PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

IT'S CHRISTMAS TIME AGAIN
 This week we find ourselves once again on the very eve of Christmas, the great festival of rejoicing for all. No matter how bad things are with us, it is a time when we make the best efforts to forget our troubles and worries and to be pleasant and friendly to everybody. We all seem to come under the spell of the Christmas spirit and this must surely be one of the wonders of the great festival.

But things are tougher this Christmas than they have been for many years and the economic recession continues to bite deeper and deeper making the prospects for the coming year more depressingly gloomy.
 However, as I say, this is not a time for gloomy thoughts or sad reflections; we will put them aside for the time being as we busy ourselves with the preparations that are customary for the Yuletide. But in the hustle and bustle let us not forget that Christmas is, primarily, a great religious occasion—that is what it really is all about—and that it is at the Masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day that we can most effectively give thanks to God for the blessings which we have.

And as we engage in our preparations let us not be forgetful either of those who through no fault of their own may not be able to provide any or many of the things that bring the good cheer for Christmas. Among these we can remember the sick and lonely, the poor and less well off. After all Christmas should be a time for giving and giving to a person in genuine need creates a feeling of personal satisfaction which is hard to surpass.

There is one other most important matter of which everyone should take note. Christmas is a time for parties and re-unions at which alcohol can flow freely and while no one wants to be a spoil-sport who draws attention to the need for additional care where these matters are concerned. Drivers have already been well warned not to "blow their licences" by being caught with an excess of alcohol while driving—so, if you must drink, please don't drive and if you do have a car let somebody who is sober take over the wheel.

Pedestrians, too, must be warned of the need for extra care as a drunken person on the street or road can prove a major hazard not only to himself but to all other road users.

We cannot forget that in 1980 there were 561 dead and about 7,800 injured in road traffic accidents throughout the country. The statistics show that the month of December is the blackest month of the year where these accidents are concerned and that the hours between 9 p.m. and 3 a.m. are the times when they most frequently occur. So let us be careful and see to it that no needless accidents occur to mar this festive season. In short let us enjoy ourselves in a responsible and acut manner.

And so, having said all that, we will observe the traditional custom of extending to all our readers our sincere and genuine good wishes for a Christmas full of contentment, peace and happiness.

IT'S THE SAME IN MANY OTHER PLACES

On Wednesday last Dungarvan Square was again taken over by an army of travelling street traders. From 4 a.m. on the previous evening they began to gather there as they arrived in vans, trucks and cars and watched until the parking bays were vacated and then they moved in and took over.

Throughout Wednesday six rows of stalls ranged along the entire length of the Square selling all sorts of everything including toys, clothes, boots and shoes, electrical and mechanical goods, ornaments and pictures, carpets and linoleum and a lot of requisites and perfumes. Because of the appalling weather the traders did not appear to do as well as usual and that probably ac-

counted for more than one lingering on later than usual. However their combined efforts must have taken quite a bundle of money out of the town. And when they all finally departed on Wednesday night they left the Square in a shambles with mountains of litter piled high. As one business person at the Square remarked to me, "it's a bloody shame."

I must again pose the question: why can't these travelling traders at least leave the Square as they found it? However if it can be any consolation to the local business people, Dungarvan is not alone where this problem of street traders is concerned. In a recent issue of "The Longford Leader" I read a report where angry business men in the casual traders in the town's Market Square moved immediately or else, as the report stated "they will go to war with the Council by refusing to pay thousands of pounds of rates and by blocking a town traffic plan which will throw the town into chaos." The Longford business people are at one with their opposite numbers in Dungarvan when they claim that these casual traders pay no rates, do not pay for the upkeep of the town, and provide no guarantee of stability.

The problem as far as Dungarvan is concerned is at present being considered by a well-known Senior Counsel briefed by the Urban Council's law advisers on a wide ranging report prepared by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and the Town Clerk, Aine Bertie White. The local Traders Association, following a series of meetings at which militant action such as has been suggested by the Longford business men was considered, agreed to hold their fire pending the receipt of the Council's opinion. It is to be hoped that this will become available early in the new year.

