## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**PAR FOR THE COURSE**  
We have been hearing little else from the new Coalition Government since they took office last week but that the financial state of the country was worse than they had expected it to be. In fact the new Taoiseach had not even returned to the Dail to announce who the members of the new cabinet were to be before he was stating that the coffers were bare. But of course this is a recognised political ploy by all new governments in conditioning the minds of the public to be prepared to accept the very worst. So while it is recognised that the economy of the country is in bad shape, we can only accept many of the gloomy forecasts with a grain of salt. However it is evident, even after little more than a week in office, that we are facing not only a period of belt-tightening by the government but one of full squeeze.

Politics is a funny game but the rules never seem to change. It is funny in that while the Labour Party made a particularly poor showing in the general election they now find themselves, following a series of back-room negotiations, as part of the Government. In the preamble to the Fine Gael policy document for the election, Dr. Garret Fitzgerald said that the programme outlined in it set out what their action, if elected to government, would be. It was on that programme that Fine Gael secured for itself 65 seats in the Dail. Similarly, the Labour Party secured 15 seats on the basis of their manifesto. But despite the wheeling and dealing that followed the election it is an insult to democracy to say that they won 80 Dail seats on the basis of the Fitzgerald-O'Leary pact.

Each of the three main political parties fought the election on the basis that theirs was the best programme and it was on those programmes that the people voted. But the end result did not give us a government voted in by the people but a coalition reached after much political compromise and back-room trading.

A further insult to the democratic process was the Taoiseach's inclusion in the cabinet of a man who was not elected by the people. His choice as Minister of Foreign Affairs, Professor James Douglas, an engineer by profession, cannot take up his position until he has been appointed to the Senate as a nominee of Dr. Fitzgerald. He is a family friend of the Taoiseach and a man who has served the Fine Gael party well but even in the Senate he still will not have been elected by any section as their representative. It is difficult to understand how Dr. Fitzgerald can regard such an appointment with basic democratic principles. However as I have said politics is a funny game and when you have the power, then anything, and apparently everything, is possible.

Here in Waterford, as soon as it became evident that we were to have a Coalition government, hopes soared that the Constituency would, for the first time, after a long number of years, be honoured by the appointment of a full Minister as both the re-elected Fine Gael Deputies had on the front bench spokesmen on the Fine Gael shadow cabinet in the previous Dail. But it did not turn out that way and in the circumstances it is a pity that we can count ourselves as lucky that one of the Junior Ministers came our way with the appointment of Waterford City Deputy Eddie Collins as Minister of State in the Department of Energy.

We congratulate Deputy Collins on his new appointment and wish him well, and we know from his past record that he will fill his role with

New Talks Open On Waterford Hospitals' Services

Negotiations are set to open on amalgamation of services between Ardskeen General Hospital and the Waterford City and County Infirmary following a new initiative from the south Eastern Health Board.

The Health Board has already nominated a group to meet with the representatives of the Infirmary to discuss further the possibility of fusing services at the Infirmary with those available at Ardskeen.

The negotiations originally broke down because the Infirmary representatives felt that the representatives of the Health Board had not made it clear to them that it was possible for them to participate fully in the proposed joint practices.

These discussions from late 1978 to early 1980 reached the stage of producing draft proposals which envisaged the ultimate fusion of both services in the new Ardskeen development, when it would be completed.

It is felt that the new round of talks will concentrate on arriving at some agreement on the long term future of the Infirmary in the overall context of the development of the new hospital at Ardskeen.

Previously it had been hoped that an interim arrangement could be arrived at whereby joint departments of medicine and surgery would be established in addition to the joint department of anaesthetics already in existence.

A statement which was issued in March on the breakdown in talks explained the S.E.H.B.'s position "if there is any indication that the position of the Infirmary in relation to the joint practices has altered after the reopening of discussions would be in the best interests of the development of hospital services in Waterford."

All new medical appointees to Ardskeen are informed that they may be required to participate in joint departments should these be established in the future.

