

Killer Dogs Still Responsible For Huge Sheep Losses

The snow blizzards of last month have not lessened the killer as far as many of us concerned.

This week's meeting of the Waterford County Council heard of the continuing menace of stray dogs and Mr. Tony O'Ryan revealed that very recently in his area of North Tipperary twenty-two sheep had been savaged by straying dogs.

"Irresponsible dog owners must take much of the blame for the huge sheep losses farmers in this county are experiencing almost on an on-going basis," Mr. O'Ryan said.

Mr. James A. Walsh said all measures available to try and combat the problem of the wounding of livestock by dogs had proved ineffective, while Mr. Michael McDonnell urged the introduction of increased licensing fees which would cost £3.44 or even £5.50," said Mr. McDonnell, adding that this would also help the Government.

Mr. Michael Henneberry said cattle were driving out from Waterford city to his town of Kilthaile where they then dumped their unwanted dogs. "These dogs are now attacking cattle in the staggering sheer losses the farmers are encountering," he said.

The meeting finally decided ask Waterford County Council and Waterford Corporation expedite the provision of a scheme under which the two bodies have already agreed jointly to undertake.

"This shelter will be one positive way of improving the situation," Mr. O'Quinn said.

Mr. O'Ryan Welcomed Back To Committee Of Agriculture

The newly co-opted member of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture, Mr. Tony O'Ryan, was welcomed by the unanticipated hailing of Fine Gael at County Council co-optation - welcomed by the chairman - Michael O'Quinn.

He attended his first meeting last Monday in Dungarvan.

Mr. O'Quinn said he was personally delighted that Mr. Ryan was back on a committee on which he had done 24 years of outstanding service to the farming community up to now.

The other members concurred with the chairman, Mr. William McGehee (FG), that the farming community could only benefit from Mr. Ryan's membership of the committee.

A former chairman of the local Fine Gael thanked the chairman and members saying that after almost a quarter of a century of membership he was coming back home.

Mr. O'Quinn thanked the Fine Gael party for supporting his option, saying the vacant seat was a Fine Gael one and at party could be competitive if it was taken.

"It is not unusual for a committee to be used as a political platform but in the best interests of the farming community," he said.

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Drivers Fined And Disqualified At Dungarvan Court

Laurence Glennon, Lord Edward Street, Kilkenney was fined £100 and disqualified from driving for 12 months when he was convicted at Dungarvan Court on a charge of driving with excess alcohol in his blood at Castle Street, Dungarvan on September 20.

Mr. E. P. King, Solv. for the defendant said that the offence was admitted by him. He was young boy from Dungarvan who had been driving for a fishing competition and took a few pints afterwards. Noel McGrath, Lusk, Dungarvan, a lorry driver, pleaded guilty to a charge of drink driving at Springmount, Dungarvan on September 20.

Supt. M. English said that the defendant came under the influence of drink and a bottle of beer on the occasion and a blood test showed an alcohol concentration of 141 micrograms per millilitre.

Remarkably that the concentration was not all that high in this case, the District Justice imposed a fine of £30 with a 12 month disqualification.

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
