## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**ELECTION '81**  
With only a week to go to polling day in the general election, the political parties are all now working in top gear and the latest opinion polls on a national basis indicate a contest which will be fought on a very tight margin. Mr. Haughey still holds a slight percentage advantage. What the eventual outcome will be will depend on the events which occur in the coming week and the manner in which the electorate accept or reject the credibility of the contesting parties and their leaders as they continue to place their policies before the public.

Nominations closed at 12 noon on Tuesday last and here in the Waterford constituency there were no surprises beyond the announcement last week-end that we were to have a candidate representing the H-Block/Armagh Committee in the person of Muzo Prison hunger-striker Kevin Lynch. This leaves us with a total of nine candidates for four seats but despite the see-saw swing in the overall opinion polls (for what these are really worth) I still believe that the status quo will hold in this constituency with two each being returned for Fianna Fail and Fine Gael.

However, the contest should hold more than academic interest and a good deal of attention will centre around the fortunes of Aid Paddy Gallagher, the city based Sinn Fein Workers Party candidate, who could well prove to be the fly in the ointment where the major parties are concerned. Gallagher was in contention for the last seat in the '77 election and now claims that he has since consolidated, and improved his position especially in some of the rural areas of the constituency.

I do not believe that the introduction of the H-Blocks candidate will appreciably affect the outcome of the election here and I could be a strategic error for the H-Block Committee to test the support for their cause in such a contest as a general election, the prime aim of which is to elect a government for the country. Kevin Lynch their candidate is affiliated to the Irish Republican Socialist Party (IRSP) which has a military wing in the Irish National Liberation Army (INLA). A statement issued by the Socialist Labour Party through their Dungarvan Branch on Tuesday morning pointed out that they were not putting up a candidate in the constituency as they were totally committed to backing the campaign of the H-Block candidate.

While the Labour Party candidate, newcomer to the hustings, Billy Kyne is expected to poll respectably well, the party organisation behind him is not very impressive and he will be relying mainly on centres like Dungarvan and Waterford city for his support. In the overall and taking everything into consideration I believe that Waterford will remain a predictable constituency and that the final result after polling day on June 11 will see the four outgoing Deputies returning to Dail Eireann when it reassembles for its first sitting on Tuesday, June 30.

## HELVICK TRAWLER SINKS BUT CREW ARE SAVED

When their fishing trawler sank off Helvick Head last Tuesday morning, the skipper and two-man crew had to take to a life-raft from which they were later rescued.

Thomas O'Connell, skipper of the "Tiron" and his crew members Liam Ronayne of Waterford and Jimmy Moloney of Youghal, put out to sea from Helvick Pier for their fishing grounds at 5.30 a.m. But they had only rounded Helvick Head half a mile away when a ripple burst in the engine room and instantly the trawler began to ship water.

The skipper sent out Mayday messages while the crew members inflated the life raft. Soon it became obvious that the "Tiron" was sinking and the three had to abandon the trawler and take to the rough seas in the life raft.

Two other trawlers, one skippered by O'Connell's first cousin Mollie Kelly and the other by Tom Whelan, also of Helvick, picked up the Mayday message from the fishing grounds and sped towards the sick Head. Meanwhile a number of other trawlers which were berthed in Helvick Harbour also put to sea.

Another boat, the 30ft. long "Patricia Ann" which had O'Connell's brother Paddy on board, was also on the scene and safely plucked the three men from the life raft and took them to Helvick Harbour. All three were in a very shocked and distressed state.

Shortly after six o'clock on a more 20 minutes after the drama began, the "Tiron" from one final heave and sank with all aboard. Several Helvick-based trawlers looking helplessly on.

Later Mrs. Dolores O'Connell, wife of the "Tiron's" skipper and a sister of one of the crew men Liam Ronayne said it was a harrowing and distressing experience but fortunately was one that had not resulted in the loss of life.

"Luckily the life raft inflated for them otherwise there could have been a triple crowning tragedy," she said.

This amid some trepidation, having listened to the weather forecast of rain, hail and strong winds, not one would have thought a good day for a river trip, but once on board the weather steadily improved and we had a most enjoyable time going down the river Suir as far as Carrick-on-Suir, Co. Tipperary where we were to see over the castle and great house (1560). This English Tudor mansion of the house was unique at that time in Ireland where fortified dwellings still held pride of place, and unique now, in that it is in such excellent condition.

It was a restful quiet trip, cool winds and cold to stay on deck but the countryside, houses, farms, etc. could easily be watched from the warm comfortable cabin. The weather had improved so much that when we arrived at Carrick-on-Suir it was sunny and warm, so we had a most enjoyable walk around to the front of the house along what must possibly have been the moat, when the castle and house had been on an island in the Suir river.

But once at the front door, it was obvious something was amiss. The young captain of our vessel, who had kindly accompanied us to see that all was well and had met our most able guide, were there willing and waiting to show us round but the caretaker had disappeared taking the key with him.

