PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

THE QUIGLEY CLOSURE
The announcement which
came out of the blue last
week that the Quigley Com-
pany were to close down their
seawater magnesia operation
at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan,
came as a body-blow to the
town and the manner in
which it was delivered has
left the people stunned and
dumbfounded. It was indeed a belt-
to the solar plexus.
Understandably the work-
force at the plant—a total of
140 jobs—were not only shocked but angered
at the manner in which the
disastrous news came to them—
through the columns of a
morning paper—several hours
before the Company's Chief
Executive was timed to
make the announcement per-
sonally to the management
and workers at Ballinacourty
and to hold a press conference
at which the bad news was to
be publicly confirmed. The
Company Press Officer denied
that the "leak" had come
from them while the Chief
Executive expressed his
regrets and apologies on
the matter. They had he stated
at the outset of the Press
conference, a very carefully
thought out programme by
which it was proposed to
announce the situation first to
senior management and then
to the workers and it was
unfortunate that there had
been "some leak" by which
the news got out before the
Company could announce it.
The big question now fol-
lowing last week's announce-
ment is what is going to be
the eventual outcome. A mass
meeting of workers attended
by the four Constituency
TD's last Friday night
pledged to do everything possi-
ble to keep the plant open
and towards this end a de-
putation was appointed to seek
discussions with Industry and
Energy Minister Albert Reynolds.
But now that the running-
down process at Ballinacourty
has commenced, the closure
is a fait accompli? My informa-
tion is that this is so and that
despite the angry demands by
the workers there appears to
be no other outcome but
closure for the factory which
was officially opened with
such a flourish on Thursday,
September 17, 1970 by the
then Minister for Finance, Mr.
George Colley. That colourful
opening ceremony was attend-
ed by a list of V.I.P.'s as long
as my arm, headed by the
then U.S. Ambassador, John
D. Moore, all of whom
traded from Dublin in a
C.I.E. train specially chartered
by the company, Corporation for
the occasion, and which
travelled all the way to
Ballinacourty over the new
spur line which had been laid
from Waterford for the new
factory.
Without doubt it marks the
end of an era and gives cause
for much worry and anxiety
among not only the workers
directly concerned but the
people of the town and district
in general as the closure
will result in a big economic
loss to the entire community
which will be felt harder and
harder as the months pass by.
MENDING FENCES
The Fianna Fail organisa-
tion in the constituency is at
present busily engaged in
mending fences and plastering
over the cracks which have
openly split the party through-
out the county for several
years now and more more
likely occupied in attempts to
regain lost ground than the
party's new sole sitting
deputy in the Dail, Mr. Jackie
Fahey, who has been at the
centre of practically all the
storms in the recent past.
Last week he made his
place with Waterford city
journalists whom he antagon-
ised when he gave an eye of
the pot interview prior to the
last general election on one
of the city's illegal radio
stations, de-pite the Party's
undertaking to members of

Coalition Government, Michael Keating. It has been stated that the new Fianna Fail Government changed the personnel of the Council because they felt that the old one was too orientated towards the Coalition and some of the appointments made by Mr. Keating too political.

Waterford's other representative on Cospor, Fianna Fail County Councillor and Deputy M.D. of Waterford Glass, Mr. Tom Healy, Fr. Moore, retained his seat on the Council and was re-nominated in the list announced by Mrs. Geoghegan Quinn last week.

News from California last week-end was that Tom Clancy, a member of the original ballad group of the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem, which won fame on both sides of the Atlantic a couple of decades ago is now making a big name for himself in the acting world. Tom is currently starring in one of the top American TV shows "Father Murphy" in which he plays Fred Mitchell, a school official who carries out inspections at Father Murphy's orphanage.

Apart from his television work Tom has also received much critical praise for his cameo role in the film "Reds" which was shown recently in Dublin.

Tom and his wife Joan are regular visitors to Ring where they spend much of their summer holidays with their daughters Blainth and Reilin (who learn Irish at the College) and enjoy wide popularity. Joan (formerly Miss Joan Walsh) is a Dungarvan woman who has, in recent years, also made a name for herself in literary circles in California.

SNOWCAPPED
While travelling through West Waterford last Monday morning I was rather surprised to see the peaks of the Knockmealdons in the Mellifield area snowcapped.

After the long warm spell throughout April during which the sun shone brightly and air temperatures rose to the mid-sixties on occasions, the return to arctic conditions over the week-end left us all shivering.

