Major Powers Reneging On U.N. Peace Keeping Commitments Says Deasy

Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D., Chairman of Fine Gael Buncrana Branch Committee on Foreign Affairs, in a statement has welcomed that the Irish Government should give very careful consideration to any request from the United Nations for an increased Irish contingent to the Southern Lorraine peacekeeping force. Owing to substantial payments running into millions of pounds, from the U.N. for services rendered, and expenses incurred, in maintaining its troops on peacekeeping missions overseas. This is apparently due to the continued failure of Russia and other Eastern Bloc countries to make substantial contributions to the U.N. for the maintenance of such forces over a number of years past.

The burden of providing such peace-keeping duties seems to continually fall on a small number of countries like Ireland.