Dr. Power, an authority on Carrick-on-Suir was faced with the difficult task of describing the inside of the house and its history, which he did extremely well, without any notes, and pointing out that the gallery hall was an unprecedented size and magnificence with a splendid stained ceiling and two stone chimneypieces, the finer of which dated 1565, stated it was made for Thomas Butler, Earl of Ormond and Osory. The rest of the house followed the same pretensions to comfort and style with apparently a good staircase, large mullioned windows and a liberal supply of privies and external offices round a large cobbled court.

The house protected by the old castle was built by Black Tom, the Anglo-philic Earl of Ormond in the hope of entertaining his kinswoman Queen Elizabeth 1st of England.

We boarded the boat for our return journey catching the 6.30 p.m. tide and once underway were given an excellent high tea and reached Waterford at 9 p.m. having enjoyed each others company and the quiet of river travel. We then made for home feeling a sincere vote of thanks was due to those who had organised our day. (R. Dowson, P.R.O.)

# Election '81

**GENERAL ELECTION APPEAL BY EDUCATION MINISTER**

The Minister appeals to all concerned to ensure that election activities to ensure that disturbances to examination students will be avoided and, in particular, to refrain from such use of loudspeakers in the vicinity of examination halls as would interfere with the concentration of the students.

## COLLINS SLATES MINISTER FOR FINANCE

Mr. Eóibh Collins, Fianna Gael spokesman on Education, speaking in Waterford said - "It appears, if we are to believe Mr. Haughey that talent like beauty is in the eye of the beholder. Speaking recently in Cork, Mr. Haughey said of his Minister for Finance, Gene Fitzgerald that 'many of his achievements are known only to those immediately involved.'"

"Who is to wonder are those lucky people who have seen the miraculous apparition of Gene Fitzgerald actually achieve something? Not the 136,000 at present out of work thanks to his monetary incompetence. Not the housewife trying to make ends meet thanks to his rising prices. Not the PAYE worker forced onto the streets by the demand tax reform. Not the farmer barely surviving the recession that is hiding agriculture. If the man has achievements, let his name let him shout them from the highest trees.

It is a price of rent they can afford to pay. The housing policy they have adopted towards assisting private finance owner-occupier to acquire his or her own home is it is against this background that the Minister has announced the Government housing package 1981 just six weeks ago in Dublin. For the members and prospective members of housing co-operatives the centerpiece of the 1981 housing package must of course be the new mortgage subsidy scheme. All of you here today will, I am sure, be familiar with the details of this scheme under which the Department of the Environment will now pay up to £1,000 to first-time owner-occupiers of grant type new houses by way of grant and special mortgage subsidy. The introduction of this new scheme is hoped, prove to be of immense benefit to the young married couple anxious to set up a home together. I know myself the difficulties young people experience in the few years of their married lives when they worry how they are going to cope with mortgage payments. The bold, imaginative step taken by the Government in introducing this scheme will be appreciated more than anyone else by these young people some of whom I dare say, are members of co-operative housing groups here today. Evidence of the interest which this scheme has evoked can be gauged from the fact that about 10,000 applications for this scheme have already been received.

The second element in the Government's housing package which must also of necessity be of particular interest to members of housing co-operatives is the decision taken to increase the amount of loan which can be advanced by Local Authorities under the Local Authority House Purchase Loan Scheme. This increase in the amount of loan maximum, the Government has also decided to increase the amount of the interest rate from 10 per cent to 12 per cent in our country.

These increases represent the fourth time in four years that we in government have responded to the harsh realities of increasing wages and housing costs. I know that the co-operative housing movement has frequently called for further and more frequent increases in these limits but I would ask that the financial implications of these increases be fully understood. Expenditure on Local Authority house purchase has increased in 1977, 1978 and 1979 by £20 million. The corresponding provision in the current year is £21 million. The Government will not have a bottomless purse into which to draw to finance house purchase loans by Local Authorities. What we do have is a sensible pragmatic and responsible approach to the whole question of housing finance.

Speaking at a Seminar on Co-operative Housing at U.C.C. last week, Mr. Jackie Cahill, Minister of State said - "Housing, as you know, has always been a priority for the policies of the present Government and our basic aim has been to ensure that every family has a house of some standard, located in an acceptable environment."

## COURT SEQUEL TO NEAR RIOT OUTSIDE DUNGARVAN HOTEL DISCO

A near-riotous situation developed outside a Dungarvan hotel when youths were refused admission to a disco. District Judge Benedict Daly was told at Dungarvan court.

The court heard that empty beer kegs, cement blocks, iron bars, and stones were hurled at three doorman, two people sustained head injuries that necessitated hospital treatment, and in all about sixteen youths were involved in the fracas.

Witness said Francis Wright, a 24 year old glass factory worker and a year old Oliver Wright, a creanery employee, both of the Burrey, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, who they pleaded not guilty to unlawfully assaulting Richard Ryan, Anthony Ryan, and Jesse Hennessy outside the hotel on the night of February 13th/14th.

Richard Ryan, Ballybeg, Waterford, told the court that he was employed as a doorman at the hotel on the night of February 13th when a disco-dance was being held. After a number of youths were refused admission they tried to force their way in and they threw a cement block through the door which Francis Wright

Witness said the mob began hurling empty beer kegs, cement blocks, iron bars and stones at him and the other two doorman and he witnesses was taken to Ardkeen hospital where six stitches were inserted in a head wound.

