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UPGRADING OF ABBEYSIDE CAUSEWAY SITE
This is expected to provide employment for about 600 young people, the majority of whom will be under 25 years of age.

But back to the plans for the Abbeyside Causeway site. Work has already commenced on part of this with the demolition of the old derelict house and the clearing of the site together with the knocking over of the surrounding wall. Already the great improvement this has created can be seen and the view of the harbour will be further enhanced when the site has been landscaped and planted as planned.

During the week, there was a great deal of activity at this junction (Strandside-Sexton Street) as excavations were made for the erection of traffic lights by County Council workers. I understand that with the lights at the Mary Street Square junction, these will be placed in position shortly and I need hardly stress again how much these will be welcomed, not only by motorists but by the harassed pedestrians who find crossing the roads at these points a most dangerous hazard.

Further plans for the development of the reclaimed land at the Causeway were referred to by County Engineer Jim Hally at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council when he detailed his plans aimed at reducing the overall cost of the proposed new bridge over the Colligan estuary which is part of the new ring road now at an advanced stage of development. A preliminary lay-out for the reclaimed area—running from the Causeway to Strandside North showed provision for a tennis court, volleyball and basketball courts, an arboretum, a paddling pool area, a herbaceous court garden and a formal garden which will front a car park.

When all these plans become effective they will enhance the beauty of the whole area and without doubt will completely transform the entire scene in this part of the urban.

Closure of Quigley Plant At Ballinacourty

SHOCK ANNOUNCEMENT STUNS DUNGARVAN

The shock announcement made on Wednesday that the Quigley Magnesium Plant at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan, was to close has come as a stunning blow to the town.

Mr. James C. O'Donoghue, President Quigley Company of Europe made the announcement to the employees at Quigley in Dungarvan on Wednesday and later told the Press that a major restructuring of its Irish operations involved the closure in July of its seawater magnesium plant at Ballinacourty employing 140 people and the shutdown in June of its Benetabridge (Co. Kilkenny) dolomite operation, which with its 17 operatives supplied the raw materials for Ballinacourty.

The Company statement emphasized that the other Quigley operation, a refractory oxide factoring facility at Tivoli, Cork, employing 120 will not be affected by the closure.

The closure at Ballinacourty will be done on a phased basis over the next three months, with only a minimal reduction in the workforce during that period. Quarrying operations at Benetabridge will cease forthwith.

The plant at Ballinacourty will be retained for about six weeks during the shutdown operation.

Mr. O'Donoghue who is also Chief Executive of the parent company, "Magnesium", manufactured at Dungarvan has become completely unaccountable despite the injection of millions of pounds in recent years to make the plant more economic to run.

GAELSCOIL FOR DUNGARBHAN?

At present a specially appointed committee is conducting a survey in Dungarvan and district to decide whether there is sufficient support for the establishing of a Gaelscoil—an Irish medium primary school—in the town.

In a circular issued to parents, the promoters of the idea point out that it was on no mere whim of abstract patriotism that they have decided to canvass support for this experiment in education in the Dungarvan area, but in the full realization that choosing a particular type of education for their children is a major decision for all parents to-day and that the school (if started) must not be just equally good but better than its English medium counterparts in the district.

The committee then goes on to point out that the number of Irish medium primary schools has more than doubled in the Dublin area in the past ten years while a similar increase has taken place in a number of other areas up and down the country outside the Gaeltacht districts.

The circular also states: "We are encouraged in our efforts by the great success of the lately established schools and nor can we ignore the extraordinary high percentage of people in leading positions in public life and in third level education who have been educated through Irish, or the high level of success attained in the experimental sciences and the creative arts by people from a similar educational background."

Personally I believe that there should be excellent support for the establishing of this Gaelscoil in Dungarvan and I hope that the organising committee will find themselves in a position to proceed with their plans.

In further support of their idea I believe that the fact we have some fifteen families from Dungarvan at present availing of primary education through Irish in Ring College which strengthens our conviction that Dungarvan is ready for an Irish medium school. "Cad is cool dúit?"

We record with regret the death of one of the best known personalities in the rural community in the area in the person of Mr. Patrick Morrissey, Affane, who occurred at Dungarvan District Hospital on the 28th inst. Mr. Morrissey was a well known and most extensive farmer, he took an active part in his politics and was an associate of Michael Collins and Richard Mulcahy. He was a member of Cumann na Gaeltachta Fine Gael in the area, his involvement in the Fine Gael movement continued up to the time of his death.

