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## PENSMAN YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**FAIR PLAY ALL ROUND**

On Wednesday of last week a now defunct third Wednesday monthly fair in Dungarvan Square was once again taken over by an army of itinerant traders who took possession of the Square to the detriment of the local public and everything else.

Their activities surrounded the square more frequent visits to these itinerant traders. The law came to a standstill as a series of large unattended meetings of the Dungarvan Traders Association took place in the Square, a meeting which was held with the County Manager and the Town Clerk to discuss the legal process being followed by Dungarvan Urban Council to deal with the problem as now controlled by the new Casual Trading Act.

Following assurances by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and Town Clerk, Bertie White that the Council had taken positive steps to clarify the legal position as it now stands under the Act and insofar as the old Charter granting certain trading rights in specified areas of the town including the Square might still affect it, the Traders, rather than follow their own course of action, agreed to await the outcome of the legal advice on the entire affair now being sought from a Senior Counsel who has been fully briefed on the subject by the Council's legal advisers. It is to be hoped that this option will not be unduly delayed even allowing for the slow pace at which such matters usually move.

However, apart from this procedure, I think that the situation as it has been developing in regard to the Square and as it turned out to be last week requires further comment.

Granted that the street traders have certain rights under the law as it stands, it cannot be that these rights supersede all other existing laws or indeed the rights, however limited, which the local established traders are entitled to. Surely the street traders should be subject to some system of control even if they are allowed to trade on the Square—the nerve centre of business in the town as well as the hub through which the very heavy volume of domestic and "through" traffic passes.

Last week the position had deteriorated to such an extent that the entire length of one side of the Square was completely blocked off and the local public and shopkeepers found themselves almost completely isolated. They were unable to take the delivery of goods or to make purchases as a solid wall of temporary stalls blocked every entrance and exit to their shops. Surely, no matter what the law says, this cannot be right. There must be some rule or law by which the numbers of itinerant traders who occupy the Square can be controlled and the free passage of traffic as well as access to and from the local shop premises is not obstructed. What, for instance, would the position be if a fire broke out in one of the local shops on a day when they were surrounded in this fashion and the Fire Fighting Service found the entire area obstructed? I hate to think what the consequences might be.

Casual traders may have their rights but they should not be entitled to be allowed to abuse them to the extent that they completely smother the rights of the local traders and residents. There should be fair play for all!

Another aspect of these visitations by the casual traders which I have referred to before is the scandalous mess in which they leave the town centre on their departure after a day's trading. Surely it is bending over backwards by the local authority in favour of the itinerants to allow this and then to expect

the local ratepayers to foot the bill for the early morning clean-up that has to follow. The visitors should at least be forced to take their litter with them when they leave or in the event of their failing to do this that they be penalised for converting the Square into a litter dump!

It must always be remembered that rights also bring obligations with them as there must, as I have already said, be fair play for everyone.

**A BAD EXAMPLE**

Earlier this month the Government decided that all members of the Oireachtas—Deputies and Senators—should receive an increase of 7 per cent in their salaries but it was agreed that the Junior Ministers would forgo the increase insofar as "the salary element of their remuneration" was concerned; the latter referring to the amounts over and above the usual allowances which are payable to them as ordinary members of the Oireachtas.

This latest increase will bring the "allowance" for a Dail Deputy to £13,802 per annum and for a Senator to £17,619.

The 7 per cent increase also applies to the Judiciary, and makes the Chief Justice, Mr. J. R. O'Higgins, the highest paid public servant—apart from the President—with an income of £37,297 (an increase of £2,440 over the old figure). The new figures will bring the salary of the Taoiseach, Dr. Garret FitzGerald to £35,758 and that of the Tansilise, Mr. Michael O'Leary to £29,960. All the Government Ministers, bar one, will now get £28,247, the exception being the Minister for Finance, Mr. J. J. Spence, who is not an elected member of the Dail and who, because he is on a Senator's allowance, will only be paid £22,064.

The Junior Ministers or Ministers of State will now receive £21,901 while the Co-Ordinator will get £28,258 and the Leas Co-Ordinator £22,457. The salary of the Cathaoirleach of the Senate has gone from £13,188 to £14,111 while the Leas Cathaoirleach's salary goes up by almost another £1,000 to £11,329.

Under the new scales Judges of the Supreme Court go from £28,501 to £30,197 while Judges of the High Court will get £27,405 as compared to the old rate of £25,612. Circuit Court Judges will get £22,160 (up from £20,290) while District Justices will receive £18,750, which also represents an increase of approximately £1,000 on the previous rate. The increases were backdated to June.

