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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

THREE FOR FINE GAE
As forecast in this column a few weeks back, the Fine Gael Party in the Constituency of Waterford is to have three candidates in the forthcoming general election. A terse Press statement issued by Mr. Danny Cunningham, Constituency P.R.O. on Tuesday last simply stated: "The National Executive of Fine Gael have decided to add a third candidate to contest the general election. The third candidate is Clr. Katharine Bulbulia."

However, this rather bald statement hides the great amount of "to-ing and fro-ing" which has been going on behind the scenes in recent months within the Fine Gael Party on this issue of whether two or three candidates should be put forward in Waterford. Originally a meeting of the Constituency Council in Dungarvan decided after a rather tense interlude that two candidates only should be selected but rumours were rife subsequently that this result came about when efforts by Clr. Bulbulia to have one selected were successfully blocked. Disappointed but not dismayed at the outcome, Clr. Bulbulia continued her campaign and prepared for the next hurdle which was the Party selection Convention.

This vital meeting was held in Dungarvan some three weeks ago and the interest in it was displayed by the fact that a crowd of over 600, of which 313 were branch delegates, attended. Five candidates put their names forward but only four contested as former Waterford Mayor Stephen Rogers withdrew before a vote was taken. The quota for selection was declared at 104 votes and only one candidate was needed to reach a decision. The two outgoing Deputies, Deputy Eddie Collins polling 110 votes and Deputy Austin Deasy, 108, were both declared selected by having exceeded the quota.

But Clr. Bulbulia, a doctor's wife from Grantstown in Waterford City, made a remarkable showing with 52 votes to be third in line and she showed no lack of stamina in her efforts to gain her political ambition when she declared the following day that she still was not satisfied and that she would make a direct approach to the Fine Gael Leader, Dr. Garrett Fitzgerald, to request that he exercise his prerogative to add her name to the list of candidates.

The success of her lobby came to light when it was announced on Wednesday night of last week that Dr. Fitzgerald had in fact decided that Clr. Bulbulia's name should go forward as the Party's third candidate in Waterford so now she joins Deputies Collins and Deasy on the Fine Gael ticket and will face the electorate with the other candidates whenever the general election takes place.

The timing of the election which, up to now, was generally expected to take place sometime during the last fortnight in May, might now be altered because of the Sands crisis in the North. Should Sands die on his hunger strike, an acceleration of street violence is expected in the Six Counties and political commentators feel that this places the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey in a cleft stick as it would not be an opportune time to have a political vacuum in the Republic at a time when trouble could heighten in the North.

As I have already said, in regard to the timing of the election, the decision is one entirely for the Taoiseach and we can only await the outcome of events to see what this will be.

In this regard there are none of us blameless. A little extra effort and practical commitment may be all that is necessary to break the 'sound barrier'. There can be no place for cynicism nor defeatism in a movement like ours: such could not exist side by side with idealism. There would be difficulties, apathy and frustration, but these are outweighed by support and optimism. Ar aghaidh leis an gceol."

We're Finished With Christmas Lights Dungarvan Traders Tell Council

Unless alternative arrangements are made in the meantime it could well mean that Dungarvan could have no street lighting for next Christmas. This was the message which came to the surface at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night when a deputation from the local Traders Association told the Council "we're finished."

The Traders deputation consisted of Messrs. James Mount, Chairman, John O'Flynn, Chairman of the O'Flynn, and Mr. Mount told the Council that they had been responsible for erecting the special street lights but because of the special effort made last Christmas extra lights and equipment had to be purchased to a total of £1,800. The BSB charges came to £600 bringing the total outlay involved to over £2,400. They had trouble in collecting the contributions to be made by the traders, particularly the larger concerns, and as a result they had to go to the Bank to raise a loan to meet their commitments. He said that they had taken on the job again last Christmas as people had been very dependent on the previous year when there had been no lights.

"I'm afraid Mr. Mount then told the Council, 'that all the gas, which we have and go around begging for money from the traders to pay for the lights and so we have come here to ask the Council to take over responsibility for the lights in the most possible manner. Mr. John O'Flynn said that there was a thankless job as the lights were not to be around for money, they went 'When there were no lights a couple of years ago,' he recalled, 'we were called a ghost town but we had one of the best, like towns in Munster last Christmas.' 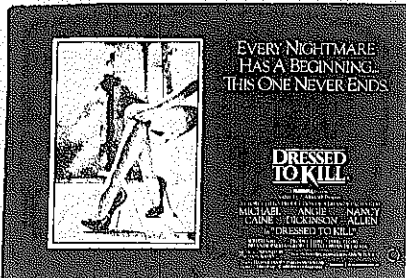

Warning By Irish Leathers Group That They May Close Tanneries At Dungarvan And Portlaoigh

Irish Leathers Ltd. two of whose three tanneries are located at Dungarvan and Portlaoigh, have warned that unless they can continue to use a quarry near Carrick-on-Suir for the disposal of tannery effluent they will be left with no option but to close down their entire operations with the loss of about 1,000 jobs.

Planning permission for the use of the quarry has already been given to the company, despite mounting protests by people living in the vicinity. The company has now reaffirmed when permission was given to An Bord Pleanála in 1974 that very stringent conditions have been attached to it.

Local people, however, are continuing to protest, and in the light of the controversy now raging over the use of the quarry, the management of Irish Leathers Ltd. have issued a statement in which they state that they will close their tanneries at Dungarvan and Carrick-on-Suir with the loss of all 1,000 jobs.

FOR NINE YEARS there say they have been using the quarry at Clashnamuth for the disposal of effluent and in that time no cause any environmental damage. The site, they say, was selected upon consultation with officials in South Tipperary Co. Council search had been conducted.

The statement continues: "In anticipation of that quarry filling up, a further extensive survey was commenced seven years ago by the company, assisted by South Tipperary Co. Council, to locate a suitable site. The site, which would meet the necessary requirements, other than the fact that it is located at Clashnamuth."

The company go on to point out that before planning permission was granted in 1974, a full-scale investigation was carried out by a team of experts from the various State bodies, concerned with the protection of the environment to ensure that the quarry would meet the requirements of the Planning Authority.

The Planning Authority now grants permission to the company is subject to strict compliance with conditions designed to protect the environment. The statement adds:

A motorist who was described as totally irresponsible towards himself and other road users was fined a total of £100 and disqualified from driving for three months when he was convicted on three counts by District Justice W. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court. The charges were a sequel to a collision between two cars which occurred near Barry's Cross on February 10, as a result of which Patrick Hickey, Ballinacorney, was charged with dangerous driving, failing to stop and failing to report an accident.

Nicholas Kirwan, Lickendurra, in evidence said that on February 10 he left his home with his wife and two children to drive to the shop at Barry's Cross. He was driving on his own side of the road when a car came against him from the opposite direction which he estimated was travelling at 70 m.p.h. The car struck him and took off all the top of his head, including the driver's door which was swept off its hinges. The car did not stop and he reported the matter to the Gardai.

Garda C. Kieley, Dungarvan said that following the report he issued the summons for the defendant. Three days later he was taken to Tralee where he was held in custody. He was released on bail and his wife and children were removed. He met Hickey and told him he had been involved in an accident and cautioned him to report the matter to the Gardai.
