PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

A GREAT DAY FOR DUNGARVAN
 Easter Sunday was a great day for Dungarvan as hundreds of cyclists, old and young, gathered in brilliant sunshine at the town carpark for the start of the local Lions Club 20 mile sponsored cycle tour.

From mid-day on, the crowds began to gather and the carpark was full of eager cyclists as the 12.30 p.m. starting time approached.

Following an impressive but simple ceremony which was presided over by Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P., V.F., blessed all taking part, expressing the hope that all would enjoy the outing and that they would return home safely, the tour was officially started by Waterford's international star long-distance runner, John Treacy.

Led by the Dungarvan Pipe Band and headed by Dungarvan's international champion walker Jim Sheehan and John O'Brien on his bicycle in a "ponny-farthing" bike, the cyclists took off from Mary Street and travelling via O'Connell Street to Cappagh and then on to Boherwillin Cross where they swung left to Whitechurch they proceeded back to Carriglogh and then to the Dungarvan Crystal factory where the circuit ended.

It was an impressive sight to see the hundreds of cyclists stretched along the road and many groups of cyclists "parade" from vantage points here and there along the route. By and large and despite the fact that the majority of the cyclists were young, some indeed of tender years, the tour was conducted in an orderly manner with very little interference with ordinary traffic on the roads. Garda motor cycle patrols and the stewarding organised by Lions Club members worked very efficiently along the 20 mile route.

It is to the credit of all who took part that everyone completed the course with only one or two minor incidents and although all looked tired (but tanned) after the three-hour spin, all expressed satisfaction at having taken part.

The proceeds from the tour will be disbursed by the Lions Club in assisting the newly-established Down Syndrome School and the CBS Building fund in the town.

WHAT IT ALL COST
 Back to Census '81 to which I referred a couple of weeks ago. There is one main reason why I refer back to the subject but before getting to this I want to deal with some other aspects of the exercise. The census forms have now almost all been gathered up and will be transferred to the Central Statistics Office which will proceed to analyse the forms and come up with answers for the many (several very silly) questions asked in them.

The total cost of the census is estimated at £5.5 million according to information given by Mr. S. Moore, Minister of State at the Department of the Taoiseach in the Dail on April 7, a couple of days before it broke up for the Easter recess (or whatever). Mr. Moore at the time was replying to a question put down by Mr. Sean Treacy, T.D. which also asked for the number of persons, male and female, appointed as census enumerators in Counties Tipperary and Waterford, the recruitment procedure and the number of persons appointed who were registered as unemployed.

Having dealt with the cost, Mr. Moore went on to say that 29 persons were appointed to a regional supervisory role following a publicly advertised competition in July 1980 and 298 field supervisors were appointed following a publicly advertised competition in September-October, 1980. All the supervisory posts were full-time and some 80 of the supervisors were unemployed

HEALTH BOARD TO SUE FARMERS

As Health Boards face a year of cutbacks and financial restraints, CEO's are preparing to take legal action against thousands of farmers throughout the country who owe upwards of £3 million in health contributions.

In the South Eastern Health Board where strict economies are to force savings of £1.7 million this year the patience of the administration appears to be running out with up to 11,000 farmers in the Board's area who owe a staggering £862,000.

Mr. Peter McQuillan, CEO, told the April meeting of the SEHB "there are about 11,000 farmers who owe contributions, some for several years. In some cases no payment has been made since the Health Act was introduced."

"It is intended to start the legal proceedings initially in the cases longest outstanding where liability is straightforward and clear and to use the civil bill procedure."

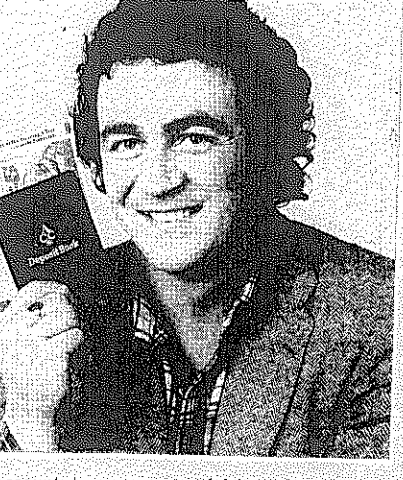

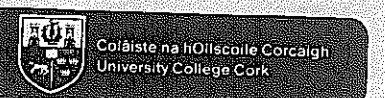

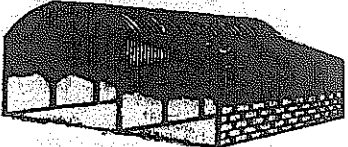
