PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

I.D.A. STILL SIDE-STEPPING ON CAPPOQUIN ISSUE
 It would appear that the I.D.A. are still side-stepping a decision on the issue of granting a replacement bacon industry for Cappoquin. When a 5-member deputation representing the County Development Team and the local action committee in Cappoquin headed by Cllr. James Aidan Walsh travelled to Dublin in the week prior to Christmas to discuss the proposals with I.D.A. officials they were informed by the latter that the I.D.A. would give the fullest consideration to the proposed industrial package when it was presented to them—in detail.

Members of the deputation were taken back when the I.D.A. people told them that these details had not been submitted to them up to that time as they were under the impression that the proposals of the East Waterford firm for Cappoquin had already been passed to the I.D.A. people before they travelled to Dublin.

It has since transpired that the plans of the firm concerned and their proposals for Cappoquin had, in fact, been sent to the I.D.A. eight days previously and when this was subsequently pointed out to the I.D.A. after members of the deputation checked the position on their return home, the I.D.A. came back with the response that they required more detailed particulars before reaching a decision.

On Monday last I was informed that the principals of the firm interested in starting the industry in Cappoquin have now become frustrated and fed up with the manner in which they have so far been given the run-around and have decided that in the event that the I.D.A. fail to come forward soon with a favourable decision, as far as Cappoquin is concerned they will set up the factory on their own but not in Cappoquin. If the Company have to "go it alone" they will start operations at their own headquarters in East Waterford so the future welfare of Cappoquin now rests entirely with the I.D.A.

After all the promises which the I.D.A. have made in recent years in regard to treating West Waterford as an underdeveloped area it would be a great shame if, now, because of their failure or refusal to reach a decision on the application of the Company to grant aid their proposals to set up a new factory in Cappoquin, this vital replacement industry for the town which is so vitally needed to absorb the qualified and trained workforce which was made redundant when the old factory ceased to operate so suddenly more than three months ago now, would be lost to the town.

It is now up to the I.D.A. to deliver on their promises and the people of Cappoquin and the rest of West Waterford look to them to do so without any further undue delay.

HOOLIGAN CONDUCT
 Over the Christmas and New Year period a certain group of teenagers have been responsible for unwarranted hooligan conduct in Dungarvan. On Sunday last the unruly conduct of this group when they almost disrupted Midnight Mass in the friary was condemned in no uncertain terms at last Mass. I have been told that those concerned showed absolute disregard for the occasion, used filthy language and even smoked during the celebration of Midnight Mass, an occasion which is traditionally one of the most sacred and emotional aspects of the religious celebrations of the Feast of the Nativity.

The hooligan conduct was continued on the Square later in the night when empty beer cans and bottles were thrown at random targets and people passing through the Square from the Midnight Masses had to do at their peril.

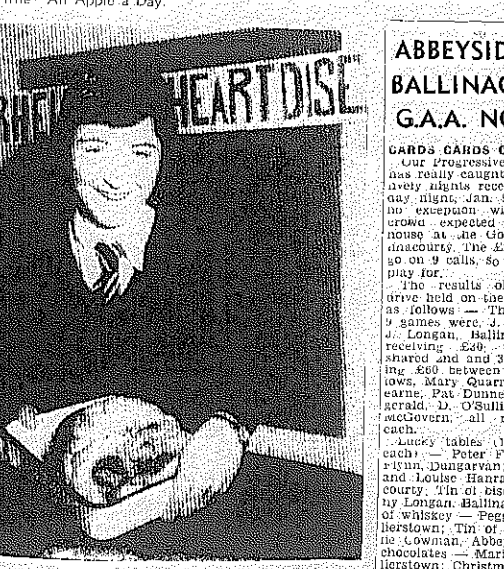

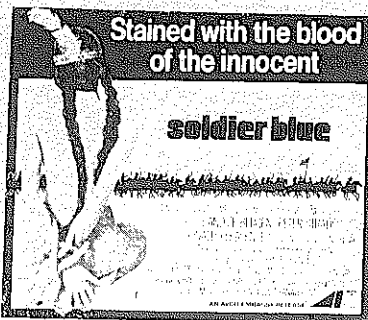

Marauding Sheep-Killing Dogs

Mr. C. Curran at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday referred to the publicity which the carrying of sheep by stray dogs in the Cork area had recently received. "It hasn't happened here so far," he said, "but it will happen unless something is done." Mr. Curran said that on his way into the meeting that day he saw a pack of about 20 dogs running without control about half-a-mile outside the town. "Something should be done about dogs which have no owners as this too many of them we have in the county," he said. Mr. Curran added that a dog was a different animal at night than it was during the day.

Mr. J. A. Walsh said that the practice adopted by some people of taking dogs which they did not want out the country and dumping them off was a factor which constituted a great dent to the problem.

LEGALISE SHOOTING

Mr. T. Murphy said that in his area 5 sheep had recently been killed and 2 had never been found after an attack by dogs. It was terrible that farmers had to put up with these losses year after year. As he saw it the only solution was to make it legal for a farmer to shoot stray dogs found on his land. "We just can't allow these packs to stray around the country as they do," said Mr. Murphy.

