PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

THIS IS REALLY NOT GOOD ENOUGH

While postal services in West Waterford have been the source of dissatisfaction and complaint for a long time now, the delays that occurred from almost the entire area last week are really not good enough at all and can't be tolerated by a public who are being asked to pay more and more for diminishing service.

Letters posted in Tallow, Clonmel, and Carrigtwohill, Ballyduff Upper (Express letter rate of 60p charged) and Lismore on Tuesday, April 13th and addressed to the "Leader" Office in Dungarvan were not delivered here until Friday morning, April 16th, taking almost three days. The result was that many items, including important notices of publishing functions, arrived too late for publication in our last issue.

It is hard to imagine in this day and age and with the highest postal charges in Europe operating that it should take so long to deliver letters over such short distances, all within a radius of 15 miles. I will go so far as to say that it is scandalous treatment and people are indeed more than tolerant to put up with it.

But put up with it any longer they should not and the postal authorities will have to do something to ensure that letters posted in the towns and villages in West Waterford are delivered at least within 24 hours. The present disgraceful service, and it has been going on for a long time now, indicates in manorways a "couldn't care less" attitude by the P. and T. authorities towards the people who are being fleeced to pay for it. It really is not good enough and should not be tolerated any longer.

DEEP BITE BY PRSI INCREASES

The increases in the Pay Related Social Insurance contributions under the recent budget which came into operation within the last few weeks have bitten into the pay packets of workers much deeper than had at first been expected. It is rather strange that this aspect of both budgets (first that of the Coalition and later that of Fianna Fail) was allowed to slip through without question or complaint during the budget debates. Obviously the increases had to become actual fact before it was realised how deep they were going to bite.

Now there is widespread protest and the government could well find itself in difficulty if some steps are not taken as a matter of urgency to ease the situation and restore the gap which has so suddenly made its appearance in workers' pay packets.

Dungarvan Urban Rate Is £15.87 In Pound

Dungarvan Urban Council, at their annual estimates meeting last Monday night unanimously adopted a rate of £15.87 the figure submitted by County Manager, Dan Hurley, for the coming year. This is an increase of £2.11 over last year's rate and the total estimate provides for a gross expenditure of £1,499,195 to finance the various Urban services for 1982.

Main heads of expenditure in the estimate are as follows: Housing and Building £549,147; Roads £22,224; Water and Sewerage £236,214; Development Incentives and Controls £10,000; Industrial development £10,000; Environmental Protection £1,000; Recreation and Amenity (Swimming Pool, Town Hall, etc.) £71,159; Miscellaneous Services £1935; County Demands £143,264.