F.F. NATIONAL EXECUTIVE TAKES ACTION

The Ard Comhairle or National Executive of the Fianna Fail Organisation has at last taken action in the controversy which has been besetting the Party in the Waterford Constituency for the last couple of years and following a meeting in Dublin on Thursday, December 10, at which the entire matter was considered, they adopted a decision to govern the Organisation's affairs in the Constituency for the future.

The decision which has now been communicated by the Party's General Secretary, Mr. Frank Wall, to the Hon. Secretary of the Waterford Comhairle Dailcheannair and to the Secretaries of each Comhairle Ceannair and Cumann in the Constituency sets out very clearly under several headings the manner in which all future meetings of the Party at all levels are to be convened and conducted.

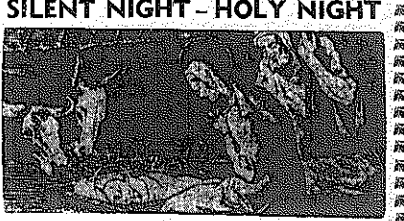
Point number one lays it down that no person other than an authorised officer or person nominated by the Ard Comhairle shall chair, convene or assist in convening any meeting of any unit of the organisation.

The second directive states that no meetings or gatherings of Party members may take place except those properly convened in accordance with the Coru and Rialacha (Constitution and Rules) by duly authorised officers.

The third and fourth directives deal with the holding of Annual General Meetings and state that the AGM's of Cumann for 1982 may only be chaired by one of a group of persons to be nominated by the Ard Comhairle while the AGM's of Comhairle Ceannair and the Comhairle Dailcheannair for 1982 will be chaired by persons appointed by the Ard Comhairle.

Directive number five deals with the press leakages which in the past have come out from even the most tightly sealed meetings, the reports and news items which have projected a very bad image of the Party in the Constituency and which have been a major factor in exacerbating the situation between the rival groups

FATAL TWO-CAR CRASH AT MONAMEAN

A 47-year-old Co. Cork man was killed instantly at Monamean, Old Parish on the main Dungarvan-Youghal Road at about 1 p.m. on Saturday last during the height of a hurricane gale.

The dead man was Mr. Edmund O'Mahony (47), of Sarsfield Terrace, Youghal and formerly of Midleton, who was married with three children. The driver of the other vehicle, Declan Coffey, 65, of Old Parish, was removed to Ardkeen Hospital, where his condition later was stated to be "comfortable".

The collision took place on a slight stretch of road and both vehicles were totally wrecked by the impact. The body of Mr. O'Mahony had to be cut from the wreckage of his Fiat 124 car by members of Dungarvan Fire Brigade and was conveyed to Dungarvan District Hospital where a post mortem examination was carried out.

Cleansing and Disinfection
Essential to Rid Farm Livestock of Bovine T.B.

This was the clear message to herd owners to come from County Waterford Assured Health Committee meeting held recently at the ACOH Offices, Dungarvan. In attendance were Mr. A. Walsh, M.C.C., who presided; Mr. J. Harrington (ACOVAS); Mr. J. Harrington (Sheep Breeders' Association); Mr. C. T. Frost (CAO, ACOT); Mr. J. O'Connell (Superintendent Veterinary Inspector); Mr. P. Crowe (Dept. of Agriculture); Mr. J. A. Penning (ACOT Advisor); Mr. M. B. Byrne (Deputy CAO Educ. ACOT).

BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION
In reporting on progress of the scheme, Mr. J. O'Connell informed the meeting that incidence of the disease was slightly higher than after the previous round of testing, 4.5 per cent of herds were tested up which was the same as before, but 0.29 per cent of animals resulted as opposed to 0.18 per cent the previous time.

Mr. O'Connell pointed out that when a herd is clear and reactors sold off the problem is not necessarily solved. When the reactors are removed it is important to wash and disinfect possible sources of infection such as yards, troughs, water and crates, etc. It is only by hitting at sources of infection in this way that eradication of the herd can be maintained.

POWER-WASHER AVAILABLE TO HERD OWNERS
Mr. O'Connell informed that a Power-Washer that could be used effectively for washing and disinfecting was available from the District Veterinary Office in Waterford for farmers who had cleared their herds of reactors.