Mr. J. Patsy said that every dog should be recorded as it was very difficult to prove ownership when one got involved in sheep killing.

Mr. G. T. Frost, C.A.O. said that this problem was one which had been discussed at several meetings of the General Council of Committees of Agriculture but no solution to it had ever been reached.

Finally it was agreed that the only thing to do for the present was to give the problem maximum publicity at local level and appeal to dog owners to keep their dogs under control, especially at night.

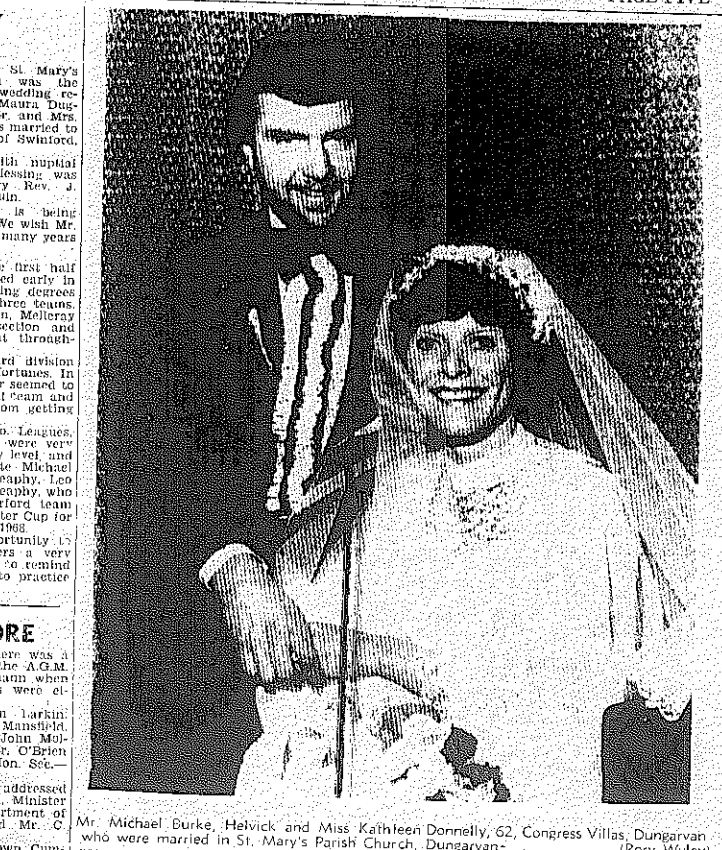

LIVESTOCK BREEDING ACT

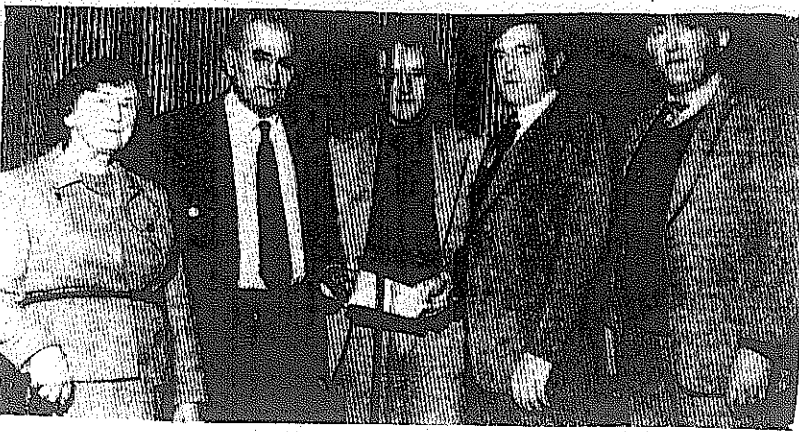

FINE GAEL MOTION ON CRISIS IN AGRICULTURE ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY

On the proposal of Deputy Loidie Collins (F.G.) standing orders were suspended at the monthly meeting of the County Agricultural Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday to permit discussion on a motion dealing with the crisis in agriculture which was not included on the agenda but which was then circulated to the members.

The motion, proposed by Deputy Collins stated: "that in view of the decline in agricultural income and production, there is an urgent need for special measures to aid agriculture, and that the following measures shall be introduced by the Government to that end: (1) the abolition and refund of the Resource Tax; (2) the repeal of the Bovine Disease Levy; (3) the abolition of rates on agricultural land; (4) the introduction of a capital allowance against income tax for expenditure on stock; (5) an interest subsidy for certain farmers and (6) the reduction of stamp duty on the transfer of agricultural property to young farmers."

Calling on the Committee to adopt the motion Deputy Collins said that it was a motion which was being proposed in every County throughout the country and was being sponsored by the Fine Gael Party. It was similar to a motion which was voted down in the Dail by the Government in December. The crisis in agriculture was becoming more serious and the income of the average farmer was now 40% below what it was two years ago and this was due to the incompetence of the Government in regard to their policy on agriculture.

Deputy Collins then said that the success of the Fine Gael policy on agriculture was shown in government stores but in stark contrast to the policy of the present Government and he said that the Fine Gael Party were now promoting a campaign to see that steps be