To say the least, it displays a rather major turnaround in the hairshirt policy of the Government to approve of these increases now and hardly supports the much repeated cry which they have been making since they took office that they had found the country's finances in a paralysed state. If matters are as bad as they claim, how can they reconcile these latest increases to themselves and more especially so at a time when they have been calling for restraint and moderation by workers and unions in regard to their wage claims.

"Euro M.P. T. J. Maher has slammed the increases, and has expressed dismay that the Government should grant such increases at a time when it was appealing to workers and others to be moderate in their demands. The Government had given bad example at the wrong time," he said.

However Mr. Maher is himself one of the highly paid members of the European Parliament and can hardly be the best person to criticise the Government here for what it has now done. But his comments are correct and should be applied equally to Euro Parliament members as well as to members of the Oireachtas. No one will deny the need to pay the going rate for any job but I feel that our Oireachtas representatives were already adequately paid

and the present cannot be accepted as the most opportune time for approving of these latest increases.

**MOVE AGAINST DERELICT SITES**

An order has been made by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, that Mr. Augustine Burke, Emerald Terrace, Dungarvan, be employed by Dungarvan Urban Council as Temporary Clerk of Works for a period of three months for the purpose of identifying, mapping and reporting on derelict sites and dangerous buildings in the Dungarvan Urban area together with the preparation of Compulsory Purchase Orders to cover the sites and buildings concerned.

The action of the County Manager in making this appointment will be much welcomed as it will help to clean up Dungarvan and remove several eyesores and dangerous buildings in the town which have been the cause of much concern in recent years.

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**Remarks Of U.D.C. Chairman Deplored By County Councillors**

At a special meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday, remarks made by the Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. H. A. Walsh, about the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Dally, in reference to the islands recently laid down at the quay side of the Dungarvan Gateway Bridge were deplored by a number of members.

The matter was raised by Cllr. J. Quirk who stated that in a report of the Dungarvan Urban Council, he had read in a local paper the previous week he saw where the Chairman of the Council, Mr. H. A. Walsh, had made a deplorable statement in which he criticised the County Engineer. The statement which alleged that the County Engineer in having the islands constructed had rendered the place ten times more dangerous than it had been was trying to prove his point to have alterations carried out to the structure of the bridge by creating an accident, there must, said Cllr. Quirk, be condemned.

Cllr. K. O'Ryan said that he wished to support what Cllr. Quirk had said and he also wished to take exception to the remarks made by Mr. Walsh about the County Engineer. "The bridge question," he said, "has already been the source of a great deal of controversy but I support Mr. Hally now and I always did in regard to the proposals which he placed before us in regard to the bridge, proposals which were dispensed with by a Minister of State at the time. What Mr. Walsh said about the County Engineer was an outlandish statement."

When Cllr. A. Deasy, T.D. pointed out that Mr. Walsh had withdrawn the remarks which he made about Mr. Hally before the discussion at the Urban Council meeting had ended, no further action was taken.

The orthopaedic operating theatre attached to one of the country's busiest accident treatment centres is to remain closed indefinitely for want of a meagre £20,000. That is the cost of a special ventilation system which consultants in orthopaedic surgery Mark Flynn, writes provided at Ardkeen Hospital to make it safe for open surgery. Mr. Flynn refuses to perform further operations in the theatre because he says a window is virtually the only source of ventilation. South-Eastern Health Board officials, however disagree with Mr. Flynn's claim that a new ventilation system is needed urgently.

The sub-standard theatre at St. Theresa's unit at the hospital has been undergoing renovation since its ordered closure six months ago. Mr. T. P. Ward, general hospital programme manager, at the November monthly meeting of the Board, said that the Board had agreed to provide an alternative theatre at a cost of £12,000 but it would be several months before this was available for installation. He did not know when operations would recommence. Secretary Katherine Bulbulia, Chairman of the Board's General Hospitals Committee said that the committee would consider the proposed operations to be resumed at the earliest possible date.

She said that Mr. Flynn was using the theatre solely for major work and closed operations in the general theatre at Ardkeen. Most of the operations were being performed by him in Killeen Hospital, 60 miles away near Kilkenny. She said it was hoped to improve provision for the ventilation system in the priority works list for the coming year which concerned the hospital's annual estimates meeting this week.

At J. Conarty's, said it was ridiculous to send patients to Kilkenny when the facilities and operations existed in Waterford. He stressed, however, that the necessary improvements would have to be carried out. The Alderman further explained that there was only one room for the ventilation system in the orthopaedic theatre. "I would not say that this should be looked into immediately," he said.

