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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

A GRACIOUS ACT OF APPRECIATION

At the outset of the November monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday, Senator Katharine Bulbulia issued an invitation to her Council colleagues and to the Council Officials and Press members present at the meeting to be her guests at a little reception which she was hosting for them in Lawlor's Hotel, across the road after the meeting.

She said that by so doing she wanted to mark her appreciation for the support, help and assistance which she had received from the Council in her recent successful Senate election campaign.

The lady Senator proved to be a most genial hostess at the function which, although simple, proved to be a most effective way of expressing her appreciation to her Council colleagues all of whom, irrespective of politics, honoured the occasion.

MORE STORMS BREWING

But while this happy function was proceeding in the hotel's front lounge, nine of the Fianna Fail Party's eleven County Council Councillors had gathered behind closed doors in a room to the rear of the hotel to discuss the storms which have been raging about "the Deputy" in recent months and which have rocked the Party to its very foundations within the Constituency.

The meeting did not last very long and when the Fianna Fail Councillors eventually emerged to join their Council colleagues at Senator Bulbulia's reception all were tight-lipped. When I asked one member whether everything had now been settled he merely shook his head in a negative manner and said: "Ye Press men are too dangerous to say anything to!"

However we have learned in the meantime that the meeting was convened on the directive of the Fianna Fail County Council Whip, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally, who is also Chairman of the Council, and that Cllr. Billy Kenneally, T.D., Chairman of the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party, presided at it. I understand that Cllr. P. Kenneally explained to his colleagues that he had taken the decision to call the meeting because of the near break-down situation that Fianna Fail is in now in Waterford.

The brief meeting at which there was at least one fiery interlude ended amicably with a decision by all present to insist on a meeting with the Party Leader, Mr. Haughey, to explain their stand and to seek, once and for all, a resolution of the problems which have been besetting the Party in the Constituency. In the event that Mr. Haughey declined to meet them and follow a certain line of action I understand that several of the Councillors have it in mind to resign from the Party and sit out the remainder of the Council's term of office as independents.

If this is so then it constitutes a most serious turn in the controversy which has been tearing the Party asunder in the Constituency. It presents the Party Leader with a major problem which I feel sure he would prefer not to be called on to adjudicate. However the divisions now run so deep within the Party that it appears that no one but the Party Leader can settle the problem.

There was a follow-up to the Co. Councillors' meeting on Tuesday night when a most representative meeting of people within the Fianna Fail Party in the Western areas of the Constituency met to discuss the situation in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan. The attendance came mainly from the Dungarvan, Lismore, Ballymacarbery and Kilmacchoma districts and included County and Urban Councillors

and members of the various Comhairle Ceannairí of the area and of the Comhairle Dail Ceannairí.

The meeting fully supported the stand taken by the County Councillors last Monday and a phone call was sent to Mr. Haughey on Wednesday morning requesting him to meet members of the Party when he visits Fermoy, tonight (Thursday) to address the Comhairle Dail Ceannairí there to discuss the whole affair. The message to Mr. Haughey also contained a request that he direct that all further meetings of the Party in the Constituency be suspended until he has been fully informed of the existing state of affairs. In the event of Mr. Haughey declining to meet this request I have been given to understand that any of these meetings already scheduled will not, in fact, be held.

ADMINISTRATOR RETIRES

In the course of the Report of Chief Executive Officer P. G. McQuillan, to the November monthly meeting of the South Eastern Health Board to be held in Kilkenny today (Thursday), the members of the Board are officially notified of the retirement from office of Mr. Sean Glanville, Dungarvan, who has been Administrator in the Board's Community Care Team in Waterford and Secretary of the Waterford Local Health Committee following a long period of service to the Board.

Over a long number of years Mr. Glanville has been one of the most outstanding and most understanding officials of the Public Health Services in the County, first under the old Waterford Health Authority and in later times under the South Eastern Health Board. His help and sound advice which was derived from his wide-ranging and comprehensive knowledge of this aspect of public administration has always been made freely available to all who sought it and has been a source of help and comfort to countless people down through the years.

As he now bows out from active duty after a long and outstanding career in the Public Health Service of the County we wish him a long, happy and contented retirement.

MAIN PROPOSALS OF DUNGARVAN TOWNSCAPE PLAN

Last week Dungarvan Urban Council adopted the Townscape Plan for the town as prepared by Messrs. Keany, Quinn and Partners, Architects and Town Planners, Dublin.

In their report submitted to the Council the Planners explain that Townscape design has been defined as "the art of giving visual coherence and organisation to the jumble of buildings, streets and spaces that make up the urban environment."

Having dealt in detail with the various aspects of the town in regard to layout, buildings etc., the report then sets out the main proposals of the plan in the following terms:

"The Consultants consider that there are three serious overall problems affecting and degrading the townscape quality of Dungarvan—1, The serious visual problem of poles and wires; 2, Traffic movement and car parking; and 3, Development trends and pressures.