**WATERFORD CITY SCHOOL
TEACHER KILLED IN HEAD-ON
CRASH**

A Waterford city school teacher, who delayed going home for Christmas in order to correct end of term exams, was tragically killed in a head-on car crash last Monday night.

Margaret Slattery (29), of Abbey Park, Rathduff, Ferrybank, lost her life in the accident which occurred on the main Waterford-Kilkenny Road at Rossina, Mullinahave.

Members of the Waterford Fire Brigade were summoned to the scene to extricate the unconscious Miss Slattery from the wreckage. She was rushed to Ardscoil General Hospital, and died there a short time later.

At the time of the collision she was on her way back to Waterford having visited her brother, Mádhain, haulage contractor, Mitchel Slattery. A commercial teacher for the past six years, at the Central Technical Institute, Parnod Street, the deceased was a native of Ballyporeen, Co. Tipperary. She had been on holiday since last Friday, but decided to finalise the correction of her students' exam papers before travelling home for Christmas on Monday.

The other car was driven by Mrs. Eleanor Rowland, of 10, St. Mary's Road, Dungarvan, who was a passenger in the car. She sustained neck and back injuries, while her 15-year-old daughter, Eleanor Junior and Mrs. M. Miller, Dunmore East, escaped injury but were both badly shocked.

**DAIL QUESTION
ON CASUAL
TRADING ACT**

At Question Time in the Dail on December 10th, Mr. A. Boland asked the Minister for Trade, Commerce and Tourism the number of prosecutions under the Casual Trading Act, 1981 since it became operative and if he has any plans to amend the legislation to enable the Act to be used more effectively.

Mr. Boland stated that he had occasion to prosecute any offence under the Casual Trading Act, 1981, and on the basis of the most up-to-date information available to me there have been no prosecutions by a local authority under the Act as far as I am aware. I am satisfied that the Act gives local authorities the powers needed to control casual trading in their functional areas and I have no plans to amend the Act. However, I strongly urge the various local authorities to take such action under the Act as is necessary to ensure that the objectives of the legislation are achieved in their areas at the earliest possible date.

**MOTORISTS CARRY UNFAIR
BURDEN OF TAXATION**

Motorists in the Republic of Ireland pay 688 more in tax and duty on a car selling at 25,000 than do motorists in Britain and Northern Ireland, according to figures released by the Society of the Irish Motor Industry.

The figures show that the combination of excise duty at 50% and retail VAT at 15% in the Republic amount to 6,876 on a car selling at 25,000. This is the equivalent of 27.5% in Britain (including Northern Ireland) retail VAT is also 15% and there is a special car tax of 10%.

The combination of these two taxes amounts to 2,987 on a car retailing at 25,000.

Again taking a car selling at the 25,000 figure, the SMI statistics show that taxes and duties amount to 2,987 on a car retailing at 25,000 in July, 1977, rising to 2,917 in February, 1980, 3,476 in July, 1981 and 3,755 in September, 1981.

These figures, the president of the Society of the Irish Motor Industry, Brian Dennis, said that, "Excise receipts in the Republic public have grown from 241.3 million in 1967/68 to an estimated 2,917 million in the current year. Included in this total were duties and taxes on vehicles, road tax which was introduced in the July Budget,

ROMANCE

When a girl wishes to dream of a handsome prince, she should marry a holly tree on a Friday. It is a three-cornered handkerchief which is placed under the pillow. Derbyshire folk regard holly as a certain cure because it let the bad blood out of the children at Brunston, Warwickshire, used holly for a strange old rhyme.

"Bluck the holly leaf to see
If my mother does want me,
While counting off the prickles
until the answer was reached.

Holly is a medicinal plant too, although it is rather neglected now among the herbs. It is curative of many better understood, our Christmas decorations could serve other useful purposes. The leaves, which become progressively less prickly with age, are febrifuge, diuretic and resolvent. An infusion was prescribed for respiratory infections, including catarrh, bronchitis, influenza and pneumonia. Calpeper says the leaves expel wind and "purge the body of gross and clammy phlegm" and that the bark and leaves are "excellent good" for dropsy, rheumatism and fever. He recommends them as fumigations to heal broken bones or dislocated joints. Among the chemical constituents of holly leaves are the valuable acids, salicin, tannin and rutin, which have a corrective effect on the arteries and veins and help the free circulation of blood. As a general tonic, drop a holly leaf in the daily herb tea two or three times a week.

