THE BRIDGE CONTROVERSY TO START AGAIN?
 The controversy surrounding proposals to alter the Dungarvan Causeway Bridge aimed from the beginning at making it safer for pedestrians, cyclists and vehicular traffic which created much controversy last year before the pressure group which opposed the proposals on the grounds that the aesthetic beauty of the structure should take precedence over safety considerations. It has been re-surveyed and from remarks made by the Council Chairman at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council it would appear that none of the old bitterness which the bridge issue generated at the time has been forgotten.

The latest onslaught has been mounted as a result of the "traffic islands" which have now been placed on the Dungarvan side of the Bridge for the purpose of directing traffic to and from the quay on one side and to and from the Shandon Road on the other.

I think that the lay-out, following the small alteration made in the "island" on the quay side, makes for a big improvement and if any criticism is to be voiced at all I believe that it should concern the "island" dividing the Shandon Road approach to the junction. I cross the bridge several times every day and since the alterations have been carried out I find a greater sense of insecurity in negotiating the Bridge from the town side as cars from the Shandon side now come up more than smartly to the very top of the thoroughfare before stopping. Despite the fact that a "yield" sign has been temporarily placed facing the Shandon Road, I have been given the impression several times over the past week and especially in the now dark evenings when going home at 6 o'clock that I have to be more wary of traffic coming from this side. This results in a break of concentration, so vital in negotiating the actual bridge itself, at a crucial point. However I presume that when the junction has been marked and lined and we have all become used to the new lay-out, or, alternatively, if the "island" was set back a little further, these initial "jitters" resulting from this aspect of the junction will disappear.

As always I believe that the danger to pedestrians, cyclists and traffic at the point arises from the Bridge itself and in its present form and with the continual growth of light traffic in the urban area no mention the heavy stuff passing through, the Bridge will continue to be a high danger zone. For this reason I was pleased to learn that the County Manager declared during the discussion at last Monday's Urban Council meeting that the whole question of the safety factors of the bridge would have to be re-opened and reassessed.

From the first salvoes fired off at that meeting it would appear that we could be in for a further chapter of the old controversy. If there is to be more of this then I would hope that it would be pursued in a more decent and restrained manner without indulging in personalities. In this regard I must deplore the attitude displayed by the remarks voiced by the Urban Council Chairman last Monday night which, although withdrawn under pressure from his colleagues, and refuted by the County Manager, should never have been made in the first place. Any discussion at this level never has and never will serve any useful purpose so let us hope there will be no repetitions.

PARTY LEADER TO INTERVENE
 As referred to in this column last week the ongoing conflict within the Fianna Fail Party in the Waterford Constituency and particularly in the Western areas of the County remains unresolved.

As stated then a number of "concerned members" of the Party did meet the Party Leader, Mr. Haughey, when he visited Fermoy to address a meeting of the East Cork Comhairle Daif Ceannair on Thursday night of last week and succeeded in convincing him of the gravity of the situation to the extent that he agreed to meet with the Party's County Council members to discuss the situation.

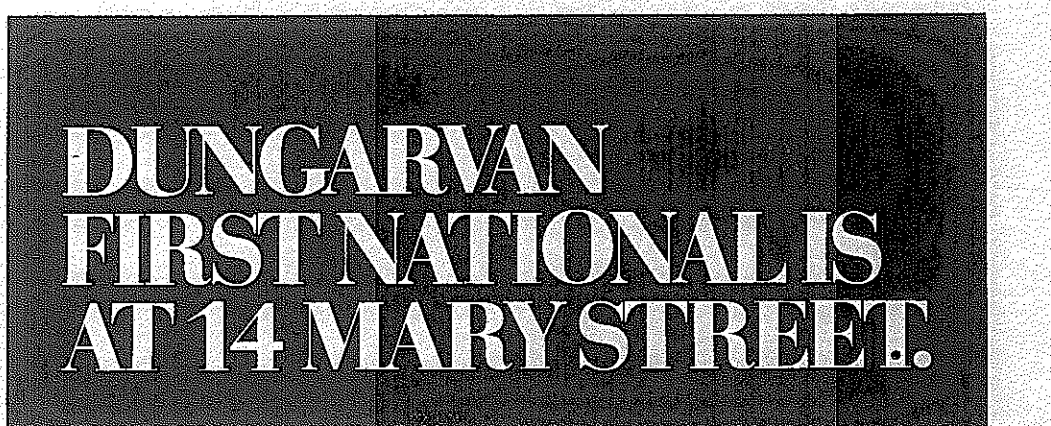

Government Scheme for payment of £9.60 a week to home-working wives

PAYMENT WILL COMMENCE 6th APRIL 1982

- The Minister for Finance has announced that he will be introducing legislation to replace certain personal allowances by personal tax credits with effect from 6 April, 1982.
- A tax credit is an amount credited against the tax chargeable on a person's taxable income.

Example of a single personal tax credit of £500

Taxable Income	£3,000
Tax Rate	25%
Tax Chargeable	£750
Tax Credit	£500
Tax Payable	£250

3. The personal tax credit of a married couple will be double the personal tax credit of a single person.

A half share will be allowable normally against any PAYE liability of the wife and any surplus will be allowed against her husband's liability.

Who qualifies for the payment of £9.60 a week?

- If you are a wife working full time in the family home (and your income is not assessed separately from that of your husband), you may opt to have one-half of the married couple's tax credit paid in cash directly to you provided that:
 - you have not an income in your own right in excess of £1,040 and
 - your husband is liable for tax and the income on which your husband is charged to tax amounts to £2,000 or more.
- If you qualify under (4) you may avail of this payment of personal tax credit by completing the form contained in this notice (or a similar form obtained from the local Tax Office).
- On receipt of the completed form the Inspector of Taxes, if he considers the

necessary conditions are satisfied, will authorise payment to you of one-half of the married personal tax credit (£9.60 a week).

- Your husband will be notified, in due course, of the payment of one-half of the personal tax credit to you:
 - in his notice of determination of tax-free allowances, if he is a PAYE taxpayer;
 - in his notice of assessment, if his main source of income is not within the PAYE scheme.
- Payment to you of the personal tax credit will be made by cheque normally issued in advance every fourth week.

Family Income Supplements

1. In addition the legislation will provide that, where the family taxable income is £2,000 or more and below £4,000, one-half of the married personal tax credit (£9.60 a week) will be paid in full to the wife working in the family home notwithstanding the fact that the husband will not be liable to pay an equivalent amount in tax. There will be marginal relief where the income is not greatly in excess of £4,000.

Example of family income supplement

Husbands taxable income is	£2,900
Tax chargeable at 25%	£725
One-half of married couple's personal tax credit	£500
Tax payable by husband	£225
£9.60 a week payable to home-working wife	£500
Family income supplement	£275

- The family income supplement payable under the taxation system during a tax-year may in certain circumstances fall below £4 a week. The Revenue Commissioners will review such cases at the end of the tax-year and provide for the topping-up of the family income supplement to the minimum figure of £208 (i.e. £4 per week). In PAYE cases marginal relief will be given by review at the end of the year.
- If you are a wife working full time in the family home, and you have not an income in your own right in excess of £1,040, and you consider that the total amount of the family income qualifies you for the family income supplement you should complete the form contained in this notice (or a similar form obtained from the local Tax Office).

The spouse, working in the home, and wishing to receive payment of the tax credit from 6 April, 1982 should complete this form and send it to the address entered at No. 11 below as soon as possible but not later than 14 December, 1981.