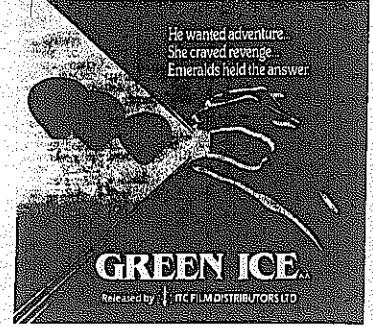

# Dairy Craftsmen Maintenance Group Formed

The second stage of what can be a major body in the industrial world was taken at a meeting held recently in Clonmel. This was the second meeting of the newly-formed Dairy Craftsmen Maintenance Group. These craftsmen, both peters and electricians, are employed in most of the major creameries in the South and South-East of the country.

**REPRESENTATIVES**  
Methonestown Co-op, Tipperary Co-op, Avonmore, Ballydoon Waterford Co-op, Golden Vale, Carbery Co-op, Westford Co-op, and Strang, were among the creameries that met at Clonmel where 42 workers expressed their hope to see all the maintenance workers in the milk processing industry formally come together, especially for wage negotiations.

Two of the people who have put a lot of time and work into this group are Billy Kynne, Dungarvan, a fitter employed by Waterford Co-op, and Sean O'Murchu, Clonmel, who works as an electrician in the Ballydoon creamery complex at Methone. In fact the entire first contact was made between workers in these two firms.

Billy Kynne is an AFMW shop steward in Dungarvan and is chairman of the group and is also spokesman of the advantages to everybody on both sides of the industry of the group.

Sean O'Murchu has proven his worth by producing a well-acclaimed DCMG house agreement booklet that initially comprised of the pay and conditions of Tipperary, Methone, Waterford and Ballydoon workers, but is now being revised to include the other creameries that joined since their first meeting on Clonmel on June 23 last.

**NEXT STEP**  
The next step for this group is to meet with their union officials to formulate a policy and it is expected that meetings with the IOU will also be organised before their next meeting, which as of today has not yet been fixed.

Speaking in Dungarvan, Billy Kynne sees in the future that at least all our members will be aware of what the pay and conditions are prevailing in the industry and I expect that we can become an effective group in the broader sense of the word. It is not only putting some input in, we only have a say in at local and shop floor level.

Following the awarding of a grant to Clonmel, Kynne has issued a challenge to the new champions and it was accepted. When Clonmel arrived on the field, where there were waiting only the Blackwater Ramblers, it could have been a very different scene. It was immaterial.

Since I began writing these articles, a number of people have contacted me about certain aspects of my activities at the time and some have asked for more information. There have been one or two contradictions. For instance a Mrs. Alice Sommers wrote to say that two and not one Waterford player travelled with the American invasion team. I have reflected on this and according to the 'Freeman's Sunday Journal' of Sept. 19th, only one of the 18 was listed as a Waterfordman. The paper did state that an M. Hickey, Currier, Co. Tipperary was one of the team. It has now transpired that he was in fact Martin Hickey, grandfather of Mick now residing in Portlaw. He was brother of the famous Dr. Michael O'Hickey, a famous character of Irish as a compulsory subject in universities. So we did have two Waterford men.

Michael Curran, Cappoquin, who is always on the ball for the Waterford history is being written about, wrote to say that Lex was not named after Queen Victoria. It had been called Queen's County since the 16th century. How to your suggestion knowledge of Queen Victoria was on the throne at the time I was writing about, so I suppose she thought she owned it.

While not continuing these articles, at least for the time being, I will reply to some of the many queries I have received next week.

# Drastic Cut In Road Accident Figures Are Possible, Seminar Told

"Research has shown that the death and injury figures on our roads could be halved if known methods of reducing accidents were implemented and implemented effectively throughout the country," said Mr. Rory Kearney of the Road Safety Association in Dublin today (14th November, 1981). "In 1979 we predicted how many people would be killed and injured on our roads in 1980, and with the exception of the pedestrian figures, we were regrettably correct. The real tragedy is that a drastic cut in accident figures is possible."

Dr. Thomas Greig, Director of the National Rehabilitation Centre in Rockstown Avenue, Co. Dublin, said that in the case of a young quadriplegic or severe brain injury, £300,000 was an unduly small amount of the cost and loss to the individual insurance companies which often exceed £500,000. Some 150 cases of fractures of the spine were admitted to the Centre each year. More than half of these were from road traffic accidents. In some twenty of the road accidents, there is permanent paralysis from the waist down or from the neck down. This is a wheelchair — never get a bus. Dr. Greig suggested that the Government's investment in the National Road Safety Association, the cost of one severe accident — be reviewed more realistically. Perhaps a small contribution from the tax on petrol might be appropriate.