Holly berries are violently purgative and emetic. When dried and powdered they were used in the treatment of dropsy and chest bleeding. An infusion of the leaves, fresh or dried, made with one tablespoonful of water, should be taken in wineglassfuls twice daily. The leaves are at their best in July when they should be selected for drying, but are effective in all seasons if freshly gathered.

Deputy Deasy's Dail Questions On Possible Multi-Channel TV Link-Up For Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow

At Question Time in the Dail recently Deputy Austin Deasy (P.G.) asked the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs if his Department would grant a licence or licences for multi-channel television in the West Waterford towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow and in any other towns in the country where reception is available through cable-vision.

Mr. Deasy: The position in regard to the former single channel area is that my Department have examined conditions in respect of the issue of exclusive licences for the provision of multi-channel cable television systems in the towns of Cork and Galway. Letters of intent to grant a licence in respect of Cork and Galway cities have been issued to Cork Communications Ltd. and Tele Telecommunications Ltd. of Galway respectively. In both cases the companies in question must comply with certain requirements before a licence can be issued. It would be premature to give any undertaking regarding the issue of licences in respect of smaller towns and it is demonstrated that a satisfactory multi-channel service will be available in Cork and Galway.

Mr. Deasy: Has there been an application for a licence for the towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow? It was indicated by the company serving Cork that they could serve Lismore and Tallow but no decision has been given on that yet. So far as that indication was given one could say it was an application but it has not been formalised.

Mr. Deasy: Will the Minister give generally comparative information in respect of any such application, seeing that it is on the route to Cork city? Mr. Cooney: I will give consideration to this as requested. Mr. Reynolds: When does the Minister propose to issue letters of intent to the Lismore area? Why has it not been proceeded with?

Mr. Cooney: The question does not arise on this question. Mr. Reynolds: I am sure the Minister has the information at his disposal. Mr. Cooney: It is a separate question.

EXPLAIN METHOD
 Mr. Deasy also asked the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs if he will explain the method by which multi-channel television is to be provided in the West Waterford cable television system in Limerick. Upon the issue of exclusive licences in respect of Cork and Galway, the licences will be expected to provide an aerial and associated head-end equipment at the site of the cable television system. Mr. Cooney: My Department has not yet arranged a competition for an exclusive licence for the provision of a multi-channel cable television system in Limerick. The detailed design of the network for a multi-channel cable television system is a matter for such licencee subject to compliance with the technical conditions laid down by my Department under the Wireless Telegraphy (Licensing) Regulations, 1974.

Mr. Cooney: Why can the signal not be transmitted through the air? Mr. Cooney: I understand and there are technical objections to going that. There is also a better than transmission by microwave could have copyright implications. There is a suggestion that that doubt has been removed but I do not know if it has been removed entirely. The broadcasting review committee in 1974 recommended that microwave link systems should be owned, controlled and maintained by the Department on an integrated basis. If permission was given to individual applications the technical and financial difficulties could lead to difficulties.

Mr. Deasy: Would not the cable system of transmitting this television network also give rise to copyright problems? Mr. Cooney: I agree with the Deputy that there appears to be a contradiction, but I am advised that there is a distinction between transmitting by microwave and by cable. I admit I cannot see the distinction but it was held that there was a distinction. Another view seems to be gaining support and that is that rebroadcasting by microwave does not infringe copyright.

Negotiations with Coláiste Ghrovia end in a request being made to County Board to have Joe McGrath and Ned Power added to senior selection committee.

FEBRUARY
Tragic death of Tallow's brilliant hurling star, Raymond O'Keefe, who died on Feb. 20th. All games postponed as a mark of respect.
Waterford playing N.H.L. with a game at Galway at Ballinaculta. We play well but lose 2-13 to 1-10 to the All-Ireland champions.
Western Board fixtures meeting held at Carrigrohane as minor hurling club and Faha as junior hurling. Ballyduff, who subsequently won the county championship were refused re-admission to junior hurling.
The Sam Melbourne Museum comes at the request of Bord na Móna (county) as a treasured success. Tallow recapture Keanehand Cup Minor hurling trial at Fraher Field in N.F.L. defeat Waterford in N.F.L. at Walsh Park.
Waterford senior hurlers score tremendous win against Limerick — 4-13 to 3-6 at Fraher Field in N.H.L.