A gentleman I spoke to in Cappoquin and to whom I commented on the unusual appearance of snow-capped mountains in the month of May recalled that one of the worst snow-storms which he remembered occurred on May 7, 1951. However, he added encouragingly that a very fine summer followed that year. Perhaps we can look forward to the same this year!

Quigley Closure

Deputation To Seek Government Aid

A special general meeting of all employees of the Quigley Magnesia Company was held at the Court House, Dungarvan last Friday night. The meeting was called to take whatever steps were considered appropriate to deal with the closure of the Company's Plant at Ballinacourty with the loss of 140 jobs, the news of which came in a shock announcement by the Company's Chief Executive Mr. James C. O'Donoghue at a special Press Conference held in Dungarvan on Wednesday last week.

Union reaction to the unexpected announcement, has been understandably bitter and in the course of a statement following the announcement Mr. Tony Mansfield, District Officer A.T. & G.W.U. on behalf of Unions on site at Ballinacourty (which also included A.U.E.W., N.E.T.U., E.T.U., A.S.T.M.S.) expressed the local dissatisfaction of the Unions with the manner in which the Company handled the entire affair covering the closure announcement.

"In the Unions' view" stated Mr. Mansfield "it is totally wrong that a multi-national Company which received substantial grants from the State and also received the fullest co-operation from all concerned in the Local Authorities and indeed the Local Community in 1970 in order to generate employment should be allowed to pull out of the country a large drop of a hat without any prior discussions or consultations with their employees. The majority of whom have given 12 years of loyal service to Quigley Magnesia."

At the point out that the value of the employment of the 140 people at Quigley Magnesia was, in recent years, also in wages and salaries each year plus an estimated £1 million in company pension and contract in the area while the

C.I.E. operation was estimated in excess of £1 million per annum. The statement also pointed out that in the Tax Year just ended the employees had even been told about it in this regard the Company was accused of "very shabby treatment" towards the work force.

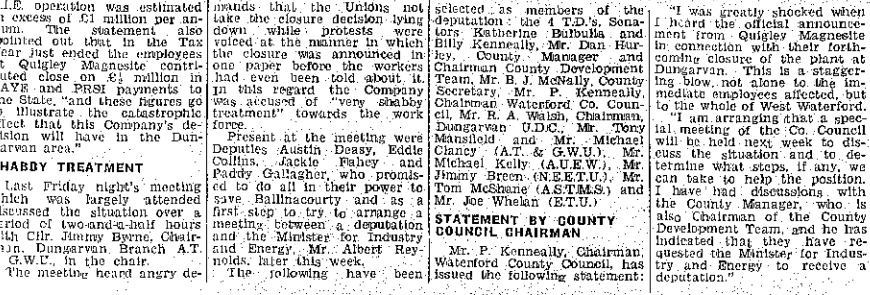

STATEMENT BY COUNTY COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

Mr. P. Kennedy, Chairman Waterford County Council, has issued the following statement:

"I was greatly shocked when I heard the official announcement from Quigley Magnesia in connection with their forthcoming closure of the plant at Ballinacourty. This is a staggering blow, not alone to the immediate employees affected, but to the whole of West Waterford. I am arranging that a special meeting of the Co. Council will be held next week to discuss the situation and to determine what steps, if any, we can take to help the position. I have had discussions with the County Manager, who is also Chairman of the County Development Team, and he has indicated that they have requested the Minister for Industry and Energy to receive a deputation."