**EFFECT OF DRUGS**  
The detrimental effects of drugs on driving was described by Dr. A. Dunne, Director of the Psycho-Endocrine Centre, Department of Psychiatry at U.C.D. There were serious road safety implications in the widespread use of both prescription and non-prescription drugs in our modern society. A fresh look at legislation and its enforcement in this area was urged by Dr. Dunne.

Dr. James O'Hanlon, Professor of Traffic Science at Cranfield University in the Netherlands, told of a research programme recently carried out in Holland to test the effects of valium on drivers. Expert police drivers were used as subjects and the results showed that even small doses of the drug which is the most commonly used tranquilliser in Ireland could have significant effects on some normally expert drivers, turning them into high accident risks.

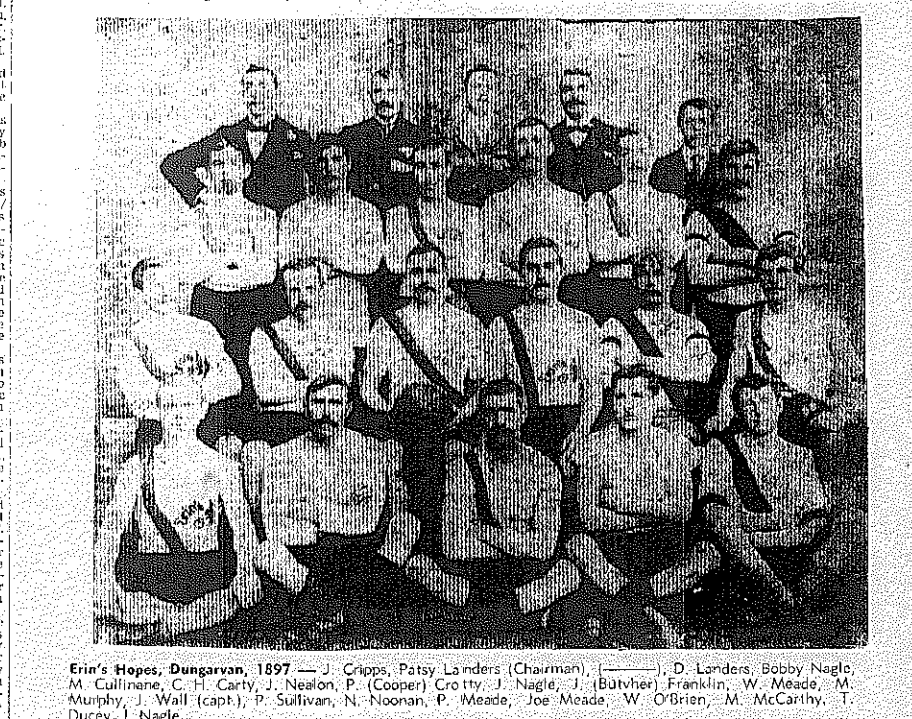

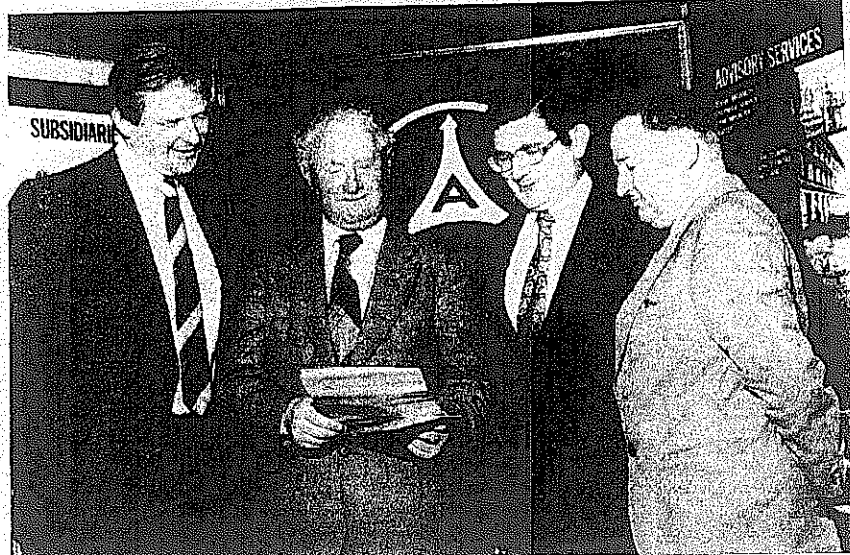
