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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**ANNUAL ST. PATRICK'S PARADE**  
The annual industrial parade organised by the Dungarvan Pipe Band will take place in Dungarvan on St. Patrick's Day (Tuesday next). Chief Marshal for the parade will, as usual, be Pat McGrath and during the week he told me that the parade will include four bands — the Brass and Pipers Bands of Dungarvan, the Lanigan-Burke Pipe Band, Abbeyside and the Castlelons Pipe Band.  
Fifty entry forms were sent to various groups, clubs and industrial concerns inviting them to participate in the parade and to date about half have replied. The Committee in charge are anxious to know the intentions of the other groups contacted and would like to hear from them, one way or the other, by Monday next at the very latest.  
The assembly point for the parade will, as in previous years, be at the Burgery at 2.30 p.m. and the route will be the usual one followed with the VIP Review Stand at the Square.  
Trophies for the six best entries under various categories will be awarded following an adjudication at the Square at the end of the parade.  
It is to be hoped that all groups, clubs and industrial concerns who have been invited to participate in the parade will co-operate with the organising committee by taking part and in maintaining the high standard set by the parade in former years.

**PLANNING LAWS AND THE GAELTACHT**  
In the lead story of the current issue of "Rosca," Conradh na Gaeltachta's bilingual newspaper, the Conradh states that "the present planning laws are endangering the very existence of the Gaeltacht."  
Citing planning controversies affecting three different Gaeltacht areas, the Conradh claims that An Bord Pleanála and the County Councils, when dealing with planning applications, consistently ignore the effects of the proposed developments on the Gaeltacht as a Gaeltacht and that the Gaeltacht will continue to be eroded until such time as cultural and linguistic factors are taken into account when dealing with planning applications for the areas.  
The article then goes on to state that "one would have thought that the Government would have realised the urgency of defusing the situation. On the contrary, the problem has since spread to the Waterford and Cork Gaeltachts — Gaeltacht na Rinne and Oileán Chloire in particular. Unwilling to witness the demise of their communities, an action committee was formed in An Rinn and direct action taken which resulted in the postponement of the developer's plans."  
Pointing out that Udaras na Gaeltachta had now asked the Minister for the Environment to make it mandatory to have them consulted on planning applications relating to high-stakes areas, the article stresses that more than consultation is needed by Udaras na Gaeltachta. It is responsible for the preservation and the extension of the Gaeltacht. It ought not to think its responsibility. Consultation is not enough on its merits. It must press for legislation making it the overall planning authority for the Gaeltacht. Less than that is "too little. The very existence of the Gaeltacht is at stake."  
It is of interest to note in this regard that Waterford County Council at their February meeting agreed to formally "vote" a resolution from the Galway County Council on the lines set out in the "Rosca" article holding that as far as the Ring Gaeltacht was concerned, the Council had always given a fair crack of

February as the national unemployment total rose for the 15th successive month. At the end of last month the jobs total was 126,256, an increase of more than one-third on the February 1980 total of 92,354.  
Both these situations paint bleak pictures and the unemployment crisis especially is a clear indication of the continuing severe impact of the economic recession.

### HARMONISING THE START OF SUMMER TIME

The Minister for Justice, Mr. G. Collins, T.D. has made an Order entitled "Winter Time Order, 1981," varying the periods of winter time in 1981 and 1982 and has presented it to both Houses of the Oireachtas (the Dail and Seanad) for approval. This approval was given on Tuesday last.  
The effect of the Order will be that summer time will commence on March 29 in 1981 and on March 28 in 1982 — one week later in each case than prescribed in the Standard Time (Amendment) Act, 1971. A minor effect of the Order will be that the time of change from summer time to winter time and vice versa will be 1 a.m. in the morning (G.M.T.) rather than 2 a.m.  
The Order was made pursuant to an EEC Directive harmonising the starting date for summer time in 1981 and 1982 in all the EEC member States.

### RARE CLONMEL ARTS WEEK

A note from Tom Reddy of the Clonmel Nationalist tells me that Clonmel's first ever Arts Week will run from Sunday next, March 15 to March 22. The events will include music recitals, concerts, drama, films, light opera, poetry and exhibitions.  
The Arts Festival, which cost €5,000 plus, will start on Sunday night when RTE personality, Andy O'Mahony, himself a Clonmel man, will officially open the proceedings in the presence of Clonmel Mayor, Ald. Carrie Acheson and other V.I.P's.  
In the words of the Festival Chairman, "The idea of an arts week for Clonmel was based not on creating a new event, but in co-ordinating the substantial number of cultural events that already existed in Clonmel, to give birth to a festival, accessible to all."  
In striving for this balance, the fifteen strong committee have drawn up a diverse programme with more than 25 separate events. The two greatest coups are the visits of noted folk musician Martin Carthy and the Yorkshire Savoyards, Carthy who is one of the folk world's top performers and an ex-member of Steeleye Span plays a special concert in Hearn's Hotel on the 16th while the Savoyards group who are well-known to Gilbert and Sullivan enthusiasts and for their successes at the Waterford Festival of Light Opera will present a variety of some of the best and not so well-known Gilbert and Sullivan melodies at the White Memorial Theatre on the 20th and 21st.

### Further Prison Sentences For Youghal Man

An unemployed Youghal labourer is presently serving a 12 months sentence imposed on him three weeks ago given two further concurrent three month sentences when he appeared in custody before District Judge P. O'Connell at Youghal Court.  
James Hogan, Dr. Kennedy pleaded guilty to assaulting "Faddy" West at Fallow Street on October 11 thereby occasioning him actual bodily harm. He also pleaded guilty to a second offence of using a knife to inflict grievous bodily harm on Rea on the same occasion.  
Mr. P. Ryan said Hogan broke in the front door of the premises where Rea was staying. The injured party was in bed and Hogan assaulted him by striking and kicking him. As a result Rea received a number of injuries. Only three months ago Hogan was sentenced to 12 months at Waterford Circuit Court on further assault charges. He had a long list of previous convictions and was a man who completely loses his head in drink.  
Mr. Patrick J. Lavan, Solicitor, said when Hogan took a few drinks his so-called friends took advantage of him and egged him on.  
The District Justice sentenced Hogan to three months imprisonment on each of the two charges. The sentences to run concurrently and also concurrently with the 12 months he is presently serving.

Callery stated that the National Debt at December 31, 1977 amounted to €4,229 million while the figure for the year ended December 31, 1981 was provisionally estimated at €7,900 million.  
To a question asked by Deputy Noel Browne, Mr. Callery replied that it was estimated that the overall cost to the Exchequer in 1981 of servicing the public debt would be €984 million.

### No Grant For Repairs To Cathal Brugha Houses

In the Dail last week Deputy Austin Denis asked the Minister for the Environment if he would consider a grant available to enable repairs to be carried out to 62 houses in Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, in view of the major defects and lack of facilities in the scheme as the local urban council cannot deal with the matter in an expeditious manner because of lack of funds.  
In his reply the Minister stated that a grant available to the council for the maintenance and management of their rented housing estates. "I understand," he added, "that Dungarvan Urban Council are carrying out a major repair and improve-ment works to these houses on a phased basis, financed from their own resources including the proceeds of sales of Council houses. There are no funds available to me out of which a specific grant could be made to the Council to speed up the work because of the limited resources of the council and the fact that the council had to raise the capital monies for the provision of badly needed new local authority housing."

The I.D.A. policy is to encourage native enterprise and thus create jobs in new towns and villages that would otherwise find it difficult to attract large industries.
