. Paddy Fitzgerald on arrangements for the IFA public demonstration in Limerick on next Saturday and December assembly at St. John's Square at 12 noon.

The President Mr. Donal Cashman emphasised that the display of farmer solidarity in support of the farming organisations demands for effective action on farm incomes and the full commitment and support of the IFA leadership and National Council. He explored certain recent insinuations to the contrary.

The IFA Council made it clear that in addition to the involvement of farmers, farm family members were encouraged to participate in the Limerick demonstration since the very survival of the family farm business was directly at stake in the current income crisis.

Strong views were expressed by the Council on the need for a much greater effort by the Government both at EEC level and at the national scene to tackle the farm income problem effectively.

This should involve (a) A 15% per cent increase at EEC level (b) A further 19 per cent price increase to compensate Irish farmers for the high inflation rate here relative to other EEC countries (c) Immediate cancellation of all taxes and levies which are not based on actual farm incomes for farmers in financial difficulties (d) Lower interest rates for agricultural development (e) EMISSIONS IMPLEMENTED WOULD MEAN A FURTHER LOSS TO IRISH FARMERS

The EEC Council of Budget Ministers have reached some details of last week on the 1981 Community Budget which, if implemented would mean a further loss to Irish farmers next year.

Consumption of turkey meat had increased from 5.94 lbs per capita in 1978 to 6.94 lbs per capita in 1979 and there was a particularly big improvement in consumption at the holiday week-ends at Easter June and August, and October, as a result of the industry's advertising campaign.

Further processing of turkey meat for the sale of super-concentrate portions in rapidly increasing numbers and accounted for just under 200,000 turkeys in 1979—that number will be exceeded this year.

There is a large number of turkeys in cold store, more than this time last year, but we understand that these have all been sold forward.

It is also important to note that the trade in turkeys from Northern Ireland has to a great extent died out mainly because of the currency differences.

Mr. Dillon said that for the first nine months of this year compared to the same period last year there was a decrease in imports of whole turkeys by just under 6,000 while exports for whole turkeys had increased by over 18,700 and during the same period exports of turkey parts increased by 48,000 kgs.

As a provisional national standard has been drawn up and issued for silage covers which it is envisaged will improve the quality of product on the Irish market. The standard has been published by the Institute for Industrial Research and Standards at the request of the Irish Farmers Association and is numbered IS 246F 1980.

Irish manufacturers will be producing silage covers to this standard for the next season and farmers must ensure that this number is printed on the label of any silage pack before they buy it.

Mr. Jackie Fahey, TD Minister of State at the Department of the Environment speaking to the Tramora Sea and Cliff Rescue Association at their annual dinner in O'Shea's Hotel Tramora on Friday last said that he was keenly conscious of the important role played by the rescue services around our coastline.

It is gratifying to meet a group of people who are prepared to give unselfishly their free time in order to undertake the often hazardous task of ensuring the safety of others.

Mr. Fahey then told those present that he recently suggested to the Minister for Defence that consideration be given to the possibility of using Waterford's new Airport as a base for air sea rescue operations in the South East of the country.

Before concluding, Mr. Fahey made a special mention here to the young members of your Association who last year recovered a body from the sea during the hours of darkness.

The people of Tramora and visitors to the area are indeed fortunate that such unselfish people are working voluntarily in the interest of water safety and should be reassured by the knowledge that an excellent rescue service is at hand in the event of any unfortunate accident occurring.

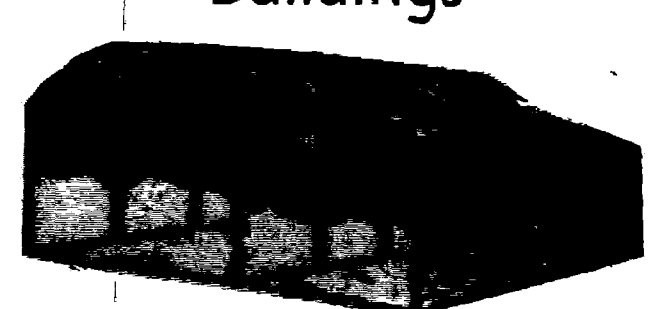

Dungarvan Man One Of Three Sentenced To Death

Three men were sentenced to death on Thursday last November 27 after being convicted in the Special Criminal Court in Dublin of the capital murder of Garda Henry Byrne, one of the two Garda shot dead in Clonsilla, Roscommon last July. The date of the execution was fixed for Friday December 19.

The three men facing death are Patrick McCann (34) of Dungarvan, Colm O'Shea (28) of Sunday's Well, Co. Wick and Peter Pringle (42) of Ringsend, Dublin. O'Shea, McCann and Pringle took their places in the dock as the three judges emerged from their chambers at 2 p.m. There was silence in the courtroom as Mr Justice Hamilton delivered the court's judgement but there was an audible gasp from the public gallery as he passed the first death sentence on O'Shea. The defendants heard the verdict without any visible expression of emotion.