1. In dealing with the problem of Traffic Movement and Car Parking, the report has this to say: "The difficulties and conflicts caused by traffic movement arise out of the fact that there is a constant stream of cars and heavy vehicles following the through route through the Square, The O'Connell Street/Parnell Street (Main Street) crossing and the movement of heavy goods vehicles in and out of the Creamery add to this chaos and congestion. The ultimate possibility of a traffic relief route being constructed would go a long way towards the alleviation of these problems.

"Car parking is also a serious problem within the town centre and it is therefore most important that a strict discipline be established for car parking... and it is recommended that further off street parking be provided in the central area to the north east and north west of the Square."

With reference to the problem thrown up under the heading "Development Trends and Pressures," the report states: "Dungarvan in common with very many towns in Ireland has reached a stage where most of its central buildings, being of similar age and in broadly similar structural condition require attention. In addition to the problems associated with the structural conditions of buildings themselves, other pressures are also at work. There is pressure to "modernise" business premises and their shop fronts. There is now a growing recognition that very many good traditional shop fronts are being destroyed and featureless anonymous and garish developments put in their place.

"A development control policy is essential in this regard, but it will be very difficult to implement unless awareness of the value of good shop fronts is created. It is strongly recommended that an inventory of all existing shop fronts be made and that all be photographed."

The concluding paragraph of the 121 page plan states: "Dungarvan at the time has escaped remarkably well from the over-commercialisation and physical damage carried out in the interests of modernisation which has befallen many other towns. A critical point has now been reached where action is essential and unless prompt action is taken in the very near future serious decline in townscape quality could take place very quickly."

COULD IT HAVE BEEN A TARPON FISH?

Some months ago we referred to a strange fish that became temporarily marooned in a pool in the estuary at Barnawee, Dungarvan, and surmised that it could have been either a sturgeon or barracuda.

Now, Michael Covving, well-known local champion sea-angler has come forward with a further suggestion. Michael was one of those who saw the fish at close quarters in the first instance and having seen a photograph of a 7 1/2 lbs., 5 feet long Tarpon fish caught recently in the River Lee at the Marina, Cork, he believes that the Barnawee fish was also a Tarpon. It could be!

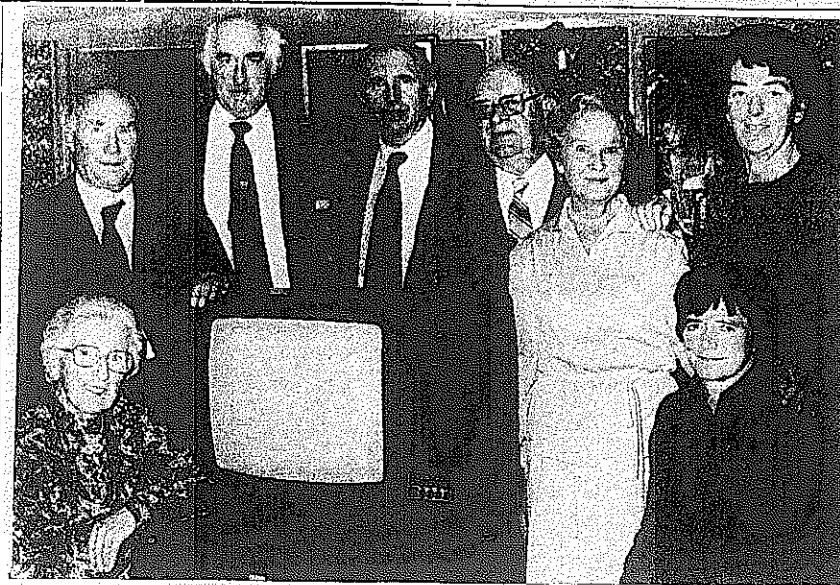
U.D.C.-Youth Club Meet Minister

Mr. Keating introduced the deputation to the Minister and detailed discussions took place during the visit. Following a specific question the Minister stated that his Department had no objection to the Youth Club's proposals to build on to the main complex. He pointed out that there may be some problems which could be ironed out locally.

He further stated that the proposals made a good economic sense and he could not see any reason why the Youth Club were not looking for any existing site in the vicinity. He had, he said, been given a completely different picture.

Councillors' Outing Was a Mess-Up

Mr. M. Keeney at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday referred to the mix-up on the previous Monday when an outing by members of the Council to visit works being carried out by the Council in the vicinity of the County Waterford Committee at Anaghurra held in Dungarvan on the same day. The members of the Council are also members of the Committee of Agriculture.

Mr. Keeney who is Chairman of the Council agreed that the mix-up had made the greatest mess-up of the outing as only half the Councillors travelled on it as a result.

Mr. P. Kenneally, Chairman of the Council, said that the clash was unfortunate as only 10 Councillors had travelled in the bus on the outing. He said that he had understood that the members of the Press who ordinarily covered the meetings of the Council in Dungarvan had been invited and this was something that should not have occurred.

It was agreed that the second planned outing of the Council to the Western areas of the county should now be postponed until next Spring due to the shortening hours of daylight at present.
