PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

VOX POPULI
 To-day, Thursday, February 18, the people of the Republic will once again go to the polls to elect a new government after a brief but very intensive election campaign. The election is unusual in that it is the second time in the short period of seven months that the people have been called on to make such a major decision. In the interim since the Coalition government, led by Dr. Garret Fitzgerald fell on the night of January 27, the electorate have been bombarded in a war of words. Full use has been made by the Coalition partners (Fine Gael and Labour) and the Opposition (Fianna Fail party of TV, radio and newspapers in getting their messages across while a number of Opinion Polls have helped to add to the confusion along the way.

While the prospects of the parties seemed this way and that as the election campaign progressed, it is generally accepted that the outcome will again be very close and although the Opinion Polls (for what they are worth) showed a slight preference for the return of the Coalition, the bookmakers, who rarely get it wrong, have made Fianna Fail favourites to regain power. So whatever the outcome it is to be fervently hoped that we will not again wind up with a hung, Dail or with a Government which will have to depend on a handful of Independents for survival. Let us return to stable government—over one with a small but clear majority—which will last out a full term of office. Nobody wants to see these elections coming every six or twelve months and apart from that it would do the country no good. So let everyone who possibly can get out to-day and vote one way or the other. As we stated last week we get in the long run, the type of government which we deserve and if we fail to do our

duty to-day, then it will be of little use to start crying about the state of affairs later.

OUR OWN CONSTITUENCY
 No change in the party representation is expected in this constituency but the campaign has not been without its quirks and dirty tricks. Last week an anonymous letter was circulated in several areas concerning one of the Fianna Fail candidates and this was countered by his supporters at the week-end with a "solo" effort over Youghal Community Radio. Whispers too, mostly malicious, have emanated about the methods used by a Fine Gael candidate in his personal canvassing campaign while the Labour people have not been without their head-aches either.

However we feel that the electorate will be adult and responsible enough to assess such quirks and dirty tricks for what they are—part of the game of politics which is usually played with no holds barred.

And just one more comment before leaving this topic. It concerns the manner in which election posters have proliferated throughout the constituency on ESB and PGT poles: let us see these disappear with the same celerity as they were put in position following the declaration of the general election. We have already received a signed undertaking from the Electricity Directors for the Labour Party candidate that all their posters will be removed after the election. Let us hope that the other Parties will follow suit.

AND THERE COULD BE LOSSES FOR THESE, TOO
 Depending also on the outcome of the election are the jobs of the Coalition's team of "special advisers" who between them divide more than half a million pounds—paid by the taxpayer. These advisers were appointed on contracts which terminate at the end of

the Coalition's term of office. Two of them, Liam Hourican and Joe Jennings, hold their appointments in the Government Information Service. Hourican was previously Press Officer to Fine Gael and Jennings was Chief Information Officer in CIE. Their salaries cost the State £32,000.

The Taoiseach, Dr. Garret Fitzgerald, appointed three special advisers in his own Department; Mr. Alexis Fitzgerald who is stated to have a Minister's salary of £25,000 (plus); Dr. Patrick Honohan, previously an economist with the Central Bank and Ms. Catherine Meenan. The salaries of the three total £103,000.

The Tanaiste, Mr. Michael O'Leary, who is also Minister for Industry and Energy, brought in Ms. Yvonne Murphy and Mr. Alan Grey to his Department. Ms. Murphy is on leave of absence (sic) from RTE and the combined cost of these additions to the Tanaiste's staff is £60,000.

There were two additions to the Department of the Public Service where the Labour T.D. Mr. Liam Kavanaugh holds the portfolio at a cost of £25,000.

The former general secretary of Fine Gael, Mr. Peter Prendergast moved into the Department of Finance at a salary of over £20,000 while there were also three others recruited and the total cost to the State (us!) of the four in a full year, is £46,000.

Dr. Michael Conroy was brought into the Department of Agriculture and with a few other additions by Minister Dukes brought the salary bill for that Department up by £35,000.

Into the Department of Justice went Miss Mary Harle, a daughter of Paddy Harle, the Fine Gael Deputy from Donagall who was Junior Minister at the Department of Posts and Telegraphs. With two others also brought in the cost of this Department went up by £27,000.

Two specialists went into the Department of Education, Dr. John Harris and Dr. Jeremiah Cronin. With three other "special" appointments in the same Department they are costing the State £54,000.

Ms. Eithne FitzGerald, daughter-in-law of the Taoiseach and Mr. John Long were brought into the Department of Health and Social Welfare while a transport economist, Mr. Tom Ferris was recruited to the Department of Transport.

While accepting the fact that all these people are highly qualified in their own fields it cannot be denied that the exercise smacks of nepotism as there can be little doubt that undue favouritism was shown to friends and relations of the Taoiseach and members of his Cabinet in the making of these public appointments.

However, if the Coalition goes, following to-day's electoral exercise, all these "special advisers" will also be out.

Just one further comment in relation to the foregoing before leaving it; How could the Taoiseach reconcile his promise to reduce expenditure in the public sector and then give the nod for all these appointments. Is there any more credibility here than anywhere else. I refer to this merely because so much play has been made about this matter of credibility throughout the election campaign.
