CIRCUIT COURT

Last Chance For Two On Audacious Robbery Charges

Prison sentences of six months imposed on two young men at Dungarvan District Court on November 23 last were the subject of an appeal heard before Judge Roe at Dungarvan Circuit Court last Tuesday.

The appeals were brought by Thomas O'Sullivan, 22, and William Sandford (19) both with addresses at Boreenra, Dungarvan who were convicted by District Justice O'Connell at Dungarvan Court of breaking into the Cash and Carry Store at Shandon, Dungarvan on November 23 and receiving goods to the total value of £1,220 the property of Messrs. United Merchants Ltd. In addition, O'Sullivan appealed against a six months suspension of his driving licence imposed on the same occasion.

Mr. John Gordon, B.L. (the solicitor for J. Gordon & Co., Soirs.), appeared for O'Sullivan and he told Judge Roe that he was appealing against the severity of the sentence imposed. Mr. P. Slattery, B.L., was for Sandford.

Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solicitor, prosecuted.

Mr. Maher told the Court that the two appellants with another defendant Derek Moran, also appeared in the case and withdrew his appeal attended a disco in a Dungarvan hotel on the night in question. They had the disco all day around Dungarvan in O'Sullivan's car which was stopped at the Cash & Carry Store at Shandon where two of them got out and broke in the door with an iron bar.

O'Sullivan stayed in the car and the others brought out a quantity of cigars, cigarettes, beer and other articles and put them in the car.

Sergeant M. Hayes said that O'Sullivan was a respectable young man who worked at the Glass factory and who, apart from this, was generally well conducted. He said that O'Sullivan had not had any previous convictions and had paid £25 in compensation.

Sergeant Hayes went on to say that O'Sullivan had been in the night in question. He was in the car with the other two men. In reality to Mr. Gordon, witness agreed that O'Sullivan did not do the robbery.

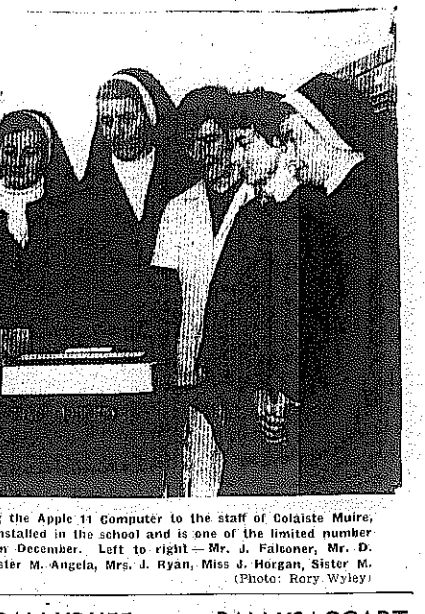
