CASUAL TRADING ACT NOW IN FORCE

An order made by Mr. Desmond Malley, Minister for Industry, Commerce and Tourism brings the Casual Trading Act, 1980 into force as from today Thursday, February 12.

The main purpose of the Act is to enable local authorities to designate the places in their functional areas where roadside and street trading may be carried on and to make bye-laws to regulate it.

Under the Act casual traders will be required to take out an annual licence which will be issued by the Department of Industry, Commerce and Tourism and which will cost £100 per year in most cases but this will be reduced to £5 in the case of licences for selling fish, horticultural or agricultural produce (other than meat) or articles made by the holder of the licence or a member of his family.

Many hawkers whose licences expire on March 31 will have to apply at least 30 days in advance of that date for the new licences but stall traders will not be required to take out casual trading licences until their certificates expire.

The Act does not apply to farmers selling their produce, fishermen selling their catches, door-to-door salesmen, newspaper sellers and a few other classes of traders who could not be tied to selling at designated places.

In towns which have adopted the Street Trading Act, 1926 places where street trading may take place are already designated and the local authorities in these urban areas have been given a maximum of two years in which to designate casual trading areas under the Casual Trading Act.

The Street Trading Act was never adopted as it was opposed by the casual traders who claimed the right to trade in the traditional market areas of the town of which the square, around which in recent years all the controversy has raged, is one.

As a first step, the Urban Council which is the statutory authority for the town will have to draft, discuss and approve of the necessary bye-laws before the new Act can be enforced and in this regard the most difficult aspect for the local Councilors will be in reaching agreement as to where the designated area in the town in which casual traders may operate should be.

Even if they were to apply themselves to this exercise without delay it could well be another twelve or eighteen months before such bye-laws are approved and sanctioned so no immediate abatement of the problem which has seen the square taken over by the hawkers on the third Wednesday of each month in recent years can be expected.

The second then that the Urban Council move in this direction the sooner they will be able to operate under the new Act and regulate the casual trading in the town in the way in which they are provided for in the Act. Persons convicted of an offence relating to trading without a licence or permit from the Council will be liable to a fine of up to £500 and the Local Authority will be liable to a fine of up to £5,000.

Other penalties in the case of a continuing offence, a fine not exceeding £250 per day, or for up to 12 months imprisonment. On summary conviction the maximum fine is £100.

Officers appointed by the Minister, officers appointed by the local authorities and the Gardaí will have the task of enforcing the Act. In addition to the customary powers of authorised officers, the Gardaí will have power to arrest offenders without warrant and to seize and detain their goods.

MUCH TRAVELLED MINISTER OF STATE

In the course of a reply to a Dail Question on January 27 in which Mr. Gerry E. Collins (F.G.) asked for the mileage covered in State cars by the Taoiseach, each Minister and Minister of State for the 12 months period ended December 31, 1980, the Minister for Justice, Mr. Gerry Collins, revealed that the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey, clocked up a total of 44,224 miles for the year. Mr. S. J. Wester Barrett, Minister for Defence, had a mileage of 49,897 while Mr. Collins himself had covered 49,387 miles.

In the list which covered the Taoiseach and 31 Ministers and Ministers of State all, with the exception of three, were in the 30 and 40 thousand miles bracket with the exception of Mr. J. Fahey, Minister of State at the Department of the Environment who was credited with having travelled a total of 54,381 miles in his State car during the year to make him the most travelled Minister in the Government in 1980.

Another question in the Dail on the same day showed how much the value of the E has dropped in the ten years since 1970. The Taoiseach told Mr. P. Harle (F.G.) that at mid-February 1980 (mid-February is one of the periods of the year in which the value of the pound is estimated) on the basis of the consumer price index it would require £3 49p to purchase the same quantum of goods and services at retail prices as £1 would have purchased at the same period in 1970.

Proposed by Councillor Jim Harley, himself from the Ring, it was seconded by Councillor Katherine Bulbulia, the first woman to be ever elected to the County Council who showed her elation when she declared that Caitlin Kelly's achievement was another "first" for the ladies. COUNTY COUNCIL NAIL AN UNFOUNDED RUMOUR

A letter from the Dept. of the Environment notified members of Waterford County Council at a County Council meeting in Dungarvan last Monday that Road Grants for 1981 totalling £1,351,000 had been allocated to the Council.

When members were asked to comment on the letter Deputy E. Collins said: "Isn't enough that's all." Thereafter a public statement made by a former member of the Council back 210,000 of last year's allocation to the Department because it was unused. It was stated that the statement had not now a member of the Council but who held another office.

Wilson, T.D., that Dungarvan was not included among the projects in the National Programme for recreational facilities as announced on April 19 last year and that there were no additional funds at the disposal of his Department from which assistance could be made available for it.

That, as the fellow said, it was no longer a member of the Council and she agreed to discuss the matter further in view of what the County Engineer should be asked to do. Deputy E. Collins remarked that more time in his office instead of travelling around he might know more about what was going on.

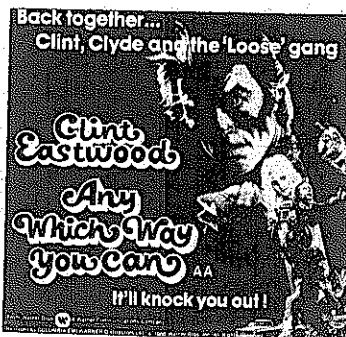