He was a prominent figure in Irish sporting circles and was a founder member and working officer of Cappoquin and District Country Club and the club's annual field meeting was held on his lands at Affane. Representative cortices attended the funeral service which took place in the local hall at 11 a.m. for each of the 14 games for each team and the playing time will be the same as in previous years. 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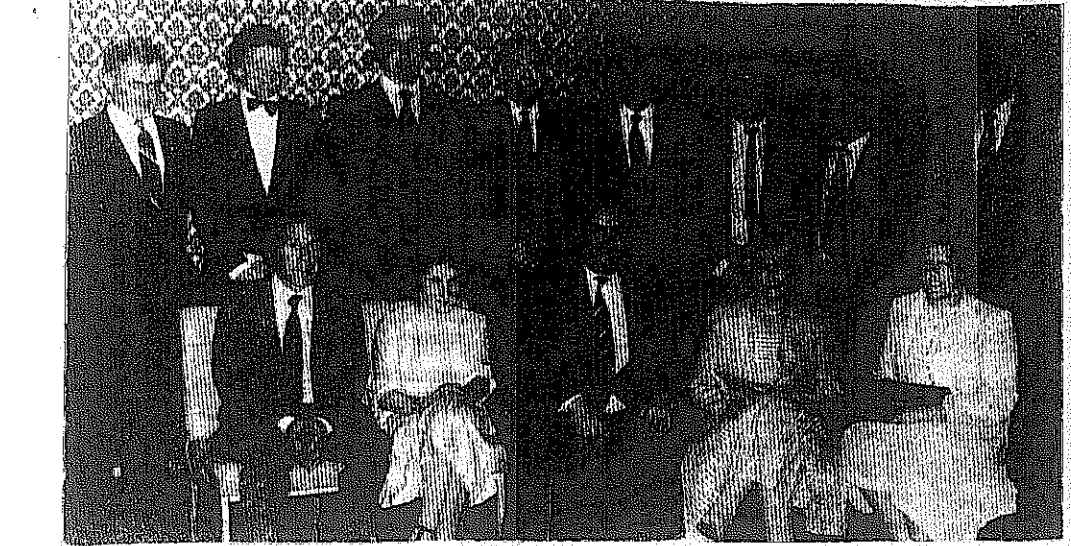

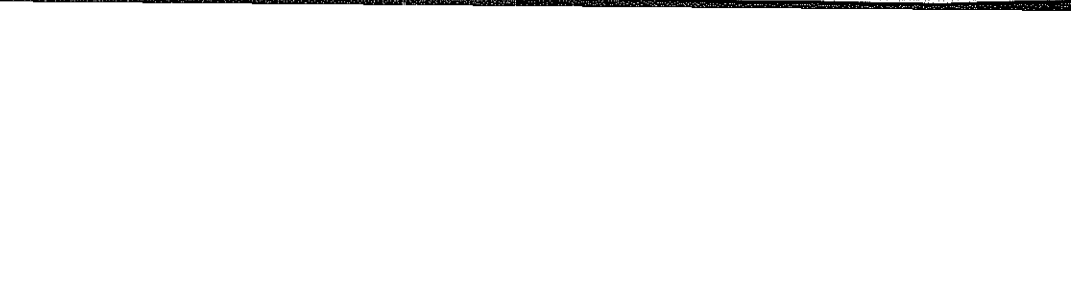

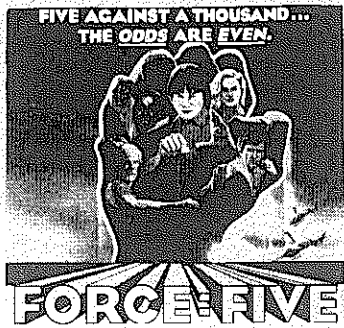

NEXT WEEK-END

On the home championship scene a dozen games are listed and a quick glance at the pairings leads one to expect some good and some poor fare. In an effort to complete all the outstanding senior league games before the next County Board meeting, the county secretary has fixed a number of games that will also take place over the coming week-end but because of so much championship action, I won't go into detail about the cup games.

COUNTY MATCHES

I am hoping that our Bord na n-Og man will deal fully with the divisional under-16 teams prospects of meeting West Tipp in the quarter final at the Fraher field. It is important that this vital game is well supported. It is needed and very helpful.

MINDR v CLARE

As far as preparation is concerned this group seem to have got the worst things and appear to have been knocked around quite a bit. IRISH FARMERS NEED PRICE INCREASE OF 28.7%

"Farmers in Ireland need an immediate price increase of 28.7% to compensate them for their increased production costs and loss in income over the past three years. This was stated by Mr. Donal Cashman, President, IFA.

The above demand was reiterated by the President of the IFA Mr. Cashman, as the Ministers for Agriculture from the ten member states of the EEC made their way to Luxembourg for discussions on the fixing of this year's agricultural price increases.

Mr. Cashman, who was present in Brussels for the last meeting of Agricultural Ministers from the ten member states of the EEC, said that the farmers throughout the country are very disillusioned with the lack of attention being given to the problems which exist in Irish farming today.

He deplored the delay in fixing the new prices and pointed out that the latest Commission proposals fell far short of the Irish requirements. COPA, the European body of farmers, had already determined on an objective basis that Irish farmers need a price increase of 28.7%.

Mr. Cashman added: "The latest proposals of the Commission, including the value of the milk premium, amounts to just over one third of the Irish requirements. Bearing in mind that the new prices are now being introduced from next September and that the decline in farm incomes in Ireland is much greater than the decline in other countries, our request for Agriculture, Mr. Lenihan, will have to be able to deliver much more than the price which is on the table at present."

He said that the land of the country has been hard won by the farming community. Each year the Government is the custodian of the land for a limited time and would wish to pass it on to the future generations.

There is also, Mr. Slatery said, great worry among farmers about restrictions on any further increase in the price of land. The top 120 acres all land in the country should be put to rest and the price of land should be fixed. For a rescue operation to be successful, it must be based on cash available quickly and this appears to be a remote possibility in the scheme outlined by the Minister.
