NEW TAOISEACH-NEW GOVERNMENT

After all the speculation and the conferences and the talks between Tom, Dick and Harry, the newly-elected members of the 22nd Dail assembled for the first time in Leinster House last Tuesday to elect a Ceann Comhairle and Taoiseach.

The unopposed election of Dr. John O'Connell (Indep.) as Ceann Comhairle was one of the big surprises of the afternoon. He was proposed by Deputy Peter Barry (FG) and seconded by Deputy James Tully (Lab.).

Mr. Haughey (F.P.) was then proposed as Taoiseach but the proposal was defeated by 85 votes to 79. Mr. Haughey (Indep.) voted with the 75 F.P. deputies for Mr. J. Keenan, Mr. J. Sheehy and Dr. N. Browne voted against him, with the 10 F.P. members of the Leinster abstained.

Dr. Garrett Fitzgerald (F.G.) was then proposed and was elected Taoiseach by 81 votes to 75 with the support of his Fine Gael and Labour colleagues and one of the Independents, Mr. Keenan, Mr. Lofus and Mr. Patrick Agnew (Louth) were absent.

The 2 H-Books (T.D.'s) Mr. Keenan Doherty (Cavan-Monaghan) and Mr. Patrick Agnew (Louth) were absent.