MARCH
Priory College reach semi-final of Munster Colleges Cup by defeating St. Brendan's. But are subsequently beaten by Ballyvourney in final (1-11 to 3-4).
Waterford draw with O'Halla Field Team were black arm bands in memory of Ray O'Brien.
Stradbally footballers defeat Kerry champions, Gnevenagh in Munster club semi-final (6-13 to 0-11).
County Board make senior draws. Dungarvan and Tallow hurlers defeat Nenagh in Munster semi-final at Fraher Field.
Waterford score great win against Wexford in the quarter final of the N.H.L. at Nolan Park and qualify for semi-final against Cork at Thurles.

APRIL
County team management confrontation with County Board about National League League semi-final fixture against Cork. Application for postponement because of injuries not requested by Board. A feeling that the management handling of the situation resulted in mental disorientation of the players — a contributing factor in their defeat by Cork one week later (1-10 to 2-26, above).
Abbotside ladies committee win A.I.B. award. Waterford minor hurlers win Munster championship hurling at Bansha.
The terrible Piltown tragedy numbs entire county when three of the thirteen under 21 team party returning from a challenge game to the Clare at Tipperary are killed. The county goes into mourning for Tony Forrester, Martin O'Grady and James Costello.
Cork defeat Waterford in league semi-final. Waterford league Tipperary in tournament at Ballymacarbery (1-11 to 1-6).
West Waterford defeat east Cork in under 21 semi-final of Munster hurling championship (0-11 to 1-7), and East Waterford also qualify by beating South Tipp.

MAY
The official opening of Ballysaggart's new grounds and dressing rooms with a drawn senior hurling tie between Waterford and Wexford. Waterford referees win seven-a-side United Demolition Trust All-Ireland.
Western and county championships continue and such results as Kilgobinet beating Ennetts in junior football.
In minor football, Waterford receive a terrible hiding from Cork. Waterford senior hurlers beat Limerick in a tournament at Palksgreen.
In the Munster football championship, Waterford force a draw with Limerick (0-10 each) at Limerick.
The game turned out to be an atrocious day, but all first round senior games were played at their best. The game was a close one. Waterford beat Fourmiletwater. Lismore pipped Shamrocks. St. Mary's beat Ballygunner. Cappoquin defeated St. Molitor's and Tallow defeated Tourin.
Waterford entries win three events in All-Ireland senior hurling. Abbotside win ballad group. Slabh a'Gua win set dancing and 34th win poetry recitation. Celebrations to mark the occasion at all three venues.
The major event of the season as at we were concerned took place at Thurles on May 24th. Thousands of supporters were shattered to see the first round of the Munster championship. It was not the manner in which it came about. Waterford hurlers seemed to have completely lost the sparkle. We were never previously had been a feature of their league displays. Whether it was over-training or over-confidence, we don't know. Maybe it was a bit of both. We lost 3-14 to 2-14 a game that we were "handy"

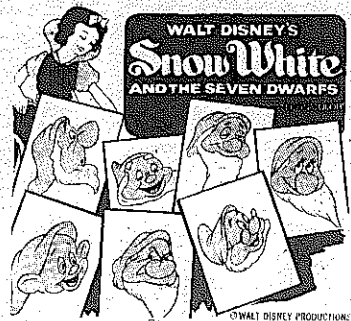

Livestock - Incidents of Liver Fluke is above average this year, cattle and sheep should get a repeat dose from now on. Feed mowing cows 14-18 lbs daily ration depending on cow condition and fodder quality. Reduce meals to 12 lbs daily.

Feed meals to ewes in the last 6-8 weeks before lambing. Check cows and heifer heifers for signs of abortion. Isolate immediately if noticed. Feed meals to ewes in the last 6-8 weeks before lambing.

Farm Home Management - Well-Dressed Windows - Lined curtains look well and hang beautifully. They provide privacy and insulation, keeping heat in and drafts out. Making them yourself cuts costs.