NO CHANGE OF OFFICERS IN COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

It was a case of "no change" at the annual meeting of the County Agricultural Committee of Agriculture held in Dungarvan last Monday when the outgoing Chairman and Vice-Chairman, Cllr. Michael Quealy and Cllr. James A. Walsh, both Fine Gael members of the Committee were re-elected unanimously.

Cllr. Quealy's re-election as Chairman was proposed by Cllr. G. Conroy and seconded by Cllr. J. A. Walsh and supported by Cllr. C. Curran on behalf of Pádraig Fain who said that Cllr. Quealy had proved a fair and impartial Chairman during the past year and was entitled to another year in office.

Thinking the members and officials for their co-operation over the past twelve months, Cllr. Quealy said that the powers which the Committee had in the past had now been whittled away so much that they were now more than a talking shop. All they were able to do was to criticise the Minister for Agriculture and the Government when they felt it was warranted but he said that it was only right that such criticism should be voiced when necessary and provided it was constructive.

E.E.C. Help Sought For South East Coastal Protection

The South East coast of Ireland (which includes Co. Waterford) was proposed by Miss Eile de Valera, M.E.P. as an ideal location for an EEC pilot coastal protection project. Miss de Valera was speaking in the European Parliament on the resolution originally proposed by Mr. Jerry Cronin, M.E.P. on the coastal erosion in the European Community.

As a result of the Resolution put forward earlier by Mr. Jerry Cronin the European Parliament's Committee on Regional Policy and Regional Planning drew up a report on the subject. Mr. John Hume presented the report to the European Parliament last Friday.

Miss de Valera explained that only six schemes had been completed in Ireland under the 1983 Coast Protection Act. The financial resources available were totally inadequate to cope with the considerable demand for coastal protection schemes. Schemes that had been completed included areas such as Donegal, Cork and Wicklow. She said that action at Community level was crucial to help overcome the acute problems around the Irish coast.

JACK ORMONDE - A MEMORY

Jack Ormonde's death will be deeply mourned by friends of his everywhere and not least by a class fellow of his in Lismore, Christian Brothers Schools, upwards of sixty years ago and more. As memories of him are stirred there comes to mind his kind friendly face, that warm smile of his, his sturdy figure and not least, his bright good humour and his constant appearance of being supremely fit. Above all, his sterling character made him a firm favourite not only in his own class but with the entire school.

A dedicated member of the boys' football team he had few rivals in energy, skill and courage. Nowhere was this more evident than his display in a series of games with school boys from Dungarvan known as 'Father Egan's team'. No one could deny how courageously he endured a serious accidental head injury in a match in Tallinn. Like the dark cloud that never, the incident had its bright side. As Jack would himself be the first to admit, his head injury was a long and conspicuous and prolonged reminder to all and sundry, teachers and masters alike, that there was a case where no one was all impatient and irritable impulses to be restrained. The manner of his first meeting with Mr. de Valera in 1922 after a great public meeting in Lismore, a linked column of Volunteers kept back the crowd from the speaker's platform before the departure of Mr. de Valera's train. Jack, however, would not be denied. Slipping under the cord, he was across in a flash to shake the leader's hand at the carriage window. How all his class-mates in the rear envied his magnanimity and good luck! What would they have said if they could have foreseen that in the years ahead he would have a seat at the Cabinet table in Dublin with the old leader at his head.

Again, he was to prove himself a man of resource when imprisoned during the civil war. He helped to construct a tunnel through which he and others escaped. Never so he retreated. Nor could he be approached for lack of ability or thought or planning ability when some roles mysteriously disappeared from a Lismore hotel while there by visiting scholars out on the town for an hour or two themselves.

In spite of exigencies of space one word may be said of his quality of leadership, even as a schoolboy. It was he who took a major part in organising the almost total absence of all the classes from school on the day of mourning across the nation on the death of Terence MacSwiney.
