## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**THREE CAPOQUIN SCOUTS FOR 70-MILE MOUNTAIN HIKE**

A hike which will take them 70 miles through the Comeragh Knockmealdown and Galtymore mountain ranges will be undertaken by three young Capoquin scouts over the Easter week-end. Rory O'Connor, John McGrath and Pat Casey of the 10th Waterford Troop (FSL) Capoquin, will undertake the greatest adventure of their young lives when they begin their journey near Comel and continue until they eventually finish in Tipperary Town.

Recognising that the test facing them will be a severe one, the young scouts have been preparing and training for it for several months past under the experienced and careful supervision of their Scoutmaster John Meskill and are now ready for the long trek and their week-end canvas as they wind their way through the mountain ranges of West Waterford and South Tipperary. As they progress on their journey the scouts will record their experiences and reactions on tape and camera, a record which should prove an invaluable asset to their brother scouts later on.

The Troop Council, conscious of the ongoing need for funds, has decided that this marathon hike might be sponsored and the question of finding sponsors was passed to the parents finance committee of the Unit. However we would be surprised if the people of Capoquin and district or of anywhere else, either were found unwilling to back such a brave and original venture for raising funds which are badly needed to purchase some very expensive camping gear this year.

Having commenced their marathon trip near Comel, the hikers will pass through check-points at Mellery, Goheen and Mountain Lodge before finishing the long journey in Tipperary Town. It only remains for us to

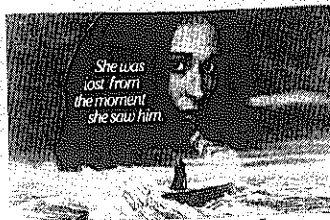

### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

#### DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

I am entitled to 3 weeks holiday. Can I take them all together or who decides this matter?

There are a couple of points worth making about the taking of holidays. Firstly, the employer has the right to decide when holidays are to be taken but he is obliged to consult the employee or his union at least 1 month in advance and to have consideration for his opportunities for rest and relaxation.

Secondly, you must be permitted to take your holidays during or within 6 months of the current leave year.

Thirdly, and here is the answer to your question, once you have worked for an employer for 6 months you are entitled to take 2 weeks together, but not necessarily the three.

The Holidays Act guarantees workers certain minimum holiday entitlements but many employees negotiate holidays which are better than the law or have established better holidays by custom and practice.

One last point with which people are not too familiar. If you are sick during your holiday leave and you provide medical evidence to this effect, you are entitled to make up at a later stage to make up for the period of sickness.
