MORE GOOD INDUSTRIAL NEWS FOR DUNGARVAN

The formal announcement by Minister of State, Eddie Collins, at a Press Conference held at the Cloneda Hotel, Dungarvan, last Tuesday afternoon that the Sterling Drug Corporation was to establish a new manufacturing facility in the town will come as the best possible kind of Christmas present for not only the people of the town and district but also of West Waterford in general.

Lines were blown down leaving many areas without electricity and telephone communications were disrupted all over. However, to give credit where credit is due, repair gangs from the ESB and Department P.G.T. worked round the clock until the widespread damage had been put right.

LIIONS CLUB CHRISTMAS SWIM

Sterling Plant Will Mean 160 Jobs For Dungarvan

ANNOUNCEMENT BY MINISTER OF STATE COLLINS MAKES IT "A WONDERFUL DAY"

The Minister for State at the Department of Industry and Energy, Mr. Eddie Collins, T.D., announced on Tuesday, 15th December at a press conference in Dungarvan that the Industrial Development Authority has finalised negotiations with Sterling Drug Inc., a leading worldwide pharmaceuticals company to build a manufacturing facility for fine chemicals in Dungarvan. Mr. Collins said that according to preliminary plans, the plant will employ approximately 160 persons and provide for additional employment in succeeding years.

The project represents another step in Sterling's ongoing capital expansion programme, which includes major manufacturing and research facilities nearing completion in Epsom, England.

Mr. Collins announced that construction of the chemical facility on a 40-acre site in Dungarvan (on the outskirts of the town at Youghal Road) is expected to begin early next year with completion scheduled for the first half of 1984.

Under the plans, the plant will be used with chemicals from other sources for the production of pharmaceuticals. The plant, which will be owned and operated by STERLING LTD., is expected to total more than 100,000 sq. ft.

Sterling is a diversified pharmaceuticals company which has 75 manufacturing plants in 48 countries around the world. Its products include the research and development, manufacture and distribution of a wide range of pharmaceuticals, proprietary products, household and industrial chemicals, cosmetics, toiletries, medicines and a range of environmental and chemical products.

Mr. Collins said that the plant will be a major employer in the town and will be a welcome addition to the local economy. He said that the plant will be a major employer in the town and will be a welcome addition to the local economy.

OTHER DEVELOPMENTS IN DUNGARVAN

Stafford Miller Ireland Ltd. another major U.S. healthcare company commenced production in its new 40,000 sq. ft. factory in Dungarvan in October. The company already employs 40 persons and plans to create employment for 131 at full production.

Mr. Collins said that the two new 3,000 sq. ft. factories being constructed in Dungarvan by the IDA will be ready for occupation in the next few weeks and are reserved for Munech Ltd. and Electroplating and Engineering Services Ltd.—local firms which have been approved under IDA's Small Industries Programme for expansions which will result in the creation of an additional 34 jobs.

Construction has commenced, he said, on a 20,000 sq. ft. extension to the company's factory at Cappoquin and recruitment is expected to begin within a few weeks.

Mr. Collins added that the IDA's 10,000 sq. ft. advance factory at Cappoquin—being financed by local private investment—was well underway and would be ready for occupation in the next few weeks.

Mr. Collins thanked Mr. Frank Burke, Regional Manager, IDA, Waterford, who presided at the function for organising the Press Conference at short notice. He joined in welcoming the new Company to the County and wished them every success for the future.

CONFIDENCE IN IRISH WORKFORCE

Councillor P. Kennedy said that as Chairman of Waterford County Council he welcomed the good news of our Minister of State and he wished to extend the confidence of the people of the County, a Cead Mile Fáilte to the executives of Sterling Drug Corporation and wished them success in their operations.

"To Sterling Drug I say you could not have made a better choice of location than Dungarvan. You will meet a first-class workforce, people and unassuming people, infrastructure of a high quality and understanding officials of the local authority."

"I am pleased to hear that the workforce at full production will number 350 and this indeed is good news for the unemployed in Dungarvan and West Waterford."

"I commend the efforts of the Regional Manager of the IDA, Mr. Frank Burke, and his staff and the members of the County Development Team members, led by Mr. Dan Hurley, for their task is not an easy one and in attracting this project to Dungarvan you all have done a superb job and I say to you in West Waterford, keep up the good work. I am fully aware of the work that has gone on behind the scenes of the past eight months—the efforts and demands are great and today we celebrate 'Clearing the First Hurdle'."

In conclusion, Mr. Kennedy said that he wished to assure the Company every cooperation from my colleagues on the Council and I know the officials will do their best to enable the Company to have a trouble-free passage in the early days of their work programme."

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager and Chairman of the Co. Development Team expressed pleasure on behalf of the members of the Team in the official announcement and said that he was very pleased that in the first instance the Co. Council had purchased the site for the new factory and had then assisted in the development. He expressed added pleasure at the announcement of further industrial investment in West Waterford and pointed out that the Co. Council were now developing their own industrial estate in Dungarvan and said that it all added up to a very thriving community.

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NEW INDUSTRIES FOR RING

Three new industries have been approved for the Ring Gaeltacht by Udaras na Gaeltachta.

The first and most important is a fish processing plant at Heilick which will be promoted and developed by Meitheal Mara na Ringe, the Ring Fishing Co-op. The Co-op will auction the fish and will have their own transport system for distribution. It is hoped to provide eight jobs in this industry, as well as giving the fishermen the top market price for their hard-won catches.

The other two industries will be the manufacturing and installation of P.V.C. (plastic) windows (14 jobs) and a micro-processing industry which it is hoped will give 8 jobs.

Of course, it will take a few years for these industries to establish themselves and the net result should see the provision of 30 extra jobs in the area.

The three industries have been helped a great deal at negotiation level by Comhairle Póil na Ringe and by Brendan Mac Gearailt, an elected member of Udaras na Gaeltachta. Mr. Mac Gearailt, who was elected to the Udaras two years ago with the help of the Waterford Gaeltacht transfer, visits Ring and Old Parish regularly and has been most helpful to the area.
