PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

NO CHANGE IN SYSTEM
In case there may have been caused by reports of the last meeting of the South Eastern Local Health Committee concerning the ongoing controversy about the establishment of a casualty service in Dungarvan and in which a prominent member of the County Council is recorded as having declared that there was "a break-through," I want to say that inquiries which have made into the matter reveal that in fact there has been no change in the system.

The published account of the meeting at which an official report by an officer of the Health Board was discussed seemed to infer that something new had taken place and that the service was now to operate as originally planned.

From my inquiries I understand that a room and a nurse are available at the Ardkeen hospital. This unit were to be provided at the Ardkine hospital. This unit was closed last year to provide space for a paediatric unit at the hospital but the CEO of the Health Board, Mr. P. G. McQuillan, has stated that all appear that neither the Health Board nor the Hospital want to accept any responsibility for the service so things are just going to go on as they have been.

This means that the local doctors will continue to work on a rota basis as they have been doing in the past and will deal with any casualties which may occur on a status quo basis. There has, in fact, been no break-through, the status quo obtains and the local doctors will continue to operate the service as they have been doing.

SUB-POSTMASTERS SEEKING A BETTER DEAL

The Irish Postmasters' Union in a recent Press Release point out that the incomes of sub Post Offices throughout the country are dropping dramatically. Stressing the fact that Sub Offices perform an essential public service in each area where one is located and that they handle millions of pounds each year dispensing the money to Old Age Pensioners, Widows, etc., it points to the fact that over half of all Postmasters of these Sub Offices earn a gross figure of less than £48 per week.

It is of interest for the public to note that when an applicant is seeking the position of Postmaster of a Sub Office there is one qualification which the applicant needs: which is probably unique, that is, he or she must have a premises which is suitable and in the right place.

Each appointment is made on the basis of a sub-contract and the Postmaster is paid only on the number of transactions performed and if there are insufficient transactions to make a living wage, then the Postmaster is told that this is his or her bad luck. Of course, the Department can reply to this by pointing out that these offices are invariably located in premises where other business is conducted but the fact remains that a Postmaster must keep the premises open for at least 5 days each week even though there may be times when no business is being carried.

The Postmasters' Union has now called on the Government to examine, as a matter of urgency, the system of remuneration of Sub Post Offices and to give them a fair and reasonable return for the responsible work which they carry out.

A STORM IN A TEA CUP?

For the past week two representatives of the French town of Tullins, which is located in the department of Isere in the South-East of France near the Italian-Swiss border have been on a visit to Dungarvan where they are investigating the desirability and feasibility of twinning their town, which has a population of 7,500, with Dungarvan. They were Monsieur Jean Paul Papet, a member of AIB at Lawlor's Hotel.

Over the weekend they toured the various beauty spots around Dungarvan and on Monday they paid visits to the town's principal industrial centres.

I was told that they included teachers or their wives, nurses, people in the public service, the wives of members of the Garda force and the wives of professional people. In these days of so much unemployment, especially among young people, it is nothing less than a scandal that these jobs which are estimated to net about £500 for each so appointed should have been given to such people.