Ryan said he was also kicked in the chest by Francis Wright which left him bruising. He described the night witness added that the cement block was being thrown at them from all directions and the situation was a near-riotous one. He saw Oliver Wright throwing kegs and blocks and later identified both defendants at the court trial.

Replying to Mr. J. P. Gordon, solicitor, defending, witness said he thought the crowd of sixteen youths involved in the fracas.

Jesse Hennessy, Cork Road, Waterford said he was also employed as a doorman at the hotel that night. He refused admission to a number of youths who became very abusive when they were not allowed into the disco. He said that he was being thrown at by youths who were hurling beer kegs, followed by cement blocks and anything else they could get their hands on. Oliver Wright struck witness on the hand with a cement block and as a result he had to have hospital treatment though the injury was not serious.

**YOUTH CLUB PREMISES**

Dear Sir,

Through the medium of your paper, I wish to clarify the position of Dungarvan Youth Club in the quest to obtain our own full-time premises.

The attempts to obtain a premises began in late 1977. A number of different possibilities were investigated ranging from derelict buildings to sites. But all to no avail, until in May 1980, the club requested the Urban District Council to give us a site in Quans adjacent to the ground. The Council agreed and we proceeded to have the necessary tests performed on the site to establish its suitability as a location for the Youth Centre which we intended to build.

During this time, we also had plans drawn up by our architect that the site could be developed. We were very optimistic of obtaining this grant because -

(1) Since October 1980, the four local T.D.'s have been making enquiries on OMR, half the provision of a grant and we are, therefore, in many ways responsible for the provision of the 5100,000.

(2) A Youth Centre is essential to the growing numbers of young people in our community are met.

(3) A large part of the grant seems to be intended for injuries such as a pitch and net course, while some of the basic needs such as a Youth Centre are to be covered.

(4) What we are asking for is not a privilege but a social right of our Youth, it is something that has to be granted now and not put on the long-finger as is so often done.

I hope the people of the community now understand our position and will, as they have done in the past, support our cause. I would also suggest to people that they let their views be known to our public servants.

Hopefully this will result in the youth of the community getting what is rightfully theirs. I remain,

## Adult Education Diploma Course

The University College, Cork, in co-operation with the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee, propose to organise a Diploma Course in Social Studies in the following centres - Vocational School, Dungarvan.

The course is conducted by means of lecture and discussion. It involves, in addition to private study, attendance at classes on two evenings (each of three hours duration) weekly. The course is open to matriculated and non-matriculated students. An exam of average intelligence with application sheets be able to pursue a course successfully.

The course is offered to groups whose members do not share a common avocation but who are, nevertheless, actively interested in community affairs. It is a course in the light of sound social and economic principles, current issues of national and international importance. The Central and Local Government systems are studied as well as Ireland's position within the European Community.

The course will commence in October next, subject to adequate enrolments. It is for two years, each year comprising two terms, viz., October/Christmas, and January/June.

Interested persons apply to Principal, Vocational School, Dungarvan, so that preliminary enquiries may be held by a representative of University College, Cork, Adult Education Department.

## Farmer Fined £500 For Revenue Offence

A mandatory fine of £500 was imposed on Gerard Curran, farmer, Ballyroan Ring, when he was convicted at Dungarvan Court by District Justice B. Daly for failing to submit PAYE returns to the Revenue Commissioners in May, 1980. A further fine of £5 in respect of failing to submit PRSI returns was also imposed.

Mr. E. P. King, Solr., for the defendant said that the defendant stated that all the returns had since been submitted and there had been no loss of revenue to the Commissioners.

Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solicitor for the Collector General pointing out that the fine was mandatory and could not be mitigated said that the defendant could petition the Revenue Commissioners for mitigation.

## Motorist Fined And Disqualified At Dungarvan

Michael Higgins, Clontarf Upper, Leamybrien, was fined for 12 months to be disqualified from his licence when he pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court to a charge of retaining urine at Dungarvan Garda Station on Saturday night, February 28. He was also fined for retaining arrest on the occasion and an additional £40 for being drunk and disorderly. A charge of driving while drunk was withdrawn.

Supt. M. English who presided said that at 9.25 pm on Saturday night, February 28, Sergeant Hurley was driving along Strandside North, Abbeyside, when he observed the defendant's car going along the road from side to side. The car drew up and the Sergeant got out and spoke to the defendant and gave him a breathalyser test which proved positive. The defendant then informed the sergeant that he was arrested and he was arrested and taken to the station. The defendant had to be forced into the patrol car but then jumped out the other side of the car and had to be recaptured.

Supt. English went on to say that the defendant retained again but was eventually got into the patrol car. He was taken to the Garda Station where he became very abusive and had to be put in a cell until the doctor arrived. The doctor advised to give a urine sample but when he was shown the equipment he went berserk and refused all further co-operation.

Mr. Joseph Curran, Solr., for the defendant said that the defendant lost his head on the occasion and didn't realise his obligations. He was now sorry for what had happened.

District Justice B. Daly commencing the defendant imposed the penalties as stated.