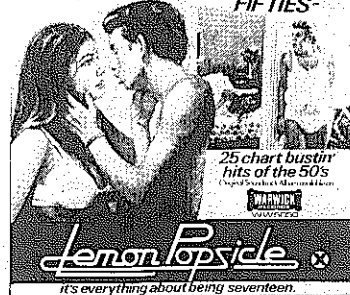

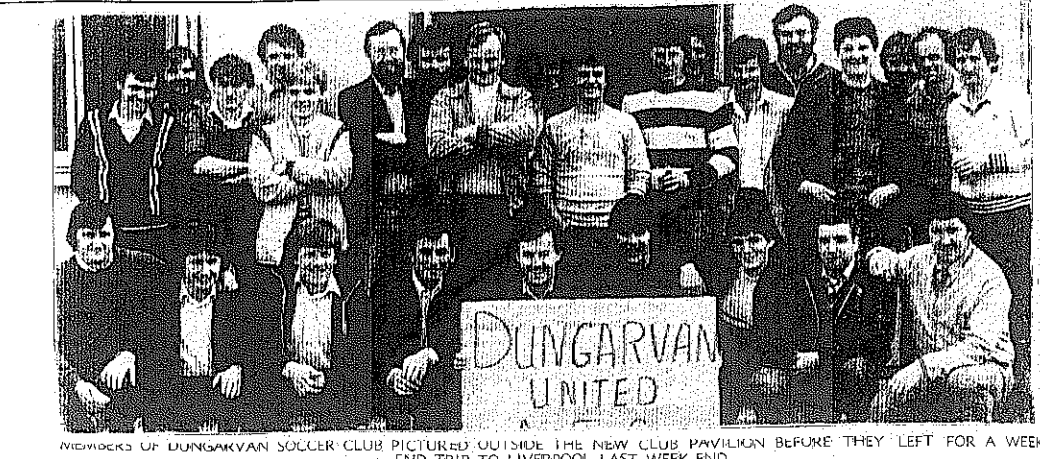

Our debt is now reduced to £20,000, so we are anxious to clear it completely and therefore are most grateful for donations of any kind however small.

The home was opened to guests in May, 1980 and has since then been a success story. The building itself is a modern, equipped house with accommodation for 25 people in single and twin bedded rooms, all of which have H and C staff together with central heating. The building is fully carpeted and tastefully decorated. It has a modern kitchen, large dining room, large sitting room with colour T.V. and various entertainment including bingo and live music.

SITUATION ON INCOME FARMS

There are many, searching statements relating to the current situation on small farms in a report published earlier this month by the Economic and Social Research Institute. They deserve more publicity and closer examination leading to a more realistic picture.

This was stated by Mr. John McGee, Chairman, I.F.A.'s Western Development Committee, at a meeting of the committee in Dublin.

The report in question deals with the distribution of income in agriculture and covers the national scene.

Its references to the situation in agriculture, however, should be more exposed and treated as unacceptable.

For example, it says that "most small farmers, though owner-occupiers, find themselves in poverty and isolation on small, uneconomic holdings that are insufficient to provide a decent living for themselves and their families. The income and standard of living of many small farmers is equivalent to that of unskilled manual labourers."

Such small farmers are to be found everywhere throughout the country, but the bulk of them are in the Western area which, itself suffers from serious disadvantages in terms of infrastructure, type of soil and distance from market are concerned.

Poverty, as defined by the authors of the report is most prevalent among farm families; 24.5 per cent have incomes inadequate to their needs; however, this obscures the concentration of poverty within the sector, if only small and marginal farmers are considered, 28.8 per cent have disposable incomes below the poverty level; 14.9 per cent of medium/large farmers have incomes below our level of adequacy.

For decades, successive Governments have shirked their duty by non-introducing an adequate structural policy to aid smaller farmers - who are the majority. In the meantime, policies alone cannot solve this problem and never will.

He added: "A healthy farm structure is dependent upon the introduction of new blood. This is not happening on smaller farms. At present, in the coming years an increasing proportion of potential total output will be in the hands of people who are not in a position to increase their own level of development in agriculture. We do not want cannot afford and must tolerate."

I.F.A. BULLETIN

MORE IRISH GRAIN SHOULD BE USED IN COMPOUND FEEDS

More than £226 million was spent on imports of cereal and animal feeds in 1981. This was stressed at a meeting between the Irish Cattle Council, I.F.A.'s Grain Committee, ACCO and the Irish Grain and Agricultural Merchants Association.

The meeting was held to discuss promoting the greater use of Irish produced feed grain in compound feeds. The matter is topical at this time as over 70 per cent of compound feed manufactured last year was produced from imported ingredients while Irish feed barley prices since last harvest have remained depressed.

It was established at the meeting that some of the import of cereal substitutes are of dubious quality and poor value for money. It was agreed by all parties that a campaign should begin to make both users and manufacturers of compound feed aware of the advantages of producing quality feedstuffs with the maximum inclusion of Irish grain while, at the same time, maintaining value for money to the feeders of these compounds.

All parties were agreed that the Irish Government should be asked to regulate the quality of cereal substitutes coming into the country and to bring improved regulations for the manufacture of quality compound feedstuffs in force.
